So rang out the ancient song of faith this past Sunday morning in the auditorium of the Gruver High School as the membership and friends of the First United Methodist Church of Gruver met for Sunday morning worship temporarily stunned by the overnight loss by fire of their once beautiful and historic church building. It was perhaps the most arduous task that the year old southern Methodist School of theology graduate had ever faced. The church building that he had come to love in his seven months as minister was gutted beyond recognition by the savagery of the flames that had engulfed every conceivable item the night before. Gone was his personal library... gathered laboriously over the past number of years of training and preparation. Gone were sermon notes... Wedding records, college and Seminary Momentos... Diplomas, letters, and a variety of other priceless and irreplaceable items.

The Rev. Mr. Tom Fuller faced his people: so many saddened but not disillusioned; shocked but not despairing; fearful yet courageous; They sang the Hymn... "Sometimes the shadows are Deep" from a selection of their Hymnal entitled "Courage in times of conflict" the young Pastor read the morning scriptures: Another hymn of faith echoed off the walls of the high school auditorium; Stand Up For Jesus... And a church facing the almost impossible task of rebuilding completely what years of sacri-

fice and endeavor had built decided to forge ahead in keeping with the words of faith they had blended in song.

Somehow the church discouraged had become the church resolute: somehow the church had indeed passed through the fire and had not been found wanting. Somehow they would rebuild. And in the rebuilding process they would mold together into a cohesive unit of believers.

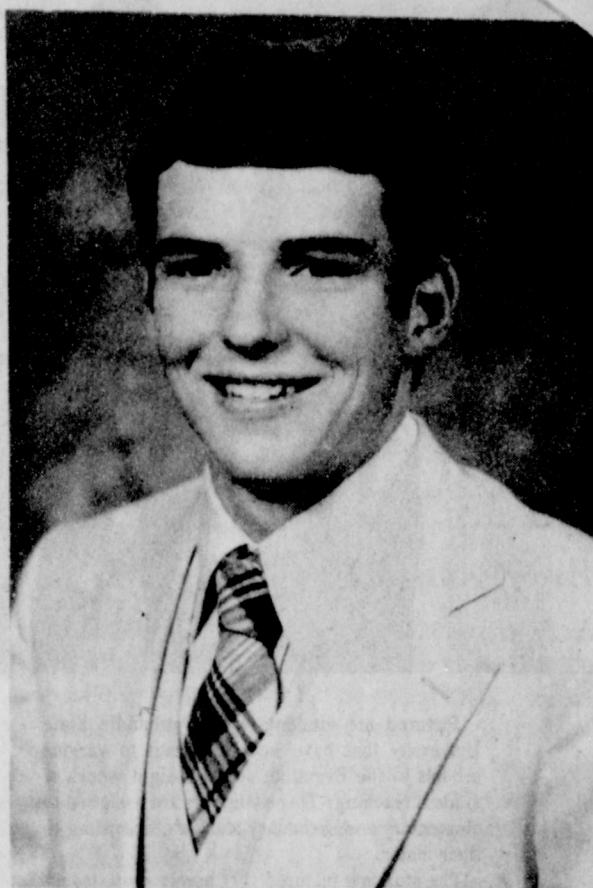
The First United Methodist Church of Gruver with losses yet to be firmly established but with estimates of over one half million dollars will rebuild. A building committee has been named. Mr. Kenneth Irwin will serve as chairman... architects who originally provided the plans for the former church will be contacted... and a new day will soon dawn!

For the time being the church will meet for various activities at the Gruver School. Offers of assistance have come from many other churches - Many non Methodist... but each offer indicative of the unity that really exists when the "Valleys Are Deep."

Many communities might have had their faith shattered... The community of Gruver has proven it's strength, uncommon, rare, indomitable... and resolute.

The future will be even greater for the church... and for the community.

SCOTT MARTIN, Spearman High School senior has been named on the first team All-State Football team as a receiver.

Scott earned this honor completing a successful high school career. During his senior year as a split end he caught 27 passes for a total of 468 yards and intercepted 8 passes on defense. Some of these catches as witnessed during the Perryton game were sensational.

Scott was a 3 year starter during high school. As a junior he was named 1st team All-District Defensive Back, and 2nd Team Split End. As a senior Scott was 1st team All-District as a Split End and 2nd team Defensive Safety.

Another highlight for Scott was to represent his team on the 1978 Panhandle Super Team as a receiver.

During high school Scott has been a member of an outstanding team record -- that of never losing a district game.



