## Mrs. Herman Mitchell Is Winner In National Hot Point Contest

Mrs. Herman Mitchell, 216 Dillon Street, Spearman, Texas has won a pushbutton range in Hotpoint's \$2,000,000 Golden Anniversary national contest.

Mr. W. E. Bratton, manager of Community Public Service Company, Spearman local Hotpoint dealer, said official contest judges in Chicago selected Mrs. Mitchell's name yesterday as having the best dealer prize entry from this immediate area.

Community Public Service Company sponsored the Spearman contest as part of the appliance company's national Anniversary celebration. Other first, second and third prizes now being awarded to families in the United States and Hawaii include four completely furnished electric homes, 50 pushbutton kitchen laundries and almost 5,000 major appliances.

Mr. Bratton said the Hotpoint contest, largest of its kind ever sponsored by a major appliance company, was specially designed to dramatize 50 years of progress in pushbutton electric living. He pointed out that Hotpoint got its name from the first electric iron "with the hot point" and said that the company later pioneered the world's first electric range and fully automatic dishwasher. He predicted that with increased public demand for electric home appliances and the expected availability of atomic power, new homes 25 to 50 years from now will be operated completely with electricity.

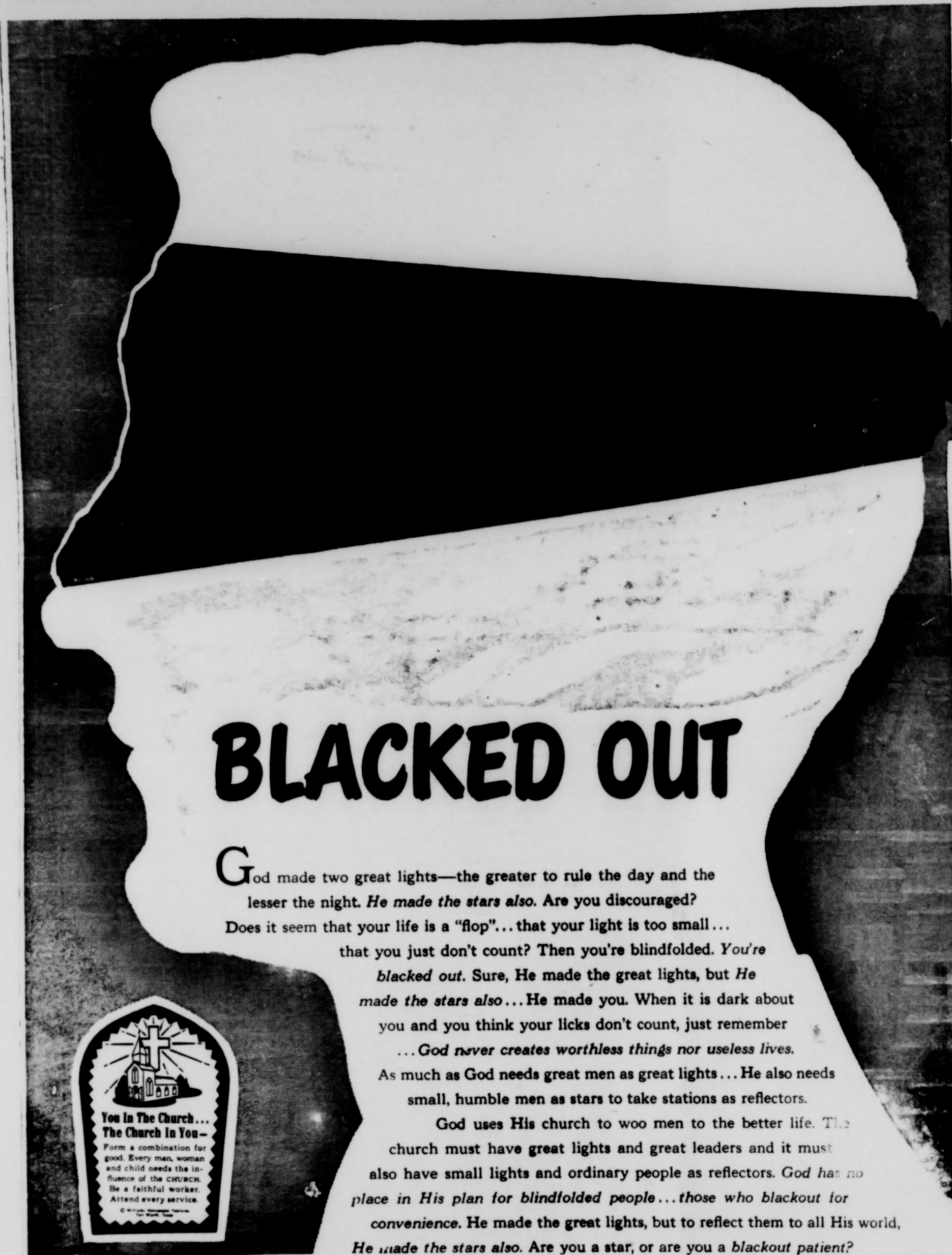

HOME THAT OF MR. AND MRS. TOM  
AND MR. AND MRS. JACK HENSON WEST

In the Mystery farm for last week you will note that there are included in the picture. The home a little to the left of the picture is that of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Henson. The larger background is the beautiful residence of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Dozier.

The Mystery Farm this week is indeed very interesting. It is the story of an old country boy raised to manhood in Cooke County, Texas, who did not know any better than to give his money. Well! he did have enough KNOW HOW to give and beautiful native girl of the Panhandle of Texas in to name to the Panhandle of Texas with his parents, (now