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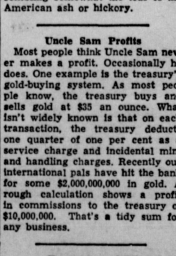
Keerosene and Oil

Mrs. L. D. Hibbs, Secretary, read the minutes. Mrs. Homer Hart, Marketing Chairman, led a discussion on buying pineapple. An order for pecans is now being made up. Mrs. Frank Davis, Chairman of Expansion and Education, made her recommendations for the year's work. In the absence of Mrs. Frank Pierce, Exhibit Chairman, Miss June Gibbs led a discussion concerning a joint or separate Achievement Day for 4-H and Home Demonstration Clubs. Relative to this, a number of clubs expressed a strong interest in a revival of the County Fair.

May of Station, Bruce Roberts of Albuquerque, N. M., Harold Bell of Clovis, N. M.

Jimmy Rex Walker was born August 17, 1921 in Clovis, N. M. He attended the Memphis public school in 1945 and graduated from high school in Albuquerque in 1948, and attended the University of New Mexico from 1948 to 1951. He entered the Air Force in 1951. He was united with the First Baptist Church in Memphis when just a boy, and moved his membership to Albuquerque when the family moved to that city. His father, Seigle P. Walker

preceded him in death March 13, 1949, and his grandfather, E. E. (Red) Walker, died May 18, 1952. Survivors include his mother Mrs. Seigle P. Walker, of Albuquerque, N. M.; his grandmother Mrs. E. E. Walker of Memphis and his grandfather, H. W. Bell, of Los Angeles, Calif. A number of other relatives also survive.

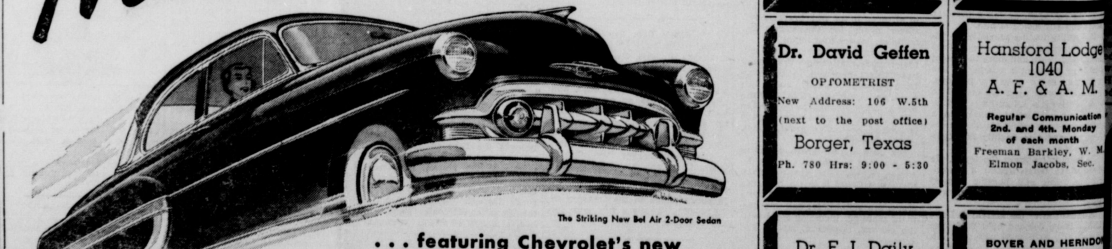

Washington News Letter by Congressman Walter Rogers

Washington, D. C. January 30, 1953.
 The President of the United States is entitled to the full support of both parties in carrying into effect his campaign promises which were approved by the voters: The National Capital is alive with gossip and rumors as to the meaning of the early actions in Congress. Actually, very little has been accomplished in the Congress outside of organizational work. I had hoped that operations would get into full swing immediately after the 29th of January. However, it seems that there has been additional delay awaiting the President's message to the Congress, which will be delivered on Monday following the writing of this letter, which will be before many of you have occasion to read it. The reason for this added delay appears to be the strife between the factions inside the Republican Party. Much of it is due to difference between the factions concerning the dispensing of patronage. It has already reared its ugly head in several of the House and Senate committees. President Eisenhower is obviously doing his best to reconcile these differences and to bring about a spirit of cooperation that will expedite the fulfillment of his campaign promise to the American people. Certainly both parties owe it to this country to cooperate with him and his administration to honor and carry out the wishes of the American people. The two major flare-ups that have occurred and have caused the greatest disturbance are: 1. The curtailment of presidential powers by the Executive Branch of the Government. 2. The proposed tariff increase before the present law, which expires April 1st, the President has the right and power to regulate the bureaus, agencies or departments in the Executive branch of Government by setting up his reorganization program and submitting it to Congress. If the Congress fails to veto such a reorganization program within sixty days by a majority of the full membership of one the Houses of Congress, the program automatically goes into effect. That is, such a program could be defeated by either House of Congress, the House of Representatives, or the Senate, but it must be remembered that in order to defeat such a program, more than a percent of the entire membership of one of the Houses must be opposed to it. In order for medical expense power of reorganization to remain in the President, it is necessary that Congress extend the law. Since one of the major campaign promises of President Eisenhower was the consolidation and simplification of the Federal Government to bring a better order and system, it was assumed that the extension of the Reorganization Act for at least two years would be requested. Extension was requested and was advocated by ex-President Hoover, who as you know headed the Hoover Commission and

received support from the Southern democrats in Congress and many other Democrats in reorganizing and reforming the boards, bureaus and departments of this Government. If such reorganization will result in better efficiency, less federal jobs and less cost to the taxpayer. Such proposals should have the unanimous support of the Congress in both Houses.

The tax reduction proposal that has caused much concern is the proposal by Representative Reed, of New York, to cut off the last tax increase at an early date. This would mean a tax reduction of around 5 1/2 per cent in 1953 and an overall tax reduction in later years of approximately 11 per cent. There is no doubt but that Eisenhower promised the American people that he would work diligently toward tax reduction and the balancing of the budget. The concern on Capitol Hill centers around the question of which is to come first—the chicken or the egg? Representative Reed takes the position that the tax reduction is in order and that balancing of the budget will follow in due course. He is the chairman of the tax writing House Ways and Means Committee and cannot be brushed aside. Other leaders in the Republican Party take the position that a great deal of work must be done on the budget toward a reduction thereof before any tax reductions can be thought of. I do not hesitate to tell you that I expect to support Mr. Reed's position for the tax reduction, if for no other reason than to be

consistent. This was the tax increase that I voted against, and I have not changed my position. It is my thought that the budget will be balanced much quicker if we spend a year or two discussing what we might possibly do without in the way of federal expenditures. A nation is no different from an individual. As long as the money is provided to be spent, the chances are it will be disposed of. Although I would prefer to make the initial tax reduction by increasing personal exemptions, I certainly intend to go along with Mr. Reed if we can get some relief.

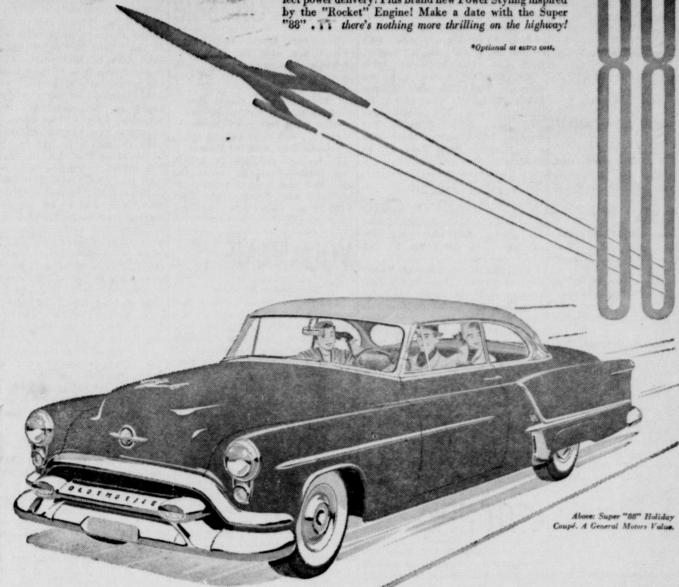
