Purchase Agreements Protect Grain Prices Tax Valuation Of County Passes Seven Million Mark

Present Price Of Wheat Is \$1.92 Per Bushel

Farmers in Hansford County, to protect the price of their crop this year through two methods. Freeman Barkley, Secretary of the County Agricultural Conservation Association, points out that purchase agreements as well as commodity loans will be offered to farmers as a means of price support on 1948 crops of wheat, corn and grain sorghums. Terms are practically the same as on 1947 crops.

Under purchase agreements, the producer states the maximum quantity of the commodity upon which he wishes an option to be exercised. The commodity credit corporation then purchases the crop at the market price or he delivers to CCC any amount of his grain crop up to the stated amount at the price-support rate. CCC will accept the grain purchase agreement during the 90 days following the maturity of the 1948 loans, which expire April 29, 1949 or earlier on demand. Both loans and purchase agreements may be obtained at the County Agricultural Conservation office, and they are available through December 31, 1948.

Price-support rates per bushel for 1948 grain in Hansford County are: wheat, \$1.92; barley, \$1.08; grain sorghums, \$2.23 per bushel.

New Tractor For Soil Office

Acting as the governing body of the Hansford county soil conservation district of Hansford County, the Commissioners met and purchased a \$9,000 tractor, at a regular meeting of the court on Monday August 9. The tractor will enable this district to complete some important work in soil conservation. The tractor is paid for out of earnings by soil conservation officials, who are liquidated from future earnings. The purchase of the tractor does not involve any tax money from Hansford County tax payers.

Perryton Boosters Will Be In Spearman Today To Advertise 29th Anniversary To Be Held At Perryton August 20-21st

Perryton welcomes all of its neighboring Panhandle cities to the 29th Annual Celebration on August 20-21 this year, and a full two-day program of entertainment has been lined up for the event.

There will be a street parade, free barbecue, a carnival, dances each night by the famous Will Osborne orchestra, two day rodeo performances and two night rodeos, and the selection of the nation's Wheatheart.

A caravan of Perryton boosters will arrive in Spearman on August 12, at 8:40 A. M. advertising the celebration.

Festivities open at 8 o'clock Friday morning, August 20, with a pilots breakfast at the Perryton Airport and free street entertainment will last until noon.

On Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the large amateur rodeo will get under way at the recently enlarged rodeo grounds, with the Claud Hays rodeo stock furnishing the competition for amateur cowpokes in the Panhandle area.

Another rodeo performance will be held that night at 8 P. M. The Will Osborne dance at the county building in north Perryton will round out the opening day program.

Important Information On Polio Prevention Is Given In State Conference Held At Austin, Texas

At a conference called by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer a group of health officials and interested citizens on June 15 in Austin discussed the poliomyelitis problem in Texas. Control measures were evaluated.

It is the consensus of opinion of the group that intensive clean-up campaigns should be carried on throughout the State. We know definitely that such clean-up campaigns will eradicate health hazards which cause certain preventable diseases. Among these preventable diseases are typhoid fever, typhus, malaria, and dysentery. Such campaigns may also eradicate one possible source of poliomyelitis.

The virus which causes poliomyelitis has been found in stools of patients and certain healthy individuals. It has been found in the walls and secretions of the pharynx, and thus exists the possibility that it may be passed from one person to another by means of droplets of pharyngeal secretions as well as by fecal contamination of food, drink, objects or hands. Present knowledge does not resolve the problems of the relative importance of these two routes.

As a result of experimental work, the following facts are known concerning fly transmission of poliomyelitis.

a. Polio virus can be found for considerable periods of time in the stools of infected persons and in sewage containing such stools.

b. Polio virus has been isolated repeatedly from flies (house-flies and blow flies) during epidemics.

c. The infection of experimental animals by the ingestion of materials containing polio virus has been demonstrated on numerous occasions.

d. It has been shown one (not yet confirmed) that flies in the home of a case of poliomyelitis became contaminated naturally with polio virus and conveyed enough of it to food which had no other contact with virus, so that polio-free chimpanzees developed infections of polio shortly after eating contaminated food.

The above indicates that flies can transmit polio. It does not show how frequently this happens; it does not exclude other means of transmission; nor does it indicate how important fly transmission is in comparison with other means of transmission.

Eliminate breeding places for mosquitoes, flies and cockroaches; secure spraying of walls and ceiling in all restaurants and dairies. Spray dump grounds with oil and promote sanitary garbage disposal.

