# Oklahoma Wins Pride of Plains Football Game

40,000 Texans and 15,000 Okies saw the bulldozing power of Oklahoma's Sooner football team down the Texas Longhorns at the Cotton Bowl Saturday.

Of course it was a grand game. The largest crowd ever to attend a football game in Southwest Conference football history was on hand.

The Longhorns looked beautiful against the Sooners for they thoroughly outplayed them for 15 minutes and 25 seconds, but the rains came and the Sooners proved that they could play rain or shine by showing the damnest offensive and defensive performance since that Texas or Texas, (or that matter) will see this year. After the Longhorns scored, the Sooners came back to score three touchdowns, but the Texas fans will swear that if Ben Frostor hadn't dropped that pass in the end zone, they would have won the ballgame. However, many a game has been won and lost on passes dropped, but don't get us wrong, as a loyal Texan you can't afford to give in to squatters north of the border, even if they did somehow or other come out on the long end of the score.

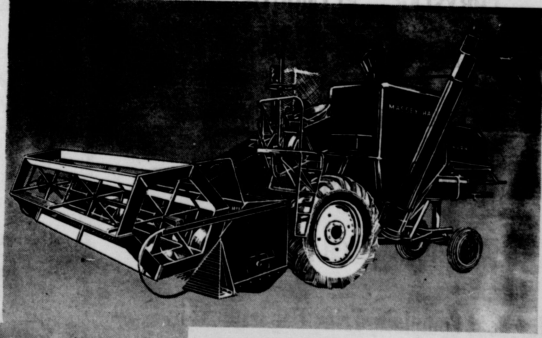

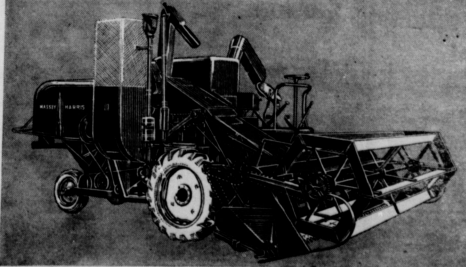
