WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 W -Charles E. Wilson said today that as defense secretary he will sell his General Motors holdings and consult with President Eisenhow er on any matter that "might be the subject of misunderstanding" because of his former connection with the auto firm.

## **Power Lines** Down; Snow, Ice Hit Area

Telephone crews were restoring damaged circuits and the Panhan dle was shoveling out of a blanket of snow Friday after a vicious but shallow norther blasted the northwest corner of the state Thursday night.

Power and telephone lines were put out of commission by ice and snow. A dangerous glaze of ice made driving "extremely hazard-ous" and stranded many motorists

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. offices in Dallas said 329 long dis-tance circuits in the storm area were out of service at one time. A total of 63 men were working in the Panhandle-South Plains area to restore service. Reports said most of the trouble was from most of the trouble storm-caused shorting,

The company listed 14 towns without phone service Friday morning. They were Cotton Center, Olton, Edmondson, Silverton, Claude, Goodnight, Groom, ray, Bovina, Friona, Hale Center, Tulia, Lockney and Hereford.

The snowfall ranged from two around 10 inches at Akin.

A Benson memorandum to em-ployes carried an implication that pay raises may be few and far between. It said most of Benson's new aides "are serving at great financial sacrifice because the have a deep sense of public duty and a desire to be of service to agriculture."

Some employes interpreted this as meaning the new secretary would expect a degree of sacrifice all along the line. The same memorandum spoke of "the unprecedented public debt and continued government expenditures' and of the public's expectation of economy in government.

Just which activities might be trimmed or eliminated was not indicated. He said the streamlining would unfold gradually. However, much that the department does is required by law.







## Army Is Paying Reich Employes For Top Ideas

By TOM STONE HEIDELBERG, Germany W. -The U. S. Army is paying Germans old cash for hot ideas. Some of the ideas are corkers, saving Uncle Sam large sums in

noney and manpower. The Army is shelling out cash prizes in a campaign to get more use out of its funds, materials, facilities and personnel. All con-

cerned are profiting by it.

American and German employes of the Army, as well as GIs, are eligible to turn in suggestions and ideas. But the Germans are the siggest contributors.

Civilians are awarded cash prizes. Soldiers earn commenda-

a three-month period last year, German employes submitted suggestions, of which 691 were adopted. For these, the Army paid out 34,431 marks, or the equivalent of \$8,200.

The Army estimates that firstyear savings resulting from these suggestions will amount to \$67.894 and 2,113,736 in marks (\$503,270). That means that for \$8,200 worth German marks the Army gets the equivalent of \$571,164 worth

One German prize-winning suggestion was a better way to fasten wooden screws in brick walls. Someone clicked with the obvious idea of building a vehicle washing rack at a military post here instead of using one more than a mile away-netting a yearly saving of \$2,700 in manpower and

transportation costs. Sleeve patches once discarded by soldiers leaving the command are now cleaned and re-issued because master sergeant thought of it. Another winner was the substitution of paper tape for costlier adhesive tape in packaging. It saves the Army \$155,760 a year.
