Annual farm bureau meeting set

The annual meeting of the Hansford County Farm Bureau will be October 23rd at the County Barn in Spearman starting at 7:00 p.m. according to Delbert McClöy, president.

Main purpose of the meeting will be to adopt policies for the next year and elect 4 directors. Directors whose term expires are Irvin Boyd, Jim Brown, Bob Womble and Robert Novak.

All members are invited to attend. However, county by-laws provide that only agricultural producers, who receive over 51% of their income from agriculture may vote or hold office.

Adopted resolutions dealing with local matters will become

county policies for next year. Other approved resolutions will be forwarded to the state convention as recommendations for resolutions to be voted on. All suggestions received, including ideas surfaced at the community discussion meeting on August 22nd in Gruver, will be considered in drafting the tentative resolutions.

Policy Development Chairman, Robert Novak will present resolutions to be voted on at the business session.

Outstanding students for F.F.A. of Gruver and Spearman, F.H.A. of Gruver and Spearman and outstanding 4-H Girl and 4-H boy will be honored.

City Sales Tax Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that his office has sent checks totaling \$23.3 million to Texas cities as their October share of the local option one percent sales tax.

The October rebates raise the cities' total for the year to \$329.9 million over the same period last year.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's Office.

Spearman's check for this period was \$3,888.49 compared to \$3,698.79 for the same period last year.

1978 payments to date are \$88,308.09 as compared to \$74,402.87 for the same period last year, up 18 percent.

Gruver received a check for \$865.94 for this period. 1978 payments to the City of Gruver so far total \$16,316.56 as compared to \$17,219.75 for the same period last year, recording a decrease of 5 percent.

Maize harvest is beginning in the county, with scattered cutting.

Murphy Rites Held Here

Services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Sacred Heart Catholic Church for Everett Albert Murphy, 59, who died Saturday at Oklahoma City. The Rev. Raymond Crozier, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Hansford Cemetery by Boxwell Brothers.

Mr. Murphy was born at Boston and had lived in Spearman for three years. He was a mechanic, a Marine veteran of World War II and a Catholic.

He married his wife, Caroline on Nov. 15, 1970 here.

Survivors include his wife; a step-daughter, Bonnie Cox of Denver and a grandson.

Father Crosier pleased with appointment of Pope

Although tradition was broken with the new papal choice, Father Crosier of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Spearman, is well pleased with the appointment. Father Crosier stated "I am quite pleased to have one from behind the Iron Curtain. It is good to have a man who has lived under Communist rule. It looks very hopeful for the church, especially the growth of the church, and will bring about better understanding between religion and communism."

The new Pope was the Cardinal Archbishop of Poland, and Poland is 90% Catholic.

The little-known 58 year old archbishop of Krakow, whose election by the conclave of cardinals came as a complete surprise, took the name John

Paul II, the same as his predecessor.

His election as 246th pontiff of the 700 million member church came on the seventh or eighth ballot of the secret conclave of 113 cardinals in the Sistine Chapel, which began Saturday.

He is the first non-Italian pope since the Dutchman Adrian VI who reigned in 1522-1523, and the youngest pope of this century.

The new Pope has been in the U.S. twice, once in 1970 and again in 1976. He has held several posts in the Vatican and has been in the diplomatic care of the vatican. He speaks 6 languages including English fluently. He has traveled exten-

sively and has proven himself a real pastoral bishop. He is a man who has promoted the reforms of Vatican II and a real promoter of Church doctrine. In a lighter light the 58 year old Pope is a sayer and rated for his classness to his people where ever he has served as a pastor. This choice shows the guidance of the Holy Spirit in the Cardinals in the Conclave and the universality of the Church. The new Pontiff's works in ecumenical advancement shows a real openness towards bringing all men closer together.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING TO BE HELD THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 2 AT 7:30 P.M. CONCERNING THE ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS

An ordinance establishing zoning regulations an creating zoning or use districts in accordance with a comprehensive plan; and regulating the height of buildings, size of yards and density of population; adopting a zoning map showing the location and boundaries of the various districts and use areas; setting forth regulations governing buildings and uses within such areas, defining terms; providing for enforcement and penalties for violations, for appeals and exceptions for future changes and amendments; requiring building permits and certificates of occupancy; authorizing revocation of building permits; defining and authorizing non-conforming uses; creating a board of adjustment and providing for its powers, procedure, etc; providing a savings clause and repealing conflicting ordinances; providing minimum housing requirements; defining architectural control, nuisances and temporary structures.

SECTION 803.1 VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES, FINES

A violation of this Ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by fine. Any person, firm or corporation who violates or refuses to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each offense. Each day that a separate offense.

This Ordinance will go into effect immediately upon its passage.