deceased) and Mrs. J. A. Dozier. This happened back in 1916, and the family moved to Sherman county. Less than 3 years later, the family moved to Walker Homestead in Hansford county. (This is the home place of Orville Walker). This was a break for Tom, since he became Hazel Jasper, and in 1924 he persuaded her to marry him. Hazel was at Perryton, or Old Ochiltree. The next smart thing that

Tom Dozier did, was to purchase two and a half sections of land which was known as the Old Sul Spivey homestead. Here is a bit of Hansford history. Sul Spivey was the only casualty from Hansford county in the First World War and one of the outstanding young men of the North Plains area. He had started his future at the farm a few miles West of Gruver. To this day there is a large pear tree that last year harvested two and a half bushels of pears. The tree was planted by the World War I Hero, Sul Spivey. The old cement well house that was built in 1915 still stands as a monument to the work of Sul Spivey. Most interesting in the abstract covering the Spivey place is the facts shown that Sul Spivey filed on much of the land and traded saddle horses for the remainder of the very attractive Mystery farm.

Mr. and Mrs. Dozier settled down on their Mystery farm in a small house that was part of the Old Hotel that was moved from Lucern. The hotel was built to attract Eastern folk to this area when the Panhandle was first settled. This residence burned in 1945 and Mr. and Mrs. Dozier built their very outstanding full basement 4 bed room modern home at the farm. This is truly a very comfortable and attractive home and shows the thought placed into the planning of a real future.

In-the-meantime, a very attractive daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dozier's had grown to young womanhood, and married Jack Henson in 1947. The young folk lived at the first Mystery Farm residence for a few months and then the second residence was built, the attractive two bed room modern home. This building was

completed early in 1948, and the Jack Henson's have lived in their new home during these years that they have helped to operate the Mystery farm.

