# Candidate For Governor To Speak At Borger



### MCCRAW WILL DELIVER ADDRESS AT 3:30 P. M. FRI. JUNE SEVENTEENTH

Attorney General McCraw will speak in Borger Friday afternoon June 17, in behalf of his candidacy for Governor of the State of Texas. McCraw will be accompanied by former Hansford county judge J. H. Broadhurst, who is actively engaged in forwarding the McCraw campaign in this section. Following the afternoon address Mr. McCraw will deliver an address at Amarillo beginning at 8 p. m. Friday evening. The address will be broadcast over the radio. On Saturday June 18 Attorney General McCraw will speak at Lubbock in the evening, the address also is to be broadcast.

A delegation of Hansford county friends will attend the Borger meeting in a body, according to Paul Loftin, secretary of the McCraw for Governor club of Hansford county. On Sunday evening Mr. McCraw will address Sunday school students of Post, Texas, in a city wide meeting. The Sunday talk will be non political and is sponsored by all the churches of Post, according to information from Mr. Loftin.

## FORMER HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER GETS HIGH HONOR

Reflecting the ability of her teacher, Miss Lucille Maize of Spearman, Hardin Joyce, student of Brownwood, Texas, high school earned for herself and Miss Maize a trip to Washington, an introduction to President Roosevelt, and other distinguished governmental officials.

In addition to this honor and prize, four other students of Miss Maize's earned a Parker fountain pen and pencil set, and the social science class instructed by Miss Maize earned for the school a \$25.00 selection of books to be placed in the school library. All awards were the result of Miss Maize's social science class of Brownwood entering into a national contest sponsored by "Scholastic" the American High School weekly publication. The entire class of 60 students made an average grade of 89.5 in the contest which proved to be the best grade for that number of pupils ever gained in a similar contest in this nation. Four members of the class made the average grade of 98 in this national contest, which brought forth the honors and prizes for the Brownwood school, in addition to the class honors and the individual honor of Hardin Joyce.

Perhaps no school in the entire nation made so good a record as the Brownwood school and the social science class taught by Miss Maize.

Miss Maize and Mr. Joyce will leave Texas June 18th on their trip to the national capital. The Brownwood, Texas school was the only school in the entire South to win such distinguished honors. The records show that 62,000 students were entered in the national contest.

FLASH! Some farmers have distributed poison during the afternoon and early night. The results: Very few hoppers dead; a few slightly wounded. To be effective, the poison must be put out in the morning before 9 o'clock.

### SPREAD HOPPER POISON EARLY MORNINGS.

County Agent Joe Hatton stated this week that the individuals who were following instructions in the matter of spreading hopper poison early each morning before 8 or 9 a. m. were gaining excellent results, and those who disregarded the instructions and spread the mixture in late afternoon were not gaining the results. The mixture is free but is supposed to be spread according to instructions. Satisfactory results cannot be obtained if the early morning is not followed in the fight to eliminate the hopper menace.

### Wheat Producers Spread Hopper Poison in Large Doses, Agent Reports.

According to information from County Agent Joe Hatton the wheat producers of this county are cooperating 100 percent in the campaign to kill the pests. The average allotment of the poison from the two stations in the county has been about 200,000 pounds per week so far in the campaign, with more demands being made as farmers complete their home constructed spreaders.

It is estimated that 300 spreaders have been constructed in the county, and are now in use. County agent Joe Hatton established a new station last week at the McRee Garage in Gruver, so that the demand could be met. Both stations have been maintaining night and day crews mixing the poison and the other ingredients. Hatton urges producers to get their supply at the nearest station available.

### Rainfall South of Spearman Heavier Monday June 6th

Rainfall in the Holt community and South east of Spearman was reported as near a half inch Monday afternoon. The report also stated more than a quarter of an inch moisture fell at the Knob and in the McKibben community.

### PETITION ASKS FOR NAME TO BE FILED ON JULY BALLOT.

Friends of James O. Guleke, prominent Amarillo attorney, today had entered his name for congress in the coming July primary, petitions requesting his name be placed on the ticket having been filed with County Democratic Chairman Roy Chase and with the county chairmen of the other 27 counties in the district. The original petition, signed by 27 persons representing various Panhandle counties was filed with Judge A. B. Crump of Wheeler, democratic chairman for the Congressional district.

Mr. Guleke was in Sherman on business and could not be contacted for a statement.

The petition in his behalf was the third filed with county election officials for a place on the congressional ticket. Rep Marvin Jones of Amarillo is a candidate for reelection and several weeks ago James O. Cade, Amarillo attorney filed for the place and has been conducting an active campaign.

Mr. Guleke is one of Amarillo's most prominent citizens, having served for 10 years on the Texas Board of Education. He is expected to return home Thursday.

Speaking of wheat production, we learn on our return home that red rust; black rust, grasshoppers, black bugs, green bugs, red bugs, drouth, too much moisture, dust, electricity and humid air is working on the Hansford wheat crop and the estimated production of two and a half million bushels has been cut to at least one and a half million.