The sanitary fill method of garbage disposal has been found to be very effective. Promote regular garbage collection and disposal; require all garbage to be kept in clean covered containers. Spray garbage cans with DDT solution.

Inaugurate rodent control measures; secure passage of a standard ordinance for rat proofing. Employ all methods of rat extermination. Close rat openings. Dust rat runs with 10 percent DDT dust.

Home sanitation can be secured by the cooperation of all householders in a home sanitation program. Recommend proper disposal of human waste, proper disposal of garbage, repair screens and spray with DDT. DDT spraying of garbage cans, outhouses should also be included with screen doors and windows.

With the above facts in mind, we feel that all officials interested citizens are justified in conducting clean-up campaigns. Citizens committees should be organized to promote such campaigns.

The following basic sanitation activities should be carried out:

Court Sets Tax Rates For 1948

At the regular meeting of Hansford County's Commissioners' Court held Monday August 9, the County tax rate for 1948 was set. Little changes were made in the Tax rate except in Precinct 1 and Road District No. 2, where rates were set to liquidate the recently bonded indebtedness for building paved roads in Hansford County.

The rate for the county is as follows:

General fund, tax rate	25c
Permanent Improvement rate	25c
Road and Bridge fund rate	30c
Total County rate	80c

In road district or Precinct No. 1, the Albert Jacobs Commissioners' Court held Monday August 9, the County tax rate for 1948 was set at 75c per hundred dollar valuation. This was set as 5c per hundred valuation to take care of liquidation of past road bonded indebtedness and 70c per \$100.00 valuation to take care of the recently voted bonded indebtedness, which means we begin paying for the roads to be paved, perhaps this year in the road precinct No. 1.

Valuations in Precinct No. 1, increased \$200,000.00 this year, over last year, perhaps as result of new pipeline construction in the precinct. This makes the liquidation rate for bonded indebtedness just slightly smaller than was anticipated at the time the bonds were voted a few months ago.

In the Ed Vernon Commissioners' precinct, Road District No. 2, the tax rate to take care of liquidating recently voted road bonded indebtedness was set at 80c per hundred dollar valuation.

In settling the tax rate for common school districts in the county, the court reduced the assessment for the Oslo district from a former rate of \$1.00 per hundred dollar valuation, this reduction was made possible by a substantial surplus accumulated in the treasurer for the common school district. The rate for the Hitchland school district, District No. 3 remains at \$1.00 per hundred dollar valuation. The rate for the Rooster school district, formerly known as the New Hope school district, officially the No. 9 common school district remains at 75c per hundred dollar valuation.

A substantial increase in valuations for Hansford County property for the coming year was reflected in the report given the Commissioners' court by Tax assessor J. B. Cooke. The total valuation this year will exceed seven million dollars, whereas, last year the total valuation was six million seven hundred thousand dollars.

Tax collector J. B. Cooke reported to the court that over 98 per cent of the 1947 tax had been collected.

Cooke also informed the court that the state rate had been reduced from the last year assessment of 73c per hundred dollar valuation to 43 cents per hundred dollar valuation. This means that even with liquidation of bonded indebtedness to pay for newly paved roads, Hansford tax payers will face only a slightly increased tax bill for 1948.

Bobson informs his dad that he has to stay a little longer than he first expected. (Bob is on vacation at Grand Falls), among other things Bob gives a graphic description of a girl and in about six words, so Mary Eck had as well prepare to meet Bob home a few days later than he really expected to arrive.

It's terribly hot to begin thinking about making our first Annual Hansford County Fair, one to set a record, but it won't hurt us to begin to commence, and we will all have a wonderful time. Recon we may be able to stage a roping club contest, baseball game and possibly a football game for this day.

We are just wondering if the Home Demonstration Clubs can not begin their occasional social entertainments. We remember when the clubs met in the Steel building next door to Ike Baggerly, and the various clubs would stage domino and "42" parties, and pie suppers etc. That's one reason this writer donated and worked for a community building. Believe we have plenty of room now for such socials, and hope the groups of women will stage some interesting socials this fall, and winter. For one the country editor has the best of times at such entertainments.

Confidentially this writer expects to announce the starting of two excellent church buildings in Spearman. We feel sure the Methodist church will be ready to announce a building program within two weeks, also Bill Masters of the First Christian church indicated that the church would probably be ready to announce "ready" to build, soon.

