## Oil Activity Increases In County

### Ed Vernon Well Is First Dual Producer In County

Ed Vernon is the first man in Hansford county to have a dual producer gas well brought in on his land. Cities Service drilled the well and the well produces forty million cubic feet of gas in the Tonkwa, and 32,000,000 in the Douglas.

Ed said that it would be allowable like two wells. The dual producer is located on Section 7, block 2, S.A.&M.G.  
Ed promised to take the country editor fishing after his gas checks start rolling in.

### Bill Brown Well Makes 200 Barrel Oil Producer

The Bill Brown well, East of Spearman came in as a good producer. The well is making 8 barrels of 38 gravity oil per hour. The production is from the Marathon, at 6,400 feet. This is a good well and only the Lasater oil well will better in this county.

### New Pastor At Morse Baptist Unit 72 No. 3 Lasater Brings In 1296 Barrels



Rev. Howell G. Verner recently accepted the pastorate at Morse, Texas Baptist church, and began serving there the last of August. Bro. Verner came to Morse from Santa Anna, Texas. Besides his regular duties as pastor at Santa Anna, he was secretary of the youth camp there; also district R. A. director, plus being the program chairman of the association.

According to information received late Tuesday, the Lasater No. 3, located on section 72, 8 miles North of Spearman, came in with a whopping 54 barrel an hour production. The casing was set at 7255 and the tubing at 7205. This makes four good oil wells on Lasater land.

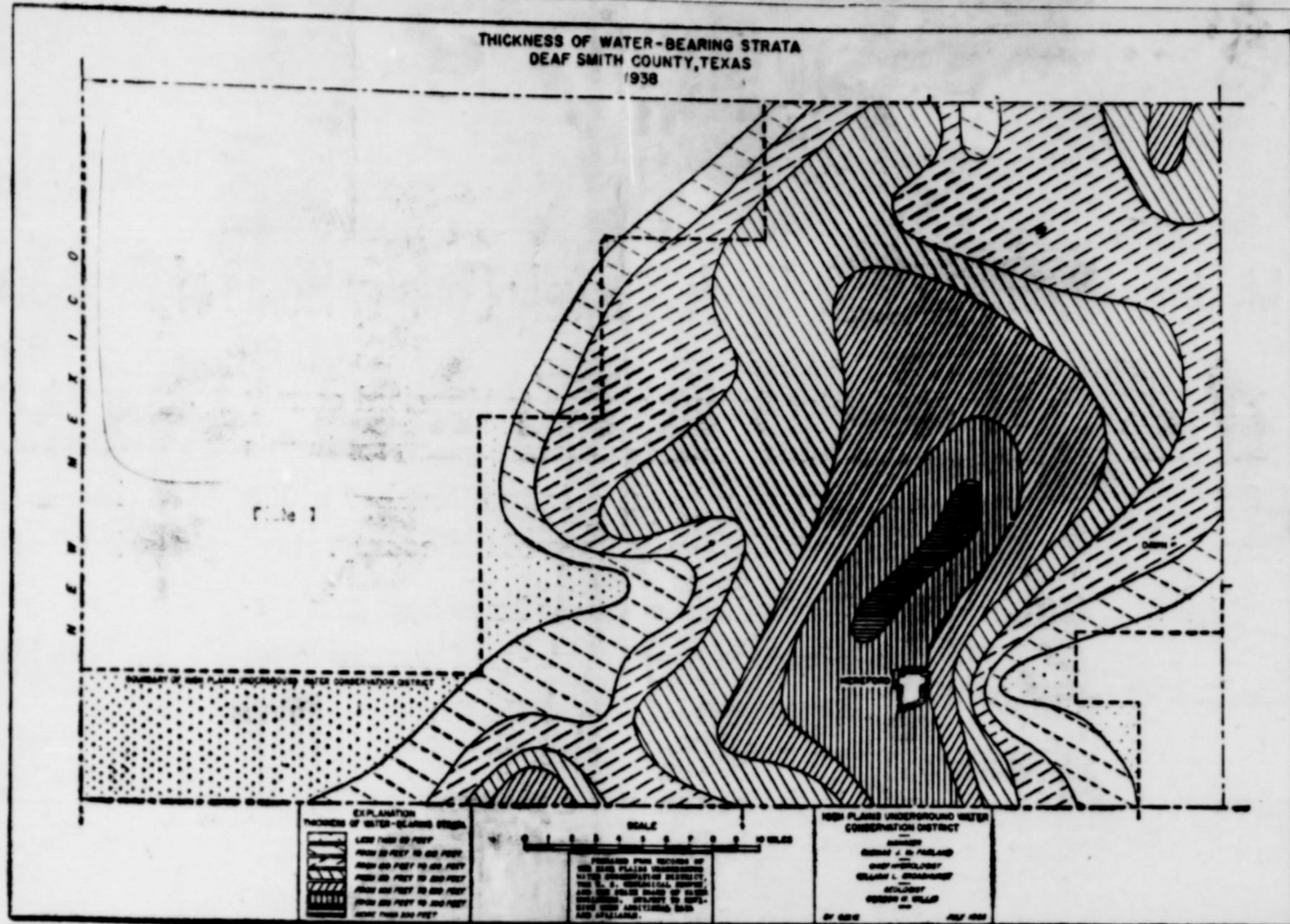
The well was drilled by Baker Taylor for R. H. Fulton, the independent oil operator that has spurred activities in Hansford and adjoining counties.

