Selective Service Headquarters Issues New Draft Ruling

Austin, Texas, January 4, 1954—Selective Service Headquarters announced today that Texas draft boards have been called upon to take action which will result in the reinduction of some who already have performed service under the draft law.

Authority for the action is based on a change in Selective Service regulations, following an executive order of President Eisenhower which was put into effect in December.

As a result of the change in regulations, 137 state draft boards will review more than 60,000 files of men who already have spent some time in uniform. Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, the state draft director, said: "The new regulations will remove the possibility of evasion of minimum equitable service by a small number of persons, who, under the former regulations, were required to be classified as having satisfied requirements if they had served on active duty for one day or more."

General Wakefield said, "As revised, the regulations will require a minimum of six months or more of honorable service. The state draft director pointed out that men who do not satisfy this minimum may be otherwise deferrable, but their cases must be reviewed."

This change will mean, General Wakefield said, that an estimated 2,000 to 3,000 persons in the nation and an estimated 100 to 150 in Texas now classified as I-C (discharged or reserve) will be subject to possible reinduction.

1953 Texas Hybrid Corn Contest Winners Announced

Hal Lester Senkel, Milam county 4-H boy, took top honors in the 1953 Texas Hybrid Corn Contest

bushels and 6 pounds of corn an acre was from a planting of Texas hybrid 30. The average corn yield for Texas last year was only 15.5 bushels an acre.

His corn was planted in 36 inch rows with the plants spaced at 9 inch intervals. He used lots of fertilizer—720 pounds of Scott's 400 pounds of 8-8-8 and 300 pounds of anhydrous ammonia an acre before planting and later used another 400 pounds of anhydrous ammonia as a side dressing. Supplemental irrigation was used.

In addition to the acre cash award, young Senkel was also presented a plaque designating him as the "Champion Corn Grower of the Year." The awards were provided by the sponsor of the contest, the Texas Central Hybrid Seed Growers Association. President of the association is David R. Bagley of Martindale.

Mr. D. M. Lacy, State Department of Agriculture, Austin, is secretary. Extension Agronomist W. B. Coke supervised the program.

For contest purposes the state was divided into four areas. Senkel was tops in the Blackland area. The other four winners in the area according to Coke, were Mike Robinson, a Bell county 4-H boy, with a yield of 115.2 bushels an acre; Ed Lyle Senkel, planted Texas hybrid 30. His corn followed alfalfa and 18 loads of manure and 1,000 pounds of phosphate were applied per acre before planting with 600 pounds of ammonium sulphate and 100 pounds of potash being used later as side dressing. W. E. Webb of Hill county was third with a yield of 110.8 bushels an acre. He used the same hybrid without fertilizer. William Gregory and Billy Gene Weiss, both of McLennan county, placed fourth and fifth in the area with respective yields of 94.8 and 93.8 bushels an acre. In the East Texas area, Otto Moser of Bowie county took top honors with a yield of 123.9 bushels an acre. He used Texas hybrid 25 and 30 in 40 inch rows with the plants spaced at 12 inches in the row. He used 250 pounds of 0-14-7 and 100 pounds of anhydrous ammonia an acre before planting.

The corn was planted on land which had been in Bermuda and white clover pasture and supplemental irrigation was the answer for the dry weather during the growing season. Wade Parks of Leon county with 121 bushels an acre from Texas hybrid 28 won second in the area.

Third, fourth and fifth place winners were from upsur county. All used Texas hybrid 30. Jerry Loyd produced 119.9 bushels an acre. Carl Loyd, 118.1 and A. W. Wittcher 114.7 bushels an acre.

In the Gulf Coast and South Texas area, Jimmy Dotson of Burleson county won top honors with a yield of 104.4 bushels an acre. He used 250 pounds of ammonia nitrate an acre as a side dressing. James Knipstein and W. F. Boragsted, both of Washington county, placed second and third with yields of 99 and 93.5 bushels an acre respectively.

