Four Spearman College Students Are Injured In Car Accident

Four popular Spearman young men from Spearman were injured in a car wreck near Denton, Texas, Thursday evening of last week. So far as we can learn all four boys are doing well, and will perhaps be able to return to their classes after a couple of months to recuperate.

Dr. A. H. Word, one of the Professors of the North Texas Teachers College, and Mrs. A. H. Word, were very active in aiding the young men and their families during the emergency of this tragedy. Many Spearmanites will remember Dr. Word who was formerly Superintendent of the Spearman school.

A letter from Mrs. A. H. Word received Monday of this week will bring our readers up-to-date on the accident and conditions of the Spearman boys. Mrs. Word also sent a clipping from the daily newspaper of Denton, which we are including in this story.

Here is the letter:

Friday night 10 P. M. January 28th

Dear Faye and Bill:

Just finished the dishes, after broiled steak etc. Want to tell you that when we left the hospital late this evening Harold Smith was still unconscious. His folks are here, also Durland's folks. They have all been so brave and we are mighty proud of them. Don't misunderstand me - it breaks one's heart to see them still, I believe they'll all pull through.

I enclose the clipping from the Denton paper. It's underplayed by far, rather than overplayed. Also I want to tell you how wonderful the Denton Police were and the Highway Patrolman - not only to the boys, but to us. They were courteous itself, and most helpful. We got to the hospital as soon as we could last night, and stayed past 11: p. m. Went back this morning, again this afternoon, and will keep on going. There's no little anyone can do though, really we feel quite useless.

Barring any unforeseen complications, she will absolutely recover, according to Dr. Kleeberger, who has been with her constantly through this accident. She absolutely is past the crisis, and expects the road to recovery.

Automobile Production Very High

As the competitive battle between the automobile companies for a larger share of the market continues, it is now apparent that the major automobile companies are producing cars at a rate which cannot be continued throughout the year. Although the wide changes in models and because of bettering business conditions, the present rate of production would turn out almost eight million units this year.

Not even the most optimistic expert in the automobile trade believes that the American buying public and foreign buyers will consume that many of the 1955 models. A more moderate estimate is consumption of about six million units, which represent an increase in sales of some 500,000 over 1954. These figures pertain to automobile production, and not trucks.

One of the reasons for the record production rate in these early months of 1955 might be the prospect of Labor trouble this summer. The automobile companies have enjoyed a five-year contract, since 1950, and this has

Over-Eating And Premature Death

Recent medical pronouncements have made it clear beyond any doubt that over-eating is the primary cause of premature death information which is even now being discovered by members of the medical profession proves conclusively that overweight people shorten their life span by more than one-third.

The shortening of one's life depends upon the age at which he or she grows obese. One doctor recently said that a fifty-year-old male in good health had a life expectancy of about twenty years but that same aged male, if obese, had a life expectancy of only about thirteen years.

This reduction of the life span varies with the age of the individual. It is said that a younger male, at about thirty, faces a prospect of an eighty per cent higher mortality rate than the same aged male who is not overweight.

One of the best suggestions made by doctors for reducing weight is to eat a tidbit before meal time. This small intake of food, a cracker, a piece of cheese, or a piece of hard candy, will increase the blood sugar and cut down on one's appetite. And doctors say that any of these tidbits will serve just about the same

Germans Building Aircraft

Publication of Jane's All The World's Aircraft recently revealed that the Germans is once again building aircraft, this time in Spain.

The publication revealed that the German company had produced only one small light weight airplane, powered by a 150-horsepower engine. The aircraft is the DO-25.

The interesting part of this announcement is the fact that it is history repeating itself. After World War I, the Germans went to Switzerland where they built aircraft to evade restrictions imposed on them by the Allies in the treaty of peace. Mothers-In-Law A Problem

A recent book, dedicated mainly to research in the in-law relationship of American families, indicates mothers-in-law are quite often the problem jokers make them out to be.

The book, "In-Laws, Pro and Con", is authored by Dr. Evelyn Willis Duval. In assembling material for the book, over 5,000 caused the most vigorous action in an attempt to court reported Germany—and, soon the Germans will actually be encouraged to build aircraft to help offset huge USSR production.

The best advice we can offer mothers-in-law (and fathers-in-law) is to accept the families of their sons and daughters as equals, and to act in their homes just as they would act if they were visiting in a friend's home. If this rule is followed, it would solve ninety-five per cent of the problems which now arise.

Present Optimism is Christmas Business

The present optimism is Christmas business, which was excellent in most lines. In fact, in the last two months of 1954, the general business pickup was evident in almost all lines and profits realized in those months, in many cases, made the business year a profitable one.

Retailers Optimistic

A survey by the New York Times recently showed that the nation's leading retailers were almost unanimous in expecting higher sales this year than in 1954. Many of the retailers surveyed felt that 1955 would bring about a record sales volume.

This outlook, of course, reflects a reversal of the outlook in January, 1954. At that time, retail merchants were generally admitting that 1954 would be less profitable than 1953 had been and were predicting sales declines of from three to ten per cent for the year.

The latest survey shows that merchants expect profits this year to be well up over those realized in 1954. One of the reasons for

U. S. Espionage Work

Democratic Representative Ray J. Madden, from Indiana, said recently that "a great deal" of U. S. espionage work is going on from the Iron Curtain countries. Madden elaborated to say that this underground work was being effectively done and that it was keeping alive the nationalist spirit in many Soviet dominated countries.

Madden's remarks are one of the few positive indications the average reader has seen in recent times covering the work of U. S. espionage agents behind the Iron Curtain. Although Communist governments and Communist propaganda sources often complain about the number of U. S. spies sent into their countries, the State Department is almost always discreetly silent on this point.

However, it does not take a genius to realize that the United States—the melting pot of the world—has great potentialities for building up the most efficient spy system in the world. We do not say that the United States now has such an espionage network, since the majority of intelligence experts usually reserve that comment for the British espionage system.

That the United States has not

had the most efficient secret service organization in existence has been fairly obviously demonstrated since World War II. Not only have we lost valuable scientific secrets to the enemy, but our intelligence on Russian progress in several fields has been inadequate and defeat—in the opening phases, at least—in a new war.

HOW TO CURE HOME-MADE BLACKOUTS

HOME-MADE BLACKOUTS occur when a short circuit or overload blows out a fuse.

Overloads are caused by too many lamps and appliances on a single circuit. Short circuits are usually caused by a defective appliance or cord.

To restore service quickly without waiting for a service man, keep spare fuses of the correct size on hand and follow the instructions below.

TO REPLACE A BLOWN FUSE

- 1 Locate the blown fuse. The metal link showing through the window will be broken or the window itself may be scorched.
- 2 Disconnect the appliance or lamp that caused the short circuit or overload.
- 3 Stand on a dry surface and pull the main switch to OFF.
- 4 Unscrew the burned-out fuse and replace it with a NEW fuse of the correct size (usually 15 amperes).
- 5 Throw the main switch back to ON position.

IF YOUR HOME HAS CIRCUIT BREAKERS INSTEAD OF FUSES

- 1 Locate the tripped breaker. It will be in the OFF or TRIPPED position.
- 2 Disconnect the appliance or lamp that caused the short or overload.
- 3 Reset the breaker to ON position, following manufacturer's instructions on breaker panel.

REMEMBER, a fuse or circuit breaker protects your wiring from short circuit or overload damage. Never use a penny or other object instead of a fuse. It's dangerous.
