**Your Senator Reports  
By Lyndon B. Johnson**

**YOUR SENATORS REPORT**

By Lyndon B. Johnson  
**TWO GROUPS:** Agriculture and small business are of vital importance to Texas. Any development which affects them adversely injures our entire State. In any downward trend of our economy, the first real victims are farmers and small business men. That is why we must keep a close watch for economic danger signals.

The present is being called a period of "transition," of "readjustment." In dealing with the resulting problems, I want to make sure the transition is not from economic sunshine to economic gloom—that we do not reeducate ourselves into a recession.

**FARM INCOME:** Cash income of Texas farmers was 17 per cent less in the first 11 months of 1953 than in the same period of 1952, reports the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas. That was a decline of close to a quarter of a billion dollars.

We had a drought, of course, but falling farm prices were mainly responsible for the drop in income. Overall prices for all farm products went down by 11 per cent during the year.

When farmers receive less total income—and when prices paid for their products keep going down—those are danger signals in any language.

**SAFEGUARDS:** Fortunately, we have machinery for combating a recession if the threat of one should become imminent. Many economic safeguards have been set up by the Government during the last 20 years. We have the know-how—gained from experience—to fight the threat of depressed economic conditions, and to fight it successfully. We must be ready to use this know-how if the necessity arises.

**SOCIAL SECURITY:** President Eisenhower's Social Security message was sent to Congress just three days before the nineteenth anniversary of the day in 1935 when the idea was first proposed

to the lawmakers. President Roosevelt told Congress in 1935 that the job could not all be done at once, that there would be continuing need for improvements in the program. President Eisenhower said in his message, "The human problems of individual citizens are a proper and important concern of our Government." That is the policy upon which the program has stood from its beginning.

Over 50 million persons were covered when the first Social Security Act was passed. Now 70 million persons are covered. President Eisenhower has proposed a substantial addition to that number.

**OPEN-MINDEDNESS:** Mr. and Mrs. Vann Kennedy of Corpus Christi, widely known in Texas newspaper and radio circles, were welcome visitors at my office—J. B. Kirkin, Ralph Burkholder, Bob Sherrill and L. D. McNeill, all of Pecos, were here in connection with the cotton acreage allotment legislation—Texas stands sixth among the States in number of farmer cooperatives. The Texas organization have 110,679 members—A. F. (Andy) Baker of Austin was here with a group of postal employees to discuss legislation of interest to them—Over the whole country, REA electrical cooperative borrowers are \$62,500,000 ahead of schedule in repayment of loans made to them.

**TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE:** The Technical Assistance Program of the United Nations, profitable from the lessons of the past three years, is now planning to place more emphasis on projects for increasing food and industrial output quickly, and less on social welfare.

**BIG FOUR CONFERENCE:** The Big Four Conference of Foreign Ministers, which was scheduled to begin in Berlin on January 24th, will meet the first and third week in the Western sector and the second week in

the Soviet sector. This arrangement ended the stalemate which had threatened to delay the scheduled talks.

Turkey backs the U. S. position on the use of weapons.

The national Farm Union desires the flexible supports.

**Dumont On Color TV**

Allen B. Dumont, President of the Allen B. Dumont Laboratories, Inc. recently speculated that perhaps 50,000 color TV sets would be produced in 1954. He noted that the limitation was the expensive color tube alone carries a retail price of about \$300.

The \$200 tube provides a picture comparable in size to a twelve and a half inch black and white television receiver. With such a tube, it is estimated that the cost of a color set would be between \$800 and \$1,000. Du Mont says the cost will be this high because of a bottleneck arising from limitations on production.

He says that at least 30,000 of the prospective 50,000 color sets to be produced in 1954 will go to the nation's television dealers who will use them as floor samples. Most of the other 20,000, he estimated, will be required by broadcasters and advertisers and people in sales and service trades.

In 1955, he predicts, the number of color sets will also be greatly limited, and he looks for the price of color TV sets to really start downward in 1956.

Du Mont estimates that a few hundred thousand people may be ready to buy color television by 1958.

These predictions are interesting although it must be kept in mind that producers of black and white sets are naturally eager to sell black and white sets today, by pointing out the prospective delays in the color field. Du Mont's estimate is probably more accurate than estimates made by those not in the trade itself, although we are inclined to believe that new developments may speed up the introduction of color TV. If new developments do not lower the cost of color production this year or early in 1955, and if production does not exceed expectations in the next fifteen months, then we agree what Mr. Du Mont that color sales will not constitute any significant volume.

