Grasshoppers Invade County

There has been a greater built up than usual of grasshoppers in Hansford County, according to Garland Stewart, Hansford County Extension Agent, in both range land and crop land.

A representative of the U.S.D.A. was scheduled to be in the county Wednesday surveying to see about the possibility of a cost share program to eliminate the grasshoppers. This program would be available primarily for rangeland.

According to Stewart, it may be necessary to have a meeting later. Notices will be sent out if such a meeting is scheduled.

Stewart said there are several chemicals that can be used to combat the grasshopper population. They are Malathion, Sevin, Toxaphene, and Diazinon. Of these four, Malathion should be used primarily around home gardens. The other chemicals may be used in other problem areas. Toxaphene will probably have more residual effect than the other three, Stewart said.

If there are producers who need more information, contact Garland Stewart, County Extension Agent.

CPS Accepted By National Energy Watch Program

Community Public Service Company recently applied for membership and was accepted into the National Energy Watch (N.E.W.) program. This is a national program designed to help the American homeowner realize the conservation potential of his home by the following three ways:

--By improving the soundness of the structure pertaining to heat use.

--By installing more efficient energy-consuming equipment and appliances.

--By adopting better use habits.

N.E.W. is the country's first nationally organized energy conservation program. It was developed by the Edison Electric Institute for use by local electric utilities and their customers throughout the country.

Community Public Service Company's basis for application in the program was their Energy Checked Efficiency Home program. This ongoing program will be revised slightly to comply with N.E.W. standards. Homeowners whose homes meet the N.E.W. suggested guidelines will be awarded a certificate of membership in the National Energy Watch. Decals will also be awarded designating the home Energy Checked Efficient and a member of the National Energy Watch. This certification should add value to the home when it is sold.

Robert Elliott, district manager for Community Public Service Company, said the company had become a part of the National Energy Watch to help reduce the national drain on scarce fossil fuels, to help minimize the need for costly new

electric generating equipment, and to help the individual homeowner keep his monthly energy bills as low as possible.

Robert added, "We must do two things: we must develop new energy conversion technologies as rapidly as possible, and we must conserve the energy resources we have. Conservation is not a solution to the energy problem, but it is the best lifeline available between the problem of today and the promise of tomorrow."

Robert said homeowners who wish to learn more about the N.E.W. homeowner program should contact the local office of Community Public Service Company.

