Old Timers At Gruver

Cancer Research Facts

Research has saved hundreds of thousands of lives and added millions to our national wealth declared Mrs. R. E. Lee, Campaign committee chairman of the Hansford county Division of the American Cancer Society. "The achievements in research since the war," the ACS spokesman said, "demonstrate what can be done when scientists receive proper support. The drop in mortality in rheumatic fever pneumonia and influenza, tuberculosis and many childhood diseases, is an indication that money invested in research pays off."

The ACS chairman pointed out that the death rate from acute rheumatic fever had declined 53 per cent since 1944; from pneumonia and influenza, 47 per cent from tuberculosis since 1945, 42 per cent; from chief communicable diseases in children since 1944, 57 per cent. "No one can place a dollar value on the lives saved, but it is interesting to note that statisticians estimate that those saved as a result of recent research, earn about two and a half billion annually," Mrs. Lee said. "If federal income taxes alone, they say about 165 million dollars annually."

"What scientists have been able to do in saving lives in other diseases, they will be able to do in cancer—if we continue our support of the American Cancer Society and through it, research in 35 states and the District of Columbia."

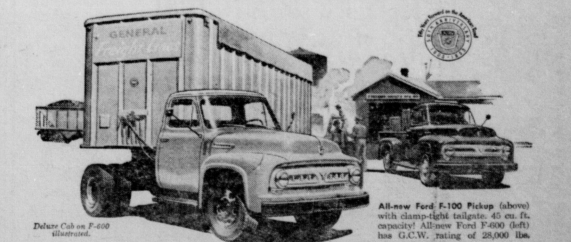
