## Schools Of County Is At All-Time High For 1955

Reflecting the steady growth of population of Hansford county since Oil and irrigation have become important factors in our county economy, enrollment in all schools of the county hit an all time high of 1082. The most pronounced increase in student enrollment was recorded at Spearman where 32 more high school pupils were enrolled this year and some 15 additional grade school students were of record.

### Spearman Jumps To Enrollment Of 575 Pupils

With a census figure of 540 students in the Spearman area, enrollment as of Tuesday noon of this week shows that 575 students had enrolled in the Spearman schools.

Most of this increase in enrollment over past years was caused by the increase in population in the Spearman area. A few students came to this school as result of transfers from other areas.

### Gruver School Enrollment Hits Alltime High For 1955 - 1956 Year

According to information from Superintendent Dooley of the Gruver school system the initial enrollment of the Gruver schools recorded the largest number of students ever enrolled at Gruver, and due to the fact that the Phillips Plant Labor Day holiday was extended to include Tuesday, an even larger enrollment is expected. The total elementary school enrollment up to Monday noon was 273 pupils with some 8 or 9 additional pupils enrolled Tuesday, but not included in the initial enrollment. The total high school enrollment was 128 at Tuesday noon, with expectations for additional high school students during the remainder of the week.

The regular census for the Gruver district listed only 392 students, thus the school has 10 more students than the census call for.

College Station, August - Kear-  
ney, a new and unusually cold  
and green-bug resistant barley  
for the High Plains area of Texas,  
will be available to growers for  
1955 plantings.

The variety was developed by  
the Nebraska Agricultural Experi-  
ment Station. Tests covering its  
adaptation and resistance to green-  
bugs have been conducted at the  
Amarillo Experiment Station at  
Bushland. It is recommended for  
the area west of the Caprock and  
from Lubbock north through the  
Panhandle.

percent at the Amarillo station in  
1951 compared with 59 and 0 for  
Reno and Cordova, respectively.  
It is a true winter type barley  
and will head normally only from  
fall plantings.

It matures later and grows taller  
than most other commercial  
varieties grown on the High  
Plains. Kearney has outyielded  
Reno and Ward but in seasons  
when winter survival is not a  
factor, less hardy varieties, such  
as cordova, may yield more.

The new variety probably will  
produce less early fall grazing  
than the upriga growing tender  
varieties but because of its super-  
ior winter-hardiness, should be  
more suitable for the High Plains  
and spring grazing on the High Plains.  
Its test weight compares favorably  
with other varieties.

Seed were released to com-  
mercial and certified growers in  
the fall of 1954 and limited quan-  
tities will be available to farmers

for 1955 fall plantings. No seed  
will be available to farmers from  
the Texas Agricultural Experi-  
ment Station. Foundation seed  
may be obtained from the Nebra-  
ska Station at Lincoln for the  
production of certified seed.

### FOLLOW THESE EASY STEPS TO BETTER LIGHT FOR HOME STUDY

Good study lighting reduces eyestrain and fatigue... aids concentration... helps make homework easier. Here are five easy steps to better study lighting:

- 1 Select a table lamp tall enough to light entire work area. Lower edge of shade should be 15" from desk top.
- 2 Shade should be 16" in diameter and should be light in color, but not too transparent.
- 3 Use a 150-watt bulb with a diffusing bowl to soften the light. (If lamp has no diffusing bowl, use a 150-watt white indirect bulb which has its own built-in diffusor.)
- 4 Place lamp 15 inches to left of work center and 12 inches from front of desk.
- 5 Cover desk with a large pastel blotter to absorb indirect glare - and place desk against a light-colored wall to reflect more light on the work.

### Tri-State Fair Opens Sept. 19

Citizens of the Golden Spread area may be justifiably proud of their region's most extravagant and spectacular Tri-State Fair for 1955 when the annual exposition opens in Amarillo Monday, Sept. 19 to continue through Saturday, Sept. 24.

Bigger, Better, more exciting than ever before is the promise fair officials have proclaimed for the 31st week-long program of amusements, livestock, poultry, home economics, culinary, textile, arts, rabbit shows and similar events designed to please everybody.

