

### City Receives Sales Tax

The City of Spearman received a check this month for the city sales and use tax thru the period ending 12-29-78 in the amount of \$4,195.11 which was an increase over the same period last year. Last year's check was \$2,533.13. According to Bob Bullock. Comptroller of Public Accounts this is an increase of 65%.

The City of Gruver received \$539.41 for the same period. Texas cities received a record \$424.8 million during 1978 as their share of the city sales tax, an increase of 17 percent over the previous year, Bullock said.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's





NBC's DALLAS COWBOYS Official weekly newspaper Super Bowl Plans

t is just over the horizon now, this spectacle we know as Super Bowl XIII and I know you are all waiting with bated breath to see how television will handle this

CBS and NBC, under terms of their multi-million dollar pact with the NFL, alternate on carrying the "ultimate" game as some call it each year and this year it is NBC's turn. The networks like to play a little game of one upmanship, sort of a "anything you can do, I can do better" approach.

Last year, in addition to the normal two hour pregame show CBS adlibbed an extra hour of coverage when the Phoenix Open golf telecast was rained out, of all things. The golf show was slated as a lead-in to football and the network had about two hours notice that the additional time would have to be filled. Then CBS sports chief Bob Wussler decided to go with a behindthe-scenes look at how CBS covers the Super Bowl.

What it succeeded in doing was getting a lot of behind-the-scenes folk who never get on camera some unexpected exposure. I'm sure it did well in the ratings, too. After all, you could put a test pattern on the air two hours before kickoff and still win the time period handily

The only time that CBS and NBC did not split Super Bowl coverage was on the world's first Super Sunday following the 1966 season when the Green Bay Packers faced off against the AFL upstart Kansas City Chiefs. Neither network wanted to play second fiddle, so NBC and CBS shared the broadcast, with each utilizing its own set of announcers for the actual play-by-play call. Ray Scott and Jack Whitaker split the play by play for CBS while Curt Gowdy called the shots for NBC. CBS, incidentally, won the battle of the ratings that day.

What makes interesting watching for those of us in the business is how Don Ohlmeyer will handle his first Super Bowl assignment: The youthful Ohlmeyer was once Roone Arledge's right hand guy at ABC. He produced Monday Night Football in its early years and also was the man behind the scenes in ABC's excellent Olympics coverage and has a closetful of Emmies to show for both assignments.

It was his expertise in places like Munich and Montreal that caught NBC's eye after they bought the rights to the 1980 games in Moscow. To get him, the network regarded him with not only cold hard cash and lots of it, but also made him executive producer of all NBC sports events, including of course the 1980 Summer Olympics and the upcoming Super Bowl.

Unlike Arledge, who is pretty well tied down at the office these days, Ohlmeyer is everywhere. He lives both in Los Angeles and New York and is liable to show up at a Fiesta Bowl as well as a Super Bowl. Indeed, he probably got more ink recently when UCLA coach Terry Donahue came out with an "oh bleep" on mike and on camera during the Fiesta Bowl than for anything else he's done till now. He is innovative and he is creative and the results are very evident in the noticeable pickup of quality in the NBC NFL telecasts this year.

Since Don arrived on the scene, NBC has become exceedingly more aggressive. Ohlmeyer has been adding top people as he goes and don't be surprised if some pretty big name broadcasters don't wind up on his roster before the Olympics.





Nevertheless, there have been signs including his relegation to a "host" role at the World Series this year that Gowdy might be on the verge of being eased out of his long standing role as NBC's top play by play man.

The NBC analyst alignment matches Merlin Olsen and John Brodie. Olsen has to be equipped with the greatest set of pipes an ex-pro football player has ever had. I find myself listening to his voice sometimes rather than what he says. Brodie is the closest thing to a Don Meredith that Ohlmeyer has been able to come up with and he also does a fine job. His quick adlib after Terry Donahue's faux pas in Phoenix will go alongside Meredith's never to be forgotten "He's saying we're number one" after that memorable Monday night shot in Houston.

Who does what in Super Bowl XIII will be interesting, particularly to those of us in the business. Anyway, it goes, look for the stamp of Don Ohlmeyer as well as his on-the-air credit. You'll be seeing it for a long time.

### **Area Delegates Attend** Farmer Union Meet

LUBBOCK, TX---- Delegates and members of the Texas Farmers Union have again given full support to re-adoption of 100% of parity farm prices and have urged all farmers and ranchers in the state to unite their numbers and harmonize their opinions in the coming months' efforts in Washington.

The convention was filled with little controversy even though coincidently timed with a caravan of tractors which left the convention center parking

lot on their way to Washington. In fact, the most heated session was not one of internal issues but rather one in which a top economist from the Carter Administration spoke. Dr. J.B. Penn., Dpty. Administrator of ESCS in the Dept. of Agriculture, was booed loudly and repeatedly in a question session after a speech in which he rather unsympathetically told the farmers that 1979 farm income would be little above last year's, "or down slightly."

As one official stated, "Our sole interest at present is to change the poor and inadequate federal farm law. When we witness an unconcerned attitude like this from one of Carter's chief brain trusts in charge of farm policy, we're disposed to raise cain. I think it's important that large numbers of farmers follow Penn back to Washington and dedicate themselves to bringing lawmakers to pass emergency legislation that even the Administration couldn't water down. I'd predict from the viewpoint here that President Carter couldn't carry enough farm votes in Texas to sneeze at.

In other sessions earlier, Farmers Union members heard from a panel of Tax experts on the issues of government spending and tazation and their efforts on family farmers.

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown, Attorney General Mark White and North Dakota Farmers Union President Stanley Moore also addressed the three-day convention. Moore was especially received with serious attention as he delineated the serious problems farmers face in the areas of inflation, energy, tran-

sportation, and representation. 

### Rotary Club

Rita Curtis, librarian of the Hansford County Library, spoke at a meeting of the Spearman Rotary Club on Monday noon, January 15, at Martin's Steak

Mrs. Curtis told the Rotarians that the Library was begun in 1932 when the 20th Century Club had a silver tea and with the proceeds bought \$65 worth of books for the starting of the library. The first library was in a small room at the City Hall, later moved to Hansford County Court House. In 1950 the name was changed from Spearman Library to Hansford County Library.

In 1968, the library was moved into the newly acquired and renovated old Excell Cheverlot garage on Main Street. Three years later the mortgage was paid off, because organizations in the community had sales, bazaars, and bake sales to pay it off.

In 1972 the library became a part of the Texas Library Association. At present, the library has over 15,000 volumes, which is about twice as much as most libraries in towns of this size. The library has the Wall Street Journals on file. It is a member of the Panhandle System with the resource center in Amarillo. \$2,500 worth of books will be purchased this year. It is a member of the inter-library loan service. Any book that a patron would like to borrow, if not in the local library, can be ordered from almost any library in the country and be here in a matter of a few days. The local library also has access to films in the Amarillo library. The library has a projector that can be checked out. Cassette tapes and framed art reproductions may be checked out like books.

The library has a paperback exchange. Anyone can exchangle one's paperbacks for ones at the library. The library has a Copier and charges 10 cents a copy.

Each month there is an artist of the month and a collector of the month with displays of their art and collectible items.

The Thrift Shop at the north end of the library was started back when the present library building was first purchased. It began with a white elephant sale that had so much contributed to it that the sale has extended to almost every Saturday for twelve years. Volunteers come down on Tuesday morn-

sale. There is a story hour for preschool children every Tuesday morning and a summer reading program for elementary school children.

Memorials and donations have been numerous, generous, and well appreciated.
