Grasshopper Control

About 38,000 acres of range land has been signed up for grasshopper control work in the county. Most of the acreage is along the Palo Duro. This work is being done by the U. S. D. A. in cooperation with a local committee of ranchers. Spraying by plane is due to get started by June 6th. Total cost of the spraying is 60 cents per acre and the Government is paying one third of this.

Bill Goldston reports that there will be a meeting of all who are signed up to spray and those who might want to spray. Friday night June 3 at 8:00 in the Court room. At this meeting Fred Reese, a U. S. D. A. Entomologist will be present to answer all questions and make final plans. The following men are on the committee: Johnny Venneman, Chairman, G. C. Brillhart, Jr., Ernest Wilmet, Erilis Pittman, Robert Alexander, Sr., and Bill Goldston. This committee does not have anything to sell. Their job is to make sure that all range owners know of this program and to sign them up if they are interested. This work is done by blocks and not by Counties. Apparently another 25,000 acres immediately over the line in Ochiltree and Texas Counties will be sprayed also.

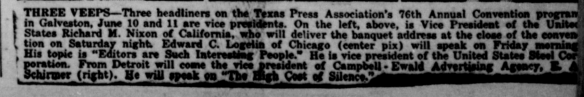

Special To Rice Belt Counties Studies On Water Seeding Rice

College Station, May "Muddying up" the water and soaking the seed before planting doesn't influence the yield of water planted rice, experiments during 1954 at the Rice-Pasture Experiment Station, Beaumont show.

The tests also indicated the time of removal of water after seeding and depth of water in the field had little effect on yields.

Century Patna 211 variety was planted in experimental plots to obtain information on the yield of rice planted under various conditions.

Although no difference was observed in yield between the muddied and unmuddied plots, the muddying operation left a smooth soil surface. This resulted in the seed drifting into low places and caused poor seed distribution. A uniform distribution of seed was obtained where the water was not muddied.

Complete results of the 1954 studies are given in Progress Report 1778, which is available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

Competition In Transportation

A Presidential advisory committee recently recommended the Government relax its controls over the transportation industry and allow competitors to play a larger role in the industry.

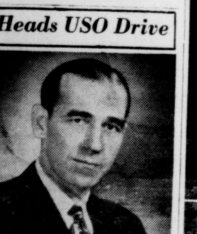
The committee expressed the belief more competition in the transportation industry would make for competitive rate-making and better and more modern transportation services.

As soon as the committee had made its report, some members of Congress assailed the report as being in favor of various methods of transportation. Others however, defended it and it is certain to have some effect in Congress and to be given thorough study at the White House.

That there is a need to do something about present non-competitive features in the transportation industry has been apparent for years. Trucking lines have long competed with railroads, and airlines with both, and this competition is sometimes limited by Government regulations and sometimes not.

In the case of the railroads, however, competition is seldom in evidence and this has worked to the disadvantage of the railroads themselves. For example, a passenger in Chicago may inquire at the offices of several different railroads and be given the same passenger-ticket fare to Los Angeles. He may travel several hundred miles more on one line than he would on the other, and go considerably out of his way, but the price would still be the same.

Texas 4-H Clubs Have Part In Texas Friendship To Korea

College Station, May — Texas 4-H club members, cooperating with the Christian Rural Overseas Program, American Korean Foundation, Church World Service and Heifer Project, Inc., are out to prove to the world the true meaning of the spiritual part of their 4-H pledge.

The day of proof will come June 20 when the Texas Friendship to Korea sails from the port of Houston loaded with livestock, poultry, rabbits, garden flowers and forage seeds, garden tools, books and bookshelves, supplies, poultry and dairy equipment, a team of mules with harness, pick-up trucks, a combine and at least 200 pedal type sewing machines. Other items which will be used in youth work in Korea are also included. Total value of the cargo may exceed \$2,000,000. The contributions made by 4-H members, their friends and supporters in Texas will go to 4-H members in Korea. The enrollment in Korean 4-H clubs now exceeds 100,000.

The program is being handled through the CROP office in Fort Worth under the direction of Walter Parr. He is receiving invaluable assistance from Harris County Agent Dan Clinton, L. D. Cain and from church and lay leaders as well as district and county Extension agents and 4-H leaders. Local pastors and extension agents can supply information on the program.