Charles Brillhart, chairman, and Elma Dahl, Vice President, of the Board of directors for the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District will be in Corpus Christi October 17-19 to attend the Thirty-Eighth Annual State Meeting of Texas Soil and Water Conservation District Directors.

Warren Proctor, District Conservationist, for the Spearman, Filled office is attending with the directors.

The theme of this year's meeting is "Strong Directors - Strong Districts". Approximately 800 are expected to attend.

The purpose of the meeting is to review developments effecting conservation programs and to plan future conservation district programs and activities.

Prior to assuming the presidency of Texas T&M University, Dr. Miller served in Argentina and the Dominican Republic as part of Texas A&M's assistance contracts with the U.S. Agency for International Development. Later he became assistant director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, named associate director

Dr. Miller serves the Joint Research Committee of the Board for International Food and Agricultural Development. Hill Caravan Visits Here

Attorney General John Hill will win the race for Governor because Texas voters have never been fooled by big money campaigns such as the \$7 million extravaganza being conducted by the Republicans, according to a group of Hill supporters taking part in a campaign caravan.

Poll Shows Krueger Leading In Panhandle

Bob Krueger appears to be leading John Tower in significant portions of the Panhandle, several recent polls in their Senate race reveals.

In a statewide poll, Krueger leads Tower by 55 per cent to 38 per cent in Amarillo, with 27 per cent undecided.

In a poll taken in Bob Simpson's legislative district, Krueger is leading Tower 37 to 31 per cent in the Potter County portion of that district.

In Carson County, the poll shows him leading Tower, 44 per cent to 28 per cent. And in Randall County, which Tower carried by more than 67 per cent in 1972, Krueger is only 11 percentage points behind.

The statewide poll released by Krueger shows him ahead of Tower overall, 40.5 to 40.4. The poll was conducted by the Austin firm of Henson Hopkins and Shipley, who received significant recognition after they

accurately predicted the outcome of the three major races in the May Democratic Primary.

"The results of this poll are particularly encouraging because in my visits to the Panhandle, I have sensed strong grassroots support for my candidacy because the independent people there know Texas can do better in the United States Senate," Krueger said.

Krueger was co-sponsor of legislation that would have given farmers full parity for their crops under a flexible parity program that would enable farmers to, in effect, design their own farm program and has introduced legislation calling for stricter inspection standards for foreign meat importers.

Krueger is probably best known for the national attention he received in 1976 when he brought to the floor of the

House a bill aimed at deregulating the price of natural gas, but he recently received high praise from the National Associated Businessmen, Inc., for his efforts to curtail wasteful spending and to balance the budget.

Krueger is also a staunch supporter of Texas right-to-work laws.

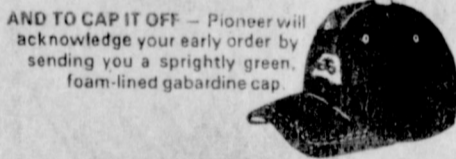

Elmo Dahl of Gruver, Texas was re-elected to the Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District board of directors Tuesday, October 10, 1978. Dahl represents Zone 5 of the district.

The purpose of the Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District, with headquarters in Spearman is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts

of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Dahl will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In other areas of leadership, Dahl is active in the Farm Bureau and member of the school board for the Gruver School District.

In Texas there are 198 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil & Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the power of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Organized in 1951, the Hansford SWCD evolved from the Soil Erosion District and has been active in promotion of soil and water conservation since that date.

Sponsored by The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hos-

pital and Tumor Institute at Houston. CIS has assisted over 12,000 people with questions or concerns on prevention, detection, treatment and causes of cancer.

"The statewide toll-free telephone lines of CIS have proved to be a very effective tool for providing the public easy access to current, factual information on cancer," said Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre, president of M.D. Anderson.

"Unfortunately, fear of cancer remains one of the biggest

obstacles to its early and successful treatment," he said. "Our goal for CIS is to help replace this fear with the facts that can help people understand cancer."

"Additional funding will enable CIS to also produce more materials in Spanish to provide a strong backup for the toll-free home operation which operates in both English and Spanish," Dr. LeMaistre explained.

CIS, in conjunction with the American Cancer Society (ACS), will be working with many Mexican-American organizations and Spanish language media to promote cancer education among Texas' large hispanic population.

With two years' experience in documenting the trends in public inquiries, existing informational gaps, myths and misconceptions surrounding cancer, CIS is now prepared and funded to produce print materials and radio and television programming for public and patient needs.

Information lines into CIS are 792-3245 in Houston and 1-800-392-2040 toll-free in Texas. The phones are manned from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays by American Red Cross volunteer operators. Additional volunteer training, designed by CIS staff and Anderson medical consultants, is scheduled for late October.
