## Two Die In Collision Monday Fire Consumes Stationwagon!

### FUNERAL RITES HELD FOR MR. AND MRS. THOMAS BROWN JULY 31ST. AT 2:00 P. M.

The entire City of Spearman was in a state of Shock Tuesday, as result of a terrible collision, South of Spearman, Monday night, that took the life of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown. The accident occurred about 5 miles South, near the Garnett Irrigation well, at an intersection of two dirt roads.

Injured are Brown's infant son, Douglas; Mrs. Billie Brown, 25 of Guyton; her two sons, Kelly 4, and David 2, and the driver of the pick-up, 50 year old Glen Bennett of Spearman.

Surviving without serious injuries is Mrs. Brown's husband, Raymond Brown. He was driver of the 1957 station wagon. Thomas Brown, and Raymond Brown, whose families were traveling together in the station wagon were cousins.

The Brown families were enroute to the Tommy Brown farm home located a mile South of the Jack Taylor farm home. Mr. Bennett was also enroute to his home after visiting the Clint Bennett West place.

The Sheriff Department reported that the Brown vehicle was hit broadside at the intersection of the two dirt roads four miles South of Spearman at about 9:00 p. m. Monday night. All persons from both vehicles were apparently thrown from the wreckage, as the station wagon and pick-up virtually exploded from concussion. It is a miracle that anyone survived the wreck.

The stationwagon was turned over twice and burned. The 1954 model pick-up truck remained upright. Mrs. Thomas Brown was pinned under the station wagon and was the only one burned.

Raymond Brown, who was apparently knocked-out only temporarily, reported that he moved the injured from near the burning stationwagon and then walked to the farm home of Jack Taylor about a quarter of a mile away. Sheriff Cooke credits Raymond Brown with possibly saving the lives of those injured by his quick action immediately after the accident. However, Raymond was considerably discouraged as the Taylor home place was vacant at the time and Brown then walked more than a mile to Highway 15, where he summoned help from Francis Jones who was driving a station wagon.

Francis and Brown returned to the scene of the accident where the dead and injured were loaded into Jones vehicle and rushed to Hansford hospital here in Spearman.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown were pronounced dead on arrival. Mrs. Billie Brown was listed in critical condition with a severe back injury and was transferred to Amarillo to be under the care of a Specialist.

Survivors of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown include their three children, Wesley 5, Kathi 3, and Douglas, the nine month old baby, in the accident. Brown also is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Brown of Spearman, and his grandmother, Mrs. T. H. Coffin of Pampa. Mrs. Brown is survived by her mother, Mrs. Lillian Morris, and a sister, Judy Morris, both of Ponca City, Okla.; a brother, Kenneth Bennett, and her father, Ben Bennett, both of Gladewater, Texas.

**BAPTISTS BELIEVE... BELIEVERS HAVE EQUAL PRIVILEGES IN THE CHURCH**

There is no debate over woman's suffrage or legal age limits within a Baptist church. There is no dispute over the balance of power between ministers and laymen. These matters are settled because of what the New Testament teaches on the place of the individual believer.

Why? Because all believers, regardless of age, sex, or occupation, are equal in privileges in a true New Testament Church, in which "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female: for ye are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28).

When a Baptist church accepts someone into its membership, it accepts him on his own testimony about his personal, spiritual experience. It is said that when Charles Evans Hughes, Chief Justice of the United States, united by letter with a Baptist church, a Chinese laundryman also joined the church.

Every person becomes a church member by vote of all the members present. A Baptist church transacts all its business in this same democratic manner.

Every member has an equal opportunity to serve according to his willingness and ability. The primary question is "Who then is willing to consecrate his service this day unto the Lord?" (1 Chronicles 29:5). The teacher of a men's

school class who had been elected by the church, was a clerk in a store. He taught business men of ability and means, college professors, and men from various walks of life.

His church offered similar opportunities to others who were willing and able—and without regard to their wealth or social standing.

The equality of individual believers in a Baptist church makes each person important. The church assumes responsibility for instructing, training and enabling in service every member from the youngest to the oldest.

Because a Baptist church grants to every member the same rights and privileges, it provides all members with Bible teaching. It instructs them in the way of righteousness and social and civic duties.