It must also be realized that few people will be content with twelve-and-a-half-inch screens, especially since 21-inch and even 24-inch screens are today very popular. Thus, while the average American consumer might seek color television in 1954, it appears that it will be 1955 at least before he has much opportunity to buy larger screens, and maybe 1956 before he can buy them at reasonable prices.

Edison, to explain his incessant and tireless reading of scientific journals, technical papers, patents and books, said that he read to avoid useless repetition of old experiments. "I start where the last man left off."

What Edison knew, and perhaps said in an unquoted moment, is that thousands of men would be needed to "start where he left off."

### Forethought In Planting Shrubs . . . Important

**COLLEGE STATION January**—A little forethought when planting shrubs will save considerable future work when it comes to pruning, watering and general care, says Saddle Hatfield, extension homestead improvement specialist.

When reminding shrub enthusiasts about the home grounds and transplant old ones, Miss Hatfield says low growing ornamentals blend well and are especially desirable around low modern homes.

When planted at least three feet from walls and six to 10 feet apart, growing shrubs will not rub nearby structures or crowd one another making excessive pruning necessary.

It's a good idea, too, says the specialist to purchase only those shrubs adapted to your particular area. This means plants hardy in your soil and climate.

An East Texas Red Bud planted in the western portion of the state, for example, will produce yellow leaves, bloom very little and, generally, will have an unthrifty appearance.

Mulch at least 25 square feet of soil when setting out new shrubs. Miss Hatfield continues. Also, two to four inches of humus-decayed grass, leaves or vegetable refuse from the kitchen—worked well into the soil will help conserve soil moisture.

Well trained shrubs are an asset and help enhance the beauty of any farm or home. Miss Hatfield says among the low growing shrubs adapted in many areas are manna, pittier juniper, abelia, coral-berry, summer flowering jasmine, winter flowering jasmine, mahonia or Oregon-grape, blue salween or blue beard, flowering almond and spiraea vanhouttei.

### Studies On Methods Of Supplying Phosphorus to Cattle

**COLLEGE STATION January**—Research into methods of supplying phosphorus to range cattle on South Texas' sandy soils indicates the choice of method generally depends upon the individual situation.

Of three methods considered, namely, by supplying phosphorus to range cattle in self-feeders, in a controlled water supply and by pasture fertilization, all gave good results of the four-year test were reported recently and were conducted jointly by the Enchito Division of King Ranch, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture.

The experiment was made with range cows near Fairburn, Texas. Four groups were used. Group one was supplied no supplemental phosphorus, group two was fed bonemeal in self-feeders, sodium phosphate in controlled water systems was given group three and the latter group, four, was supplied to a mineral supplement through pasture fertilization with triple superphosphate.

Four years after the tests commenced, group two, three and four showed decided advantages in returns per cow and returns per acre over the control group. Only slight variations were observed, however, among the top three groups. Experiment Station investigators point out that the best method of supplying phosphorus to range cattle should be mainly governed by the facilities of the individual producer. When costs of phosphorus supplements and superphosphate were charged against each group, returns for each cow were \$191.84, \$272.84, \$287.89 and \$234.72 for lots one, two, three and four respectively. Returns per acre, in order, were \$13.91, \$16.91, \$20.39 and \$19.87.

Feeding phosphorus supplements also greatly increased inorganic phosphorus levels in the blood stream. Cows receiving the mineral regardless of method produced larger calf crops and heavier calves at weaning time, investigators report. Cows that did not receive the mineral produced 93 pounds of weaned calves for each animal; cows fed bonemeal, 118; cows that received disodium phosphate in drinking water, 143 pounds; and cows on fertilized pasture, 176 pounds.

A full report and results of the tests are contained in Experiment Bulletin-778 and may be obtained from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

**VA BENEFITS**  
The Veterans Administration is sending letters of advice as to benefits to the next-of-kin of the 3,500 men missing in Korea and now officially presumed dead. Because the armed forces continued pay and other allowances until the official declaration of death on December 31, 1953, the VA will use that date in computing pensions and compensation payments.

**MARCH DRAFT**  
The Army has announced that its draft for March will be for 18,000 men. The March quota is the same as that announced for February, when the Selective

Service call was reduced from the 23,000 level maintained since last July. Including the March quota, 1,643,000 men have been drafted or slated for inventory service since the resumption of Selective Service in September 1950.