With two modern churches, and the school in Spearman beginning band again this year, and agriculture offered for the second year, this writer believes we are off to an excellent start at building a fine little city.

Thru an error on the part of the country editor, the Reporter is completely overstocked with a very good grade of social stationary. We bought three cases; over 300 boxes of stationary from the Army surplus supply depot, and bought it at so small a price that we can virtually give away the stationary. There are 80 sheets of good bond paper and 40 envelopes in each box. We can sell these boxes unprinted to customers for 20c a box. If you want

your name printed on the paper and envelopes it will cost \$2.20 per box. Or if you need a half dozen boxes, the printing will be \$3.00 plus the cost of the stationary. Thus you could get 480 sheets of paper and 220 envelopes printed and delivered to you for \$4.50. This is a ridiculous price, and a rare bargain. The writer made a mistake in getting this 3 cases. We thought we were getting one case, and only bought the one case to get other material—such as carbon paper, index cards and typewriter ribbons. So if you want this bargain come in and take away the stationary. We feel sure that most any customer can be justified in purchasing as much as 10 boxes each. That would only be \$2.00 and you will have 800 sheets of paper and 400 envelopes. This writer cannot buy the same quality paper and envelopes on the wholesale market today for less than four times the price we are quoting on this shipment we bought from army surplus. Come in and talk it over. We really do not want to get into the social stationary business, and we offer this shipment to local merchants, but they were already heavily stocked, and so we will try to move the merchandise and in the future leave sales of social stationary to local merchants.

Incidentally, anyone wanting some good bargains in standard make typewriter ribbons and carbon paper, index cards, alphabetical markers and note book paper can really make a buy, if you will buy in quantity at the Reporter office. All we want is a normal profit and the prices on this good merchandise was so low we stocked up heavily.

H. D. NOTES

Would you like to keep your crape myrtle blooming several weeks longer?
Three things will do the job: cutting the faded blooms, plenty of moisture and fertile soil. As soon as the blooms begin to fade, cut them off. If seed are formed, they will take food from the plant which otherwise would go into new blooms.
If you did not fertilize your crape myrtle last year, it may

need some now. For a large bush use two or three cups of 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer. Spread it around the plant in a ten by ten foot square area. Water it right away letting a small stream of water soak into the ground several inches deep around the plant. Water it this way every week or ten days, but be sure the plant is well drained.

Dust the crape myrtle with the cotton dusting sulphur if you notice mildew forming on the leaves. Too much shade may keep the crape myrtle from blooming as much as it could. Give them lots of sunshine if you want them to bloom out big. Crape myrtle that was fertilized well last winter or early this spring won't need any more right now. But putting a mulch layer around the plant will help it hold moisture in the soil.

Do you often become discouraged with house cleaning only to give it up and say "Oh" what is the use? If so, maybe this suggestion will help you. Keeping your house clean saves time, energy, furnishings and equipment. The best way to do any job is the simplest easiest, quickest and safest way.

First, think of all the jobs to be done in keeping the house clean. Decide which should be done daily, weekly, monthly, or seasonally. Every task has three parts. 1. Get ready. 2. Do the task. 3. Clean up. These questions will help to simplify your house work.

Dustless dust cloths may be made by mixing 1 tablespoon of kerosene with 1 quart of hot water. Dip squares of clean soft cloth into this solution, wring out, dry and store.

Dry suds are useful in a number of cleaning tasks, especially upholstered furniture when you want to clean the covering without removing it. To make dry suds, dissolve one half cup neutral soap-flakes, beads, chips or a bar shaved in small pieces in 1 qt of hot, soft water. If the water is hard, more soap will be needed to make the suds stiff enough to hold up when shampooing upholstery fabrics and rugs. Test the soap to see if it is neutral by putting a bit of it on the tongue. If neutral, it will not bite or sting.

To clean windows and mirrors, first remove the surface soil with tissue or soft paper; then wash with a soft lintless cloth wrung out of clear water, or one of the following solutions:
4 T. ammonia to 1 quart of warm water.
3 T. denatured alcohol to 1 quart of warm water.
2 T. Kerosene to 4 quarts of warm water.

