## City Receives Sales Tax Check

The City of Spearman sales tax allocation for the first half of 1978 are running 24% ahead of those last year, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock. Statewide sales tax are running a healthy 17.5 percent ahead of last year.

Spearman received 14,668.60 for its June share of the local option one percent tax. Last year's share for the same period was 13,001.48.

Payments to the City of Spearman to date for 1978 are 49,341.28 compared to 47,279.23 for the same period last year.

The City of Gruver received a check of 3,856.01 for its June share compared to 2,119.70 for the same period last year. 1978

payments to date to Gruver is 10,030.97 compared to a 9,824.74 for the same period last year, up 2%.

Statewide the latest checks raise cities share to date this year to 196.5 million, compared to 167.2 million for the first half of last year. That's a 17.5 percent increase.

City sales tax allocation for the year are up 20% in Houston, 11 percent in Dallas, 15 percent in Fort Worth, 10 percent in San Antonio and 17 percent in Austin.

The tax collected by local merchants along with the state sales tax and is rebated to the cities monthly by the Comptroller's Office.

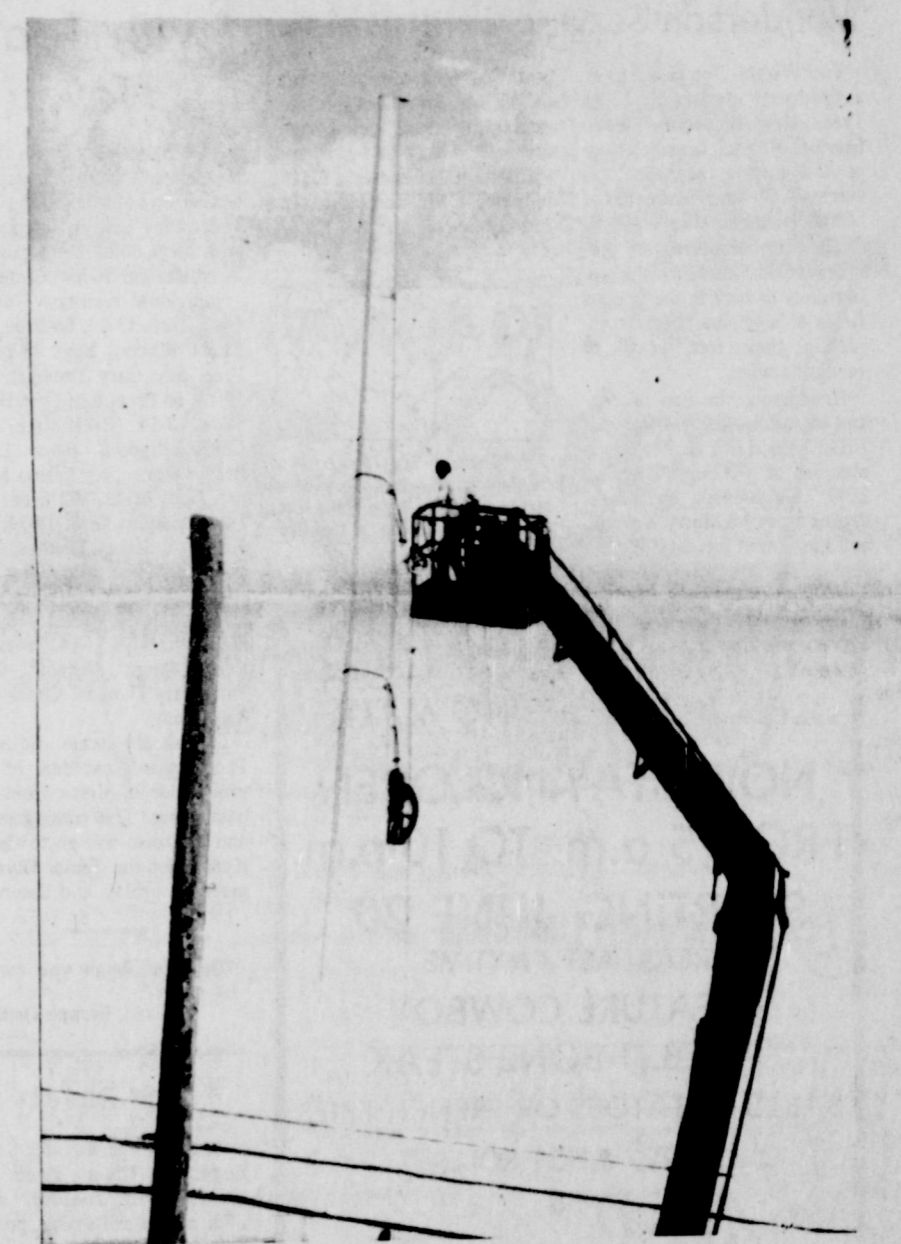
Sacred Heart Parish Hall in Spearman. Donors are to be contacted for time during the drives and everyone in the county is encouraged to participate if possible.