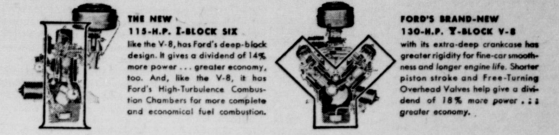
**WHOLESALE FOOD PRICES**

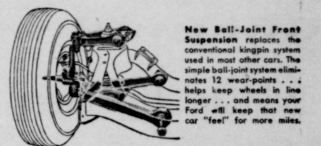

### HHFA Chief Says Self-Help Aim Of Housing Program

Port Worth, Texas, January 31, 1946. Self-help in housing, both for individuals and cities, underlies every phase of the Administration's newly-announced housing policy. Fred V. Cole, Housing and Home Finance Agency administrator said here tonight. Speaking on the Texas GOP's state network radio program, Cole asserted that his agency's aim is to "eliminate all paternalistic aspects of a government housing program, but to help individuals toward home ownership and to aid communities in developing their own rehabilitation projects." Cole clarified the HHFA's position as being the administration's agency for all federal interests in housing; the better-known Federal Housing Administration, or FHA, being the mortgage or lending department of HHFA. "Government-sponsored low rent projects have served their purpose in their time," Cole said, "but the real aim of this Administration is to put home ownership within the reach of every person, right down to the lowest income brackets. To that end

we seek to make it possible for those in such brackets to buy lower priced houses, with no down payment and to have up to forty years to pay for them." Cole emphasized that his agency would not attempt to do original municipal or community rehabilitation projects, but would serve merely as a service organization to assist communities in launching clean-up endeavors. Commenting on President Eisenhower's 8-point program as presented to Congress, Cole stated that it embraced most phases of his advisory committee's earlier recommendations to the President.

"Throughout the program emphasis is placed on stimulating private enterprise to fulfill all housing needs, rather than moving any closer to socialized housing," Cole said. "Private enterprise will be encouraged to fill the need for low-cost housing. The Federal National Mortgage Association should be re-organized to enable private financing institutions gradually to take over the mortgage underwriting functions. Our emphasis on rehabilitation, recommending increased funds and liberalized terms, for repair and modernization loans, will save many existing dwellings and will provide additional activity in the building trades as well." Cole pointed out the importance of liberalizing the financing requirements on old houses, permitting the same down payment on them as on new ones. "When an older house is sold, it means the seller is probably going to buy or build a new house," he pointed out.

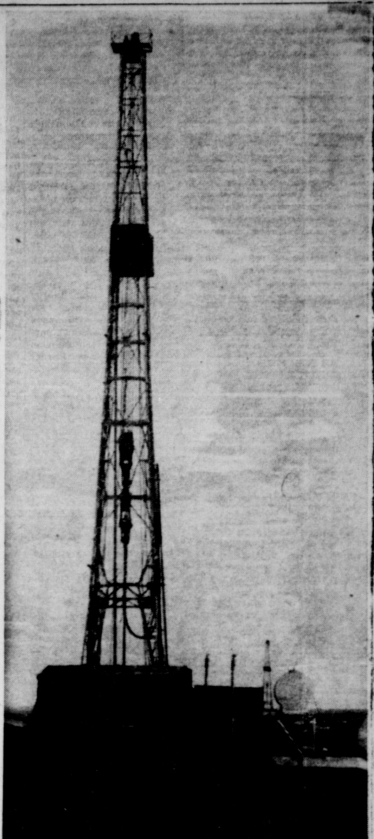
The Air Force can expect to achieve 115-wing strength before the end of this year under present appropriations, Roger M. Kyes, Deputy Secretary of Defense, said Sunday night.

Speaking over the Texas State Network on the Texas GOP's weekly transcribed program "Report to Texas," Kyes quoted a recent Air Force report as saying: "We can now see our way clear to provide 115 wings instead of 110 in 1954, and 129 wings by 1955 instead of 119." "I want to compliment the men in the Air Force for their outstanding accomplishments in 1953," Kyes said. "Under the leadership of Secretary Talbott and General Twining, they have made tremendous strides toward improving the organization of the Air Force and its effectiveness. In addition to increasing the number of wings, they have succeeded in more effectively utilizing their personnel. They have been determined to cut out unnecessary activities, and are doing so well that they will be able to man 129 wings with their original estimates." The entire Defense Department, Kyes said, is working hard toward improving both organization and procedures to increase its effectiveness. "Once a strategic plan has been developed by the Joint Chiefs of Staff, it is necessary to establish requirements with respect to personnel, weapons, etc. Because this is the beginning of a chain reaction which affects the entire economy in case of war, we initiated an intense investigation into the methods of establishing such requirements." "The Defense Department has some four million items which it must procure and put through its system. The so-called 'hard goods' are the core of combat capability, so we traced three 'hard goods' items through the entire system. One was a specific airplane model one was a tank and one was a round of ammunition. We are able to follow all the transactions and evaluate the strength and weakness of the system." Many items among the four million can be purchased locally, the Deputy Secretary pointed out, and local purchase has been authorized where it is feasible and economical. Kyes emphasized savings which have been accomplished by eliminating duplication. "There were 5,900 different electron tubes carried in the military services inventories when we initiated our clean-up campaign," he said. "By eliminating duplication and unnecessary varieties, we have found that 192 different types are all that are necessary." "There were 800 different kinds of screw drivers. Now we are doing the job with 100 different types. There were 74,000 different types of bearings. Twenty-one thousand are sufficient."

