



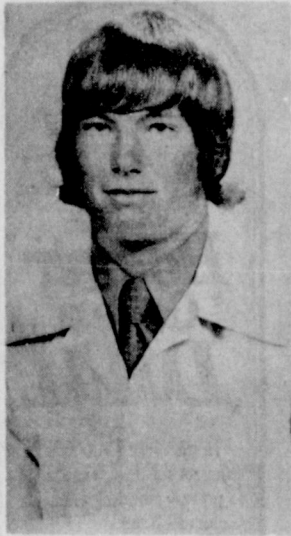

Regie Robertson Killed in Car Wreck

Funeral services for Arnold Reginald "Regie" Robertson, Jr., 20, were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday in the First United Methodist Church here with the Rev. Frank Oglesby, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Russell Pogue, pastor of the First Christian Church. Burial was in Hansford Cemetery under the direction of Boxwell Brothers Funeral Directors here.

Robertson was announced dead on arrival at a Hale Center Hospital about 7:30 p.m. Friday after being injured in a one-car accident south of Hale Center. Department of Public Safety troopers said the driver, Brent Ky Sherrod of Amarillo, was driving the car northbound on U. S. 87 a mile south of Hale Center about 6:50 p.m. when the left rear tire blew out. The car left the roadway and overturned three times, throwing

the men from the vehicle. Sherrod was released from High Plains Hospital in Hale Center Saturday after treatment of injuries.

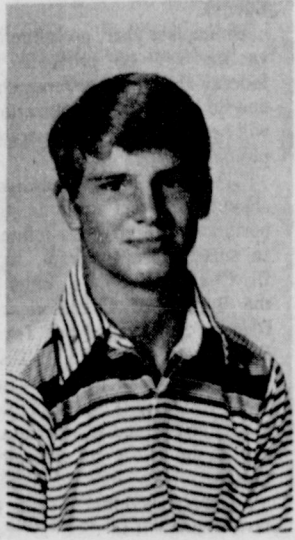
Robertson was a lifetime resident of Spearman and a member of the First United Methodist Church. A 1976 graduate of Spearman High School, he was a Tri-State bull riding champion and a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Reg Robertson; his sisters, Tammy and Melissa of the home; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jess Melton of Spearman and grandmother Mrs. Irene Smith of Moriarity, N.M.; great-grandmothers, Mrs. L. J. Robertson of Memphis and Mrs. W. H. Henry of Monitor, Wash.

Parcel Post Preparation Guidelines

Postmaster T. Ray Robertson today issued a reminder to postal customers in Spearman that if the Postal Service's new packaging guidelines are followed they can virtually eliminate damage to their parcels.

Postmaster Robertson said that checks at bulk mail plants show that more than 80 percent of all articles damaged in the mails were improperly packaged.

While the regulations and guidelines adopted recently by the Postal Service are detailed, they boil down to several basic steps that can help assure safe delivery.

First, select a strong carton. Use a fiberboard box with the "burst test" number printed on it.

If the box says, for instance, 125 lbs. it can be used for mailing many types of merchandise weighing up to 20 lbs.

When a person is shipping dense or heavy materials, such as books, stronger boxes are required. For 10 lbs. of books the Postal Service recommends a box with a 175-lb. burst test.

The Postal Service suggest that wrapping paper not be used on cartons. If a wrapper is torn or lost in transit, the mailing address can disappear.

Further, the paper adds nothing to the package's strength.

The use of masking and cellophane tapes for closing or sealing is prohibited. In transit they tend to peel off, and they have little strength. String is not recommended. If twine loosens, it can readily catch on processing machinery.

Instead, parcel post customers are urged to use the pressure-sensitive, reinforced tapes. They are almost unbreakable.

When marking a package "DO NOT BEND," it is required that the container have stiffeners which will protect it from being bent.

In using a second-hand box, it is important to mark out addresses that may have been printed on it along with extraneous numbers that could be confused with the ZIP codes.

A final suggestion: Enclose a return address card in the package so that it can be returned if the mailing label is damaged or lost.

Postmaster Robertson said customers should contact the Spearman Post Office for more information concerning parcel preparation.

Annual Conferences Set

DALLAS, TX -- Ethnic minority local churches, evangelism and world hunger are expected to be major concerns at the seven United Methodist Annual Conferences meeting in Texas and New Mexico, May 23 - June 11.

Representing 800,000 members in 2,500 local churches throughout the two-state region, the conference members will be asked to continue their 1977-80 emphasis on these three "missional priorities."

Agendas vary from conference to conference, but expected to rank high on them will be action on SMU's \$153 capital funds campaign, updating constitutions and by-laws for three state-wide agencies, and the 1979 program budget for each conference.

