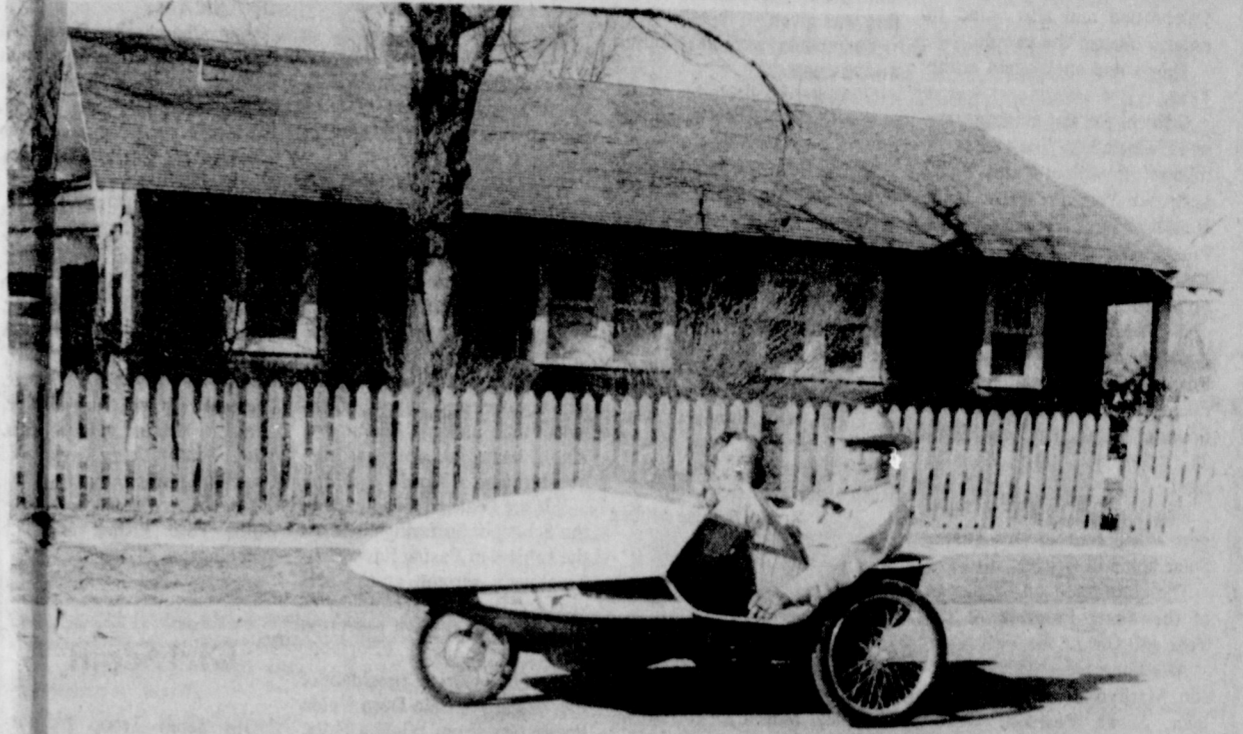
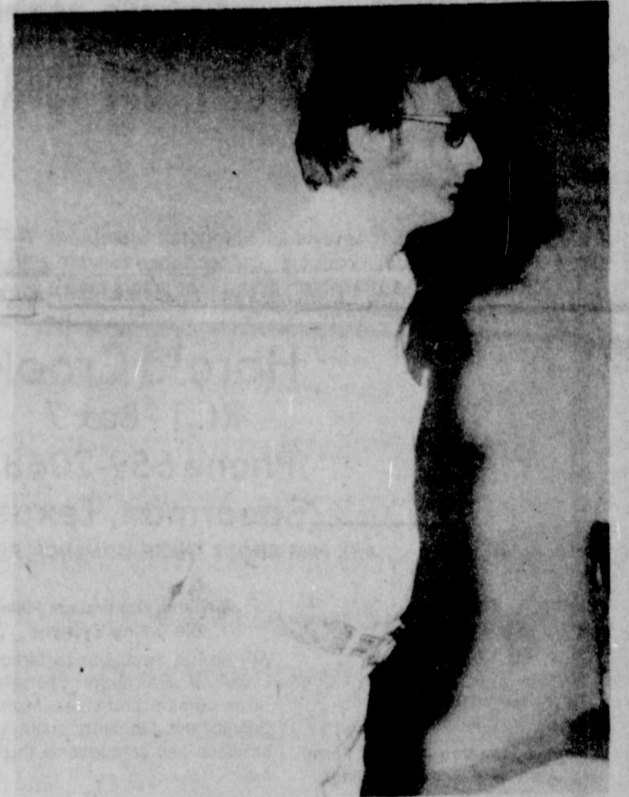


Gasohol Possibilities Discussed!

