It was a thriller all the way, as the Lynxettes and Henrietta Bearcats played their bi-district championship game at Memphis Monday night. The Lynxettes took a 26-23 halftime lead, and were actually leading in the game 54-53 with 4 seconds left but one of the Bad News Bears stepped to the free throw line and hit 2 free throws to put the game on ice for the Bearcats.

To say that Lisa Caine had two pressure shots is putting it mildly, as she capped a come-from-behind effort to upset Spearman 55-54. A crowd of some 1000 watched the Lynxettes in the thrill-capped game.

Neither team lead by more than 6 points during the game, but the Lynxettes actually pulled out with their biggest lead of 6 points late in the 4th quarter. But, they got into foul trouble plus 24 turnover, and 9 tie ball (jump) calls!

### County Citizens Give 12 Gallons Plus

Ninety-nine red blooded Hansford County citizens gave to save others during the Red Cross Bloodmobile visit at the Gruver Baptist Activity Building Wednesday. Good citizens numbering 118 offered their blood during the 10:00 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. hours but due to the rash of winter infections and other causes for which blood can not be accepted the quota of 110 pints came within 11 with the final 99th pint.

Many area residents were involved in the operations of the Wednesday county-wide Red Cross Bloodmobile visit along with the American Red Cross workers from the Wichita Blood center of which Hansford County is a part. Included in the total operations along with the blood donors were medical personnel, Hansford County Hospital Volunteers, Gruver merchants, Gruver High School FTA members, and many others whose assistance was necessary for the well-organized and smoothly running operation.

Under the efficient leadership of Hansford County Bloodmobile Chairman Mrs. Preston Smith of Spearman, assisted by Gruver co-chairmen Mrs. Spec Cator and Mrs. Bill Maupin, many from throughout the county assisted with the many details attendant on this important community service.

Of very special note were those donors who have attained 4 gallon, 3 gallon, 2 gallon, and 1 gallon status including Ed Freeman of Spearman who was

presented with a 4 gallon (32 pints) pin this time! Receiving recognition for having given three gallons of the precious blood were Jerry Tucker and Weldon Green, both of Gruver. Receiving two gallon pins were Herb Hoff and Diana Smith of Spearman; Elmo Dahl and Bill Cator of Gruver.

### Excel Receives Contract

### Bureaucratic Nonsense

Bureaucrat Richard Davis recently announced the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (under the Treasury Department) had decided (after two year's study) not to require warnings of beer, wine and liquor labels--despite a request for such a step from the Food and Drug Administration, and others. It will try an expensive educational program instead (which the taxpayers will, of course, pay for).

Davis, an assistant Treasury Secretary, excused the department's refusal by saying the alcohol problem is not yet fully understood. Yet he admitted evidence clearly establishes the fact that women who drink heavily during pregnancy can be damaging their unborn babies' health.

And surely no one can deny the mountain of problems caused by alcohol abuse, including automobile accidents, millions of lost work days, ruined lives and wasted billions.

What else needs to be understood? Warnings on labels would, at the least, encourage young people to think about possible effects when buying alcoholic beverages.

To refuse to order such warnings, as FDA requested, is both bureaucratic arrogance and ineffectiveness--at a time when taxpayers are already greatly disturbed over the federal government's lack of responsiveness, effectiveness and common sense.

### Farm Census Reports Needed

Farm or ranch operators who have not been counted yet in the 1978 Census of Agriculture still have an opportunity to be included, according to the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce.

Uncounted operators are urged to write for a farm census report form to (WYC), Bureau of the Census, 1201 East 10th Street, Jeffersonville, INd. 47132. The census has been underway since January 1, 1979.

Bureau officials remind farmers and ranchers that the census will include producers of many commodities not often thought of as agricultural. Among these are rabbits, pheasants, quail, and pigeons or squab. Greenhouse and such nursery products as sod, mushrooms, greenhouse vegetables, cut flowers, and bulbs are also on the list as farm and ranch products. Any commercial producer of these commodities should fill out a census report form. Bureau officials also remind farm operators that the quicker report forms are returned to the Bureau the less it will cost in follow-up work to complete collection of census data.

### ARE YOU IN AGRICULTURE?



The Census of Agriculture has been underway since January 1st and the Bureau of the Census is asking agricultural operators: "WILL YOU BE COUNTED?"

