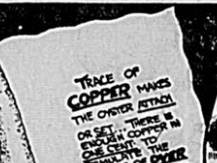

With silence and tears.

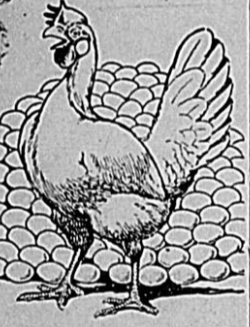
What was he like, this great

hailed as the perfect Romeo,

He suffered so horribly from
nightmares that he resorted to
audanum. But even laudanum
couldn't stifle his bad dreams,
so he kept two loaded pistols
beside his bed. In the quiet of
the night, he would wake up
yelling and gnashing his teeth,
and would stride up and down
the room brandishing pistols and
daggers. He had another super-
stition that haunted him. A gypsy
fortune-teller once warned him
that he would die in his thirty-
seventh year. He died three
months after he had passed his
thirty-sixth birthday. Byron
believed a sinister
curse doomed all his family.
The thirty-sixth birthday, he
swore, was fatal to the people
of his blood. Some modern
biographers are even inclined
to agree with him for Byron's
father died at the age of thirty-
six, and Byron's daughter,
whose life was exactly like
her father's, also died on the
eve of her thirty-sixth birth-
day.

Behind The Scenes Of American Business

Business—A better feeling
prevailed last week in business
and agricultural circles. Farmers
especially in the west were cheer-
ed by the fact that the price of
Wheat which two weeks ago
dropped to 67-1-2 cents a bushel,
was back to the 75-cent level.
With America's wheat crop esti-
mated at one billion bushels, this
rise means \$80,000,000 more for
farmers. Cotton rose too, more
than \$2 a bale, on reports of
heavy rains damaging the crop.
Great Britain ordered 400 air-
planes from U. S. firms, prac-
tically assuring capacity opera-
tions in this industry for at least
two years. Auto manufacturers
said that it may not be necessary
to close Detroit plants for two
months this summer, as previous-
ly expected. Renewal of confi-
dence is seen in the fact that
railroads last month ordered 6-
114 new freight cars. In April
only 3 were ordered.

Washington—While retail busi-
ness promises to be dull this sum-
mer, there is good reason to look
for a sharp expansion in the fall.
President Roosevelt has asked the
PWA to prepare a list of pro-
jects costing about \$600,000,000
which can be begun by the end of
the month. Once the government
pump-priming ball gets rolling, it
is believed that an average of
\$300,000,000 a month will be
spent for the balance of 1938.
Opinions differ as to the ultimate
value of such a program for ach-
ieving lasting recovery, but there
is little doubt that temporarily
it will greatly stimulate mass
buying power and therefore retail
trade.

Things To Watch For—A new
treatment for cloth which will
enable designs to retain their
sharpness and original luster on
fabrics even after repeated wash-
ing. An apparatus which permits
a patient to administer anesthetic
to himself while having a tooth
filled, a bone set or while under-
going a minor operation; as long
as he feels pain he squeezes on
a bulb similar to those used on
atomizers—A vending machine
that sells flashlight batteries—A
rear view vanity mirror for wom-
en interested in seeing what is
going on behind their backs with-
out being observed.—A method
of freezing bread so that it can
be kept in storage six or eight
months—Bowl of Rice Party in
your community Friday night,
June 17th, to aid 50 million
Chinese civilian victims of ag-
gression.

Things To Watch For — Com-
bination lamp and mosquito "e-
lectric chair". A new photogra-
phic printer which makes enlarge-

ments of 35 mm. negatives at the
speed of contact printing. A new
commercial method of treating
for storage which places them in
a vacuum chamber and then dips
them in carbon-dioxide oil. A hand-
y pump unit for campers which
purifies drinking water. Moisture-
proof window curtains made of
cellaphane. Synthetic wool made
from coffee grounds. Street and
home lamps with no filaments,
but lit by radio waves. Neon traf-
fic lights which can be seen for
greater distances than the present
lights.

Competition — Indication that
Congress is becoming aroused by
the menace of Japanese competi-
tured products is seen in a speech
delivered in the House by Edith
Nourse Rogers, congresswoman
from Massachusetts. U. S. imports
from Japan, she declared are "imi-
tations of American products,
which have been counterfeited in
Japan, are being sent to this
country inferior in quality and
brutally lower in price. The con-
sequence is unquestionably to be
read in the mounting toll of un-
employment among our industrial
workers."

Who Pays—A recent survey
reveals the rather astounding
fact that if everyone had to turn
over to the government all in-
come in excess of \$5,000 a year
the sum collected would pay only
about 1-5 of the annual cost. Hid-
den taxes on a loaf of bread cost-
ing 8 cents are 2 cents and it
takes 57 governmental agencies to
collect it.

ABOLISH TAX EXEMPTIONS
There will be general agreement, except among those whose pocket-books are directly affected with the proposal laid before Congress by the President that no more Federal bond issues should exempt their holders from income taxes on the money which the Government pays them, and that the rule of exempting state and Federal government salaries from income taxation should be abolished.