### R. H. Fulton Will Drill Texas Wells on Farm Out.

Of a great deal of interest and significance to Hansford people is the information carried in the "From The Crown" block column in Tuesdays Amarillo regional paper.

Here is the item—"A deal has just been closed that may mean a great deal to the play in the Andarko Basin. R. H. Fulton, who has had outstanding success so far in the deep basin, has taken a five section farm out from the Texas Company that calls for quick action. On four of the sections, the leases expire in December of this year; the other section in July of '56. The sections in an unexplored part of the basin, are No's 7, 9, and 12 in block 2, WCRW survey, on the East edge of Hansford county, and sections 43 and 55 block 4-T GH&H survey of DeHiltre county. The first well will be located in section 55, just South of Waka. Depth is exploration of the upper Mississippi.

This is great news for Hansford county. We can expect a very brisk drilling campaign East and South of Spearman if the production is found.



### GROUND WATER INVENTORY

**ED NOTE:** Due to the fact that the water for irrigation in Deaf Smith county is similar to that in Hansford county we are printing this water inventory in hopes that it may answer some of the questions that confront prospective owners who might plan to drill irrigation wells.

The volume of water remaining in the underground reservoir was determined by subtracting the volume of material unwatersed since 1938 from the total volume saturated material in 1938 and multiplying the remainder by the coefficient of storage of 15 per cent.

This data shows that 15,000,000 acre feet of water was in storage available for pumping in 1938

and that 1,300,000 acre feet of water had been removed from storage since 1938. In other words, 8.7 per cent of the volume of the available water had been removed from storage since 1938. Approximately 900,000 acre feet or about 70 per cent of the volume of water removed from storage was pumped during the 5 year period from January 1950 to January 1955.

The approximate quantity of underground water in storage available for pumping, beneath an individual farm may be determined by multiplying the number of acres in the farm by the thickness of the water bearing strata underlying the farm and then multiplying by the storage coefficient of 15 percent.

An individual may use this information to determine, within reasonable limits, how long the quantity of underground water in storage beneath his farm will last at any annual rate of withdrawal.

In the case of Hansford county we are informed that the supply of water in the irrigation area is practically inexhaustible. Our information is not authentic, but we believe that any land owner can investigate and become well informed relative to the supply of water available for future use.