Wipe with a clean, dry cloth; a chamolais makes windows clean easily.
Sinks, Bathtubs and Wash-Basins may be cleaned by using a paste made of one fourth cup of kerosene and 1 cup of soda. Apply the paste to the surface with a

cloth.
To clean fixtures make a cream paste by mixing water and whitening. Rub the fixtures with the paste. Wash with soapy water. Rinse and wipe dry. To clean chrome fixtures, wash with hot soapy water to remove all traces of grease. Rinse with water and wipe dry.
Vinegar or lemon juice may be used to remove the green corrosion which sometimes forms on pipes.

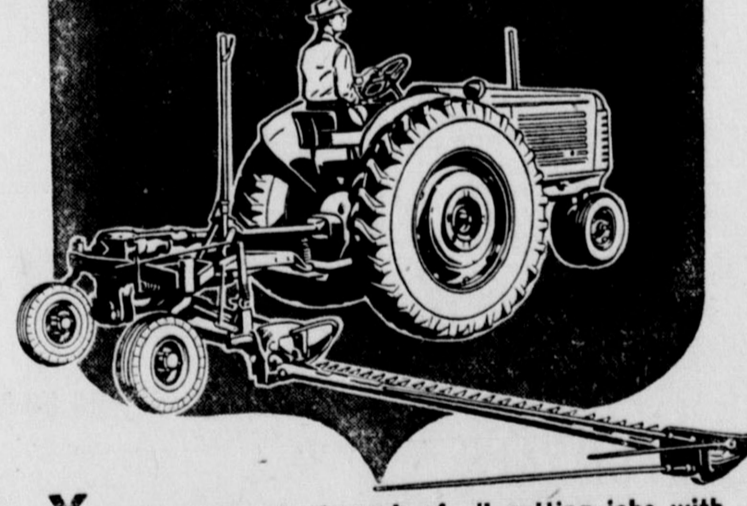

Emil Knutson Open Large Elevator At Guymon, Okla.

The largest single structure ever built here was open for business Saturday with the completion of the 625,000 bushel Knutson elevator. David Knutson from the Oslo Community 22 miles west of Guymon hauled the first load of wheat.

Work was begun on the huge steel reinforced concrete structure last March 8, and has progressed since then both day and night. Six thousand three hundred cubic yards of concrete, enough to pave 27 city blocks, were poured in the forms during construction. The building now towers 170 feet above the water towers 130 feet which is the second highest structure here. It estimates measures 110 x 75 feet at the ground level.

Majority stock in the elevator is owned by a family corporation. Emil Knutson is the president, his wife is vice-president, and his sister-in-law, Marie Stedje is secretary-treasurer.

Manager Guy Bennett said a box car can be loaded from the stator in one minute for the dumping of an ordinary farm truck and the double dumps handle 2 trucks at a time. One of the dumps is designed to handle the largest trucks now being made. In addition to the 625,000 bushel storage capacity of the elevator proper, there is railroad siding for 20 box cars at the site.

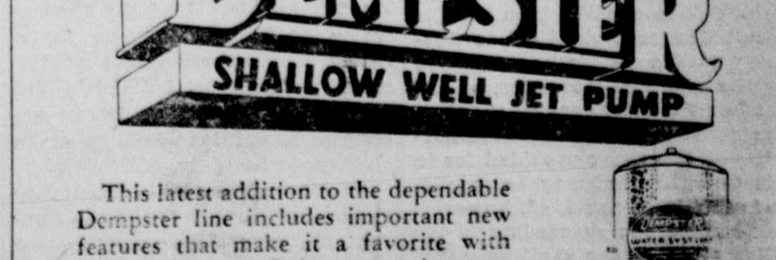

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

H. J. R. No. 39
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an amendment to article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section 1-a, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of Appellate Courts and Judges of District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed; providing for the submission of the amendment to the voters of this state; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as "Section 1-a," which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-a. The Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Criminal District Courts of this state on account of length of service, age or disability and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts of this State on account of length of service, age or disability and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

H. J. R. No. 7
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an amendment to article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify before taking his oath of office; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and prohibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at a General Election to be held throughout this state on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

For the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor elect dies, or becomes disabled

before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies. Against the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor elect dies or becomes disabled before qualifying for such succession and other contingencies Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