Tax exempt bonds were devised in the World War times to induce people to lend money to the Government at low rates of interest. There seems to be no good reason why such an inducement should be offered in peace times. On the taxation of salaries, Constitutional questions are involved. The Income Tax amendment to the Constitution authorizes Congress to tax incomes from whatever source derived. But for more than 125 years the Supreme Court has held that the independent sovereignties of the states and the Federal Government are inviolate, and that neither may tax or interfere with the instrumentalities of the other. Under that principle the Federal Government may not tax the salaries of State employees, nor the states which impose income taxes levy such upon Federal salaries.

This is plainly an inequitable exemption of workers in the public service, whose incomes generally are higher than those of persons similarly employed in private occupations. Federal employees pay the Federal income tax, and state employees pay their state income taxes, if any. But there is no good reason why the four or five millions on state payrolls should not pay the same proportionate Federal taxes as those who have no political jobs.

It may take another Constitutional amendment to bring it about, but the President's proposal should be put into effect.
The New Political Party

The new "National Progressive" party which Gov. Phil La Follette of Wisconsin and his brother, Senator Bob LaFollette, recently launched, may or may not prove to be an important factor in national politics. That depends upon many things which time alone can disclose. It must be conceded, however, that this new effort to set up a new third party is under the direction of no political amateurs. The LaFollette brothers inherited a natural genius for politics from their father, who ran for President on his own third party ticket in 1924 and received nearly five million votes. They have had much practical experience in politics themselves, both in their home state of Wisconsin and in Washington. They know all the arts of political organization.

It seems likely, therefore, that their new party will be a factor to be reckoned with in the Presidential election of 1940. Especially will that be the case if, as has been suggested, the National Progressive Party attracts to itself the strength of the Farmer-Labor Party of the Northwest and the American Labor Party of the East, together with the personal following of Fiorella La Guardia, the Mayor of New York. Whether the National Progressive Party can gain enough seats in Congress and carry enough states in the next Presidential election to establish itself as a permanent "Centrist" party remains to be seen. The history of American politics has been that whenever a new third party has shown such strength its principles have

Government Agency Says Estate Prices Due To Forecast Upward Trend

There is every indication of increased real estate activity, and those who have money to invest should forget the "Calamity Howlers", Col. Harold Lee, deputy general manager of the Home Owner's Loan Corporation declared. If they don't purchase property in today's market, Col. Lee warned, they soon may find prices up, interest rates higher and terms less favorable. Assuring real estate men that they need have no fear of the Home Owner's Loan Corporation policy on sale of real estate, since it still was "mindful of the need for stabilization of the market," he added: Real estate today is in an unusually favorable position. We have never lived in a period when the vacancy ratio and interest rates have been so low, money so plentiful and terms so favorable to the buyer. The situation is tempting from the buyer's point of view.

"The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company has announced that it plans to spend \$100,000,000 on rental housing in the next five years. The Prudential Insurance Company also is investing in low rent housing and it is not unlikely that other life insurance companies will follow suit. Federal Housing Administration has insured loans amounting to more than \$20,000,000 on large scale renting developments and many more projects are under consideration. "The briskly increasing monthly sales of the Home Owner's Loan Corporation and evidence from every quarter definitely point toward increased real estate activity. Ordinarily such activity is reflected in higher prices higher interest rates and more restrictive terms. Those who have money to invest should forget the calamity howlers. They should go ahead and purchase in today's market."

Col. Lee told in detail of the harassed days which brought about the establishment of the HOLC and its task of lending over \$3,000,000,000 to finance the mortgages of more than a million distressed home owners. He told how the Corporation had been forced to acquire 85,842 properties, but pointed out that they represent only a small percent of the total loans. Every consideration was extended those borrowers before foreclosures were instituted, he declared.

The Corporation has sold 11,482 properties, while it had a cumulative rental income from owned properties up to April of \$15,116,098. The Corporation collected 99.7 percent of rents due in March and only 3.3 percent of tenants were delinquent more than one month. Only 14.3 percent of its properties available to yield income were vacant.

"In 1936, the HOLC recaptured more than 100 percent of the book value of its properties and in 1937 recaptured 99 percent," said Col. Lee. "Present indications are that sales for 1938, when the year is completed will reflect some losses. "Some of our sales are on a cash basis, but the great majority are on a deferred payment plan, with liberal terms. The amount of down payment depends largely on the credit of the prospect."

"There will be no forced sales by this corporation. It would be a short-sighted policy to stimulate a new depression in real estate values by such tactics. There will be no dumping, no sales or rental for less than fair value, and properties will not be offered in greater numbers than the market can absorb. "This Corporation was created as an emergency agency and will gradually liquidate its loans and holdings. It was created because a drastic remedy was needed that was too great for private agencies. The operations of the Corporation benefitted the whole financial structure. Since almost every borrower was facing foreclosure, it was inevitable that the Corporation would be forced to take over some properties, but such action has been taken only as a last resort.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD
Picturing Children Indoors



Floodlight from almost directly overhead makes the child's figure stand out against a background of rich shadow. The picture was snapped when the subject had forgotten there was a camera near.