The presiding bishops, places and dates of the conferences are: Bishop Alsie H. Carleton, Albuquerque, is president of the New Mexico Conference meeting at Gloriaeta Baptist Assembly, Gloriaeta, NM, May 23-26 and the Northwest Texas Conference scheduled for First United Methodist Church, Midland, May 30-June 1.

Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe, Dallas, heads the North Texas Conference scheduled for Southern Methodist University, Dallas, May 28-31 and the Central Texas Conference to be held at the Sheraton Hotel and First United Methodist Church,

Ft. Worth, June 4-7.

Bishop Finis A. Crutchfield, Houston, presides at the Texas Annual Conference meeting at First United Methodist Church, Houston, May 29-June 1.

Bishop J. Lovern, San Antonio, chairs the Southwest Texas Conference, scheduled for Travis Park United Methodist Church, San Antonio, May 29-June 1 and the Spanish speaking Rio Grande Conference to be held at the Civic Center, El Paso, June 9-11.

The bishops will announce the new pastoral appointments during the seven annual conference sessions.

The Texas Department of Health will conduct and coordinate a program of influenza surveillance during the upcoming respiratory disease season in an effort to identify and halt potential local outbreaks of influenza.

Unlike last year, no influenza vaccine will be provided by federal and state governments and no influenza immunizations will be offered in state-operated public health clinics.

"This policy, however, shouldn't detract from the importance of an effective influenza surveillance program," says Dr. Charles Webb, Jr., chief of the Bureau of Communicable Disease Services of the Texas Department of Health. "Only through such a program can influenza viruses be isolated, characterized and a determination to be made of emerging strains."

Dr. Webb said that in order to have enough lead time to produce the right vaccines for the next year, vaccines are produced from strains of the current year.

The three types of influenza virus that have been identified are called types A, B, and C. It has been shown that influenza A and B viruses change their

ted to one region.

Outbreaks of flu usually occur abruptly. The disease spreads through communities, peaking in about three weeks and subsiding after another three to four weeks. Twenty to 50 percent of susceptible members of the population may be affected, with the highest incidence in children ages five to 14.

The most frequent complication of flu is a secondary bacterial infection in the lower respiratory tract. Usually these bacterial infections can be successfully treated with antibiotics.

Called **HANDICAPPED HOTLINE**, the new service is part of the 1978-1979 Governor's Conference on Handicapped Individuals.

From now through summer it will be in service 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Plans are underway to expand its availability in the early fall.

The GCHI as established by Governor Dolph Briscoe is part of an Executive Order to examine and identify problems facing individuals with physical and mental handicaps.

Through the **HOTLINE**, planning and orientation sessions throughout the State, 6 forums in five regions all during September, and a State Conference in October, it will be possible to assess the problems and formulate solutions.

Another important activity of the Conference will be to interpret much of the new federal and state legislation concerning employment of the handicapped and transportation accessibility.

It is further planned that during the October conference some out of state individuals will participate in exhibit and entertainment presentations.

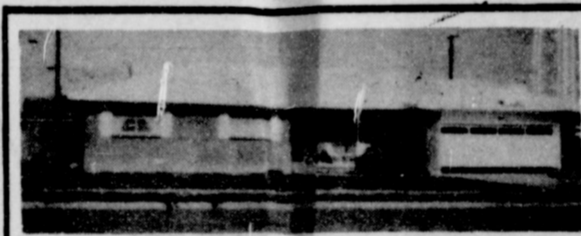

Insurance rates have risen for a variety of reasons. Plain old economic inflation is one. The cost of just about everything has risen: repair bills, medical care, hospital costs. Health Agency Offers New Service

Clients using home health care services often need skilled nursing service by an LVN or an RN, but they are ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing needs do not meet the Medicare guidelines for "skilled care."

Seeing this special need, the MBFA Foundation, which has delivered home health care in Texas since 1969, now announces a new service to these special clients.

Now those persons who require less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines, or those who require the skills of a licensed professional (vocational) or registered nurse, but cannot afford to pay the regular charge and have no insurance covering these services, are eligible through the

Texas Homemaker Service, a division of MBFA Foundation.

An example of this type of service would be the home-bound client who needs a B12 or other type of vitamin injections, as has been ordered by an attending physician, and has no Medicare, Medicaid, veterans or private insurance of any kind and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient can have the visits of an LVN or RN in the home at a beneficial rate based on one's individual financial status.

This service also will benefit the patient who has been on the home health service under Medicare, or some other type of insurance coverage, and has depleted this coverage, but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client can pay

a beneficial rate and remain on the service under this new system through MBFA's Texas Homemaker Service.

The service should not be confused with regular homemaker services. This is still skilled nursing care given by an LVN or RN, but just does not meet the Medicare guidelines. The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient.