Goals Suggested

Could a Gasohol Plant be developed in the Spearman area? This question... and other similar concerns were a topic for discussion Monday evening as 27 Spearman citizens met under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce for a "Goals Setting Meeting."

Chamber President Gerald Heinrich presented various aspects of a Gasohol Production program locally. Much of the information had been obtained by several members of the Chamber in a recent meeting in Evergreen, Colorado, of the Domestic Gasohol Institute.

One of the concepts said the Chamber official, developed by the Institute's planning is a small scale food and ethanol fuel plant. The plant would provide a liquid fuel alternative to gasoline, and a marketable food or feed by-product.

Heinrich pointed out that under current Texas statutes such production of alcohol would not be legal. It would take a Constitutional Convention for such approval, and the earliest this could be done would be next November.

President Heinrich added that there was a National Gasohol Commission made up of persons and groups who wanted to "get out of OPEC."

The representatives at the meeting were from various walks of life in Spearman. Agriculture, banking, institutions, the law, City Government, Insurance and the Media.

Heinrich discussed the technological aspects of such a plant, and added that most of the necessary technology was already available.

Cost figures were also presented, but no specific action was taken by the group present

as to whether such an industry could be developed in Spearman. The need for feedlot cooperation was pointed out as being essential for the successful operation of the plant. The livestock could be fed the wet by-products of the gasohol feeds.

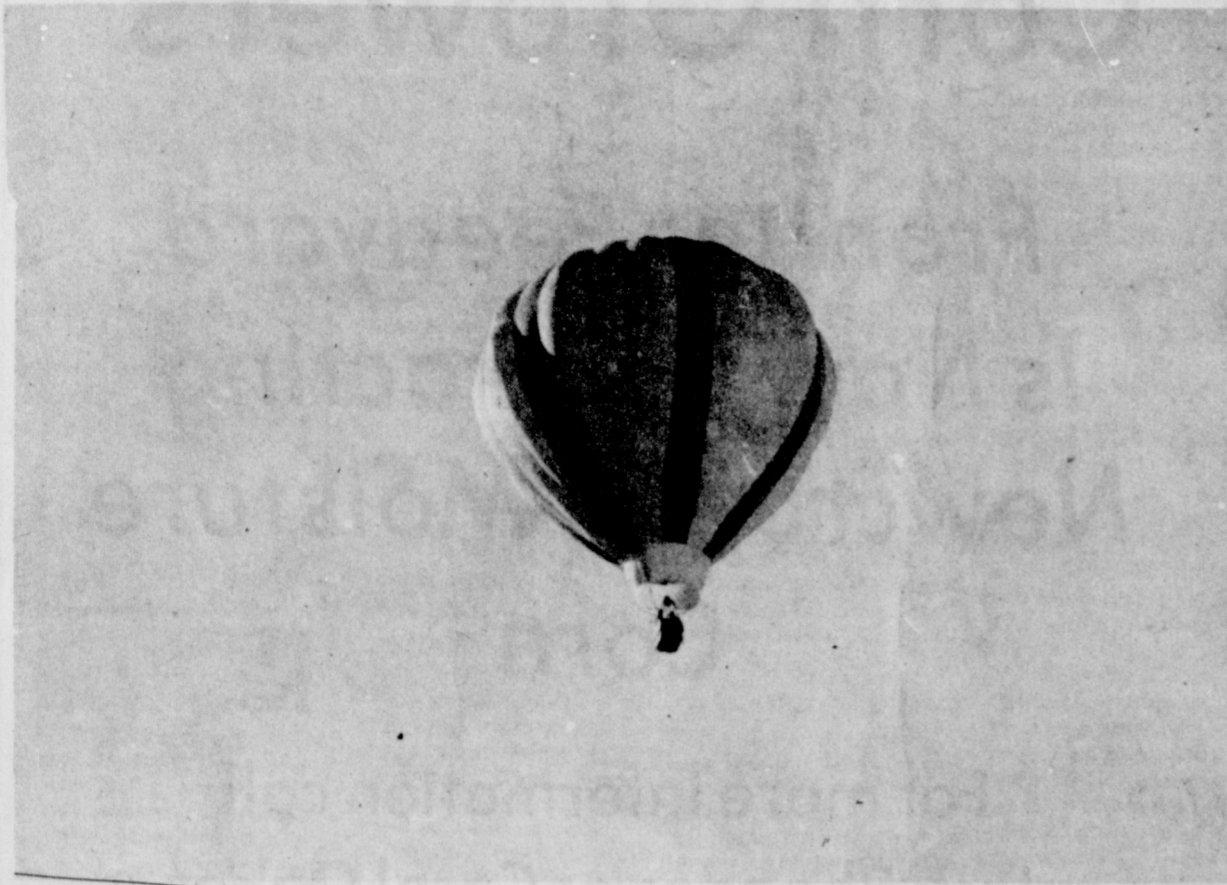
In essence The Chamber president said: "The technology is presently available for such a plant and that if laws would be passed approving such production, such a plant could be built provided sufficient private investment were to be available."