Holiday on Ice, the world's

most fabulous, breath taking ice spectacle, will present eight indoor performances in spacious Fair Coliseum, Monday through Saturday nights, with matinees on Friday and Saturday afternoons.

Two featured free acts will be presented twice daily on the fair grounds. Bill Atterbury's Sky Kings, who perform on sway poles 100 feet above the ground, are certain to please every fair patron, regardless of age. This death-defying act has never before been seen in this section.

Jack Andrews, his trained mule and Brahma bull, are being re-popular demand after an absence of two years.

New and old-time favorites are

among the more than 20 rides and scores of gaudy carnival attractions to be seen on this year's Tri-State Fair midway setup by Bill Hames Greater Shows, the southwest's largest railroad show.

Another first for this year's Tri-State Fair will be the Shelton Pony Show. The remarkable interest that almost all persons have in these small animals is expected to be reflected in this added attraction.

The thousands of persons throughout the Tri-State are who like to sing just for the fun of it will welcome the news that this year's fair again will feature a Country Singing Convention. This second annual event will be held only on Saturday afternoon Sept. 24 in the Sports Arena, beginning at

1 o'clock. There will be no charge to the Sports Arena for either participants or listeners.

Visitors to this year's fair will see major improvements in the exposition grounds and facilities, with increased parking room inside the fair plant. Among improvements is a \$125,000 addition to Fair Park Coliseum, slated for completion in time for the fair.

The 1955 Tri-State Fair will open with a gigantic parade along Amarillo's Polk Street at 11 o'clock Monday morning, Sept. 19. More than 200 visiting high school bands from communities throughout the Golden Spread region will join with Amarillo school bands, the Amarillo Air Force Band, the Shrine Drum & Bugle Corps, and the Shrine's Circus Band, to pro-

vide music for the initial spectacle.

Davy Crockett has a unit reserved for this year's parade, which will also feature 1000 uniformed troops from AAFB, and hundreds of Army, Marine, Navy, ROTC, National Guard and other military reserve units.

Numerous cities however, will not send organized delegations, headed by their high school bands, to the fair until later in the week.

Advance entries in the livestock, swine, poultry, rabbit, women's home demonstration club and county exhibits are all an all-time high in advance of the fair's opening. Attendance this year is expected to keep pace with all previous fairs, which annually

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# Washington News Letter From Congressman Walter Rogers

August 26, 1955  
To The People Of The 18th District:  
**THE PANHANDLE LOOKS GOOD**  
The Texas Panhandle has always been a sort of garden spot when we had a little rain. That is exactly what it looks like today in the several sections which I had the good fortune to visit. The time element enters into the picture and prevents me from getting every place as quickly as I would like, but we have seen quite a bit of it and hope to get over the rest of it before long. Irrigation is cropping up all over the Panhandle and it can certainly change the picture. I was down in Hall County the other day and things looked mighty good, both the irrigated and the dry land. Wheeler County is another place I had a chance to visit and it looks equally good. However, we do need a good rain, and I have filed application for a four-inch "soaker," to be delivered over a period of about ten days. If this application is approved, we will hope that there will be no red tape in the delivery of the rain.

I have talked to people from every section of the Panhandle and get good reports on the prospects from all quarters. Of course, there are some exceptions, but we hope these will straighten out in the next 30 to 60 days. It is too bad that the heavy rains that occurred in the eastern part of our country could not have been divided up over the whole country. Instead of billions of dollars worth of damage, there would be billions of dollars worth of benefits. Worrying about getting rain much, like those poor folks did, may not be as bad as getting too much. One of my friends here said that if those rains had come out here during the drought, the land would have soaked up the water so fast that it would have seemed like a mere sprinkle.

Most of the towns are looking fine. There are some vacancies in some of the cities that are dependent primarily upon agriculture. We hope that this situation will be changed so that these cities can continue to prosper as they have in the past. Many of the larger towns seem to be growing by leaps and bounds. We have plenty of room for industry in this section of the country and hope that we can make it inviting to them.