For the first time in history the state of Texas is attempting to help solve the unemployment situation in our section. A branch of the state employment bureau will have an employee in Spearman on and after June 18th who will provide a medium for employers. The service is free to both. We suggest wheat producers who want to employ help give in their estimated needs to the agency so that this country may obtain help at reasonable rates.

The matter of reporting moisture (the most important news item of this area) is becoming difficult. The only official record is kept in Spearman, and for the past 2 or 3 weeks most of the moisture has been falling outside of Spearman city limits. Tuesday night F. W. Brandt only recorded 4 hundredths of an inch of rainfall. We learn from various communities that the rainfall scattered over the county amounted to as much in some places as 2 inches. Heavy rain reported at Gruver and North of Gruver.

# DELEGATION TO WASHINGTON TO SECURE \$5,000,000 FINANCES FOR COVER CROP PLAN

Three delegates representing the High Plains area of Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma are to leave today for Washington to get \$5,000,000 to be given farmers in the area as a grant, and to be used for emergency planting and to establish a cover crop.

John Wray, a Hartley county farmer and secretary-treasurer of the Hartley county agricultural association; and C. R. Board, Cimmarron county judge of Boise City, Oklahoma, left this morning and Ray Jackson of Elkhart, Kans. is to meet them in Kansas City tonight.

Farm leaders who have been working for an emergency program since early April estimate there are 10 million acres in the five state area that need emergency treatment. They fear that 59 to 75 percent of this acreage will not be worked unless a listing and cover crop program is secured that will give the farmers a direct grant of about 50 cents per acre.

Wray said this morning that an even greater percent of the ten million acres may be abandoned. He based his statement on interviews and observations made Saturday during a 500-mile trip through portions of Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. With him he said were John Johnson, Boise City banker and Judge Board. Farmers, county officials, business and professional men declared, Wray said, that the physical condition of the country has never been known to be worse than now.

It was the general opinion, he said, that from both an economic and moral viewpoint, direct and immediate grant assistance must be given farmers if land now blowing is properly listed and a vegetative cover established on it. Otherwise, he said, millions of acres will continue to blow and if a cover is not grown this summer the situation will be aggravated next year.

"In many sections, for miles and miles, there was no vegetation of any sort on land which in normal times is fine farm soil," Wray declared. "Much of that area has very recently had good rains but it was estimated that not more than five percent has been plowed or planted this spring because of the lack of individual resources."

To further emphasize the need of the \$5,000,000 emergency grant, Wray said that the newspaper editor and a member of the county ACP committee at Elkhart stated that farm finances are so limited that if farmers took advantage of all loans now available that not more than 55 percent of the farm land in their county could be tilled this year.

Under the new-type Farm Security Administration loan authorized last week for only 26 state counties, farmers could probably put their land under control since it offers them financial assistance based on their needs and has no maximum limit. But in the other 74 High Plains counties facing severe soil erosion farmers cannot get this loan, at least at this time.

Wray last week in an exclusive interview with Roy Kimmel, Amarillo coordinator of government work in the 5-state region secured his assurance that he is not opposed to the request of farmers for a cover crop grant. He merely wants all money coming into the 5-state territory to be used so that it will become an integral part of permanent progress toward solution of the area's ranch and farm problems.

## SOIL CONSERVATION METHODS BENEFICIAL

## STATE EMPLOYMENT SERVICE AVAILABLE.

The Texas State Employment Service is busy at this time organizing its field forces throughout the state for the benefit and assistance of those employed in Agriculture. In the Panhandle the annual wheat harvest commands the early attention each summer of this free state government service.

As previously announced and for the information of those unfamiliar with this seasonal service attention is directed to points in this area where state employees will be stationed.

At Spearman the county court house will be headquarters with a man on duty beginning on the 18th of June.

At Perryton from the 15th of June there will be a representative of the State Employment Service with headquarters at the courthouse.

The State Government through its Employment Service aims at an even distribution of agricultural labor during peak periods. In this respect the Employment Service renders a valuable service to farmers in assisting the direction of labor to them when required. In this same respect the service becomes equally valuable to the transient agricultural laborer by informing him where there are work opportunities, thus tending to prevent a congestion of labor where not needed.

The Employment Service through its state-wide organization and efficient cooperation is also able to separate Dame Rumor from actual opportunity and translate this information into work opportunity for those interested. For those who will be seeking work opportunities during the wheat harvest attention is directed to necessity for registering at nearest point where an employment service representative is stationed. Registration in ones own county is required and this procedure simplifies placing in work opportunities.

Stress is laid upon the fact that there is no fee collected nor charged for this service. The employment Service is a branch of Texas State Government and is equally available to employer and worker.

Complete neutrality is maintained by the Texas State Employment Service in the matter of wages. Such agreements are completed between employer and worker without any opinion, leverage or assistance on the part of the State Government or Employment Service.

Farmers who anticipate needing extra help during the harvest are invited to contact the nearest representative at the earliest possible moment.

conour, Soil Conservation Service technicians report. More and more during recent years farmers are planting their principal crops around the curve of the slope on the level instead of up and down the hills.