Noted President Heinrich: "we have two possible avenues of activity: 1. Let's find out more about the feasibility and let's study what we can do: be ready to build if the laws were to be passed paving the way for such a fuel alternative. Or, said the Chamber official..." we can let some other community build and gamble... and if it works... then we can forge ahead ourselves."

He asked for further input from the community but assured his listeners that the Chamber was studying the possibilities carefully.

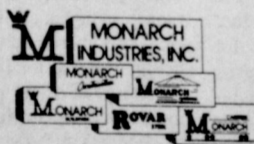

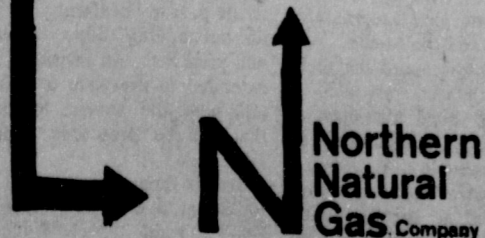

"Scream softly or the neighbors might hear!" Are you aware that wife battering occurs once in 50-60% of all marriages?

Contrary to popular belief, wife battering is not limited to the lower class. Women of middle income feel more trapped as they live in perpetual fear that the economic hardship they may face will be more than they can bear if they leave their husbands.

Many women try to hide their problem and hope that it will get better. Statistics show that most beatings begin early in marriage, becoming more frequent and more violent through the years.

The Council on Domestic Violence suggests that you be open with your problem and firm with your mate from the

start concerning how you feel about battering and what you will do should it occur -- then follow through!

Extension homemakers throughout the top 20 counties of Texas received the above information at the District I TEHA meeting in Wellington last week, as it was presented by Melissa Taylor, volunteer worker for Domestic Violence in Amarillo.

New Legislation Aimed At Redistribution of City Sales Tax

State Representative Ray Keller, Duncanville, has announced his sponsoring of legislation aimed at redistribution of the city sales tax "to allow cities to regain the tax revenue that is rightfully theirs in the first place."

Explaining, Keller said, "The city sales tax is voted on by citizens of a local municipality but it is promulgated, administered and dispersed by the State. My bill calls for redistributing this money on the basis of population rather than where it is collected, under present law. Now, when someone shops outside his home town, the 1% portion of the tax does not return to the citizen in the form of services. It goes to another city for services, means the shopper is footing the bill for another city and represents blatant taxation without representation."

Continuing, Keller said, "Not only does this create a windfall for cities who happen to have manu businesses arbitrarily situated in their political bound-

aries, but the recovering cities are under no obligation as to how the revenue should be used. Under my proposal, 91% of the cities in Texas would receive a net gain and we would stop subsidizing those 9% who gain under the present inequity."

In fact, the City of Spearman would realize a net gain of \$32,208 under this legislation."

Keller concluded, "The cities with large retail areas gain from increased property taxes. There is no reason to subsidize other cities at the loss of our own when demands for tax relief and ever-increasing expenses are the concern of every local government. The time has come to do away with the inequities of the present law and give each citizen their rightful voice in how that money is spent."