It does you good to see the country expanding like this Panhandle section. Nothing is better medicine against communism than an expanding economy of a free people. We concern ourselves with many worries, but everything is going to work out fine and I think the picture will grow better as we move along.

**Back In Washington For Committee Work.**  
We will be on our way back to Washington when you get this letter. We have to get the children back in school and also have to get set for the committee work that has to be done this fall preparatory to the next session of Congress. One of the committees on which I serve is the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, which has jurisdiction over transportation in this country. The President has appointed a committee of Cabinet level to make a report on the transportation situation. The committee on which I serve will work in cooperation with that Cabinet committee in trying to work out the many difficulties that will plague the transportation industry in our country. This will require extensive hearings for which there is not sufficient time during a session of Congress. There is also a concern with air transportation, problem incidental to this country, which is also within the jurisdiction of this particular committee.

The requirements for information concerning these problems are great and we must get it together so that proper legislation can be enacted to insure a continued expansion of our economy under the free enterprise system. As soon as possible after these investigations are concluded, I will, of course, be back in the district and can be reached at 45631 in Pampa, Texas.

The children certainly had a wonderful time and are headed back for Washington most reluctantly. Their many good friends were very kind to them and they are deeply appreciative. Mrs. Rogers and I are most humble in our deep appreciation for the many courtesies extended, and we hope that the opportunity will occur at an early date for us to reciprocate.

The respite from the controversial issues will be short, because many of them are not settled and must be faced during the early days of the next session. Some that are left pending are the natural gas bill (it passed the House but not the Senate), the highway bill, the school construction bill, additional legislation concerning the polio vaccine and several others. In addition there will be new ones. One of these will be the surface transportation issue. Much pressure is being built up in this particular segment of the economy and a tough conflict will probably ensue. In any event the respite is most welcome, because it will give all the members a chance to re-evaluate the problems and to obtain the grass roots advice on them that is so essential to their proper solution. They will be refreshed both mentally and physically for the renewed attack on these problems in January.

**Operation Deep Freeze**  
In association with several other Members of Congress, I had very pleasant visit with Admiral Richard E. Byrd, of both North and South Pole fame, and a group of those who have worked closely with him in his explorations. The Admiral expects to return to the South Pole in connection with the Antarctic Expedition announced by the President on March 28th. The expedition is to be in conjunction with the Internationally Geophysical Year, a cooperative world-wide effort. A thorough briefing on the subject clearly points up the tremendous importance of Antarctica. The great mysteries that have been locked in this icebound continent may prove to be the greatest boon to mankind in future generations. As Dr. Siple, one of the leaders in these expeditions puts it of specific interest in Antarctica:

"The intensity of the electromagnetic phenomena, such as those related to geomagnetism, aurora and airglow, cosmic rays, ionospheric physics, and solar activity, are directly or indirectly influenced by the earth's magnetic and geomagnetic poles. Evidence is inconclusive that the observed responses are similar at both poles, and it is scientifically desirable to make simultaneous observations for comparative and analytic reasons and to check theories on unipolar evidence."  
You can see from this clear and concise treatment of the mat-

ter that all is not yet known. Incidentally, such portions of Antarctica as would be claimed by the USA, would be under the jurisdiction of the Department of Interior as public lands. This, of course, would come under the jurisdiction of one of my committees, to wit, the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs. After viewing some of the pictures of this continent and hearing of the hardships encountered by the men, I advised Admiral Byrd that I did not think he need expect any Congressional visitors in that area until things warm up a bit. He told me that the discoveries proved that this area was at one time tropical, and that present indications point toward a warming up cycle. However, this will require quite a few years, say several thousand.

**A Friend Of Man**  
The nation came off the loser when Bob Anderson, Deputy Secretary of Defense, terminated his government service. I have known Bob for many years. He is an outstanding fellow who has been blessed with a brilliant mind and many qualities and abilities that the average man did not get. His crowning glory lies in the fact that he has always employed these characteristics and fine qualities for the betterment and benefit of his fellow man and not his own personal purposes. We are sorry to see Bob leave and wish him the greatest success in his personal life that we know he is entitled to enjoy.

