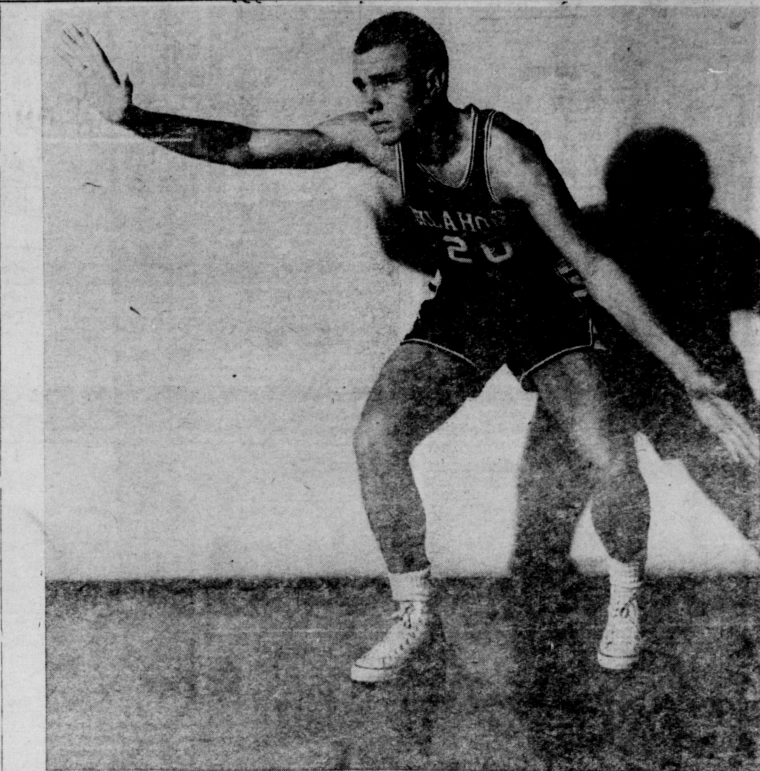
Reporter Will Hold Election Party Saturday, Jan. 15th

Lynn Hart An All-Time Hansford County Athletic GREAT

Sensitivity rings a much-sought after tone with any athletic coach, and that quality has been the sport-life story of Lynn Hart, dependable Oklahoma Sooner cager from Okmulgee, Texas. The budding 21-year-old has been the most accurate field goal and free throw shot on the Oklahoma squad for two years. After lettering four years in football, basketball and baseball at Gruver high school, Hart is now shooting for his fourth monogram in basketball at Oklahoma. With eight games under his belt this season, Hart once again is pacing the Sooner squad in free-throw percentage and is second among the regulars in the field goal percentages. The 6-2 forward has landed 44 of 55 free throw attempts for a red-hot 80 per cent.

Only center Fred Muller tops Hart in field goals, having hit 17 of 34 for a percentage of 406. The graver native has averaged an even 12 points per game. Last year Lynn netted 414 per cent of his field goal tries and 78.2 per cent of his free shots, and he led the team in both departments as a sophomore. After lettering during his freshman season, Hart made the starting team several times during the last two seasons and is now one of coach Bruce Drake's regulars. A steady, all-around player Hart seldom has a "bad night,"

but such players do get a big whirl out of winning certain games. "The Aggie game last year would have to be it," Hart said sitting on a bench in the fieldhouse before practice. Hart was remembering the starting 62-50 Sooner upset of the Oklahoma Aggies at Stillwater, Okla., last February. It was the first A&M loss in Gallagher hall in 27 games and it cut a 17-game winning streak. Hart is majoring in business management at Oklahoma University and lacks only 21 hours to graduate. He is hoping to take a correspondence course and finish his requirements to get his degree in June. Following graduation Uncle Sam has the first words to say about Hart's plans. The 175-pound cager will receive a Second Lieutenant commission in the Air Force as soon as he receives his degree.

While playing at Gruver high school, Hart helped the Gruver Oklahoma Class B state championship in basketball in 1949, his junior year. Hart also was selected for all-state in the cut sport, Lawrence Brotherton coached him in high school. Lynn is the son of Jim Hart, Gruver farmer, and the transplanted Sooner plans to return to his father's farm after graduation. His brother, Jon, is a freshman at Gruver high school.

City Bond Issue Postively Will Not Raise Taxes In City

According to information from Mayor C. A. Gibbs, the proposed city bond issue, which comes up for vote in Spearman Tuesday January 25th, will positively not call for any raise in tax rate or valuation. This is due to the fact that the city of Spearman is CITY OF DEBT, so far as Tax bonds are concerned. This is not quite true as of today, but the money is available and the last of the tax bonds have been called

ed in and on February 1st this city will not owe a single tax bond. There is a matter of a few revenue bonds for gas that remain to be liquidated, but these bonds are far ahead of schedule and are not tax bonds but strictly revenue bonds. City officials KNOW that the present tax rate will take care of liquidating the proposed water and sewerage bonds that will be voted on January 25th.