### IRS News

Social Security benefits are underwriting a college education for thousands of young Americans. If a parent is receiving either disability or retirement social security, unmarried children between the ages of 18 and 22 can receive student benefits if they are attending school on a full-time basis. The benefit can be as much as 1/2 of the parent's benefit when the parent is living or 3/4 of the parent's benefit if the parent is deceased.

Starting in 1974 student benefits became payable directly to the student. This is convenient for the student but it places responsibility for overpayments directly on the student.

Overpayments occur when students fail to report changes that affect their entitlement to social security. Terminating events include marriage, dropping out of school, changing to a non-accredited course of instruction and earning more in wages and/or self-employment than is allowed.

Since student benefits are dependent on parent's entitlement to benefits, a student can also be overpaid if his/her disabled or retired parent refuses to work and fails to notify Social Security.

Overpayments can be a real burden to a young person trying to get established in life. If you are a student receiving Social Security, be sure you understand your reporting responsibility and report changes immediately to your nearest Social Security Office.

**Brown Signs New License Agreements**

AUSTIN -- Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has signed agreements with two neighboring states, New Mexico and Louisiana, for mutual recognition of restricted-use pesticide applicator licenses.

The purpose of the agreement is to issue licenses or certifications on a reciprocal basis to

non-resident commercial, non-commercial, and private applicators who have passed tests and met other requirements of the two states.

"We initiated this agreement to help cut some of the red tape in dealing with Federal programs. The requirements in both states had to have approval from the Environmental Protection Agency, which regulates national pesticide statutes. The training and qualifications for applicators are essentially the same for all states," Brown said.

hormone-type herbicides will still be required to comply with the special laws of each state, Brown added. "Also, if we feel that commercial or private applicators require additional training, we are authorized to request this."

Applicants under the reciprocal agreement must pay all fees and satisfy all other licensing requirements of the reciprocating states and agree to abide by all pertinent pesticide laws.

In case an applicator's license or certification is suspended or revoked by either state, proper state authorities must be notified.

### Peggy's Pointers

If you put your electric blankets away without cleaning, better back-track!

Proper laundering is a "must" for longer blanket life. Never dry-clean an electric blanket. This usually ruins the insulation on the wiring.

Launder newer electric blankets in automatic washers and dryers. Many older blankets can also be laundered in automatic washers if controls are adjusted, but check instruction booklets.

Here are some instructions on how to launder an electric blanket:

- (1) Fill the washer with the blanket, lukewarm water and detergent-or cold water and a cold-water, wool-washing detergent. Let blanket soak 10 to 15 minutes. Then, agitate one to three minutes only.
- (2) Spin just long enough for water to drain from washer. Fill again for rinsing. Agitate one minute and spin again. If blanket still looks sudsy, repeat rinse.
- (3) Spread blanket over two parallel clotheslines to dry-or place in automatic dryer. When it is almost dry, brush lightly to lift nap.

Press binding with iron set at "synthetic" or "rayon." Most electric blankets are made of mothproof fabric-so don't use moth preventives-they might damage the plastic parts.

Store the clean blanket in a box or large plastic bag.

## Accent On Health

Don't let mosquitoes take all the fun out of your summer by turning up as uninvited guests at picnics and backyard cookouts, says the Texas Department of Health.

"It only takes a little standing water and some adult mosquitoes to bring on pain, discomfort, aggravation and sometimes disease from the pesky insects," said Kenneth C. Lauderdale, Director of the General Sanitation Division. "Water in which to pass their early life stages is a necessity for mosquitoes."

"Some mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water where they hatch in a day or two. Other mosquitoes lay their eggs in old tires, tin cans, or other water-holding containers where they remain unhatched for

weeks or months until they are covered with water."

With both types of mosquitoes, the wigglers or larvae grow quickly and turn into tumblers or pupae. Soon the skin of the tumbler splits open and out climbs another hungry mosquito looking for its victim.

In addition to being pests, says Lauderdale, mosquitoes can spread disease. Such diseases as encephalitis, yellow fever, dengue fever and malaria are common diseases spread by mosquitoes.

