Emergency Reinforcement Plan Effective July 1

The Department of the Army has announced that its new emergency reinforcement plan, whereby officers and enlisted personnel released from active duty with eight-year obligations are designated for specific assignments in the event of mobilization, will be initiated in continental U. S. Army areas starting

July 1. The plan is designed to assure the prompt filling of recall quotas for active duty during early phases of mobilization, as well as to encourage voluntary participation in National Guard and Reserve training programs. Men selected for emergency reinforcement designations will be from among those who are not participating as members of reserve component units. These reservists will be designated for three-year periods as reinforcements to active Army units or installations and to National Guard and Army Reserve units located as near their homes as practicable. However, the reinforcement designations can be terminated by men who enlist in the Regular Army or a National Guard unit, or those who volunteer for assignment to an Army Reserve unit with the objective of full and active participation.

The plan will not be applied to obligated reservists who have undergone hardships and suffering in, or as a result of, combat. The reinforcement designations are not "assignments" in the ordinary sense. The men will not become organic parts of their respective organizations, merely being pre-selected for assignment on or after M-Day when the unit and individuals are ordered to active duty. In all cases the designations will be limited so as not to cause any unit or installation to exceed 115 per cent of its authorized strength plus emergency reinforcements. Obligated reservists who have had prior National Guard or Army Reserve service will generally be designated to National Guard or Army Reserve units, respectively. 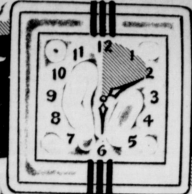

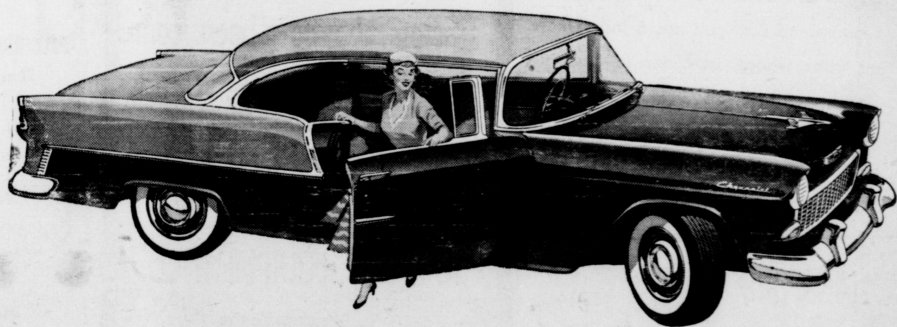

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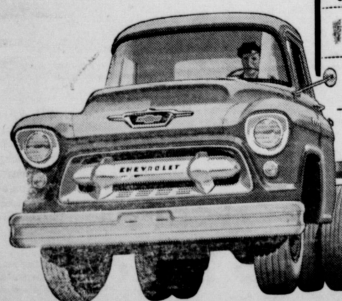

Washington News Letter From Your Congressman Walter Rogers

July 8, 1955
DISTRICT

FEDERAL EXPENDITURES

Federal agencies, according to a report from Senator Byrd's committee, entered the third quarter of fiscal year 1955 with unexpended balances and authorizations totaling 101.1 billion dollars. This does not mean that these agencies had this much cash on hand. It means that agencies, on March 31, 1955, were still authorized to call upon the Treasury for sums in that amount. The third quarter of fiscal year 1955, being April, May and June of this year, has already passed, but the final figures on expenditures have not been released.

For the first three quarters of the 1955 fiscal year, the agencies had spent 47.2 billion dollars. For strictly military services 26.3 billion was spent, leaving a balance of \$7.3 billion.

The Foreign Operations Administration spent 2.8 billion during the first nine months of fiscal year 1955, and entered the last three months with a balance of 10.1 billion dollars. You will recall that in a previous newsletter I pointed out that 3.13 billion dollars was added to the balance in the recent foreign aid authorization. The balance of 10 billion dollars on hand was one of the several reasons that I voted against adding more funds to the

balance out of the taxpayers' pockets.

18 billion dollars was spent by other agencies of the government, leaving a balance in their accounts of \$3.7 billion. You will no doubt wonder why such stuporous balances should be present when the government is operating on a deficit. Most of these balances represent appropriations and authorizations for expenditures to be made upon the fulfillment of contracts for military and other equipment and supplies that must be ordered in advance. In some cases, contracts are entered into what will be fulfilled for several years. However, the appropriation or authorization for the appropriation must be made in order to provide the means for the government to carry out its part of the contract.

TENSION IN THE CAPITAL

Our own Texas, Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson, was the victim of what could well be called capital tension. All of us who know Johnson are well aware of the force with which he continually drives himself in carrying on his work. The tremendous responsibilities that rest on his shoulders and the conscientiousness with which he always tries to fulfill them would be a heavy burden for several men to carry. As a session of Congress begins to draw near a close, these tensions increase and more demands are

made on all of the Members, and especially those in the position of leaders or spokesmen for their respective parties. These sometimes become too great for the human body to support. This is no doubt what happened to Lyndon. I feel certain that his condition is temporary, but it will require much rest and careful nursing for him to be restored to his former vigorous self. Everyone is going to help, and we hope that within the next few months he will be fully recovered with no bad after-effects.
