Snow Totals Two Inches On Saturday

Winter has let its presence be known throughout the State of Texas with a massive white blanked laid over everything exposed to the sky.

On Saturday morning, two or more inches of snow covered the ground throughout Bailey County, with an additional 3-5 inches predicted for the day on Saturday, and an additional 2-4 inches in the forecast for

At presstime, only two accidents had occurred in Bailey County which were attributed to the road conditions.

DPS Trooper Lacie Kirk investigated an accident in the Needmore area on SH214 and City Officers investigated another accident at the 'Crossroads' with both accidents resulting from the snow packed roads.

National Weather Service issued a winter storm warning for a large area of Texas, extending from the Panhandle to as far south as the hill country. Moist Pacific air has been overrunning an arctic surface air mass, and is expected to add considerable more snow to the accumulation ready on the ground.

NWS also posted travelers advisories for most northern and western sections of the state.

Driving was expected to be hazardous throughout the entire western part of Texas, as well as Eastern New Mexico.

Although no roads were closed, NWS issued warnings to discourage driving unless absolutely necessary.

An 80 percent chance for snow was forecast for Saturday, with snow expected to continue through Sunday.





Again, Hightower says "No" to nuclear dump

(AUSTIN)--"I don't care if the U.S. Department of Energy has narrowed its sites for the proposed high-level nuclear dump to nine square miles or nine square inches. We don't want it anywhere in Texas," State Agriculture Commissioner Jim High-

The DOE, which earlier designated a 300-square-mile area in Deaf Smith County and a 190-square-mile area in Swisher County as potential storage sites, has unexpectedly narrowed the possible locations to nine square miles in both Panhandle counties, without advising affected landowners.

"DOE can play by the rules, or they can break the rules," Hightower said of the federal agency's continued push to select a site before the siteselection process is finalized "We at the Texas Department of Agriculture remain committed to keeping the nastiest stuff known to mankind out from underneath some of the most valuable agricultural land, and one of the most precious underground water reservoirs in our state.

"It's our soil, our water, our farms and our people they are risking. The people of the Panhandle have spoken loudly and clearly: They don't want a nuclear dump in their backyard. We'll fight this crazy idea in the Panhandle, in Austin and in Washington-and we'll win."

Reportedly, the other sites still under consideration are in Washington, Nevada, Louisiana, two in Utah and two in Mississippi.

A member of TDA's Natural Resources Division has been in the Panhandle, gathering more information on DOE's two proposed Texas sites and meeting with groups who are opposed to the nuclear dump.



Four-point water conservation plan for Texas announced

Commissioner Jim Hightower has proposed a four-point water conservation program for Texas agriculture "that will cost a tiny fraction of previously-proposed water schemes, yet will conserve trillions of gallons of water for our state over the next decade. From the standpoint of Texas' longterm water needs, from the standpoint of Texas agricultural producers, and from the standpoint of our limited state budget, this proposal is better than a water witch.

"The secret is to get more efficient use of Texas' existing water supply," Hightower told the State Legislature's Joint Committee on Water Resources. "As things now stand, agriculture consumes 72 percent of the water used in Texas. Rather than spending hundreds of millions of dollars to develop or import more water for the needs of agriculture, it is far cheaper-and much more practical--to help individual producers squeeze more use out of the water already available to them. If they can get more 'bang' for each drop, it saves them money, and it saves precious water for other uses.

"By making it financially feasible for individual producers to purchase and implement water conservation equipment and practices, we can save-in a single decade--upward of 20 percent of the water now being consumed by agriculture. We're talking about the possibility of saving 650 billion gallons of water every year. At a cost of \$8 million to \$10 million a year, we can really make a difference in a short time.

'The Water Plan which is submitted to the next session of the Legislature must be flexible enough to deal not only with the problems confronting farmers on the High Plains, but also with livestock producers in Southwest Texas, with non-irrigating farmers in East Texas and with producers in the Rio Grande Valley. Our water shortage is not a regional issue, it's a statewide concern, and conservation of our existing water resources is the key to finding answers.

"What the Texas Department of Agriculture is releasing is a water proposal that meets the needs of all of Texas agriculture, yet it also meets the demands of urban people and conservationists. It was developed by TDA's Office of Natural Resources after months and months of grassroots consultation with farmers, water conservationists, members of the Legislature, other state agencies and concerned individuals. It's been checked out with Governor White, Lieutenant Governor Hobby, Speaker Lewis and Senator Montford.

"While the state can address problems of urban water use by working with the municipalities and water districts that supply homes and

tural water is obtained through comparable irrigation districts. Generally speaking, there are no central pipelines running to farms and ranches. To really address agricultural water, conservation must involve individual producers.

"Unfortunately, Texas agriculture remains in very serious economic trouble, and few producers can make these conservation investments entirely on their own. Investments in conserving water and land resources are cheaper than developing new supplies. In today's economy, absorbing the entire cost of conservation programs is impossible for those producers who most need the assistance. That is why TDA is proposing a program of state financial incentives and technical assistance: to encourage farmers to invest their own money in conservation and to facilitate the projects we need to save our land and water resources for