**Something To Keep In Mind**  
Oliver Wendell Holmes once said, "To be seventy years young is sometimes more cheerful and hopeful than to be forty years old". This sound like a good old Panhandle saying to me.

## New Hybrid Spanish Available For Fall Plantings

College Station, Sept. Seed of Early Hybrid 7, a new variety of spinach resistant to blue-mold and blight, will be available in limited quantity for commercial planting this fall. This announcement was made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.  
The hybrid was developed by the USDA and tested by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Sta-

tion. It is semi-compact, dark green, and upright, which makes it well suited to machine harvesting. Since the variety develops fast and bolts easily, it is not generally satisfactory as a spring crop. It should be planted in the fall when the short cool days tend to suppress bolting and insure top yields.

Early Hybrid 7 yields 13.5 to 19.6 tons an acre as a fall crop and 9.7 tons as a spring crop in tests during 1953-54 in Southern Texas and in the Arkansas Valley of Arkansas. Yields of commonly grown varieties ranged from 5.2 to 14.8 tons an acre in the fall and 3.7 to 7.1 tons in the spring. The new hybrid is a cross between blue-mold resistant variety and Virginia Savoy, a blight resistant spinach. The hybrid is resistant to both diseases but under epidemic conditions, a few plants may become diseased.  
Tests have shown the new hybrid to be satisfactory for canning and freezing and has been approved by some shippers for fresh shipments. Foundation seed was first released for increase in 1954. The USDA announcement said it is planned to distribute foundation seed this fall to additional spinach seed growers who can produce hybrid seed.

Dallas —Up—The new supersonic jet day fighter of Chance Vought Aircraft was described by company officials Friday as the "world's fastest Navy fighter." It is named the "Crusader" and is undergoing final tests in California.

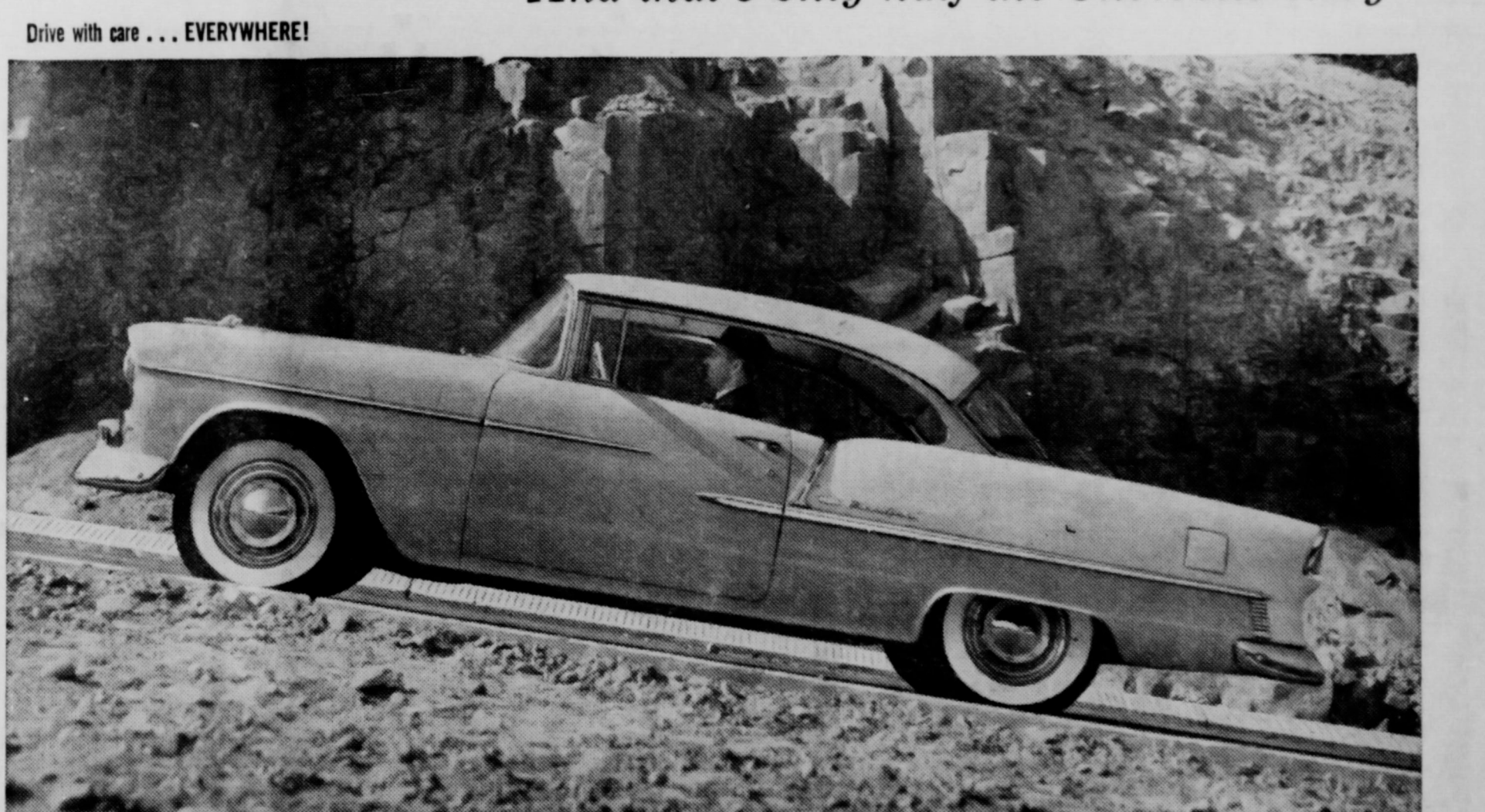

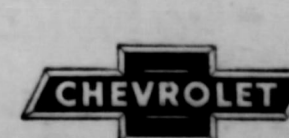

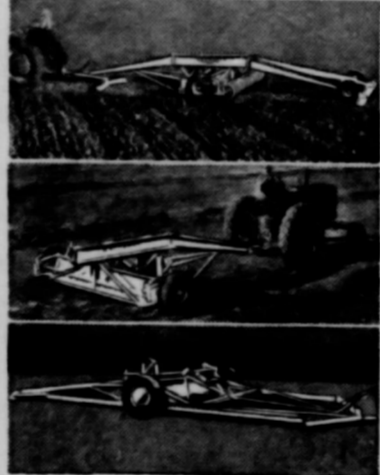

### Little Lady Defies USDA

HUMMELTOWN, Pa., Sept. 2—UP—Elsie Mumma, a spunky, 55-year-old lady farmer who calls the U. S. wheat quota system unGodly vowed Friday to shoot the next federal inspector to set foot on her land.

She was served with a federal summons this week to appear in U. S. district court on a \$403.20 penalty for growing 18 acres more wheat than allowed on her 70-acre farm.

"My ancestors pioneered this land in 1624," she told the court in an answer mailed to Scranton, "and as long as I own the land, and pay the taxes, pay my debts, and ask for no aid from the government, the land is mine, to have, to hold, to govern, to protect, to plant, to harvest, and no one has a right to enter upon the land without my permission or without a warrant of law, and I will die to defend my right."

Miss Mumma, who is five-feet-two and blue-eyed, said she had fought a state highway department attempt to take part of her land for a by-pass and had successfully defeated a school board attempt to "take 26 of my 60 acres."

"And now they have come at me by two and three from the federal government. And if they set foot on my land again, I'll shoot them so help me God," she said.

She said USDA agents had surveyed her farm by air when she refused them permission to measure her fields.

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"I have never voted for wheat quotas. We turned them down in Pennsylvania two-to-one, but we're at the mercy of the western states. But I will never be party to such unGodliness." Miss Mumma, who raises cattle, sheep, geese, ducks and chickens, said she told the deputy U. S. marshal who served the summons "I shall never be able to sing again. 'Land of the Free and Home of the Brave' means freedom."