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Judge Dent Predicts 10

Expansions

Predicts 5000 Irrigation Wells Soon

Judge Otho Dent, member of the state water board, is very active in a hand full of Hansford citizens at the District court room in Spearman Wednesday afternoon.

Judge Dent comes to the water board as a member of the Canadian river to bring information so that folk can intelligently vote in the coming water election to be held in eight counties of this area January 21st.

The Dent has a wealth of experience in having been active in the formation of the water district on the South Plains, and also being a member of the state water board, with all information relative to water at his finger tips.

His talk was a folksy talk, and he led the interested land owners into a series of questions that revealed the need for district control or face the possibility of the state becoming the owner of underground water and placing control on irrigation wells.

One statement made by this member of the water board was that the recent survey showed 5500 irrigation wells North of the Canadian river. Judge Dent predicted that there would be more than 5000 irrigation wells drilled North of the Canadian river during the next 5 years.

This is a conservation estimate, and local people believe there will be eventually be more than 2000 irrigation wells in Hansford County and that trade territory.

Judge Dent stated that 83 per cent of all underground water used for irrigation is used for irrigation. Of this amount 70 per cent is used in the North and South Panhandle area.

He emphasized the fact that a constitutional amendment could be voted to allow the state to own the water and vest the ownership in the state. To show the danger from this standpoint he pointed out that 65 per cent of the population of the state was located in municipalities of 10,000 population or more.

The remaining 35 per cent many live in towns of 2500 or less and many strictly rural land owners irrigate with surface water from rivers. These land owners are anxious to get the ownership of the underground water in the state, since the surface water is owned by the State, and land owners complain that the Plains land owners are pumping the water out and drying up the springs that enabled them to irrigate extensively.

It is a real shame that all the qualified voters of the area could not have heard this talk by Judge Dent. Certainly, they would realize the need for forming the water district composed of eight counties North of the Canadian river.

Irrigation Farmers Of Area Given Information By Regional Engineer

H. P. (Svede) Swanson, Soil Conservation service irrigation engineer, stationed at the Amarillo Experiment Station, was guest speaker at the Hansford County Irrigation Club meeting Thursday night.

Swanson talked on his work and its relations to the irrigation farmers in the High Plains Area. He also mentioned that irrigation in the High Plains is more efficient than any other irrigated area in the country. In this area, about 60 gallons of every 100 gallons pumped reaches the plant root zone. In some areas the efficiency drops as low as 23.3 per cent.

Some of the points stressed by Swanson for high acre yields of Grain Sorghums were (1) High plant population per acre. This means more heads produced, more roots in the soil to make use of the water supplied and the thick stand shades the ground thus reducing evaporation. (2) A staggered planting system. This enables the farmer to water the crop as each planting becomes old enough and large enough to irrigate.

(3) Plant late enough in the season that the crop has a shortening growing day rather than days increasing in length. (4) Give the crop all the water it needs, rather than plant large acreage and use an insufficient amount of water, plant fewer acres and water them adequately.

Gran Sorghum requires approximately 15-18 inches of water for good yields and "applying only enough to keep the plants alive and hoping for rain does not always pay off," the speaker said.

Swanson used slide films during his talk to show the results obtained using varying amounts of water and different planting rates per acre.

EXPLANATION

There has been two articles printed in this paper and a letter sent out to the citizens, by a group opposing an election to give the county commissioners authority to lease the hospital. We feel we need are confusing and misleading.

There are some of the facts we feel the people should know. "Shut doctor" election carry to lease the hospital, the commission court is not bound to lease the hospital, but merely have the authority to do so; this authority would give the simple mistake more power of control over the hospital and its method of operation. Under the present status the commissioners are not authorized to lease the hospital, even though an opportunity might arise where such a lease might be in the best interest of our county.

The matter which is to be voted on at the polls next Saturday is not a contest between medical doctors and Osteopathic doctors, or whether to lease the hospital open or close it, but the simple question of whether or not the commissioners should be authorized to lease the hospital where such a lease would be in the best interest of the county.

The Commissioner's Court and the County Judge are elected by a majority vote of the people in this county and are responsible officials who have done a good job and certainly should be given the authority to handle the hospital in the same way they have the authority to handle other county property. We do not think these officials will take this authority lightly, should it be given and lease the hospital to a "Shut doctor", as some people would lead you to believe. We have faith in the county officials and believe that they would handle this matter with the same good judgment they use in handling all other county affairs under their authority.

Some of the group which are opposing this election had sponsored petitions themselves, calling for an election for leasing the hospital, but asking that the commissioners be authorized to lease to a Medical Doctor only, which is the original purpose. The lack of qualified signing the qualifying petition requests only all other county affairs under their authority.

East, the United Nations decried an Indonesian request to have the Dutch resume negotiations with Indonesia over the status of West New Guinea. Greece was thwarted if an effort to bring the Cyprus question up for consideration, and colonial lands in North Africa lost an effort to force the French to take more satisfactory action toward granting independence in this area. Such defeats of independence aspirations are defeats for the democracies, since the Communists play up these nationalistic issues and blame the old colonial powers for keeping native peoples in colonial areas in subjugation.