As a present or former resident of Hansford County, you are eligible for 500 words of free space to tell your story in the family history section of the Hansford County History Book being compiled as a nonprofit endeavor by the Hansford County Historical Commission.

The planned general history section will narrate the county's growth and development from its beginning to the present through written copy and photos, accurately describing the changes in agriculture, industry, education, and other subjects of historical significance. The addition of histories of individual businesses, churches, organizations, and communities make the book even more comprehensive.

Histories are being sought from Newcomers as well as Oldtimers and from present residents as well as those who formerly lived in the county. Each eligible living family unit is entitled to the free space whether they have lived in Hansford County 1 day or 80 years.

If you or other family members need more than 500 words, additional space may be purchased at the rate of \$10.00 per hundred words. In addition, space will be available for you to say "I love you" in a special way with words and photos to a parent or other loved ones-deceased or living.

Your family story and pictures should be sent in as soon as possible, but no later than April 15. Tell it as if you were telling it to your children or grandchildren in reminiscence, and others will enjoy reading it, too!

To guard against unnecessary refund delays, the IRS encourages taxpayers to use the peel-off identification label provided with the tax package. The label is pre-printed with the taxpayer's name, address, and needs only to be affixed to the tax return before it is mailed, according to the IRS.

The IRS reminded taxpayers to check the information on the label before using it, however, to be sure all information is correct. Any changes should be made in ink on the label itself.

The IRS also reminded those persons who changed their names last year to report the new name to their local Social Security Administration office. This ensures that the new name will be assigned to the proper social security number.

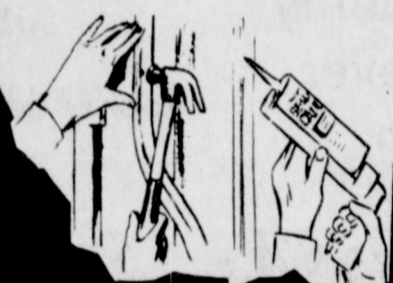

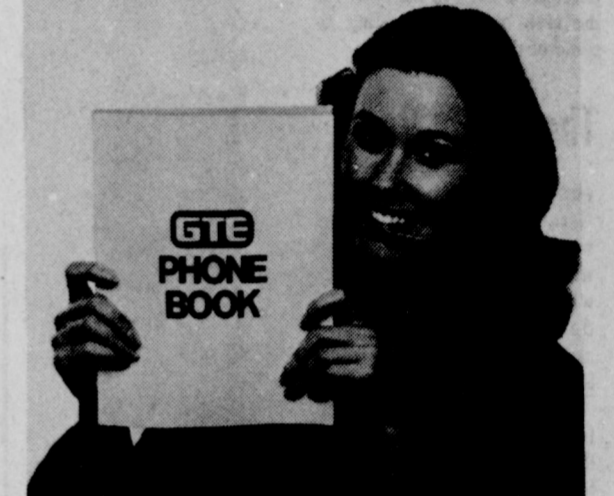

They were married in 1917, and the gown has been stored since the wedding night. Also, the original seal of the First State Bank, was donated to the museum. Mrs. Renner's dolls have been added to the museum, along with several fiddles donated by Rube Faus. The fiddles were used to play for dances at Old Hansford. Other items include kitchen safes, wash stands, maps from the territory dating back to 1869. Also, the Lion Club will probably vote to purchase a page in the book for the club history, according to some of the club offices.

The Arab View

In the widespread euphoria over an Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty, it's well to keep in mind the majority Arab view of what President Carter has done, in buying that agreement with five billion U.S. taxpayer dollars. It's simply this: Until Israel agrees to give the Palestinians a homeland, to give back Arab Jerusalem to the Arabs and to return the West Bank, or most of it, to Jordan, and to return most of the Golan Heights to Syria, no permanent peace will come to the Middle East. Arabs believe Mr. Carter couldn't apply the pressure for these Israeli withdrawals—all required by several U.N. votes—because of the influence of the Israeli lobby inside the United States.

Thus they see Egypt's individual settlement with Israel as less significant than many in the U.S., and believe President Sadat of Egypt is now isolated (and to many a traitor) in the Arab world. Only time will tell whether their assessment is realistic.

Ezer Weizman, Israel's Defense Minister: "The treaty cannot be signed until the withdrawal question is resolved, and someone has to give way."