You may discuss this with your physician or you may call the Panhandle Home Health Agency for more information. The phone number to call is 935-6861 in Dumas.

Mrs. Luetze, Director of Health Services indicates that this new service will provide another alternative to their

clients toward better and more complete medical care available in the clients' homes. She adds, "MBFA Foundation's motto is 'Vision With A Task,' and this task is continually being accomplished and the vision is becoming a reality to those the Foundation is privileged to serve."

IRS News

Everyone, regardless of age or place of birth, must now submit evidence of age, identity, and U. S. citizenship or lawful admission status when applying for a social security number, Howard Weatherly, social security manager in Pampa, said today.

These procedures are intended to help protect the applicant's social security record, assure that it is complete and accurate, and to prevent anyone else from misusing or abusing the person's social security number, Weatherly said.

In addition, a person 18 or over who is applying for a number for the first time, must apply in person.

The best evidence of a person's age and U. S. citizenship is a birth certificate he stated. This should be submitted if possible. But, if it is not available, other documentary evidence can be used.

Evidence of identity should include documentation which shows the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or other identifying information.

Applicants not born in the U. S. should submit evidence of their U. S. citizenship or their immigration documents showing they are lawfully admitted to the U. S.

All documents submitted as evidence are subject to verification with the agency which issued them.

A person should allow plenty of time to get the number. It takes 5 to 6 weeks to issue the number and deliver the card after all required evidence has been submitted.

A free leaflet, "Applying for a social security number," can be obtained at the Pampa social security office. It tells what kinds of evidence can be used. The office is located at 1541 North Hobart Street and phone number is 669-3381.

Wheat Board To Host Brazilian Trade Mission

Brazil, one of the five highest economic growth areas in the world, annually buys up to 50 million bushels of U. S. wheat—a five times increase since 1972, according to C. L. Edwards, Chairman of the Texas Wheat Producers Board. Edwards pointed out that "Brazil purchases imported wheat not only to satisfy domestic food deficiencies, but also in support of its foreign policy. Consequently, price considerations may be swept aside for political objectives—balance of trade between nations that trade with Her. This has resulted in wide fluctuations and periodic losses of U. S. wheat exports to other Brazilian wheat market, Great Plains Wheat, Inc., the U. S. wheat producers market development arm in Latin America has invited a team of wheat flour millers, government grain purchasing officials and bank officers to study the U. S. wheat production and marketing system, May 5 through May 27. The Texas Wheat Producers Board, a GPW member, has charge of the groups schedule May 14-17, according to Bill Nelson, the organization's Executive Vice President. Members of the visiting Brazilian Wheat Trade Mission are: Carlos Alberto PIRES, Dir., Molino da Luz (a flour miller, Rio de Janeiro) Afranio Roberto FERRERA, Dir., Molino Pilar (A flour miller, Recife) Renata MAURICIO, Dir., Wheat Dept., SUNAB (the government purchasing agency) Humberto GARROFALO, Dept. of Wheat Finance, Banco de Brazil, Leon

Yallouz, Economist-Interpreter, U. S. Embassy, Brasilia, Mitchell Skalicky, Great Plains Wheat, Washington, D.C.

The Texas itinerary for the international agri-business group will include farm production and test plots in the Wichita Falls-Burkburnett area, country elevator receiving and quality maintenance at Iowa Park and storage, handling and shipping facilities at Vernon. At each scheduled stop ample opportunity will be provided for wheat producers and local grain trade individuals to meet and discuss wheat interests with the visitors, according to Nelson. Also a program has been organized in Houston to study the Port facilities, Federal Grain Inspection Service, and export marketing facilities in cooperation with the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Other stops for the visiting wheat officials to study the U.S. production and marketing system include: Kansas, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Minnesota, North Dakota, Washington, D.C. and New York City.

Great Plains Wheat, Inc., which conducts overseas market development programs in Latin America, Europe, the Mid-East and Africa is supported by wheat boards and commissions throughout the wheat belt. The Texas Wheat Producers Board supports this work for Texas through a 1/2 cent-per-bushel self-assessment on producer deliveries to country elevators.