ZANE NEWTON was named to the 2nd team All-State Football squad as a defensive back. Zane has combined a 4 year high school career record of rushing 2,138 yards averaging approximately 6.9 yards per carry. Zane was the punter and extra-point kicker for the Lynx. He has been named four years to the All-District team, making first team on offense and defense his junior and senior years.

Zane's senior year he was named as the Amarillo Globe-News Player of the Week. Other honors include, KVII Player of the Week as a freshman and the Spearman High School Grade Offensive Award as a junior.

#### Missionary To Speak



The Reverend Jimmy L. Beggs, and Assemblies of God missionary to Kenya, will be the guest speaker Sunday 21, 9:45, at the First Assembly of God, 401 N. Bernice, the Reverend David Nuckles, pastor, has announced.

During their last term of missionary service, Mr. Beggs and his wife Mary were active in Bible school teaching and in the Theological Education by Extension (TEE) program. TEE provides training by mail for pastors and Christian workers.

Mr. Beggs also served as the general superintendent of the Assemblies of God in Kenya. Mrs. Beggs was the national director of the women's auxiliary groups.

Before their ministry in Kenya, the Beggses ministered for 7 years in evangelism and teaching in Tanzania.

About their work in Kenya, Mr. Beggs says, "Kenya is the calm eye of the hurricane of war and trouble that is sweeping Africa. God is allowing Kenya's churches to experience growth. Their stability and maturity will be a basis for African missionary activities in the future."

Prior to their missionary ministry, Mr. and Mrs. Beggs pastored in Morton, Texas. To prepare for their ministerial careers the Beggses attended Southwestern Assemblies of God College in Waxahachie, Texas. Mr. Beggs earned a B.A. degree.

During this special missions rally, Mr. and Mrs. Beggs will be emphasizing the importance of prayer support for missionaries from Christians and church groups in America. They will also present the need for missionary recruits. The public is invited to attend.

#### City Receives Sales Tax

The City of Spearman received a check this month for the city sales and use tax thru the period ending 12-29-78 in the amount of \$4,195.11 which was an increase over the same period last year. Last year's check was \$2,533.13. According to Bob Bullock, Comptroller of Public Accounts this is an increase of 65%.

The City of Gruver received \$539.41 for the same period.

Texas cities received a record \$424.8 million during 1978 as their share of the city sales tax, an increase of 17 percent over the previous year, Bullock said.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's Office.

The logo was discussed a great deal and a

committee was appointed to work on getting a logo. Georgia Holt is continuing to work on drawing one. ### Government Regulations Up Loss

Stringent government regulations requiring additional professional staff personnel at Hansford Hospital aided in increasing salary and wage costs by over 26% in 1978 over the previous year. The local medical facility

striving to maintain its accreditation as a medicare facility is required to have additional registered nursing personnel on duty around the clock simply to meet government and health education and welfare rules and regulations. Hospital administration Jerry Taylor explained that he has been faced with the alternative of either employing the additional staff members or loss of medicare accreditation. Such a loss would be a severe blow and could even constitute a crippling loss financially to the hospital. Salaries and wages increased to \$366,779.00 as compared to \$296,096 in 1977. The information was presented by hospital auditor

Mac Hoel at the recent hospital board meeting. Administrator Taylor noted that there were now nine RN's on the staff of Hansford Hospital.

The Spearman officer left January 8th to assume the Chief's position in Portales, N. M. Lenis Simpson had named

Sergeant Jimmy Jackson to serve as acting Chief, pending official council action on a permanent replacement. It had been learned by the Reporter that Chief Wisniewski presented a written recommendation concerning his department to the council. City Manager Lenis Simpson told the Reporter that this was normal procedure when a Department Head left to move elsewhere. The City Manager confirmed however that the former Chief had prepared the written document before leaving.