Many Baptist churches are far ahead of their communities in meeting the needs of youth. Baptists also make adequate provision for older people and for babies in their Sunday schools and other church services.

Baptist churches take seriously their responsibility for training each and every member. The activities of their several organizations—the Sunday school, the Training Union, the men's Brotherhood, the Woman's Missionary Union—provide this.

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court that on said date, to-wit: March 11, 1957, by order duly passed and entered of record, this Court set said petition down for hearing before the Commissioners' Court, at a session thereof to be held in the Commissioners' Courtroom in the Courthouse in the City of Spearman, Texas, on the 28th day of March, 1957 at 10:00 o'clock A. M. which was not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the aforesaid order setting such petition down for hearing; and

Texas A & M Discov. Means More Income For Poultry Producers

College Station, March—Adding a quarter's worth of molybdenum to 2,000,000 pounds of poultry feed can mean an extra \$18,000 worth of chickens at market time, scientists at the Poultry Science Department at Texas A. & M. College have discovered.

The extra two-bits would go to an ounce of molybdenum, one of the "trace" minerals in common supply, necessary for plant life, inexpensive and now proved capable of producing 15 percent larger birds than those whose diets lack the mineral.

This "add-a-quarter-and-get-back \$10,000" story figures this way: It takes about 1,000 tons of feed to get 200,000 chickens to market. Figuring a 15 percent increase in weight in the chickens getting adequate molybdenum in their feed, the live weight added would be \$9,000 pounds. At 20c a pound live weight, this means an extra \$18,000 for somebody.

Poultry Science research has found that molybdenum has a high tolerance, too before becoming toxic. You have to feed about 10,500 times too much before it damages the birds, by causing a decrease in weight.

Molybdenum is only one of a number of minerals being checked out in research at Texas A. & M. College to determine the effects of adding aluminum, arsenic, barium, boron, cadmium, chromium, cobalt, copper, silver, iron, lead, nickel, silicon, titanium, tin, tungsten and zinc to poultry diets—all without significant response. Still to go are about 60 minerals and combinations.

This research is being conducted through funds provided by the Welch Foundation of Houston. The Foundation has provided \$30,000 to the college department for research on determination and isolation of new vitamins and minerals in unidentified growth factors affecting poultry.

Only this past week Cornell University, another national center of poultry research, confirmed the work done at Texas A. & M. College, which is considered one of the most significant steps in evaluating the place of minerals and their combinations in putting extra weight on poultry.

Research in this area of nutrition is, expected to find implications in other areas—in livestock feedings and possibly in human nutrition. Already, an experiment to determine the value

Beware The Rabid Dog

College Station, March — The rabid dog is a constant threat to all children, asserts Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian, especially on warm spring days when large groups of youngsters congregate in play areas. Rabies is currently a serious problem in several sections of the state, he adds, and should be a subject of real concern to pet owners everywhere.

Dr. Patterson says any warm-blooded animal is susceptible to rabies, but that it is most likely to be spread by the predator-type. Symptoms are hard to define, explains the veterinarian, but it is a good practice to suspect any animal if it loses the fear of men.

Keep under observation any suspicious animal should it bite a human, advises Dr. Patterson. If the animal is not available, the person should be placed under competent medical supervision at once.

Texas law now empowers commissioners courts to declare the county a rabies control area, Dr. Patterson says. This should extend more efficient control programs into the state's rural areas. Vaccination of all pets and strict impoundment of every stray dog are essential features of a good control program, he adds.