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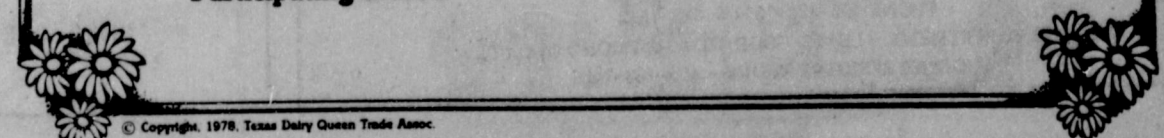
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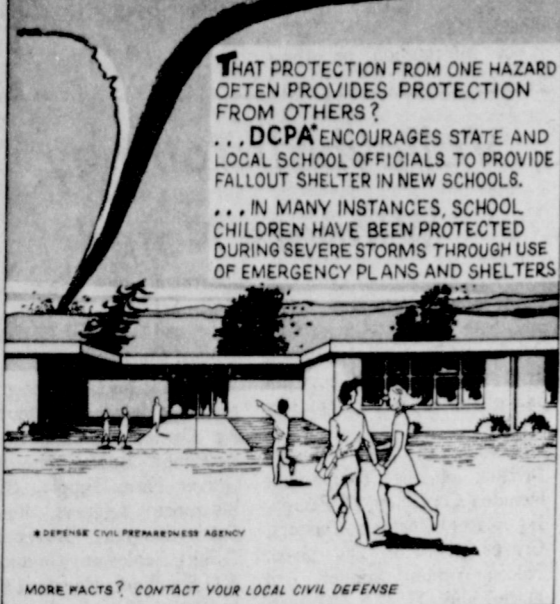
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Weed Research Findings Presented

Allowing weeds to grow two weeks after they emerge on fallow dryland fields may seem like trashy dryland farming to some people. "It may be a little trashy, but not necessarily bad farming in the Southern Great Plains," says Dwane Lavake and Dr. Allen Wiese, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers.

Lavake presented these findings at the Weed Science Society of America meeting in

Dallas on February 10. Weeds that grow four inches tall on fallow ground use only water that would evaporate from bare soil. After sweep plowing, mulch from dead weeds tends to reduce erosion and slow evaporation.

To arrive at these conclusions, Lavake and Wiese experimented for six years with a wheat-sorghum-fallow cropping sequence. The researchers had enough plots at the USDA Research Center at Bushland, Texas, so that all phases of the three year cropping sequence occurred each year. Five tillage intervals with 30-inch sweep plows were tested during 11 month fallow periods between the two crops. Sweeps were operated about four inches deep. Sweep plowing every two weeks during the growing season was the shortest tillage interval. This was compared to sweep plowing at either four, 10, 17, and 24 days after weeds emerged. Plowing about four days after weed emergence or one week after a good rain is the normal tillage interval for most farmers. In this dry area soil in the plowed layer dries out preventing weed emergence until the next rain.

After experiments were underway the scientists checked effect of tillage interval on nitrate nitrogen and moisture in

the top four feet of soil. In addition, yield of wheat and sorghum were determined.

Following sweep tillage every two weeks there were 180 pounds per acre of nitrate nitrogen in the top four feet of soil at wheat and sorghum planting. There was a gradual drop in nitrates as tillage interval increased. Nitrates dropped to 100 pounds per acre when tillage was delayed until four days after weed emergence. There were only 50 pounds per acre when tillage came 24 days after weed emergence. The researchers figured that all treatments had adequate nitrogen for dryland yields. High nitrate levels in soil come about with organic matter breakdown. "Tilling too much destroys organic matter unnecessarily," Lavake said.

Tilling every two weeks, or four and 10 days after weed emergence did not affect soil moisture from the soil that would have evaporated. Weeds grew faster in the summer and reduced soil moisture quicker. With cool temperatures in April and May, pigweed grew to about four inches in 24 days. Pigweed emerging in warmer July and August weather were 12 inches tall in 24 days.

Wheat averaged nine bushels per acre with tillage intervals up to 17 days after weed emergence. This was four bushels per acre less than the long time average for Bushland. Allowing sorghum yields exceeded 2100 pounds per acre unless tillage was delayed to 17 days after weed emergence. Moisture conditions were favorable for sorghum and this yield was

600 pounds per acre above average. Average yield dropped to 1800 pounds per acre when plowing was put off until 24 days after weed emergence. Tillage interval did not reduce yields three years out of six. At the end of the study the number of weed seedlings that emerged after a good rain was not affected by tillage interval. The researchers anticipated this because weeds that were 24 days old did not have time to produce seed.

"Our chief objective was finding out if tillage cost could be cut by letting weeds grow longer than normal," Lavake said. During the growing season in the 11 month fallow prior to planting wheat, 10 operations were used to till every two weeks. It took five and four operations to plow weeds at four and 10 days after weed emergence. Allowing weeds to grow 17 days also took four operations, but only three tillages were required when weeds were plowed 24 days after emergence.

Two week tillage took aa operations prior to planting sorghum. Plowing four days after weed emergence like most farmers took six operations. When weeds were allowed to grow 10 days, five operations were needed. Four plowings were used to kill weeds 17 or 24 days after emergence.

Lavake concluded this presentation by stating that weeds two weeks old or less than four inches tall use soil moisture that would evaporate from fallow ground.