PARENTS usually think of outdoor and sunny summer days as the proper place and time for picturing children, and once this was true. Before the advent of fast films and electric light bulbs especially designed for amateur photography, daytime was the only time snapshot shooters could work. Today that is no longer the case.

Nowadays, pleasing child pictures may be taken inside the home either by day or night, and more amateurs are taking them. This is partly because the home provides an ideal setting for pictures one wants to keep, and partly because the photographer can control his light to make pictures more interesting.

The modern large-sized amateur flood bulbs are so powerful that the camera worker can put two of them in reflectors three to four feet from his subject, and take snapshots, as he would outdoors, with an ordinary box camera. The camera is, of course, loaded with supersensitive film and its lens set at the largest opening. Other cameras can be used at 1/25 second shutter speed and f.8 or f.11 lens opening.

Ability to take snapshots like this is a great help in obtaining natural, unposed child pictures. It is no longer necessary to take "time" exposures or to tell the child to "hold very still." Now his toys can be placed in the circle of light cast by



Beautiful "high-key" effects can be obtained with the child on a window-seat where daylight diffuses through the curtains, and bright floodlight inside so that there are no dark areas or masses of shadow. The child's clothing should be light in color. Good balancing of light will give a picture that is almost all white and lighter tones of gray, with just enough shadow here and there for accents. "Backlighting," as from the window, can also be obtained with artificial light, a bulb being placed behind the child so that the hair becomes a bright, silky halo. Start today to keep a picture diary of your children.

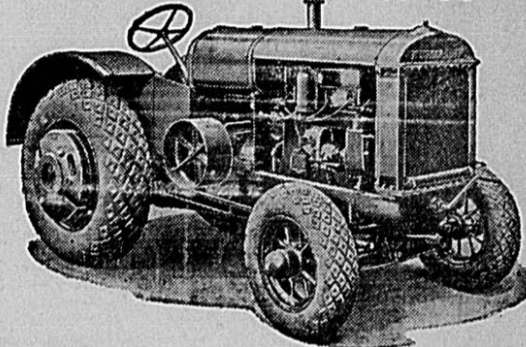

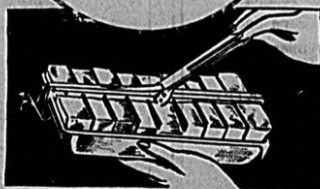

tainers from the creek bed below. This pottery was not painted, but covered with a cord-like impression from which it gets the name "cord-marked pottery."

These plains redmen were more peaceful in habits than the nomadic tribes which probably annihilated them or drove them from this section. They hunted, raised corn and probably beans and squash, and bartered with residents of other villages, some of which were nearby.

Burials often were made beneath the dirt floors of the houses. In one room of the Antelope creek ruin was found last week the skeleton of a middle-aged man. It was in a flexed position. Prof. Johnston said the physical build appeared to be similar to that of the modern plains Indian.

A typical slab room of one of these villages will be taken to the museum of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society here and restored in every detail. Plaster of Paris figures made from molds formed on the bodies of living Indians will be placed

in this room. The first of these casts was made last week of Chief Sky Eagle, an Ottawa Indian entertainer and model. Sky Eagle, a graduate of Carlisle, posed for students of the Palo Duro School of Art in the nearby canyon. The cast was made by Harley Goettsche of Higgins, student assistant in geology and anthropology who has done similar work for leading museums elsewhere.

Other habitat figures will be made for the museum probably in Taos, N. M.

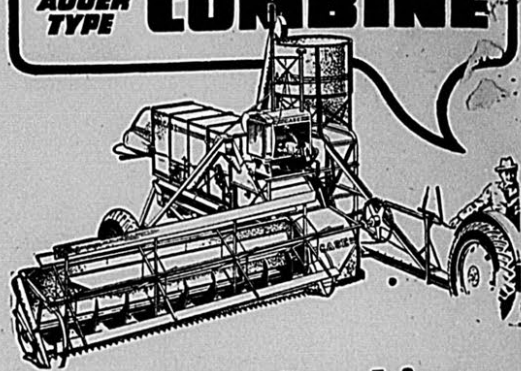

KILL Counts In 'Hopper War --

Definite results are what we're after in the war on grasshoppers. With the fight well started, more attention should now be paid to getting the poison material spread in an efficient manner.

Some excellent kills are being made and in some instances poor kills have been recorded. The early morning hours are the best for spreading the poison.

Look over your territory carefully before spreading materials. Put the poison where the 'hoppers' are, or ahead of them if they are moving. It is getting increasingly difficult to obtain Federal bran and poison and materials wasted may be badly needed later.

Fine cooperation is being given the program from all sources. Every effort is being made to keep down costs, for the fight may be long drawn out. The Commissioners' court, the highway department and the railroads are all set for a good fight.