### Turner Well Is Good Producer

While official Railroad Commission test is not yet available as to production of the Ned Turner gas well from the Morrow, those with experience say this will be one of the outstanding gas producers of the area. It is officially estimated at between thirty and forty million cubic feet, based on drill stem tests made recently, and assuming the increase in production will result from sand fracturing the new well.

North Plains Fair Week has arrived and Perryton is preparing for one of the largest crowds ever to attend the annual event.

Highlighting the three big days, August 18, 19 and 20th, will be a parade on Saturday morning at 10:00 a. m. Included in the two mile spectacle will be several special attractions, the Khiva Temple Drum and Bugle Corp and Band, from Amarillo, the miniature Santa Fe train, and the Bunn Bread truck which will distribute miniature loaves of bread to the spectators.

Invitations have also been mailed to Roping clubs throughout the North Plains area and hundreds of horsemen along with beautiful civic and community floats are expected to be on hand.

Besides the parade, Fair visitors can attend rodeos, dances, and old timers reunion, North Plains Fair exhibits, and a double header baseball game Sunday.

The present owners of the home and farm were born in the house that was featured in the picture last week and appears above this write-up. They are Ward and Elizabeth Spivey, brother and sister, and children of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Spivey.

The section where the home is located was filed on by the Senior W. G. Spivey in 1900 almost 56 years

ago. The Senior Spiveys moved to Hansford county from Bosque county Texas, and were pioneers in this area. Mrs. (Mary) Ward was a school teacher at the Lakeside school in the early days of the county.

Ward and Elizabeth Spivey now have approximately 2,000 acres of good farming land and pasture land. They follow the pattern of most land owners, in that they grow wheat and small grain, and pasture a lot of good cattle in their ranching and farming program. One of the outstanding features of this efficient farm-






**Questions And Answers Of Vets**

Q—I am a disabled Korea veteran and I have received vocational training under Public Law 894. Now I want to take further training under the Korean GI Bill. To figure training time, I know I must subtract the training I've already had from 48 months. But do I count the two months during which I received subsistence after I was rehabilitated?  
 A—No. In computing your remaining entitlement for Korean GI Bill training, you do not count the two months during which you received post-rehabilitation subsistence pay.  
 Q—I am considering paying my GI insurance premiums in ad-

vance on a yearly basis. What would be done with the money in case anything happened to me before my yearly payment had been applied to premiums?  
 A—The money that had not yet been applied to premiums would be refunded to your beneficiary, in a lump sum.  
 Q—I am a veteran drawing a VA pension for a non-service-connected disability. Part of my living costs are being borne by a relative. Must I consider the value of these living costs as income, for pension purposes?  
 A—No. The value of maintenance, furnished by your relative, need not be considered as income, for VA pension purposes.  
 Q—I am taking on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill. Re-

cently my State Approving Agency lengthened my training program. Will I receive GI training allowances for this extension?  
 A—No. Under the law, GI training allowances may not be authorized for such extensions of GI job training programs.  
**Funds for Texas Projects**  
 The Senate last week passed the 1 billion 800 million dollar appropriation bill which includes many river, harbour, and flood control appropriations for Texas. In its final form the bill includes construction funds for the Corpus Christi Bridge in an amount of \$1,500,000, the Dallas Floodways \$2,690,000, the Houston Ship Channel \$500,000 for the Texarkana Reservoir, \$1,500,000 for McGee Bend Dam, and \$340,000 for Canyon Reservoir.

Survey funds are provided for Lake Liberty, Port Mansfield, the San Bernard River, Buffalo, Bayou, a flood control project at Ozona, Trinity Bay Soil Conservation District, Richland, Chambers and Cedar Creek, Waco Reservoir, Navarro Mills Reservoir, Guadalupe River channel improvements.  
**Ferrell's Bridge Dam and Reservoir**  
 The Senate reinstated a \$2,450,000 appropriation for construction of Ferrell's Bridge Dam which had been eliminated in the House because of the failure to complete a contract between the Corps of Engineers and the local water district concerning an addition to the dam to impound

water for local use. The Senate recently passed a bill sponsored by Senator Johnson and myself which will eliminate this difficulty.  
 Also last week it was determined that a bill to provide authority for the construction of the Cooper Dam and Reservoir on the South Sulphur River would be considered by the Senate Committee on Public Works on either July 11, or 12, 1955. We will make every effort to secure prompt passage of this bill both in the Committee and on the floor of the Senate before Congress adjourns. The House passed without a dissenting vote a bill to allow this construction which was sponsored by Congressman Wright Patman.

