





Folks stopped at Farwell to spend the night or water their stock or mules at the dug well right in the back yard of the Mystery Farm home. Squire Maupin filled up the well many years ago, but he said that for many years he found printers type scattered around his farm. The Town of Farwell was erased by a cyclone back younder in the early days and the newspaper was blown hither and yonder. The town was never rebuilt after the cyclone.