If you engaged in agriculture operations in 1978, then you should have already received a 1978 Census of Agriculture report form. Agriculture Census report forms have been mailed to all known agriculture operations, yet some will be missed.

It is important to you that the 1978 Census of Agriculture be complete and accurate. Farm organizations; local, State, and Federal policymakers; farm suppliers; and many others use this information to make decisions. Complete and accurate data lead to better decisionmaking that affects you and your neighbors.

If you can answer "Yes" to any one of the following questions, you should have received a Census of Agriculture report form. If you did not, please complete the coupon below and a census form will be mailed to you.

- Did you have day-to-day control in 1978 of an individual agricultural operation from which agricultural products were sold?
- Did you have any crops or livestock for other than home use?
- Did you own or rent land and operate this land yourself for agricultural purposes?

NOTE: If all of your land is rented to others, or you have only a garden, it is not necessary to file an Agricultural Census form.

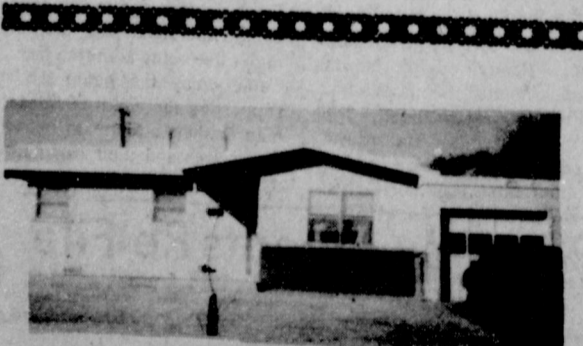

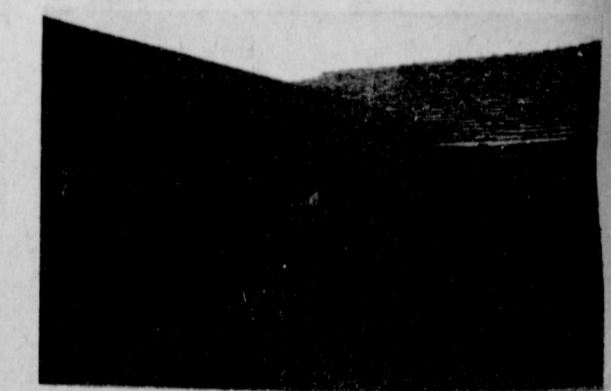
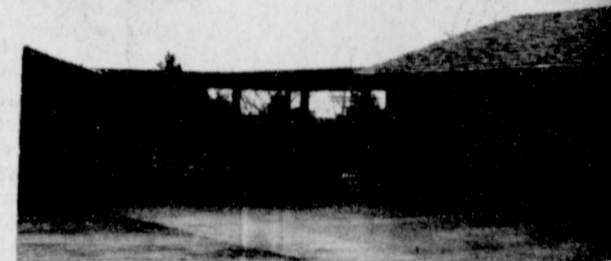

## IRS News

DALLAS--Taxpayers who  
take certain steps to save en-  
ergy in their homes can cut their  
income tax bills by up to \$2,500  
as a result of recent legislation.

The law, which is retroactive to  
April 20, 1977, provides for a  
tax credit of up to \$300 for  
energy conservation materials  
installed in the home, with a  
separate credit of as much as  
\$2,200 for taxpayers who install  
"renewable" energy source  
devices such as solar or wind  
equipment.

The smaller credit is figured at  
15 percent of the first \$2,000  
spent on such items as storm or  
thermal windows and doors,  
insulation, weatherstripping  
and caulking. Also qualifying are  
furnace replacement burners,  
flue-opening modifications,  
electrical or mechanical ignition  
systems to replace gas pilot  
lights, and clock thermostats.

The "renewable" energy  
source credit is 30 percent of the  
first \$2,000 plus 20 percent of  
the next \$8,000 invested in  
qualifying solar, wind or geo-  
thermal equipment used to heat,  
cool or provide hot water for  
use in the home.

Both credits are available for  
items purchased and installed on  
a taxpayer's principal resi-  
dence between April 20, 1977  
and December 31, 1985. The  
"renewable" energy credit is  
available for both existing and  
newly constructed homes. Ren-  
ters as well as homeowners are  
eligible for the credit.