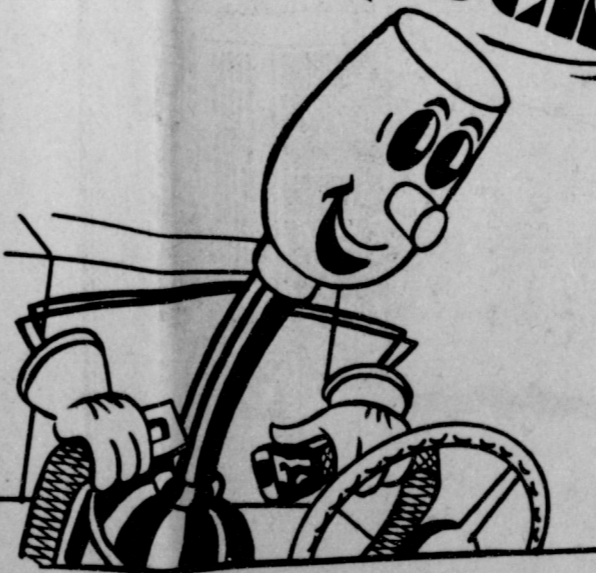
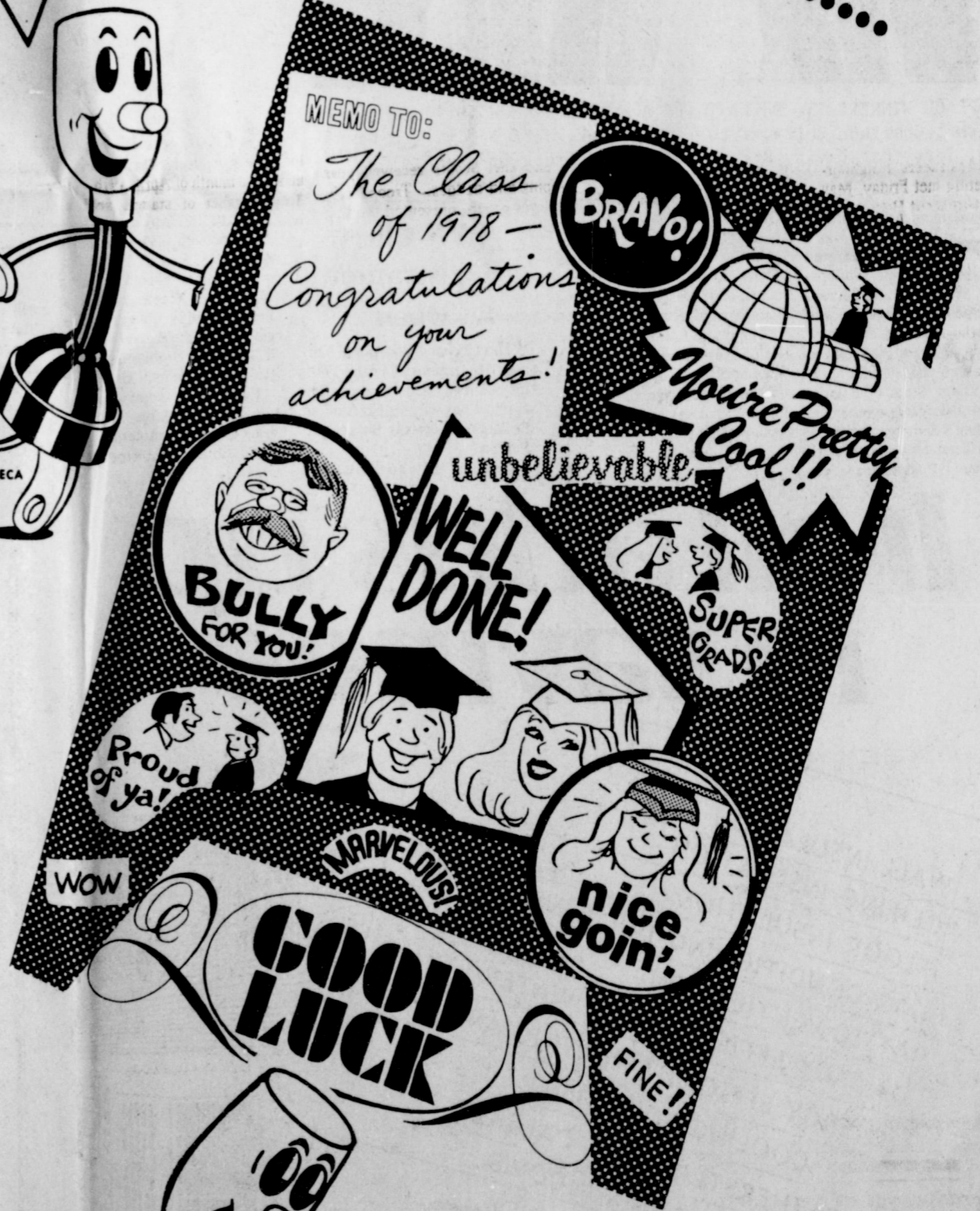

You get true taste of cattle country on visit to Palo Duro canyon region

CANYON, Tex.—This is real West Texas country, prairie, where you get a true taste of the cattle ranges and the pioneer life of the Lone Star State.