The pride and joy of the Mystery farm generation is two grand sons (and of course sons). They are Tommie Henson, 4 year old son and Danny Henson, 2 year old sons of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Henson. At the time the Doziers first moved to the Mystery Farm there were 170 acres of the home place in cultivation. Tom and his son-in-law have brought the entire two and a half sections of land into cultivation, and operate a typical small grain and cattle farm. They have been very successful, as indicated by the fact that this year in the drought cycle weather they harvested an average of 13 bushels of wheat on a half section of the Mystery farm. 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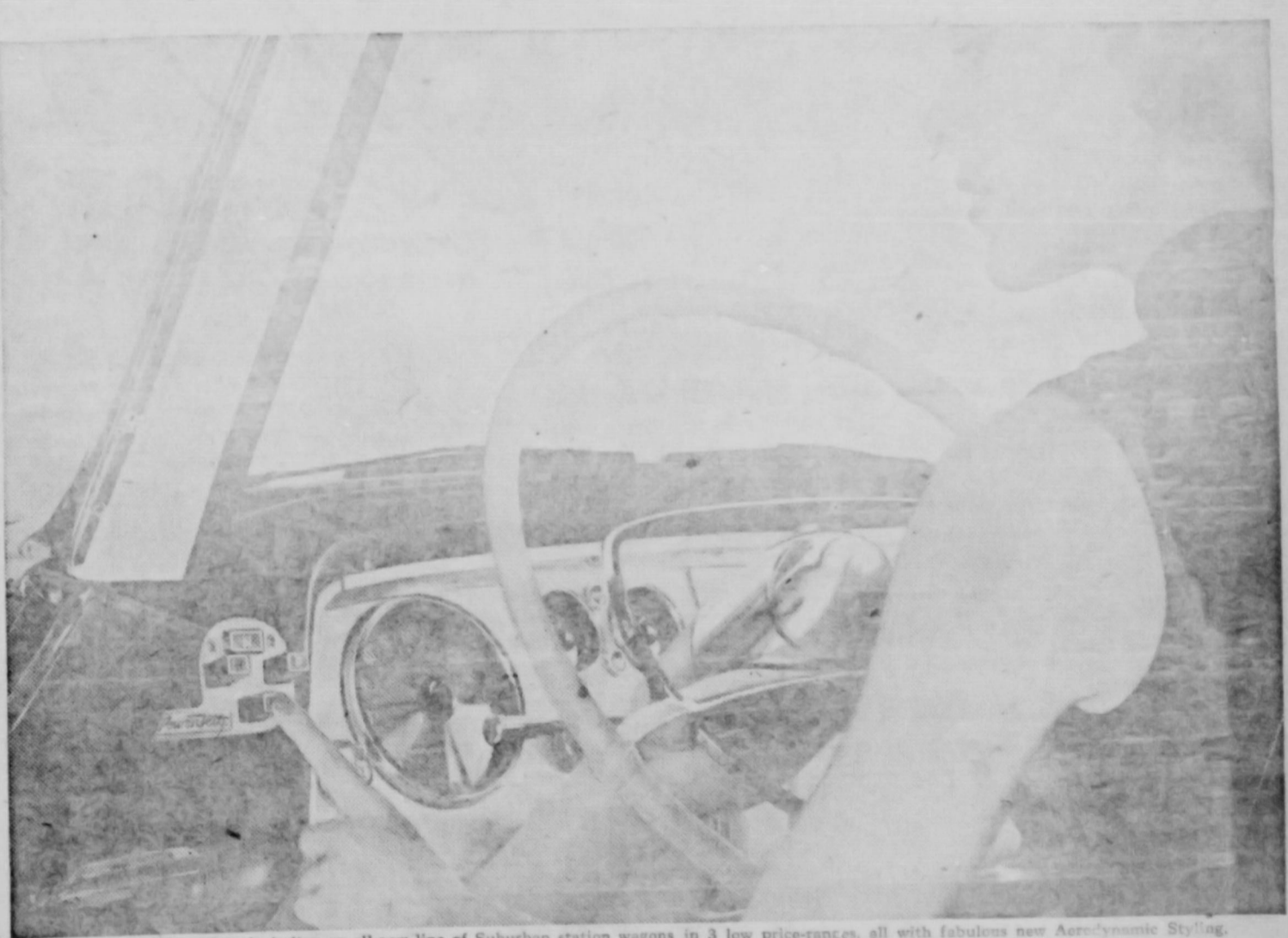

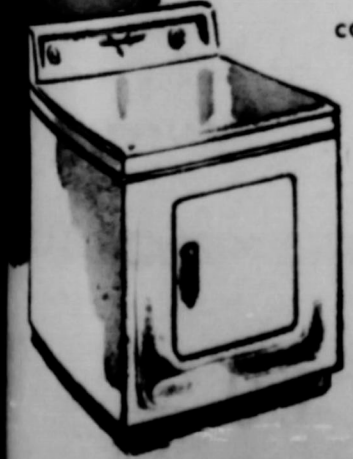

**Hansford County May Have More Beef Cattle Than Any County In Texas**

This is still cow country! Hansford county, which has long been noted as the outstanding certified wheat county in the world, has suddenly been tabbed with a new name. The best dad-gum-state in the union.

Many cattle men are saying now, that Hansford county has more cattle than has ever been in the county, considering that there just isn't hardly any wheat pasture to brag about, but there is a lot of stalks in the county and the cattle men are filling up the stalk fields fairly fast. Although, there are still some stalk fields available, the heavy freeze Sunday night will certainly make the fields less tempting to the cattle. It seems that after a freeze the stalks lose their green tasty flavor.