Taxpayers need not itemize  
deductions to claim the resi-  
dential energy tax credit. They  
do, however, have to file Form  
1040 attaching IRS Form 5695,  
showing how the credit was  
computed. Form 5695, showing  
how the credit was computed,  
Form 5695, "Energy Credits,"  
is available at IRS offices and  
many banks and post offices.

The credits for property in-  
stalled in 1978 must be claimed  
on the 1978 return. However,  
no credit is allowed on any  
return for any taxable year if the  
credit is less than \$10. Any  
unused energy credits may be  
carried over to the extent the  
credit is more than the taxpay-  
er's liability. The carryover  
extends through 1987.

IRS has prepared a free  
publication, Publication 903,  
"Energy Credits for Individu-  
als," which explains the resi-  
dential energy credits in detail.  
Taxpayers may pick up a copy at  
their nearest IRS office or call  
the IRS toll-free by dialing

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## Bridge Demolition Planned

AMARILLO—Two 200-foot steel truss spans of the old U. S. Highway 87-287 bridge over the Canadian River 20 miles north of Amarillo will be brought down by explosives on March 7th or 8th, weather permitting. Dyke Explosive Service Company (DESCO, Inc.) of Tulsa, Okla., who will handle the demolition is the same firm that demolished the old Amarillo Hotel in April, 1978. They are a subcontractor for Cooper & Woodruff Inc., of Amarillo who have the job of replacing the northbound bridge and approaches.

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission in August 1978 awarded Cooper & Woodruff the contract. Cooper & Woodruff's low bid of \$747,794. A DESCO official said the bridge, built in 1935, will be brought down at once in five sections per span using linear-shaped charges. The Tulsa firm, which performed consulting work recently in dropping the Antioch bridge east of San Francisco by using explosives, will have the old bridge dropped into the river bed in a matter of seconds.

Traffic, both north and southbound, will have to be stopped for just a few minutes when the charges are set off by electric blasting caps. The existing southbound bridge, now carrying traffic two-way until the new bridge can be completed, probably by mid-November, will be closed to traffic a short time. A 1500-foot clearance around the bridge will be required

when the bridge is blasted.

The three existing piers under the bridge with the addition of two new intermediate piers, will be used to support the new bridge which will be wider and similar in construction to the southbound bridge at the site, according to Henry L. "Lou" Gallegly of Dalhart, SDHPT Supervising Resident Engineer.

Martin & Martin of Smithfield, Texas, will be the subcontractor of drill shafts for the new piers.

After the two 200-foot main spans have been brought down, Cooper & Woodruff will wreck the ends spans. The new structure will then require new end span work.

Dropping the steel trusses by explosives rather than by cutting torches is a safer and more economical method. The height of the structure poses possible hazardous circumstances for workers and the uniform breakdown of the bridge by explosives will prevent damage to the existing piers that will be used for the new bridge. Also, the smaller sections in tact will be easier and more quickly removed from the river bed.

The new bridge will provide safer travel on four-lane U. S. 87-287 between Amarillo and Dumas, Gallegly said. This bridge replacement project, authorized by the 1977 State Bridge Replacement Program, is .3 of a mile in length.

The existing bridge has a clear roadway width of 24 feet. Its replacement will have a clear roadway width of 38 feet.

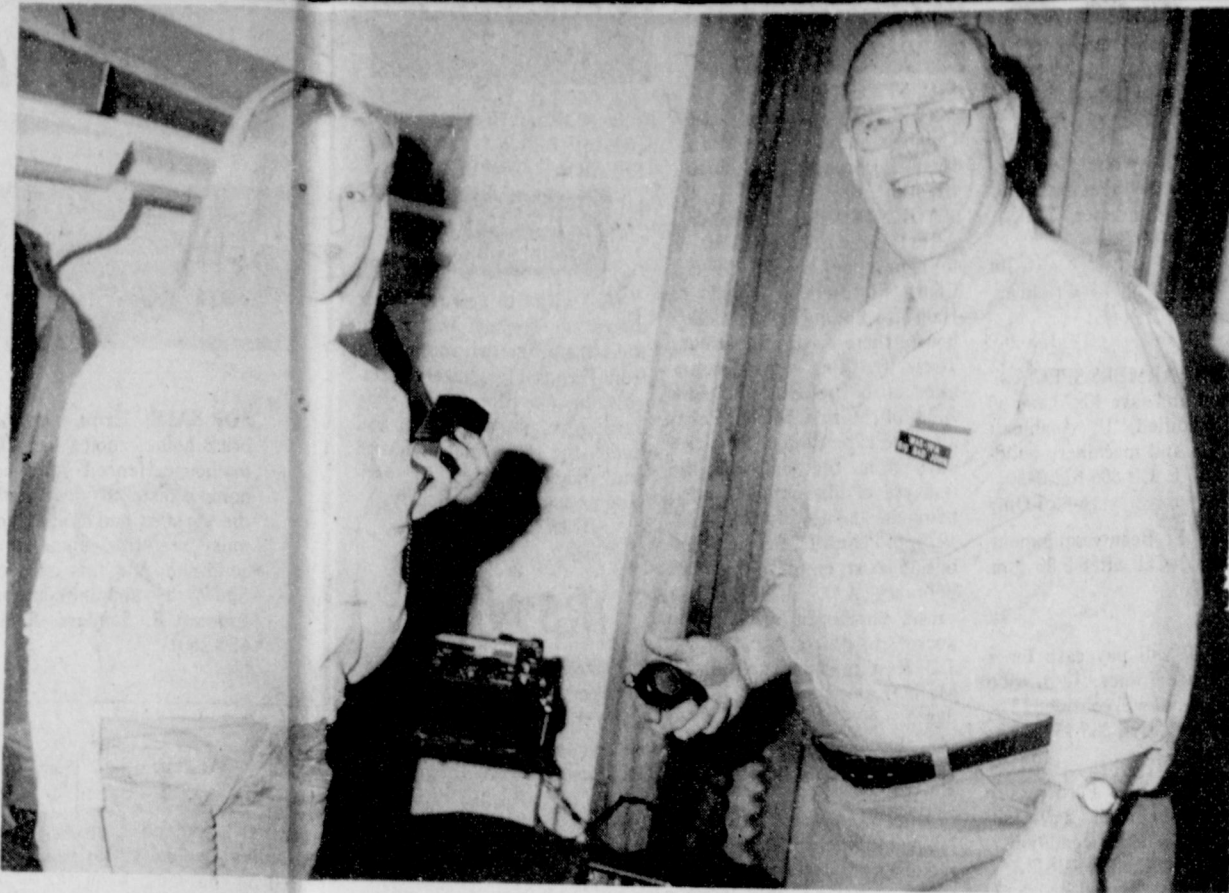

# To Merge Recreation With Y?

A resolution presented to the Spearman City Council by YMCA representatives at Tuesday's meeting would in essence merge the City's long time recreational program with the new YMCA. The resolution was not acted on but was passed along to a committee composed of City Manager Len Simpson City Attorney J.E. Blackburn, and YMCA Executive Director Jim Benson. The Committee was instructed to study a proposed contract, seeking input from the Coaching staffs of the Spearman School system, and then to report back to the City Council at its first meeting in March.

The YMCA representatives also asked the City Council to approve a contract whereby the YMCA would serve as the managing agent for the use of the City Pool for the summer of 1979 with the YMCA providing the necessary personnel, such as a competent manager, guards, and instructors to operate the pool. The YMCA would also provide the necessary insurance. The City would provide certain basic concession supplies and provide the city with a summary of the swimming operation at the conclusion of the season.

The proposed contract would in essence allow the YMCA through "its capability, expertise, management skills and programming abilities to provide desired programs and quality of services consistent with past standards of performance and quality of services consistent with past standards of performance established by the City".

For managing the pool and the concessions the YMCA would receive all revenue generated by the pool and the concessions.

The representatives present from the YMCA were President Jim McLain, Board member Tim Woodington and Executive Director Benson.

The City would then in turn provide the City with financial summary as to the fiscal operation of that recreation program. Benson explained to Council members that the concept was to "do more for the community as an agency". He also explained that the resolution was sought so as to prevent the duplication of recreation and swimming programs on the part of the City and the YMCA.

They told the Council that the YMCA was "desirous" of cooperating with the City in providing various recreational programs to the Public, regardless of whether those members of the public were members of the YMCA.

Benson told the Council that the present very successful swimming team program under the guidance of The Rev. Mr. Don Wirsdorfer could be brought under the "wing" of the Y.

The YMCA Representatives have asked the City to enter into a long term contract with the YMCA of Hansford County for the old Lynx Stadium, for a period of ten years at a cost of \$1.00 per year. The City would provide the maintenance services necessary. Executive Director Benson explained that the YMCA envisioned programs such as soccer and other such Sports that might be developed by the Y at the old Stadium.

Benson urged the city to consider the program for one year to ascertain the merits of such a cooperative venture. Council members appeared to be basically responsive to the proposal.

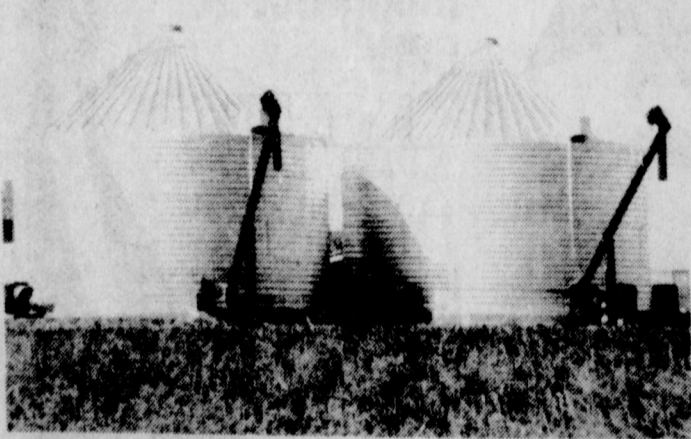



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

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**IRS News**

Dallas--Taxpayers age 55 or over have a once in a lifetime chance to exclude from gross income up to \$100,000 of the gain from the sale of their home if they sold it after July 26, 1978.

Taxpayers can exclude all or part of the gain on the sale of their homes if it was the principal residence for at least three of the five years prior to the sale. Those age 65 or over have the additional option of using a principal residence test of five years out of the eight years before the sale. This option is available only on sales prior to July 26, 1981.

The new exclusion takes the place of the \$35,000 exclusion previously available to taxpayers 65 or over. However, taxpayers who took this \$35,000 exclusion on homes sold before July 27 can still qualify for \$100,000 exclusion if they sell their current home after July 26, 1978.

The new law also modifies the rule that taxpayers must keep a new principal residence for 18 months if they deferred gain from the sale of their old house. If the taxpayer must sell the new residence before 18 months because of a job-related move that qualifies for the moving expense deduction, he or she is exempted from the requirement.

More information is available in IRS Publication 523, "Tax Information on Selling or Purchasing your Home." The booklet is available from local IRS offices.

**Search for Texas' Rural Hero On**

The search is underway for Texas' rural hero of 1978. Presentation of the Rural Heroism Award annually gives recognition to a deserving person who has performed an act of exceptional bravery during a time of crisis. The Award is presented during the Annual Texas Safety Association Conference and Exposition.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, sponsor of the award, is requesting nominations. Ben Bullard, Council President and Assistant Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau outlined details:

1) Nominations should include a written account of the

incident and the names, addresses and phone numbers of all persons involved. Newspaper clippings and pictures should also accompany the nominations, if available.

2) All entries must be submitted by March 5, 1979, to the Rural Heroism Award Committee, Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, P. O. Box 489, Waco, 76703.

3) This year's award winner will be recognized Monday morning, March 26, at the Texas Safety Association's 40th Annual Conference and Exposition general Opening Session ceremonies at the Shamrock Hilton Hotel, Houston.

**Bill To Give Control Over Nuclear Waste Introduced**

AUSTIN...Senator Bob Price, R-Pampa, has cosponsored legislation that will give the state some control the construction of long term or permanent storage facilities for nuclear waste materials in the state of Texas. "Long term" means over twenty years.

The bill, Senate Bill No. 664, introduced by Senator Roy Blake of Nacogdoches, will require approval of both houses of the State Legislature before such facilities can be constructed. The bill covers only those nuclear waste materials which require licensing for storage by the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission. It will not include those low level wastes that are presently supervised by the Texas State Department of Health.