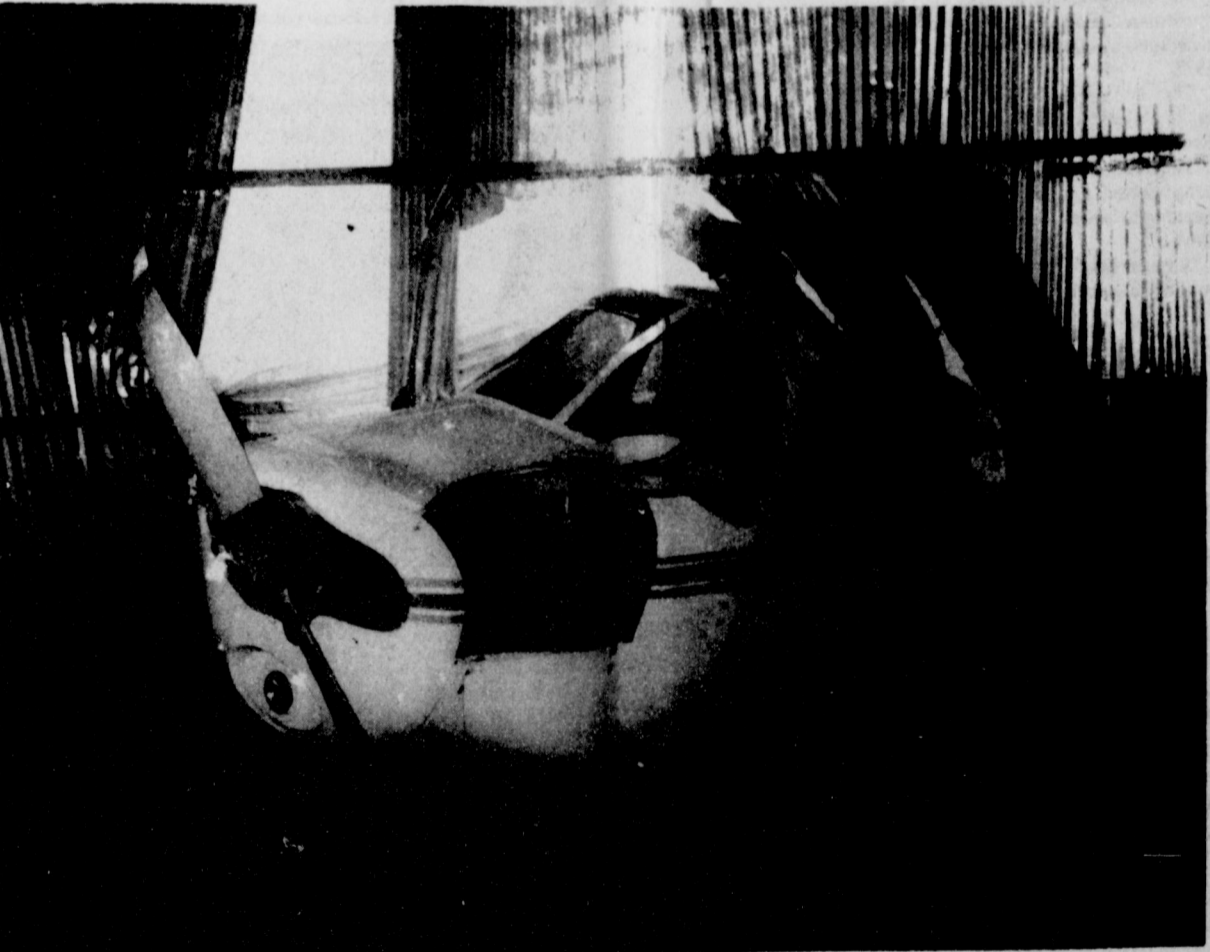
Most Merchants to Close July 4

It's that time of the year! Accidents, accidents, and even more accidents. We have had a large tanker truck turn-over, South of Spearman, and the cab was completely demolished, but the driver escaped with bruises, and body aches and pains. An airplane flew thru the back of a hangar at the local airport, and one motorcycle driver hit a black angus cow Saturday night, killed the cow immediately, and he and the bike flew 300 feet through the air. None of those involved in the accidents were killed, but more important, the airplane pilot was not

injured, and the other two men who were injured were brought to Hansford Hospital and received the very FINEST CARE AND are on the road to recovery.

Brad Lemons was coming in town Saturday night, when he hit the black cow. He was driving a rather small motorcycle, but he said the black angus was "on top of him" before he had a chance. Brad said he saw the cows back as he hit her, and that she did not make any sound, and was dead upon impact. He said that the officers measured some 300 feet from impact until he stopped rolling. Brad said that he didn't

know that he was hurt, and that he got up and went back to the motorcycle, turned the lights off and took the key out of the motorcycle. Three men from Baker and Taylor saw the wreck and thought that he had just fallen off of the bike. They picked him up and took him to the Hansford Hospital, and I must admit that he has to be the "luckiest man alive today!" Evil Kalevel never did hit a cow, so we will have to give Brad the Evil Kalevel award of the month.

While we are on motorcycles, I was in an emergency receiving center in a large city over the week-end and several of those

who were in the center were victims of motorcycle accidents, all of them did not have a crash helmet on! They were mad as a hornet at the state for letting adults ride a motorcycle without a helmet. And, most of the other people who had broken legs, etc, were people who managed to survive a car wreck without seat belts. None of them would have been injured badly if they had been wearing seat belts, and crash helmets on their motorcycles.

An Amarillo truck driver sustained minor head lacerations and contusions to the rest of his body when his gasoline truck overturned in a field about 15 miles south of Spearman Monday afternoon.

David Blanton, 2520 N. Bolton, Amarillo, was traveling west on Highway 281 near the intersection of Highway 207 and 281 when his brakes apparently failed, said Mike Stark of the Texas Highway Patrol.

The truck was carrying an undetermined amount of gasoline, much of which was spilled said Spearman Police Chief Steve Wisniewski.

Another tanker truck was sent to the scene and most of the gasoline carried in Blanton's truck was salvaged, said Wisniewski. A wrecker took the wreckage away about 7:30 p.m. Monday, said the official.

A representative of the Hansford County Hospital reported that Blanton was "doing all right," Tuesday afternoon.

A Nashville pilot sustained no injuries as his plane crashed into a local building at the airport Monday, said Spearman Police Chief Steve Wisniewski.

Brice Palmer, 37, of Nashville, was flying a Piper aircraft rented from a firm in Waco when wind conditions at the time he attempted to land caused him to crash into a building belonging to Jim McLain and leased to Baker & Taylor, said Wisniewski.

Both the building and airplane sustained heavy damage, said Wisniewski.

A 26-year-old Spearman man is listed in satisfactory condition after hitting a cow with a motorcycle Sunday morning, said Hansford County Sheriff R. L. McFarlin.

Brad Lemons had stitches in his head, and suffered minor scratches, said the sheriff.

The cow was killed and extensive damage was done to the motorcycle, he said.

A Pueblo, Colorado man was arrested Sunday by local authorities on the charge of simple assault, said McFarlin.

Craig Carter, 31, was arrested by the Hansford County Sheriff's office and members of the Gruver police department. Bond was set at \$200, said McFarlin. He was still in custody Tuesday afternoon.

A 26-year-old Gruver man is still in custody after being indicted for burglary Monday, said McFarlin. Jesus Aguilar had his bond forfeited.