The largest number of cases of St. Louis Encephalitis (SLE) on record for a single year occurred in 1975 when a total of nearly 1800 cases were reported from 30 states, including Texas.

"While mosquitoes are a threat to health and bodily comfort, there is something that you as an individual can do to ease the situation and lessen the job of local and regional health organizations and mosquito control units," Lauderdale says.

The Ten Commandments of mosquito control are:

1. Empty, remove, cover or turn upside down any receptacle that will hold water—particularly old bottles and tin cans.
2. Change water and scrub vases holding flowers or cuttings twice each week—or grow cuttings in sand.
3. Discard old tires or store them indoors.
4. Screen rain barrels and openings to water tanks or cisterns.
5. Repair leaky plumbing and outside faucets. They may cause

standing water in which mosquitoes can hatch.

6. Connect open wastewater drains to a sewage system, or construct separate sump or leach lines.

7. Clean clogged roof gutters and drain flat roofs.

8. Fill holes in trees with sand or mortar, or drain or spray them, as required.

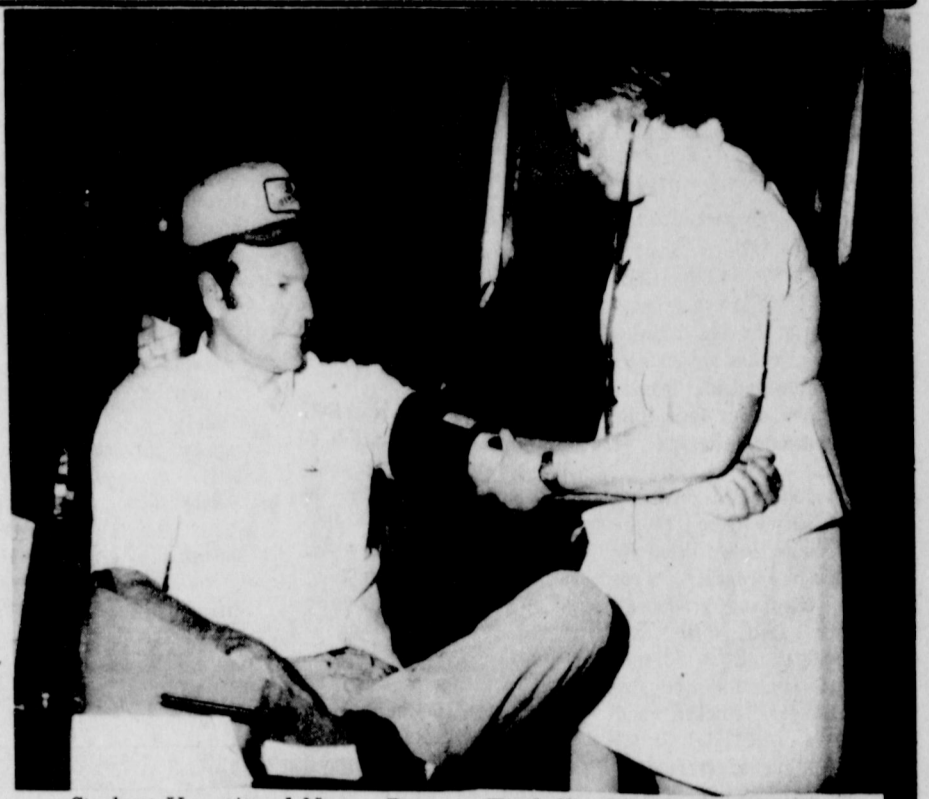
9. Stock ornamental ponds with mosquito-eating fish.

10. Clean and drain evaporative coolers frequently.

"These tips will help you prevent mosquitoes from reproducing," says Lauderdale. "In addition, your local health department may have summer spraying programs to rid infested areas of the insects. You should also keep your window screens in good repair, screen fireplaces and other openings, and kill all mosquitoes inside your home with proper insecticides."

What if you're going into areas where mosquitoes may be prevalent? Lauderdale says there are several repellants on the market which can be used on exposed areas of your skin. Used on clothing, they might also protect you from chiggers and ticks, he said.

Remember, all mosquitoes need water for their early life stages. Adult flying mosquitoes frequently rest in grass, shrubbery or other foliage, but they never develop there. So, if there are any places around your home where water collects, get rid of them. Don't raise the mosquitoes that bite you!

# Texas Food and Fiber

Texas Department of Agriculture  
Reagan V. Brown, Commissioner



RECENT PUBLICITY about the "harmful effects" of meat in the diet is having little impact on the younger generation, judging from a recent poll, notes Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

"According to a Gallup youth survey, seven of the 17 favorite foods listed by American teenagers were meat or meat products," Brown said. "Beefsteak ranked second in overall popularity, followed by hamburger, chicken and turkey."

