Rev. Ottinger, who is also Chaplain of the American Legion organization for this district, was rather reluctant to provide the above picture, but was persuaded to do so.

Rev. Ottinger was born in the state of Tennessee the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Ottinger. His parents were farmers and ranchers and migrated from Tennessee to their new home in Oklahoma near Deval, Oklahoma when their son Cecil was 6 years of age. The family moved to Burkburnett, Texas and Boise City, Oklahoma during the years Cecil received his grade school and high school education. Young Ottinger first made his plans to become a minister back in 1922. During that year he was licensed to preach and entered upon his active ministry. While Ottinger preached at several small church during the next few years, his first pastorate began at Optima, Oklahoma in 1936. At that time Cecil was completing his college work at Goodwell College. He completed his education and training at S. M. U., Dallas, Texas.

Rev. Ottinger has been pastor at McCauley, Texas; Tye, Texas; Booker, Texas; Shallow Water, Texas; Higgins, Texas; Happy, Texas before moving to Gruver.

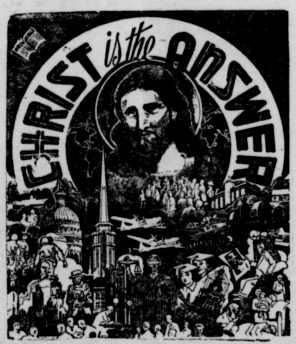
Rev. Ottinger spent 3 years in the Armed Service, devoting most of his tour of Duty in the Southwest Pacific. He retired from active duty as a Major.

There are those who feel that France should work out a truce, and of this sentiment comes from France. It is doubtful that a truce in Indochina would accomplish anything except causing France to lose face. The Reds know this, and it is one of the moving reasons for the terrific pressure now being put on by the Reds.

On the political side of the ledger, the Near East is still the hot spot. You don't read much about it or hear very much about it, but the heat is there and creates a problem that must be faced straight across the board sooner or later. The sooner it is faced, I think, the quicker we will be in a position to take steps that could well avoid a third world war.

Another political hot spot is, of course, Italy. The Communists fully realize the terrific post-war strain that is usually present in the moral fiber of those people who have lost the war. They are playing this to the hilt in Italy, and it is going to take strong and honest leadership to knock them down. The incident in France was a tragic thing, but all hope that it will blow away the fact and meet their responsibility.

There has been more comment around here about the reference of the President to the Congress-

ional investigations in his recent speech than any other subject that he treated. Everyone was waiting to see when and where the President would make some comment on some of the uproar that is going on in the Congressional investigations. He touched on the subject very well in his speech and furnished the solution for some of these troublesome matters by calling upon everyone for adherence to the traditional American rule of fair play. Every true American is a fundamental believer in fair play. However, it is understandable that human emotions sometimes take temporary control of a person and cause things to be said and done that are not in keeping with these rules of fair play.

The President was giving good advice when he talked about people setting down and approaching these problems with sound and basic reasoning. The quickest and most effective method of attaining desired results is to play the game hard but to play it fairly and squarely. Successes that are won by the employment of false and unfair tactics are usually short-lived. As my grandmother used to say, "Chickens always come home to roost."

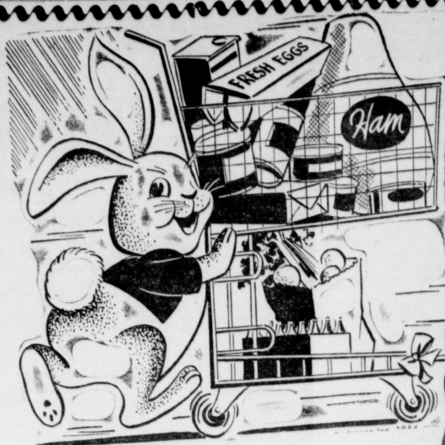

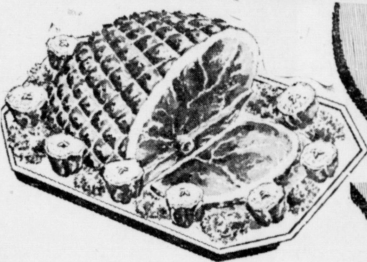

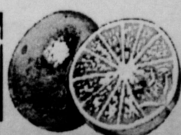

Cancer Crusade Starts This Week

The volunteers who are conducting the 1954 American Cancer Society crusade in Hansford County have a two-fold assignment," ACS chairman Mrs. Bob Skinner said in an interview here today.

In addition to soliciting funds," she explained "these campaign workers are carrying out a house-to-house basis—the Society's year-round program of cancer education. This program is concentrated on teaching all adult Americans that cancer usually is curable only when limited to the site of origin and that the disease may often be diagnosed in an early stage by one of several danger signals."

The ACS chairman pointed out that this concentration of imparting cancer information to the public during April—Cancer Control Month—has been reflected in cancer cures.

Doctors, she said, have reported that more people have come for physical check-ups during April than during any other month in the year. The result has been more cancers detected in time for successful treatment.

The nationwide goal for the 1954 cancer crusade is \$20,000,000.

"The 1954 crusade funds," the

chairman said, "will be devoted to the Cancer Society's three-fold program of research, professional and public education and service to patients.

"Research is no long range quest for knowledge that will lead to successful cancer cures or preventives that will conquer the disease. Education aims at teaching Americans to take advantage of present cancer treatments before spreads of the disease has made cure impossible. Patient service seeks to provide cancer patients with sickroom necessities and comforts.

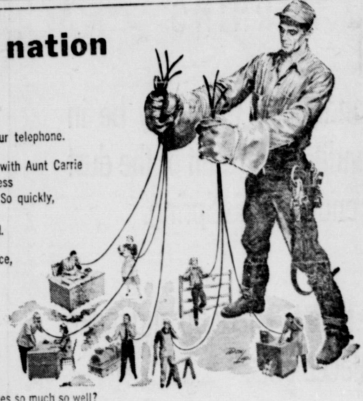

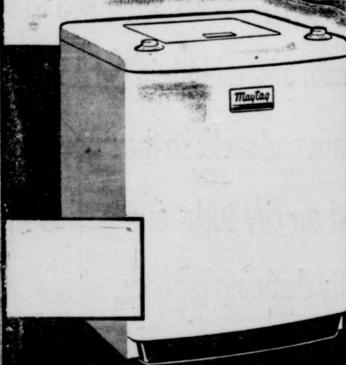