A quiet, friendly town of 10,000 residents, Canyon is the justly proud home of the interesting Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, located on the campus of West Texas State University.

Nearby is the beautiful Pioneer Amphitheater in the Palo Duro Canyon State Park, where each night during the summer is presented the magnificent musical drama, "Texas."

I have visited the museum, the university and the musical production and recommend all three to visitors, just as I recommend Palo Duro Canyon itself.

The museum shows geological specimens and fossils from the earliest geologic times to the present. You can trace the lives of the earliest Indians down through the nomadic tribes which were here when the white men came. The displays of weapons, utensils, clothing and crafts of the Comanches and Kiowas are known nationally for their quality.

Ranch, cowboy life

The museum also has a marvelous display of ranch and cowboy life and even a Pioneer Village. It is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and from 1 to 6 p.m. on Sundays. During June, July and August the open hours are extended to 6 p.m. Admission is free.

The exciting story of the Panhandle is told in the amphitheater each evening

during the summer. Events in the lives of the pioneers come to life in a thoroughly professional production by a cast of 80, with fine music and excellent dancing. The theater, with a 600-foot canyon wall as a backdrop behind the stage, was built as a memorial to the pioneers. It has free parking.

"Texas" is presented nightly except Sundays. The 1977 dates are June 15 through August 20. Curtain time is 8:30 p.m. You can buy tickets by mail from "Texas", Box 268, Canyon, 79015. Best seats are \$5 for adults and for children. Other seats are \$3 for adults and \$1.50 for children.

Palo Duro is the Grand Canyon of Texas. As Texas Highways Magazine reports, "Interred within the palisades of Palo Duro's colored cliffs are chapters of a story 230 million years old." It is an oasis of shade and water at the edge of the plains. It was a refuge and hunting grounds for the In-

dians and now is a hiking, camping, and vacation delight for children and adults.

The canyon is an abyss 1,000 feet deep and more than 100 miles long. On its floor is the "Sad Money Railroad", which makes a two-mile run lasting 25 minutes. The engineer-lecturer tells the canyon story and points out the palo duro is the Spanish name for the cedar brush that grows in the canyon. It translates to hard wood. The cedar was used by the Indians for their bows and arrows.

For information write the Board of City Development, Box 8, Canyon, 79015, the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce or the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

Canyon is 16 miles from Amarillo, which is centrally located in the Texas panhandle at the intersection of Highway 66, the east-west route, and the main highway running south from Denver to the Gulf.

State Cigarette Tax Revenue Up

Warren G. Harding, State Treasurer, announces another increase in cigarette tax revenue for the month of April, 1978. Total number of stamps sold were 127,927,080 with income of \$22,608,174.23. This is an increase of \$740,394.52 over April, 1977.

Total cigarette tax revenue collected for the first eight months of this fiscal year were \$186,044,665.00. This represents an increase of \$7,008,868.00 compared with the previous year.

Liquor stamp tax collections for the first eight months of the fiscal year were \$1,251,166.65, collections for wine were \$6,020.00 and beer stamp tax collections totaled \$10,638.58 for this fiscal year.

Harvest Will Find Grain Bins Bulging

AUSTIN--Carryover stocks of all grains except barley are up over last year as the 1978 harvest season approaches, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has said.

"Carryover stocks of both feed grains and wheat are still high, but it is possible several factors will work to reduce current heavy supplies this year," Brown said. "Participation in government loan and reserve programs, increases in livestock and poultry feeding, higher export activities and expected acreage cutbacks in some crops should make the price outlook this year a little less dismal."

As of April 1, stocks of corn, oats, grain sorghum and barley, the four major feed grains, stand 6 per cent higher than last year, Brown said. However, barley stocks have dropped 24 per cent since last year, and this has pulled down the average for the other feed grains, he stated.

Brown noted that wheat stocks stored in all positions on April 1 were estimated at 100.1 million bushels, up 30 per cent from 1977. Just over 38 million bushels moved out of storage during the first quarter of this year. Expanded stocks of wheat are due in large part to this year's federal reserve programs, which encourage holding large supplies of the grain off the market.

CRANKING THE CAR

Next time you start your car be thankful it's a key you're turning instead of a crank. There was a time when cars didn't even have starters, that is except for a wicked looking bent steel rod called a crank. The crank was to turn the engine over to start it, the same thing a starter does today.