S. J. R. No. 2
A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 25. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the comptroller of public accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extra-ordinary writ conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expenses during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Amendment to Section 25, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Against the amendment to Section 25, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary,

is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 amending Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision that the husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests all or any part of their community property, whereupon without prejudice to the right of existing creditors the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse; further providing that such Constitutional Amendment if adopted shall be self-operative and self-executing; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 15. All property, both real and personal, of the wife, owned or claimed by her before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife; and laws shall be passed more clearly defining the rights of the wife, in relation as well to her separate property as that held in common with her husband; provided that husband and wife, without prejudice to pre-existing creditors, may from time to time by written instrument as if the wife were a feme sole partition between themselves in severalty or into equal undivided interests all or any part of their existing community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of one spouse in any property for the community interest of the other spouse in other community property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse. This Amendment is self-operative, but laws may be passed prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of execution of such instruments, and providing for their recording, and for such other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith as the Legislature may from time to time consider proper with relation to the subject of this Amendment. Should the Legislature pass an Act dealing with the subject of this Amendment and prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of the execution of such instruments and providing for their recording and other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith and anticipatory thereto, such Act shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character and shall take effect just as though this Constitutional Amendment was in effect when the Act was passed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto

Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this state to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this state and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional amendment providing workman's compensation insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing workman's compensation insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this constitutional amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the constitutional amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 61, Article XVI of the constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the state of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in the state the Commissioners court shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners courts, to compensate all constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949, and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal census, the Commissioners courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon Commissioners courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where an officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI, of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis"; and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables, and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

H. J. R. No. 24
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for the State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951 and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing for a Three Thousand (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption and providing for the necessary proclamation by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to be as follows:

"Section 1-a. After January 1, 1951, no ad valorem tax shall be levied for general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, in any county of this state, except as provided in this section. Counties are authorized to levy their ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective counties for purposes, except first \$3,000 value of residential (30c) on all other valuation, that shall not exceed the amount derived therefrom in this state, provided the same is for the purpose of farm to market roads or for flood control, except as herein otherwise provided."

"Provided that in those counties or political subdivisions or areas of the state from which tax donations have heretofore been granted, the state automatic tax board shall continue to levy the full amount of the state ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, or until all legal obligations shall have been fully discharged, whichever shall first occur; provided that if such donation to any such county or political subdivision is for less than the full amount of state ad valorem taxes so levied, the portion of such taxes remaining over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the date fixed by law for the general election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the constitutional amendment of section 1-a of Article VIII of the constitution of the state of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for state general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing for a Three Thousand (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations," and "Against the constitutional amendment of Section 1-a of article VIII of the constitution of the state of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for state general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing for a Three Thousand (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations," and "Against the constitutional amendment of Section 1-a of article VIII of the constitution of the state of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for state general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951."

Science Shatters Myth of Birds' Eerie Homing Sense

ITHACA, N. Y.—Birds turned loose in a strange place far from home do not fly straight to their homes, guided by some mysterious sense or some hidden sense.

They cruise in curving lines, with a suggestion of spiraling, apparently getting home by plain ordinary exploration.

This is the conclusion reached as the result of experiments by Dr. Cornell University ornithologist, Dr. Ronald H. Griffin and Raymond J. Hoek.

They chose gannets for their tests, because these big white birds are easily seen at a distance and because it was safe to assume that they had never of their own accord gone far from the coast.

They carried a number of boxes into the interior of New Brunswick where they turned them loose to find their own way home.

Only two of the birds flew in anything like a straight line to the coast. The others flew literally in all directions.

There was no evidence whatever of a "sense of direction."

War Vet Pays \$80 a Month To Live in 30x30 Army Tent

PASCO, WASH.—Ed Mercer, construction worker on the atomic project here, is paying \$80 a month rent for a tent.

To the resident, and qualified electors of road District No. 4 of Hansford County, Texas who own taxable property in said district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

TAKE NOTICE that a hearing will be held at the court house in Spearman, Texas, on a petition to the Commissioners' court to call an election on the proposition of issuing the bonds for said Road District No. 4 of Hansford County, Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars, as more particularly set out in an order fixing the hearing as follows:

"Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 4 of Hansford County, Texas, shall be issued under Article III Section 52 of the Constitution, in an amount not to exceed \$200,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 5 per cent per annum payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Road District No. 4 of Hansford County, Texas; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District No. 4 sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity; and

WHEREAS, it appears to the court and is so adjudged that said petition is signed by at least fifty qualified electors who own taxable property in road district No. 4 of Hansford County, Texas and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

WHEREAS Road District No. 4 of Hansford County, Texas, has heretofore been legally created by order of the Commissioners' Court passed on April 19, 1948.

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF HANSFORD COUNTY, TEXAS:
