The Spearman Lynx will entertain the River Road Wildcats at Lynx Stadium Friday evening, with the game starting at 7:30 p.m. This is the first conference game of the year for the Lynx, and while the Lynx are entertaining River Road, Perryton and Dalhart will clash at Perryton in another conference opener. Both Spearman and Perryton are heading for a "clash" in their Oct. 26th game at Perryton. Both are heavy favorites to win Friday night games. But, anything can, and usually does happen in District 1-AA conference football.

The Lynx are having their best week of practice this week. Zane "the train" Newton was picked as the Globe News player of the week in AA football, and the entire Lynx team is feeling "high" after their win over Guymon at Guymon Friday night.

The highly improved 7th, 8th, 9th, and B teams will be in action this Thursday. The 7th and 8th graders will play at home this Thursday, with the first game starting at 5 p.m. The 9th grade will journey to Amarillo, along with the B team to play River Road. Their first game will also be at 5 p.m.

Coach Smith will be using more players each game, and he feels that the Lynx will be ready for the "game of the century at Perryton" one week from Friday.

City Sales Tax Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that his office has sent checks totaling \$23.3 million to Texas cities as their October share of the local option one percent sales tax.

The October rebates raise the cities' total for the year to \$329.9 million over the same period last year.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's

Spearman's check for this period was \$3,888.49 compared to \$3,698.79 for the same period last year.

1978 payments to date are \$88,308.09 as compared to \$74,402.87 for the same period

last year, up 18 percent. Gruver received a check for \$865.94 for this period. 1978 payments to the City of Gruver so far total \$16,316.56 as compared to \$17,219.75 for the same period last year, recording a decrease of 5 percent.



An ordinance establishing zoning regulations an creating zoning or use districts in accordance with a comprehensive plan; and regulating the height of buildings, size of yards and density of population; adopting a zoning map showing the location and boundaries of the various districts and use areas; setting forth regulations governing buildings and uses within such areas, defining terms; providing for enforcement and penalties for violations, for appeals and exceptions for future changes and amendments; requiring building permits and certificates of occupancy; authorizing revocation of building permits; defining and authorizing non-conforming uses; creating a board of adjustment and providing for its powers, procedure, etc; providing a savings clause and repealing conflicting ordinances; providing minimum housing requirements; defining architectural control, nuisances and temporary structures.

SECTION 803.1 VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES, FINES

A violation of this Ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by fine. Any person, firm or corporation who violates or refuses to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than Twentyfive Dollars (\$25.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each offense. Each day that a separate offense.