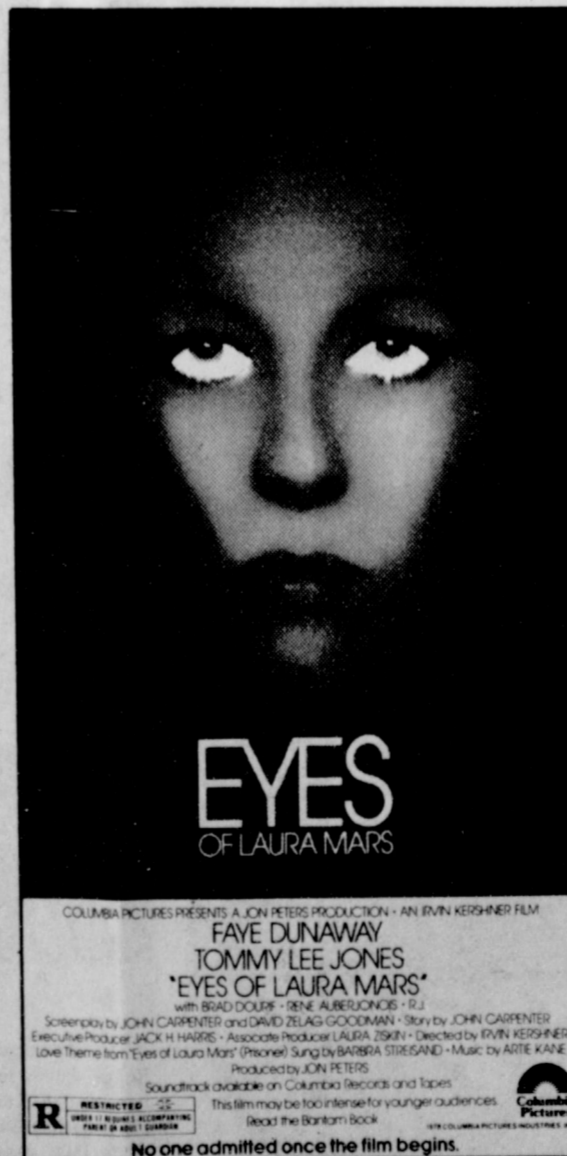

# 39% Jump In City's Dec. Gas Bill

The City's gas bill for December lends credence to the feeling that December was a particularly cold month. City Manager Len Simpson told City Council members last night that the gas bill the City received from High Plains Gas Company was 39% higher than last year's!

The actual cost of gas furnished the City for sale to it's customers topped the forty thousand dollar mark last month!

High Plains officials concerned about the increase asked City Manager Simpson to provide data concerning gas line leakage and according to the City official there probably was a ten per cent loss in this respect this year as compared to a 13.4% loss last December.

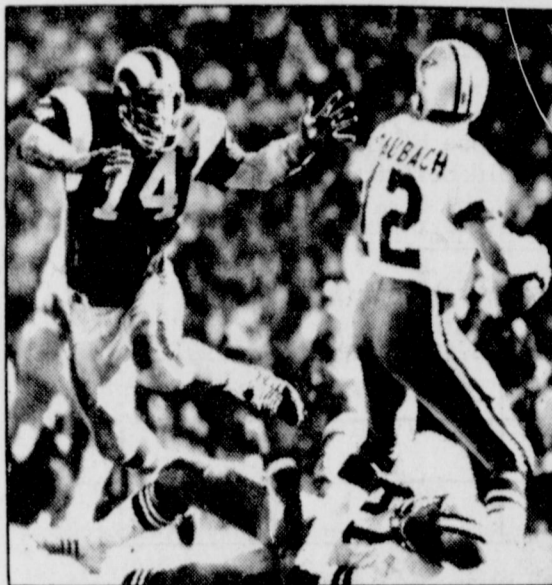

I find myself listening to his voice sometimes rather than what he says. Brodie is the closest thing to a Don Meredith that Ohlmeier has been able to come up with and he also does a fine job. His quick adlib after Terry Donahue's faux pas in Phoenix will go alongside Meredith's never to be forgotten "He's saying we're number one" after that memorable Monday night shot in Houston.

Who does what in Super Bowl XIII will be interesting, particularly to those of us in the business. Anyway, it goes, look for the stamp of Don Ohlmeier as well as his on-the-air credit. You'll be seeing it for a long time.

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## Area Delegates Attend Farmer Union Meet

LUBBOCK, TX— Delegates and members of the Texas Farmers Union have again given full support to re-adoption of 100% of parity farm prices and have urged all farmers and ranchers in the state to unite their numbers and harmonize their opinions in the coming months' efforts in Washington. The convention was filled with little controversy even though coincidentally timed with a caravan of tractors which left the convention center parking lot on their way to Washington. In fact, the most heated session was not one of internal issues but rather one in which a top economist from the Carter Administration spoke. Dr. J.B. Penn., Dpty. Administrator of ESCS in the Dept. of Agriculture, was booed loudly and repeatedly in a question session after a speech in which he rather unsympathetically told the farmers that 1979 farm income would be little above last year's, "or down slightly."

As one official stated, "Our sole interest at present is to change the poor and inadequate federal farm law. When we witness an unconcerned attitude like this from one of Carter's chief brain trusts in charge of farm policy, we're disposed to raise Cain. I think it's important that large numbers of farmers follow Penn back to Washington and dedicate themselves to bringing lawmakers to pass emergency legislation that even the Administration couldn't water down. I'd predict from the viewpoint here that President Carter couldn't carry enough farm votes in Texas to sneeze at."

In other sessions earlier, Farmers Union members heard from a panel of Tax experts on the issues of government spending and taxation and their efforts on family farmers.

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown, Attorney General Mark White and North Dakota Farmers Union President Stanley Moore also addressed the three-day convention. Moore was especially received with serious attention as he delineated the serious problems farmers face in the areas of inflation, energy, transportation, and representation.

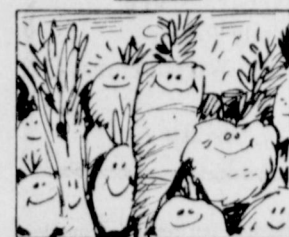

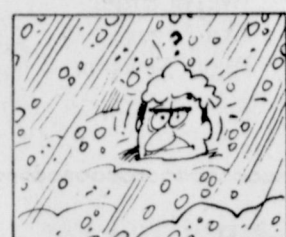

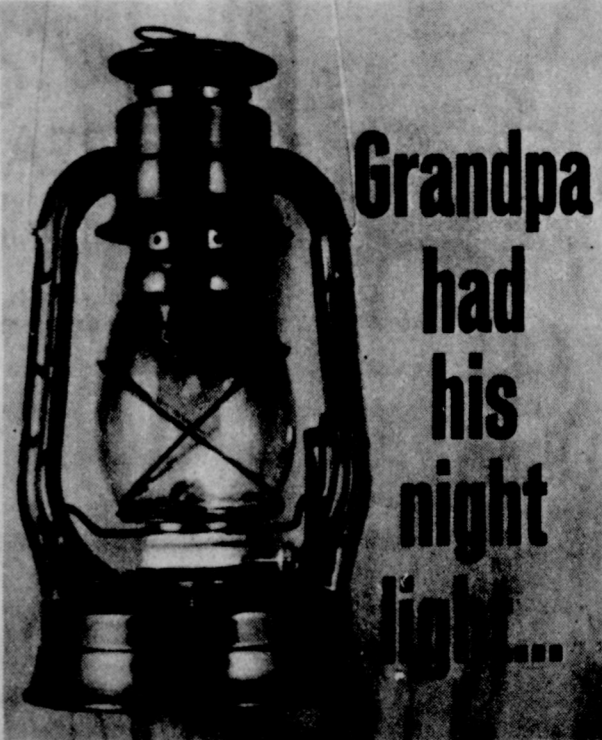

### Rotary Club

Rita Curtis, librarian of the Hansford County Library, spoke at a meeting of the Spearman Rotary Club on Monday noon, January 15, at Martin's Steak Garden.

Mrs. Curtis told the Rotarians that the Library was begun in 1932 when the 20th Century Club had a silver tea and with the proceeds bought \$65 worth of books for the starting of the library. The first library was in a small room at the City Hall, later moved to Hansford County Court House. In 1950 the name was changed from Spearman Library to Hansford County Library.

In 1968, the library was moved into the newly acquired and renovated old Excell Chevrolet garage on Main Street. Three years later the mortgage was paid off, because organizations in the community had sales, bazaars, and bake sales to pay it off.

In 1972 the library became a part of the Texas Library Association. At present, the library has over 15,000 volumes, which is about twice as much as most libraries in towns of this size. The library has the Wall Street Journals on file. It is a member of the Panhandle System with the resource center in Amarillo. \$2,500 worth of books will be purchased this year. It is a member of the inter-library loan service. Any book that a patron would like to borrow, if not in the local library, can be ordered from almost any library in the country and be here in a matter of a few days. The local library also has access to films in the Amarillo library. The library has a projector that can be checked out. Cassette tapes and framed art reproductions may be checked out like books.

The library has a paperback exchange. Anyone can exchange one's paperbacks for ones at the library. The library has a Copier and charges 10 cents a copy.

Each month there is an artist of the month and a collector of the month with displays of their art and collectible items.

The Thrift Shop at the north end of the library was started back when the present library building was first purchased. It began with a white elephant sale that had so much contributed to it that the sale has extended to almost every Saturday for twelve years. Volunteers come down on Tuesday mornings and sort and mark items for sale.

There is a story hour for preschool children every Tuesday morning and a summer reading program for elementary school children.

Memorials and donations have been numerous, generous, and well appreciated. The average circulation per