# Don't Name It

## TIME TO SECEDE—

Back when the Republic of Texas became a state, one of the United States some far sighted Statesman provided that the great Republic could be divided into 5 states.

Perhaps the great Statesman who made the provision for the division of the Republic into states, anticipated the need of more representation at our National seat of Government. We doubt seriously if he anticipated that the need for division would come from conditions existing within our own state.

He could not have anticipated that the Great Republic of Texas would take a share of the state as large as Rhode Island, sell it to build a Capital and then abandon that section of the state for the plunderers and Raconteers of a very Selfish Public.

That's the situation, Central, South and East Texas have aban-

doned the Western portion of the state. The great natural resources of the West portion of this state have been taxed to keep the state expenses going. Due to the large amount of representation (because of population) in other sections of the state we of West Texas find it difficult to present our problems in the state Legislature, regardless of the merit of our problems.

With the greatest source of Natural Gas, perhaps in the world, we find that the man who owns the land, owns the Royalty cannot purchase his own gas for use on his own farm. With 97 per cent of this gas being exported out of the state for consumption in Eastern States, the man who owns the top surface faces the problem of having the natural gas piped thousands of miles into other states, and perhaps returned to him if he is to buy this gas for his own use. As it stands now he cannot buy this gas at any price and under any conditions.

Naturally the land owner did not know that he was signing away his heritage when he leased his land. For many years it was the custom for land owners to use natural gas from under his own land, virtually free of

charge. Now that we have suffered severe droughts in this section of the state and there is a natural resource (WATER) easily accessible with the use of natural gas, the farmer who NEEDS this gas finds that he cannot get the gas for irrigation purposes.

The only solution we can see is for this state to adopt a law that will protect our people of this section of the great State of Texas, Kansas and New Mexico have such laws. Namely that gas taken from below the surface of their lands cannot be exported until the NEEDS of their state consumers are met.

Unless the Legislature can see fit to protect our land owners, and for that matter the rest of the state of Texas with a similar law, we cannot see any recourse except to SECEDE and start a state in the Western portion of TEXAS.

Of course we might mention to the law makers who fall to see our needs, that if TEXAS is to become a great manufacturing center, they may find themselves in the same condition sooner or later that we find ourselves at this time. The Central, Southern and Eastern section of the state have the population, and naturally they will be the first to receive prospective relocation of manufacturing institutions. Would it not be sorta funny for the smart politicians to awaken some of these days to find that they

have the chance to locate manufacturing plants in their section of the state and learn that their birthright had been sold and was being piped to Eastern states. Namely, if the natural gas now plentiful in East Texas and protected somewhat by the earlier form of leases, should be come exhausted, or the demands for this gas should become so great that there would not be enough to attract manufacturing plants to East Texas, then they would naturally assume that they could pick up their needs in the three great fields of West Texas. Unless they enact a law this year to protect TEXAS, whereby the needs at home are respected before natural gas is piped out of the state, then they will likely know our present problems from EXPERIENCE.

It is time for every citizen to get busy and see that we have a law that will protect TEXANS. Let's follow the example of Kansas and New Mexico. Let's place a law on our statute books, providing for the needs of TEXANS before any gas can be shipped out of state.

## Alamo Oats & Frisco Wheat Announced

COLLEGE STATION January—The development of high-yielding Frisco wheat and rust-resistant Alamo oats by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture is a long step forward in the search for improved strains of small grain varieties.

Alamo is among the first commercial oat varieties available in the U. S. which is resistant to all common races of stem rust. It was released to seed growers in the fall of 1953 and will be available for farm planting this fall.

Because it is less hardy than present varieties, Alamo is recommended for fall seeding in the southern half of the state and for spring seeding in the northern section. Its early maturity makes it a highly desirable for spring planting.