Conservation of soil and moisture by farming on the contour has brought such satisfactory results in increased crop yields that many Panhandle farmers now are using the same principle for other farming operations. They are building new fences and roads on the contour, and in many instances old fences and roads are being rearranged to follow the true level of the land.

Contour fences have many advantages, the Soil Conservation Service points out. Contour farming in a square-fenced field usually makes a number of short rows or point rows in the corner. Farmers usually consider such rows a nuisance and in many instances are rebuilding fences to parallel the curvature of the contour.

One farmer, who had a permanent pasture adjoining a cultivated field, added the point rows to the pasture and added some of the pasture at the upper swing of the contour to the cultivated portion of the farm. In the end he had about the same acreage of pasture and cultivated land as before. He protected the point rows newly seeded to pasture grass by not moving the fence until the grass was firmly established. When land next to a cultivated field has a soil that is rocky, thin or unproductive, it should not be added to the cultivated portion of the field, the Service says.

**The SNAPSHOT GUILD**  
LEARN YOUR LIGHTING



Careful lighting, low and to one side, gives this "character portrait" its unusual firelight effect.

**HAVE you ever tried shooting?** Haul a whole roll of film on one subject, not changing its position in the least but merely altering the way the light strikes it?  
It may seem foolish and extrava- gant but it can be one of the most important photographic lessons you ever took.

Try it on this theory: that the ob- jects in a picture have no real in- terest in themselves but that all the interest is in the way they are lighted—how the light strikes, how shadows are cast. Or, in the words of a great French photographer, that the subject is nothing, the lighting is everything.

Take a photoflood lamp in a re- flector and arrange a number of small objects—say some fruit spill- ing from a bowl—on a white table top. Have enough general room light to give detail in the shadows.  
Now set up your camera firmly with the light right beside it, for your first picture. Take another with the light far to the left and high up. Take one with the light directly over the subject. Take one with it behind the subject, shading the bulb so that

no direct light shines into the cam- era lens.  
Try as many positions as the length of the film roll allows. When the pictures are developed and print- ed, the differences will astound you. Study them and you will learn what can be done with light when it is properly used.

If you don't like still life, try a series of portraits, using the same person and the same pose but dif- ferent angles of lighting. From pic- ture to picture, facial expression will vary astonishingly—dead with flat front light, sinister with the light low and directly in front, startled or even terrified with the light low and to one side, and so on.

The same is true of landscapes. With each hour of the day they change, the deep morning shadows dwindling into noon and growing again into the grandeur of evening.  
Light is the photographer's work- ing material, the plastic clay from which he models his pictures. Study it. Learn what lighting can do and apply your knowledge and you will produce pictures of which you will be proud.

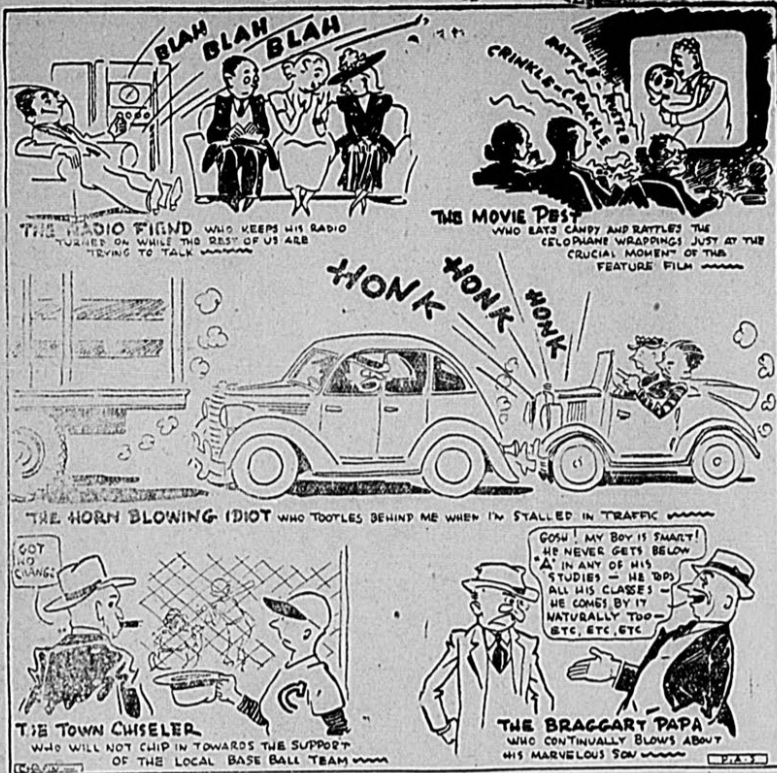

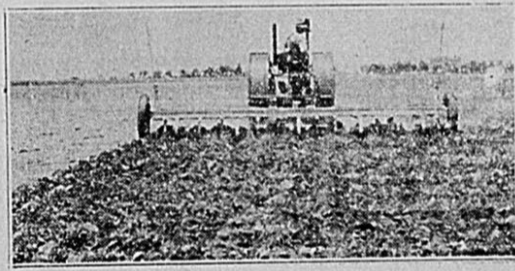