There is much to the fact that some of the European allies of the United States, those which have been colonial powers for centuries, having not kept pace with the times in granting independence to their colonies. These major powers exert considerable influence in the United Nations and have been able to thwart the logical aspiration of many independence-minded people on many occasions. The United States, which places the friendship of these major powers above the possible support of independence minded people in various areas, is following what might be an expedient policy, but one which might cause regrets in the future.

We do not believe that colonial areas can suddenly be freed, and that all of them should be given immediate freedom. However, we believe that if the colonial powers in the United Nations do not make definite progressive moves in that direction, Asians, Africans and other people who are filled with discontent might be drawn into the Communist orbit.

The 35 Chinese Students
One of the puzzling developments in the current tense situation involving eleven imprisoned Americans is the State Department's apparent willingness to swap thirty-five students or some of them, for the imprisoned Americans. Little had been heard about the Chinese students—who are being detained in this country—until the present tense developed.

At first the State Department's attitude was reported as one of being open to proposals for a swap. Then the news from Washington changed and it was said that the State Department might be willing to entertain offers from the Chinese Communists on a possible swap. We think the fact that two versions of policy came out of Washington in a short time regrettable and we are not interested in swapping legitimately-detained Chinese for illegally-imprisoned prisoners of war.

If the United States has detained the Chinese under unmentionable circumstances, then that in itself is not very heartening news. If on the other hand, we have detained them rightfully, then the Chinese deserve no such swap. Rather, the United Nations should be allowed to generate whatever pressure it can behind its efforts to release the Americans. Actually, if the U. N. fails, the United States might have to resort to other methods—and this last resort may come within a year, or after several years. The answer to that question is unknown at this time.

It is frustrating to know that eleven prisoners of war, and probably many more are being held by the Chinese. While we are anxious for the thirty-five students to be swapped, in exchange for them and other prisoners, we feel that the State Department switch on this question, and the fact that they have not been offered in earlier proposals for trading prisoners, are unfortunate circumstances.

Connie Mack stadium is sold to the Phillies. Nehru says Moscow and Peiping do not want war. Outlays for new plant and equipment in the first quarter of 1955 will run at an annual rate of \$26,000,000, just below the present rate, according to official estimates. The nation's accident death rate is headed for a new low this year.

The Balloons Continue To Descend

The United States has rejected a strong protest from Communist Hungary, aimed at stopping the current balloon barrage which has been bringing as many as 15,000,000 "freedom leaflets" a month down on Hungary territory. The Hungarians claim that the leaflets were sponsored by the United States and that they tended to incite rebellion and trouble.

The United States disagrees with this viewpoint and has rejected the Hungarian note. The United States' position was that the leaflets only suggested that the people of Hungary use legal means to regain their freedom. Moreover, the United States, not pointed out that it was regrettable that a balloon barrage was maintained between free people and the Hungarians, and stressed the hope that these conditions would not continue.

Among other points, the leaflets have been stressing the Hungarian people's right to freedom of worship, freedom of conscience, freedom of speech and freedom of assembly. In addition the notes have stressed the Hungarian people's right to preserve their wealth for their own people before it is sent to foreign governments. That, of course, refers to Russia.

The balloon barrage on Hungary began on October 2nd, and since that time leaflets have been showering down on that country at steady rate. A barrage was begun over Czechoslovakia earlier.

The balloons are thought to be sent aloft from West Germany and are capable of releasing leaflets from a height of thirty thousand feet. The release of the leaflets is effected by a new device trigger, which spreads the leaflets over a wide area, instead of dumping them in one concentrated place.

We are glad to see that the balloon barrage is having some success, and if the Hungarians go to the trouble to protest against this barrage, that seems to be proof that it is accomplishing results.

About Your Home

Vegetables cooked in a tightly covered saucpan with half their weight in water, have been found to be superior in appearance, flavor and color to those prepared in a waterless cooker. Large amounts of ascarbic acid can be retained in such vegetables as broccoli, peas, snap beans, asparagus, Brussels sprouts, cabbage and cauliflower when the correct amount of water and a tightly sealed saucpan is used. This method is very important because ascarbic acid, or vitamin C, is highly sensitive to heat.

Veal shoulder roast is a good buy now at about thirty-three cents a pound. The shoulder cut is very meaty, with very little bone or fat.

Have your butcher bone a four or five pound square cut shoulder, cream two tablespoons fat with the crushed clove garlic, one teaspoon salt, one-quarter teaspoon sage and pepper to taste. Rub over boned area of meat and tie into shape.

Cook covered in a moderate oven for about two hours. Turn meat often in the fat to baste it. It may be necessary to add a little water during cooking. Remove roast to a hot platter. Strain broth, skin off excess fat. Add water to make two cups of liquid. Thicken with a tablespoon of corn starch, mixed with three tablespoons of sherry.

Heat in the gravy, turning often to glaze surface. Remove the strings.