The bill would establish a review process by which the Texas Natural Resources Council would be a part of any feasibility or specific site study conducted by the federal government. The Council would examine each step in the study, and would give its recommendations to a legislative committee appointed by the Governor. The Committee would report to the Governor and both houses of the Legislature prior to each session of the Legislature.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission has indicated that they want active state participation in licensing such facilities. Hopefully, the State of Texas by using this approach could avoid exercise of the preemptive power by the federal government and retain the right of state approval.

**Price Joins In Implementing Red River Compact**

AUSTIN...Senator Bob Price has joined four colleagues in the Senate in sponsoring Senate Bill No. 581 implementing the Red River Compact.

The Red River Compact was created last year between the states of Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas.

The principle purposes of the compact are: (a) to promote interstate comity and remove causes of controversy between each of the affected states by governing use, control and distribution of the interstate water of the Red River and its tributaries; (b) to provide equitable apportionment of water of

the Red River and its tributaries; (c) to promote program for control and alleviation of natural deterioration and pollution of the water of the Red River Basin and provide enforcement of same; (d) to provide program for conservation of water, flood protection, improvement of water quality, as well as navigation and regulation of river flow; and (e) to provide joint state planning.

The bill also provides for the administration of the compact. Under the legislation, the "Red River Compact Commission" would be created consisting of

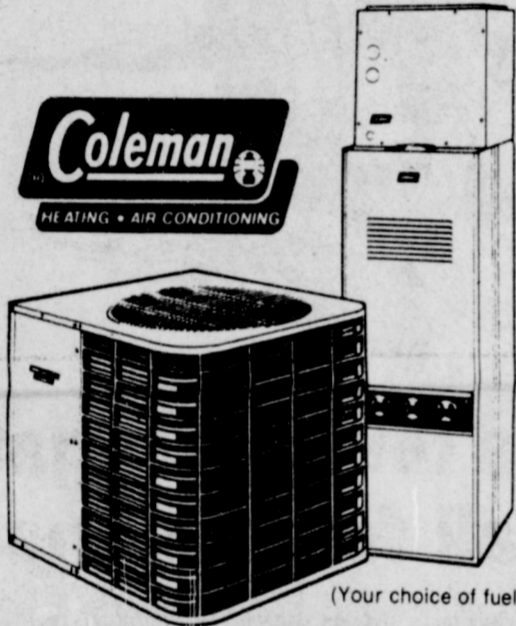

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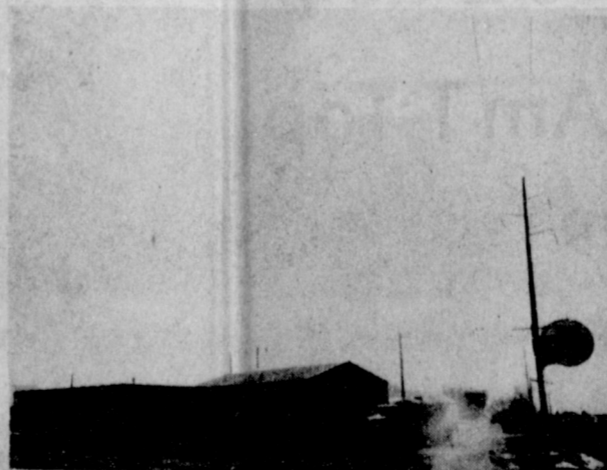

"My favorite co-star is Herbie. My favorite leading lady," he added with a grin, "is a different matter."

Herbie is the humanized 1963 Volkswagen beetle with a worldwide fan following and cement tireprints in the forecourt of Hollywood's famous Mann's Chinese Theatre. The name March comes from Mars, the ancient Roman deity known as the god of war but thought to have been, originally, the god of vegetation, and was for centuries the first month of the year.

In the United States the 1st is Nebraska State Day (dating from admission in 1867), the 2nd is Texas Independence Day (dating from 1836, when a conference of residents of Texas declared independence from Mexico) and the 4th is Vermont Day, dating from admission in 1791.

The 3rd is the birthday anniversary of Alexander Graham Bell, the great inventor who did so much for all who followed him; he was born in Scotland in 1842. On the 5th in 1768 three Americans were shot down by British troops in Boston and John Adams always thought this often-forgotten incident was one of the major sparks that fanned the American Revolution.