There was a little hole in the front end of the car that you could stick the crank through. On the front of the car's engine was a bracket that the crank hooked into. The bracket had teeth that meshed with two prongs on the crank. The idea was to stick the crank in, turn it smartly clockwise a couple of times, the engine would cough, spit, then start and you could be on your way. As I said that was the idea but it didn't always work that way. There were several methods of "cranking". Some people placed the handle near the bottom and pulled up sharply, one pull at a time. Others would turn it vigorously around and around several times without stopping. Different methods worked for different people and different vehicles.

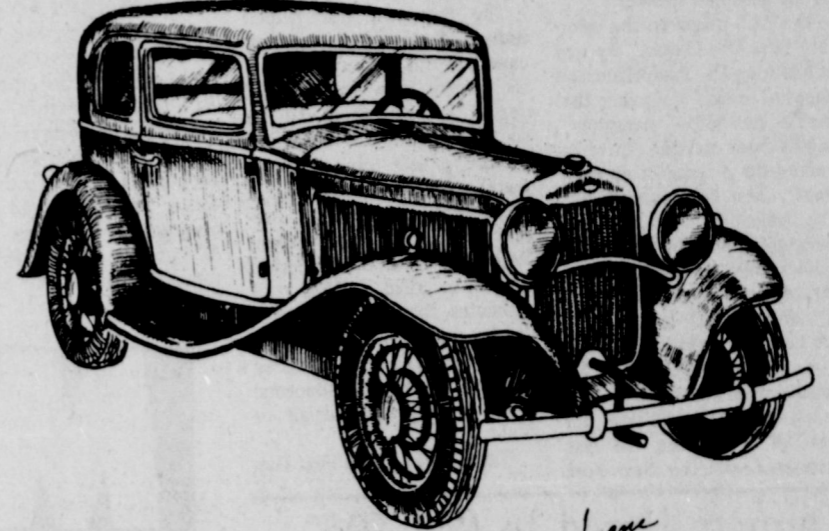
The crank was always an

instrument of confusion for most women. They usually didn't know which end of the crank to hold or which end to put into the car, or what exactly to do with it once it was in the car. They had a way of looking bewildered and helpless, waiting for some man to come along and do the honors. My cousin says we were better off back then—fewer women drivers you see.

Cars had a personality and definite temperament in those days. Cars would start for certain people but not for others. We had an old

your hand but on extremely cold days the crank might freeze to your fingers. On such days it was usually futile to try to crank the car anyway. Often the engine would backfire and if it did the crank could break your arm or at least bruise your biceps. To top it off the car could sometimes slip into gear all by itself and lots of people got run over by their own cars just after cranking them.

After auto makers started putting electric starters on cars most people were skeptical enough that they wanted to keep the crank, just to be sure, so the crank hole was left in most models for some years after starters became standard equipment. I miss some things from those days but the crank is not one of them.



Acreage Drop Will Decrease 1978 Texas Wheat Production

AUSTIN--Texas wheat production in 1978 is expected to drop 37 per cent below that of last year, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service's first spring report forecasts 73.5 million bushels for the summer harvest, based on surveys from sample field plots in growing areas.

"This is quite a contrast to the 117-million bushel average harvested between 1975-77, when our farmers were encouraged to plant fence-row to fence-row without adequate markets for their crops," Brown said. "We had 600,000 fewer acres planted for this year's crop," he commented. "The season began with 5.7 million acres seeded. We have no way to determine from the survey the exact reasons for the cutback, but the combination of low prices, 138-million bushels in carryover stocks and organized efforts to cut back production, plus drought conditions on the Plains were factors."

Low moisture during the growing season on dryland

wheat in the Plains has wiped out some production, Brown said. However, irrigated fields are in good to excellent condition now.

Brown said the reduced production should be no reason for consumers to feel the effect in higher bread prices. "While the price of one pound of bread cost 35 cents in January and the

wheat it was made from cost three cents, the grain's price actually dropped to 2.9 cents per loaf the following month," he said "and yet consumers paid more, 36.1 cents for the same loaf of bread."

New Commemorative Stamp Issued

The United States Postal Service will issue a special 13-cent commemorative postage stamp May 18th honoring the late Dr. George N. Papanicolaou, creator of the Pap test, a means of detecting cervical cancer, the most common form of uterine cancer. The souvenir "First Day Cover", a desirable bit of memorabilia for stamp collectors, will be available through the Hansford Unit of the American Cancer Society Unit.

The new stamp will be dedicated at The White House in a "First Day of Issue" ceremony. First Lady Rosalynn Carter will be the principle speaker.

