



The Communist offer, to end a guerilla war which has raged for many years, is interesting in view of the fact that Malaya is the last country in which the Communists are still fighting, openly, to overhrow the established government The British rejection left little doubt that the government viewed the peace offer as an admission defeat on the part of the re-

Among other things, the British reply noted: "Knowing the true purpose of the Communist offer and peace motives which underly it, the government rejects it absolutely, and has no intention of negotiating with the Communist terrorists.

General Sir Geoffrey Bourne, n charge of the Government's war against guerillas in Malaya, said heavy losses recently sustained by the Communists, and continuing British victories, prompted the Communist peace offer. He said the Communists have ost 5.589 men since the war began in 1948, while the Government's forces have lost only 4,120. The Communist peace offer and other recent signs indicate the British are winning their long and bitter fight for control of Malaya and this is a good sign, especially in view of the precarious situation in Indochina, and the threat of Communist subversion in several other countries in

The Communist insurgents in Malaya have offered to negotiate with the British-supported government of Malaya. The offer was promptly rejected by the British. who were apparently not fooled by the offer, nor misled into thinking that negotiations with the Communists would be fruit

The Communist offer, to end a guerilla war which has raged for many years, is interesting in view of the fact that Malaya is the last country in which the Communists are still fighting, openly, to over throw the established government The British rejection left little doubt that the government viewed the peace offer as an adm defeat on the part of the re-

Among other things, the British reply noted: "Knowing the true purpose of the Communist offer and peace motives which underly it, the government rejects it absolutely, and has no intention of negotiating with the Communist terrorists.

General Sir Geoffrey Bourne, n charge of the Government's war against guerillas in Malaya, said heavy losses recently sustained by the Communists, and continuing British victories, prompted the Communist peace offer. He said the Communists have ost 5,589 men since the war, began in 1948, while the Government's forces have lost only 4,120

The Communist peace offer and other recent signs indicate the British are winning their long and bitter fight for control of Malaya and this is a good sign, especially in view of the precarious situation in Indochina, and the threat of Communist subversion in several other countries in the Asian Theater.

### Plentiful Foods For August Listed

College Station, July - Food shoppers should find the August plentiful list to their liking. Broliers and fryers share the spotlight with canned grapefruit sections, says Mae Belle Smith, extension specialist in consumer education.

Because crop prospects now indicate a near record supply, grapes have been added to the

Supplies of rice, Irish potatoes, watermelons, fresh and processed lemons and limes, says the specialist are much larger than for last summer. Too, other than the spotlighted meats, beef and frozen halibut are the only ones carried on the August list.

Milk and other dairy foods such as American chedder and cottage cheeses continue in heavy supply-about equal to the peak production in June.

Stocks of lard, vegetable fats and oils remain heavy and in some areas the summer vegetables will be in peak supply.