The 6th is Alamo Day, in memory of the fall of the Alamo and its brave defenders at San Antonio, the survivors being shot by a brutal Santa Anna. The 8th is the birthday anniversary of Oliver Wendell Holmes, one of the Nation's greatest jurists, born in Boston in 1841. Another Massachusetts native, Ely Whitney, patented the cotton gin on the 14th in 1794. This opened the way to the cultivation of cotton in the South. (South Carolina, in recognition of the importance of the invention, voted Whitney \$50,000.)

Maine was admitted to the Union on the 15th in 1820, having formerly been a dependency of Massachusetts. James Madison, the nation's fourth President, was born at Port Conway, Virginia, on the 16th in 1751. Madison was a master builder of the U.S. Constitution, was largely influential in defeating Patrick Henry's efforts to prevent its ratification, and did much to insure the right of free worship for all, having helped defeat Patrick Henry's proposal to levy a general tax in Virginia to support religion.

Perhaps today the stars have lost some of their importance as guides and direction indicators with radio direction-finding and radar. In the old days, when sailors or hunters or explorers ran into foul weather, or fair, they could use the stars to give them a course away from the undesirable elements. In bad weather, glimpses of the stars are few and far between, but one glimpse is enough.

You must know that there are five constellations of stars in our hemisphere which never sink below the horizon--Big Dipper, Little Dipper, Draco, Cepheus and Cassiopeia. The tip of the Big Dipper always points to the North Star--also always visible.

In this hemisphere weather moves west to east, and bad weather counter clockwise. A direction bearing from the stars can point the way to the warmer south, away from the center of a hurricane or storm, etc. And the stars, unlike a compass, never fail.

## Gas Rates Increased!

City gas customer's gas rates will reflect an additional 3 cents per one thousand cubic feet of gas consumed as a result of action taken by the Spearman City Council Tuesday evening.

It all comes as a result of "evening" out increases actually approved by the Texas Railroad Commissioner's Examiner after his study of a gas rate increase sought by High Plains Natural Gas Company.

The Examiner approved an "Interim" gas rate increase of approximately 3 cents. A final order, however will not be handed down for 45 to 60 days. The Examiner allowed what in essence is a Cost of Service increase from 25.76 cents to 28.05 cents per one thousand cubic feet of gas.

The gas utility is allowed by law to recover a portion of its costs making the total increase the city will impose, right at 8 cents. The City Council had earlier increased the gas rates charged city customers by 5 cents, anticipating such an increase from the Texas Railroad Commission.

City Council members explained however that the High Plains will probably charge the City an additional 9 cents per thousand on top of the increase approved for local customers. The Gas utility can do this by law because the Texas Railroad Commission did not take its action until after 150 days had

passed from the point of the petition by the Utility.

The additional rates, namely the extra 9 cents will be absorbed by the City for the next several months hopeful that the imposition of the additional 3 cents on top of the original 5 cents will be sufficient ultimately to absorb the actual additional costs of the City.

High Plains can by law impose the new rates it originally sought for a one month period. The extra cost to the City will be approximately \$12000.00. City council members were unanimous in their feelings that this should not be ragged on to local customer's bills but rather absorbed over a several month period.

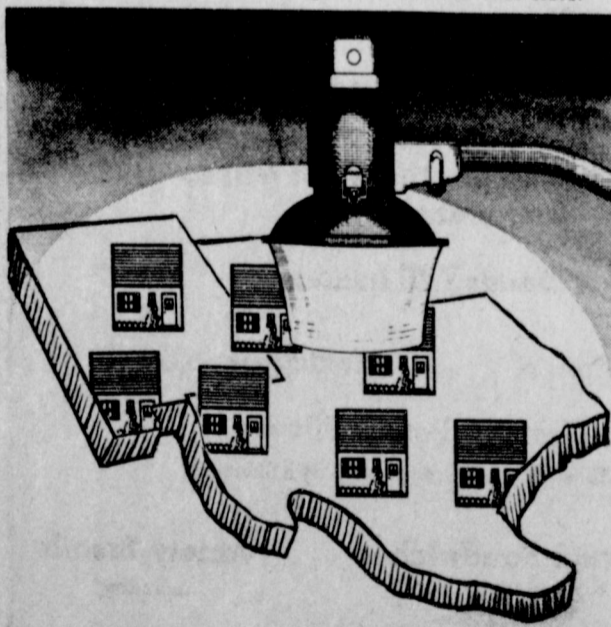