In any event, Hansford county has had to change their general procedure, from wheat farming to cattle, feed and maize. It is the general opinion of most farmers and ranchers, that a period of say five or ten years, if more land will be used for cattle feed, pasture, etc., the income will almost double-up for the land-owners, or operators.

Diversification is the key-word in modern farming. Plant something that the cattle can eat, after the drought, hail and bugs get through with it. In any event, the farmer or rancher who runs livestock in with his farming, has the better chance of survival according to the records.

These funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency along with funds appropriated by Congress are used by farmers to buy, develop and operate family-type farms.

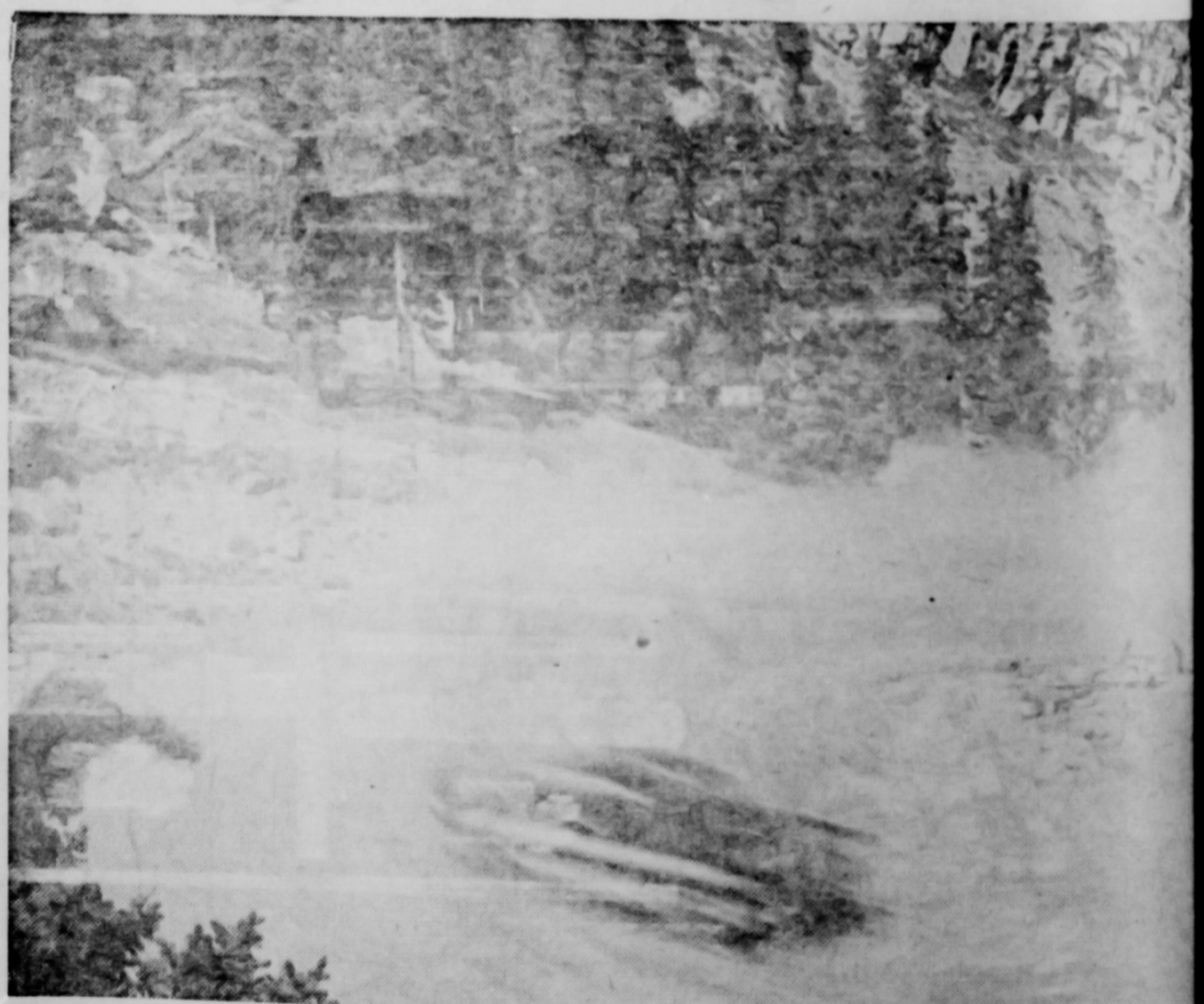