**Hornflies Are Costly But Easily Controlled**

College Station, July — Hornflies a problem on livestock this time of year—are causing many producers to lose 20 to 30 pounds of beef per animal annually. But the pest can be controlled with simple steps and nominal costs.

About half the size of ordinary housefly, hornflies suck the blood of livestock causing irritation which leads to loss of weight, indigestion and other disorders, explains Dr. F. M. Fuller, extension entomologist.

Sprays of 5 (five-tenths) percent DDT, toxaphene or methoxychlor are recommended for hornfly control. Any type hand or power sprayer is effective in making applications which should remain potent to the flies for three weeks or longer.

While some producers are using cable type rubbing devices, Fuller believes a good spray program gives much better control of the costly pests.

**Ways To Save On Water**

Do you have a little drip in your home? It's costing you money—perhaps more than you think, says the editors of *Changing Times*, The Kiplinger Magazine.

In a day, the steadily dripping faucet can waste almost as much water as one member of the family will use during that day.

Saving water is mainly a matter of thinking about the subject whenever you turn on a faucet. Here are some suggestions on ways to save.

Showers usually require 25 gallons of water—baths, 36. Reduce these figures by turning off the shower while soaping and turning it on again to rinse and save 15 gallons. Substitute a partly filled tub for a full one and save 16 gallons.

Washing dishes under running water can use up to 30 gallons per meal. You can save by using a dishpan or sinkstopper.

Letting the water run all the time you are brushing your teeth is wasteful.

Use the basin instead of the shower for a shampoo.

Turn off the hot-water faucet when shaving and save up to 25 gallons of water.

It is usually best to keep your water heater on an even setting.

If you want to know whether you're using the average amount of water, read your meter at the beginning and end of a representative period and calculate your consumption per person per day. If its 25 to 35 gallons, that's pretty good. Fifty is about average. Anything above that is too high for household use.

**Suggestions Offered On Planting Small Grains**

College Station, August—Four items should now be receiving attention from farmers who expect to make plantings of small grain this fall. According to Ben R. Spears, extension agronomist, the four are selection of the area to be planted; taking and sending to a soil testing laboratory a soil sample from the selected field or fields and buying the fertilizer needed; choosing the best adapted variety along with a source of seed and preparation of the seed-bed.

Spears in commenting on the first recommends planting the crop on land which was not in small grain last year. Rotation, he says, will help control insects and soil borne diseases. This means better yields and quality in the grain produced.

The only sure way to know what plant foods are needed to make the crop most productive is to have an analysis made of the soil on which it is to be grown.

"Take the guess out of fertilizer requirements by soil testing," says Spears. Plant food deficiencies are often confused with insect in-

jury, and research has shown that grazing benefits as well as grain yields can be greatly increased through the use of the proper kinds and amounts of fertilizers.

New varieties of small grains adapted to specific areas have been developed by research and Spears recommends that farmers contact their local county agents for the latest information on varieties for their area and also sources of certified planting seed. He says all planting seed should be treated with a fungi-

icide before it is planted to control seedling and seed and soil borne diseases.

By preparing the land early, the seedbed has time to settle and catch and hold moisture, says Spears. Between now and planting time, he advises only tillage sufficient to control weed growth.

Oats may be dry-planted but it is a bit hazardous to follow this practice in seeding barley and wheat, says the specialist. Finally, he suggests a visit with the local county agent for the latest in-

formation on small grain production problems.
