Rev. Boyd has a tent for the services that will seat 1000 people. Through the church, he has arranged to have a 60 voice choir of local talent. Martin Spell, director of the choir.

Rev. Boyd started out in life to become an accountant and had become assistant to chief accountant at the Todd Dry Dock & Corporation in Galveston when he felt the call of God to preach the gospel. He quit his job and entered the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at Fort Worth.

He pastored a Dallas Church 3 one-half years while he was a student at the Seminary.

Rev. Boyd was an all American tackle while he was a student at Texas A. and M. But turned down offers to play pro football to become an accountant.

Rev. Boyd has been in full time evangelism since 1948, conducting an average of 20 campaigns every year since.

Oscar Donnell Is Chairman Of 1954 Emergency March of Dimes

Allan Shivers News Letter
AUSTIN, Tex., Aug.—Governor Allan Shivers said this week that twisted facts and misrepresentations were hampering prospects for an increase in old age pensions.
He said the facts were being clouded in such a way by his opponent that the voters did not have a clear understanding that they have the right to cast ballots in November on increasing pensions.
He pointed out that the people will vote in the November election on a constitutional amendment to raise the ceiling on old age assistance.
"Many people do not realize that this question is not for a decision by Allan Shivers or Ralph Yarborough but by the people themselves in the November election," the Governor said.
The Governor said misleading statements by Yarborough have confused the people to the point where it is crippling prospects of a fair vote on the amendment.
Shivers said that his opponent, a former district judge, has never lifted a finger to help increase any pension. Instead, he worked diligently to increase pensions for retired judges.
"If he were really interested in old age pensions, he would have done the same thing for the old people of Texas that has done good for the retired judges. He has appeared before the Legislature urging \$400 month pension for judges, but he never has walked to the State Capitol, where the Legislature meets, to recommend even so much as one dollar more for the old folk."
"I do not believe he really wants to do anything about old age pensionage pensions, or other problems of Texas people, except to use them as a vehicle for meaningless campaign promises."
Senator George Parkhouse of Dallas, who just won another four year term with out opposition, supported Shivers on his old age assistance record. Parkhouse noted that Shivers lever put on the statute books in Texas.
"Allan Shivers told the old people two years ago that he would lend his support to a constitutional amendment to increase old age pensions. The people of Texas will vote on that amendment in November—proof that Allan Shivers carries out his promises."

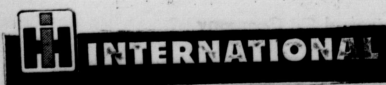