"Despite the continuing drought," Parr says, "the response to appeals for aiding the thousands of homeless and orphaned children in Korea has been excellent. Ned bought the home section in 1940

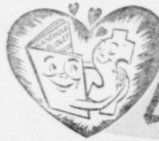
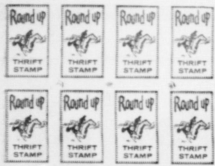

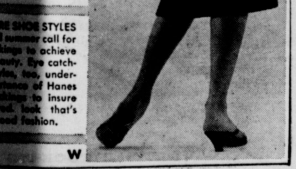

Reenlistment In Navy Carries Old Ranks

The Navy announced that applicants for enlistment in the regular Navy who are members of reserve components of any branch of the Armed Forces may enlist without losing rank up to and including pay grade E-3. If otherwise qualified, they may also enlist under the High School Graduate Training Program choosing an occupational field before enlisting.

This applies to members of the Navy, Marine Corps, Army, Air Force and the National Guard who have not served on active duty other than training periods.

Time served in a reserve unit prior to enlisting in the Navy will count toward the individual's eight year military obligation as well as for pay purposes.

Men enlisted under this program will be transferred to the Navy Training Center in San Diego, California, for recruit induction.

Questions & Answers

Q—I am required to take a physical examination to reinstate my license. GI insurance policy. Would VA accept an examination made by an osteopath?

A—Yes, provided the osteopathic physician is a graduate of a recognized college of osteopathy, and is listed in the current directory of the American Osteopathic Association.

Q—I bought a house with a GI loan. Occasionally I earn a few extra dollars on the side, and I'd like to use this money to pay off the loan in advance. Is there any minimum set for these pre-payments, or may they be for any amount?

A—Your pre-payments may be for either one monthly payment or \$100, whichever is less, or in multiples of either one of those payments.

Q—I have been taking on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill. I intend to change my course to on-the-job training in a different field. I already have had three reductions in my GI training allowance. After I change, will I receive the full rate of allowance, or my current reduction rate?

A—Since you are changing your job training course, you will receive the full rate of allowance at the beginning of your new course. This rate will be reduced at four-month intervals.

Q—How much money can I borrow on my permanent National Service Life Insurance policy?

A—You may borrow up to 94 percent of the cash value of your policy. Your VA District Office where you mail your premiums, can give you the amount of your current cash value.

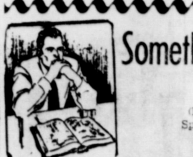

As long as we find an attitude like that there is hope. The sooner more of us can find it in our hearts to say, "I put it there," "I have no one to blame but self," or "I have sinned"—just that soon we will see a most inspiring improvement in our lives.

God in his infinite wisdom, could force this condition, and because of his great love for mankind, he gave us the necessary tools to be used in overcoming this and all of our sins. May He help us to use them to the salvation of our souls, should be our constant prayer. Think about it.

He will return to WT in the fall.

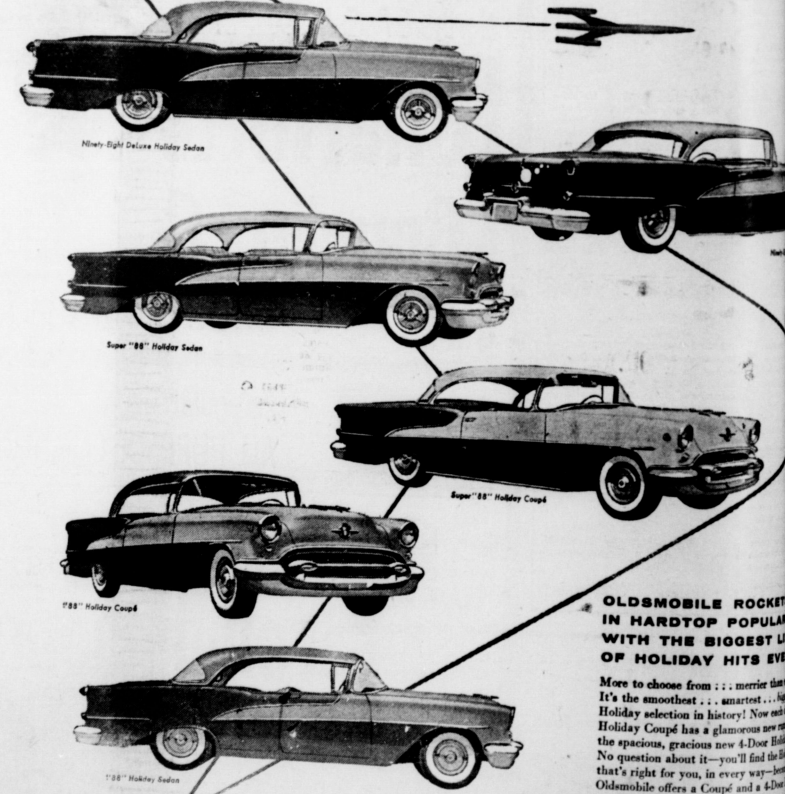