Frisco, a new soft-red winter wheat, is now available to growers in central Texas. The rust wheat strain is highly resistant to most leaf and stem rusts, has an early maturity date and has given outstanding yields in comparison with present commercial varieties. However, owing to its susceptibility to race 15-B of stem rust, it is recommended only in north-central Texas. Seed will be available from certified seed growers after the 1954 harvest.

by first removing all old whitewash materials, says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer. Allen suggests filling the rough places with putty before applying a new coat if a smooth finish is desired.

Whitewash "sets" better, he points out, of the surface is dampened prior to painting. This allows the new materials to dry more slowly.

Apply each coat thin and quickly. The first application should be thoroughly dry before a second is added, he says.

In a bulletin recently issued, Allen lists several formulas for concocting whitewash at home. The bulletin may be obtained from county agricultural agents or by writing for L-150, Whitewash For Farms and Homes, from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

The soil testing laboratory operated by the Agricultural Extension Service at College Station last year tested and made recommendations on 7,933 soil samples. A soil analysis is a mighty good first in commencing a soil improving program.

Results of a four-year test conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the King Ranch show that cows receiving a phosphorus supplement produced a larger calf crop and heavier calves at weaning age.

Farm Records A Big Help . . .

COLLEGE STATION, January—Many farmers wish now they had better records of their operations in 1953. Accurate farm records are a "must" for figuring income tax returns and should be the basis for changing farm practices and cropping systems.

To present economic situation calls for management practices that lead to more efficient production. C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist says a good set of records will show the weak spots in your present operations. They reflect, for study, the year's business, he says. And, records should be expanded or curtailed.

Bates says many good farm record books are available but he especially likes the one prepared by staff members of the Texas A & M College System. The Texas Farm Record Book contains inventories for land, farm improvements, machinery and equipment, livestock, crops and feeds on hand, farm assets and especially, farm products used in the home and a summary of the year's farming business.

An inventory, points out what is a farmer's check-up of what he has at the start and finish of each year.

It's easy enough to keep a complete and accurate set of records, he says and they'll pay big dividends when it's time to evaluate your operations at the end of this year.

County agricultural agents can furnish information on how to order the Texas Farm Record Book or it may be purchased direct from the Exchange Store, College Station, Texas.

# Washington News Letter From Congressman Walter Rogers

### To The People Of The 18 District ADVOCATING OVERTHROW OF GOVERNMENT

Section 2385 of Title 18 of the United States Code is the present law that prohibits advocating the overthrow of the government of the United States or the government of any state, territory, district, or possession thereof, or the government of any political subdivision therein, by force or violence. This same statute provides the punishment for engaging in such activities. This law says that anyone engaging in the enumerated activities "shall be fined not more than \$10,000.00 or imprisoned not more than ten years, or both, and shall be ineligible for employment by the United States or any department or agency thereof, for the five years next following his conviction."

This law was passed June 25, 1948, and became effective September 1, 1948. I have just introduced a bill amending the paragraph above quoted, which has to do with the punishment of offenders. My amendment, if passed, will take the place of the language above quoted. It provides that anyone who advocates the overthrow of the government in the manner and under the circumstances outlined in the present law, shall "shall suffer death, or shall be fined not more than \$10,000.00 or imprisoned not more than twenty-nine years, or both, and shall be ineligible for employment by the United States or any department or agency thereof."

Criminal laws have two major purposes. One is to provide punishment for those who offend, and the other is to act as a deterrent against a person engaging in activities that would be a violation of the law. Under the present law it does not occur to me that the punishment provided is proper or sufficient to fully carry out either of the purposes for which we have criminal laws. Those who would advocate the overthrow of our government would not consider a fine up to \$10,000.00 very severe punishment or would they consider prison terms up to ten years that could be served in less than ten months actually assessed by the court, very severe. Therefore, these penalties would not be considered very much punishment, and certainly they would not be the proper deterrent to subversive activities. A fine in any amount would not be considered by subversives as very much punishment. They could get the money from others of their depraved philosophies and consider the whole matter more or less a joke. The only reason that I included the fine provisions in my amendment was to take care of situations that might arise involving some innocent youngster who was dup-

make treaties, provided that two-thirds of the authorized membership of the Senate concurs." If this language is adopted and the Constitution is so changed, then the analysts, the public officials, the commentators and all the other speakers can tell you that ratification of a treaty requires two-thirds of the Senate and they will be exactly right. It will be the whole truth. Although it would not completely remove the present danger, it would go a long way in providing a safeguard against the executive department of this government frittering away our constitutional and statutory rights in crackpot world government schemes.