The ACS prepared the colorful "First Day Covers" by way of honoring Dr. Papanicolaou and hopes to remind the public that the Pap test helps "stamp out" deaths from cervical cancer by finding the disease in an early stage when cure is possible. The Hansford Unit has free literature explaining this quick, painless test that should be a part of every woman's life from her 20th birthday (or earlier if she has begun sexual activity).

A native of Greece, Dr. Papanicolaou came to the U.S. before the First World War. For most of his career, he was associated with the New York

Hospital and Cornell Medical College. He first hit upon the idea of studying cast-off cells under the microscope as a means of identifying possible cancer in the 1920's but it was not until the 1940's that the use of the Pap test as a routine screening device for unsuspected disease became widely known and accepted. His work was supported by the Commonwealth Fund and the American Cancer Society which provided some \$800,000 in support. In addition, the society informed the public about the test and helped to educate the medical world about it.

The Pap test has helped reduce deaths from cervical cancer in this country by some 65 percent over the last 40 years. In 1978, there will be some 48,000 new cases of uterine cancer plus approximately 40,000 new cases of in-situ cervical cancer, a precancerous condition. About 7,400 women will die of cervical cancer in 1978. The ACS estimates that cervical cancer deaths could be eliminated if every woman had a regular Pap test and reported any abnormal bleeding to her physician or clinic.

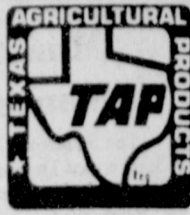
The ACS Pap stamp First Day

Cover is illustrated in full color. It is printed on silk and bordered in 14-carat gold foil. A "First Day Cover" is an envelope bearing a new postage stamp with the date and place of issue. In addition the Post Office applies a cancellation slogan reading, "First Day of Issue". This is done for exactly one day. Since as many as 165 million copies of the Pap stamp may go into circulation, the ACS "First Day Cover" represents a unique and coveted limited edition.

The official ACS souvenir Papanicolaou "First Day Cover" will be available through the Hansford ACS Unit at Judge Johnnie Lee's, president; Hansford ACS* County Courthouse, Spearman for a donation to the ACS (and a stamped, self-addressed, #10 business-size envelope) which will be used to support the Society's research, cancer education, and service programs. Donations to the ACS are tax deductible. Retail value of the souvenir cover is \$1.50.

Texas Food and Fiber

Texas Department of Agriculture
Reagan V. Brown, Commissioner



TEXAS CONSUMERS may be buying short-weight packaged food in supermarkets without knowing it, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has stated.

"Texas statutes require all packaged food to contain the exact amount stated on the label, within certain tolerances," Brown said. "However, a ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court last summer now prevents the Texas Department of Agriculture from enforcing these laws."

"Basically, it was ruled that federal standards take precedence over state laws. These federal regulations allow foods packaged under

U.S. government supervision to vary in net weight because of moisture loss during shipping," he said.

Brown noted that some foods, such as bacon or ham, could lose up to three ounces in juices and other fluids during transportation. This may not seem like a great deal to the individual, but when multiplied by millions of packages statewide, the costs to the consuming public are substantial.

THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE will step up its testing of imported fruits and vegetables for pesticide residues thanks to a recent grant from the

Environmental Protection Agency, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

"The \$403,500 grant was awarded mainly to enlarge the size and capacity of the TDA pesticide testing laboratory in Brenham," Brown said. "In addition to the usual regulatory work, we have increased the number of samples of imported fruits and vegetables that we are checking."

The Food and Drug Administration has total responsibility for sampling Mexican produce for pesticide residues, Brown pointed out. However, because of recent citizen concern, the Department is supplementing the efforts of the FDA at the border.

AUSTIN--Persons who have passed their restricted-use pesticide tests have been asked to contact the Texas Department of Agriculture, Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Anyone who has applied for a license to apply these restricted commercial and non-commercial pesticides but has not received it should call or write to: Commissioner Reagan V.

Brown, Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas, 78711, (512-475-6133).

The licenses are required to purchase, use or supervise the use of 24 pesticides which the Environmental Protection Agency has classified as "restricted use," Brown said. As of June 9, manufacturers will not be able to ship these pesticides without a restricted use label.

DONALD DEAN BROGDON

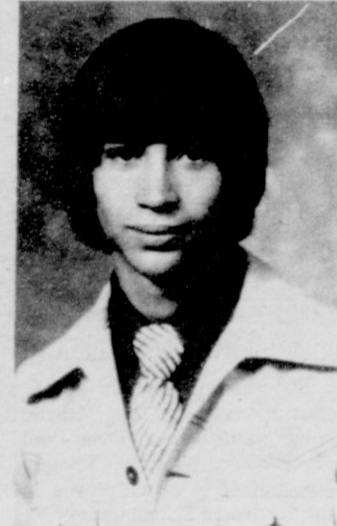
