### Roy Reed Gets MIG-15!

Fifth Air Force, Korea -- Major Roy L. Reed of Spearman, Texas, a U. S. Marine Corps exchange pilot flying F-84 Sabers with the U. S. Air Force 51st Fighter Interceptor Wing in Korea, shot down a MIG-15, Tuesday, April 7. It was the first time that Major Reed has scored against the Russian-built jet fighters, and he made his "kill" on a day when Sabre jet pilots shot down two MIGs, probably destroyed one and damaged several others. Since the start of the Korean war Far East Air Forces aircraft have destroyed 618 of these sweep-wing enemy jets. Major Reed's wife lives at 814 E. Catalina, Santa Ana, Calif. His mother, Mrs. Pearl C. Reed lives in Spearman.

### COUNTY TRAPPER BEN ALSUP CAPTURES 25LB. BOBCAT

County Trapper Ben Alsup was displaying a large Bobcat he had trapped on the Durwood Creek Ranch on Coldwater creek Northwest of Gruver. **KNOW YOUR LOCAL HOSPITAL**

Several years ago a group of public spirited individuals in Hansford county joined in an effort to establish a hospital which would be adequate to serve the needs of the county. The first effort was a cooperative affair in which many persons indicated their interest to the tune of \$100.00 per share. In order to

have a hospital, many persons bought several shares even though they would have only one vote in the enterprise.

Later three alternatives became apparent because of financial difficulties in connection with the operation of the hospital: (1) to lease to private interests, (2) to liquidate (3) to make it a county hospital.

After due consideration the latter choice was made and on or about February 1, 1952 the Hansford County Hospital became a reality. It should be remembered that this came about only because the need for a good hospital to serve the community was sensed by a number of forward looking citizens in the county.

The community should be aware of the fact that Hansford county's hospital is one of the most modern and best equipped hospitals of its size in Texas. It can adequately meet the medical or surgical needs of any emergency which ordinarily arises.

For example it has an X-Ray machine of the latest type. It has a complete laboratory with an expert technician in charge 24 hours a day.

A recent addition to the equipment is a E. K. G. Heart Machine which is used in diagnosing heart ailments.

The hospital will accommodate sixteen patients. It has an excellent operating room, a delivery room and facilities for five babies in the nursery.

The rates for the various services available are as reasonable as can be obtained anywhere.

The hospital through its efficient staff of doctors, and nurses, renders twenty four hour service to the community.

Miss Effie Knott is the Superintendent of nurses.

Infrared rays are similar to rays of visible light, except that the length of their waves is greater than those of red light, which are about 1/40,000th of an inch and are the longest that the eye can detect.