"Also named as favorite foods were roast beef, pork chops and hot dogs," Brown stated.

Several other prepared dishes utilizing meat products were also included as preferred foods, he added. "The public is becoming skeptical of the constant adverse publicity about meat and other products that have been in our diets for years," Brown said. "Many of these warnings are based on tentative scientific findings, and can have a very damaging impact on the industry or product they attack. One example is the announcement of the alleged link between hamburger cooking methods and cancer."

EMERGENCY HAYING AND GRAZING authorization on set-aside grain sorghum acreage in drought-stricken South Texas was approved recently, following a recommendation to Washington, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown reports.

The request stemmed from a tour of the parched region by Brown and members of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation state executive committee.

"It was an emergency request," Brown stated. "It seemed foolish to destroy set-aside grain fodder when cattle are starving."

Brown noted that details will be available through county ASCS offices.

A GROUP OF RESEARCHERS from throughout the South and Southwest has commended Texas Tech University for its "innovative research approach" in helping solve the problem of imported red fire ants in Texas, Agriculture Commissioner

Reagan V. Brown reports. The research is financed through a grant from the Texas Department of Agriculture, as part of a multi-faceted attack against the costly pest, which now infests large areas of the southern and eastern portions of the state.

"Tech's research team was congratulated for steps taken to mathematically develop a computer picture of the habitation area of the ants in counties in nine southern states," commented Brown. "Along with work being done at Texas A&M University in genetic studies of the ant, which we are optimistic will lead to possible biological control measures, the work at Texas Tech will offer an integrated pest management approach."

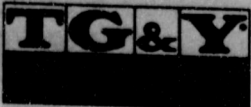

**Price To Introduce Property Tax Legislation**

AMARILLO—Senator Bob Price revealed at a press conference at the Ramada Inn on Saturday, June 17, that he will introduce property tax legislation at the beginning of the next session of the Texas State Senate in January, 1979.

Price said that his tax proposal would be very similar to the recent tax proposal which was passed in California, known as Proposition 13. The exact details of the proposal are being researched and perfected at the present time.

"It is anticipated that I will hold public hearings at various cities in the 31st Senatorial District so that citizens will have the opportunity to testify and make suggestions that could be incorporated into such a tax proposal.

"Texas, unlike California, does not have the 'initiative and referendum' method of allowing its citizens to petition their State government. Therefore, I am approaching this tax cut proposal by a two-prong method. One method is the legislative proposal under which a bill is introduced into the committee which has jurisdiction of taxing in the State, where it is anticipated hearings would be held if the chairman of the committee sees fit to bring the bill up for consideration. At that point, interested citizens would be allowed to testify for or against the proposal as well as make recommendations. If the bill was voted out of the committee, it would be considered by both the House and Senate. Should it pass both bodies, the governor would either veto it or affix his signature to it for the bill to become law.

"There is a question whether the State legislature has the constitutional authority to pass such legislation. The second approach is going to be very similar to the first, except that if the legislative proposal is not constitutional, two-thirds of each body would have to approve the tax proposal before it could be placed on the ballot for consideration by the people of Texas. I plan on pursuing both

approaches.

"It is not my intent to try and gut services provided by tax monies of the people of the State. However, it is my intention to give the people of my district and this State the opportunity to vote on a proposal which, if they desired, would give them a reduction in taxes or at least halt the alarming increase in taxes. Every citizen works one-half day every working day, just to pay their local, state and national taxes which consume presently 45% of their total income. Hopefully, this will be a start in the reduction of duplication, overlapping agencies and wasting government."

"Several other tax proposals," Price said, will be introduced simultaneously with other bills which would limit the amount of increase in any one year that taxes could be raised. Further details on these proposals will have to wait until the bills are fully developed and the public has time to make their input into the legislation.

"There is now a movement by a number of State Legislatures to call for a constitutional convention forcing the federal government to put a limit on its expenditures. This is a long-range approach which could be pursued by citizens of this country, if the people are willing to put forth the effort that will be needed to bring federal spending under control. A democratically controlled congress for the past forty-four years has not seen fit to do anything except tax, tax and spend, spend, spend.

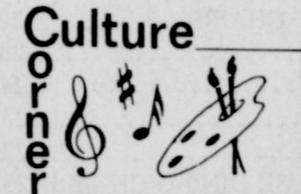