Bruno J. Letts of Victoria county produced 91.5 bushels an acre for fourth place and John Jetz of Liberty county placed fifth with a yield of 81 bushels an acre. All planted Texas hybrid 36.

In the fourth area of the state all three winners were from Castro county and all planted Texas hybrid 25. Joe Nelson with 123.1 bushels an acre placed first. He used 200 pounds of 14-7-0 fertilizer before planting and side dressed later with 50 pounds of anhydrous ammonia an acre; Bill Hochester was second with 99.0 bushels an acre. He used 50 fertilizer. Doyle Johnson was third with 73.5 bushels an acre.

Fifty-five head of animals are consigned to this year's show which will be held in a new county barn which has been constructed at Recreation Park. This new barn, which is 70 x 100 will be used as the show arena and sales barn for the Top O' Texas Show.

According to M. C. Overton, Jr., President of the Top O' Texas Hereford Breeders Association, many serviceable aged bulls are included in the consignment. Col. Walter Britten, veteran auctioneer for the southwestern area, will be on hand to cry the sale, which is expected to attract buyers from a wide area.

The Breeders Annual banquet will be held on Tuesday, January 26, at 7:30 P. M. prior to the show and sale on Wednesday, and everyone interested in attending will be most welcome. Reservations can be made by writing to Box 1942, Pampa, Texas.

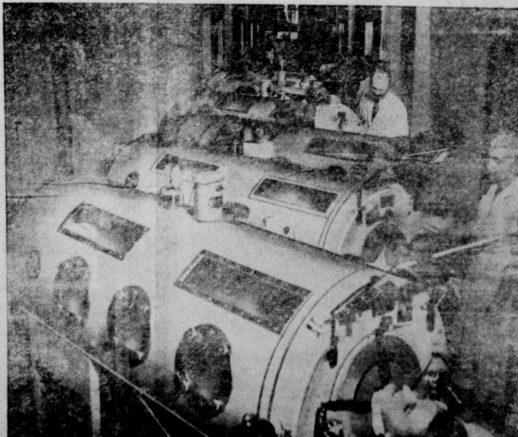

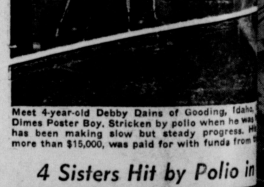

Annual Report**

ANNUAL REPORT: 1953 Hansford Soil Conservation District No. 148 Conservation on all practices has been good in 1953 despite the drought. The waterways that have been established are outstanding in that they are on the most difficult watersheds in the District. One of the watersheds that control has been started on contains over 5,000 acres. Two and one-half miles of waterways have been constructed on the lower end of the watershed. Which will make possible the protection of 1,250 acres of good farm land. This land has in the past received severe water erosion from above watershed.

Irrigation in the District is still on the increase with 33 wells drilled in 1953 making a total of 79 wells in operation on 25,230 acres in the District. Most of the land under irrigation is planted in grain sorghums and wheat with some alfalfa. A large acreage of cover crops has been established and stubble mulch maintained because of the farmers interest in keeping their land covered and protected from wind erosion and water erosion from possible heavy rains after the drought breaks.

Application of conservation practices will probably be good in 1954. A large number of farmers and ranchers postponed application in 1953, because of shortage of money and decreased A. C. P. assistance.

Increased workability of the ACP program and a good outlook for a wheat crop and good grazing will make the farmers and ranchers more able to install needed permanent type conservation practices.

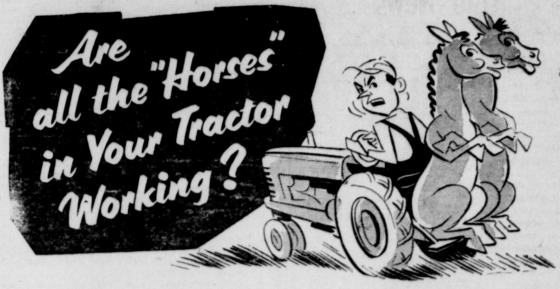
And on Sunday, Faught did offer up the profit unto the Lord in the Enick Baptist church, of which he has been a member for one year.