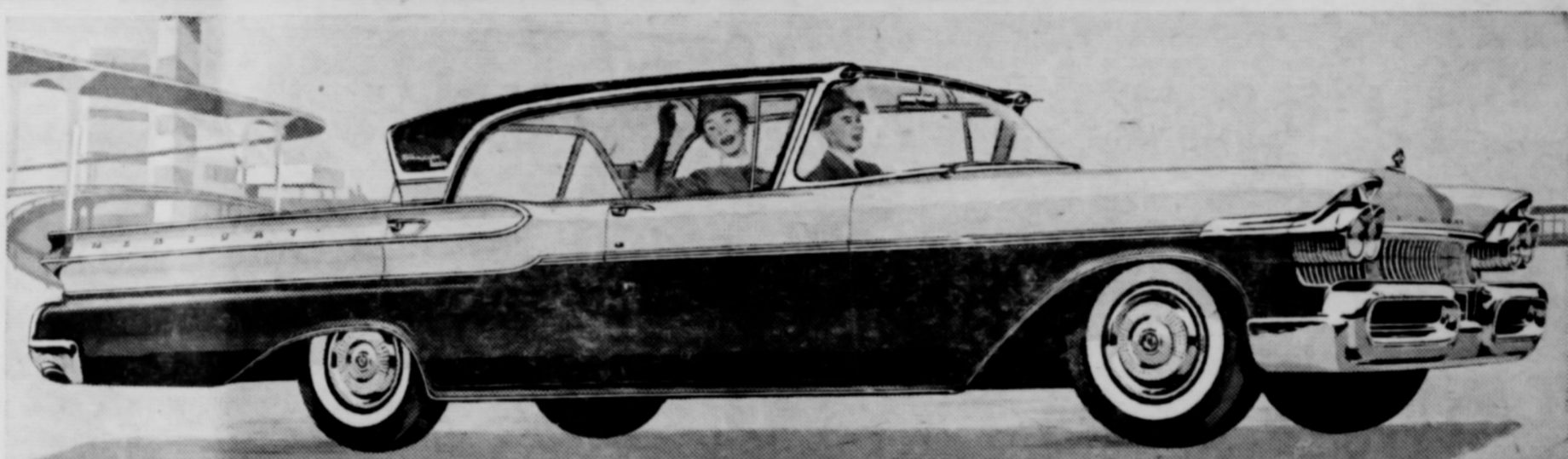
Wild animals sometimes carry the danger of rabies to farms and ranches, endangering livestock as well as farmers. Dr. Patterson warns rural people to be on the lookout for strange-acting animals, particularly foxes, coyotes, skunks, and civet cats. Pets coming in contact with any suspicious domestic or wild animals should be given a booster shot, he warns, even if already protected by a standard rabies shot.

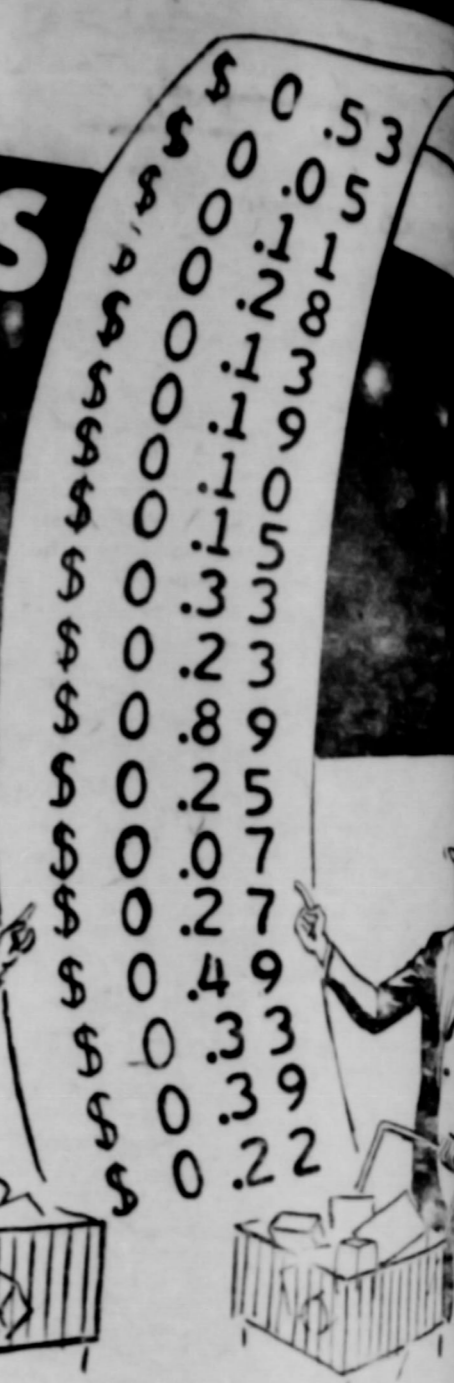

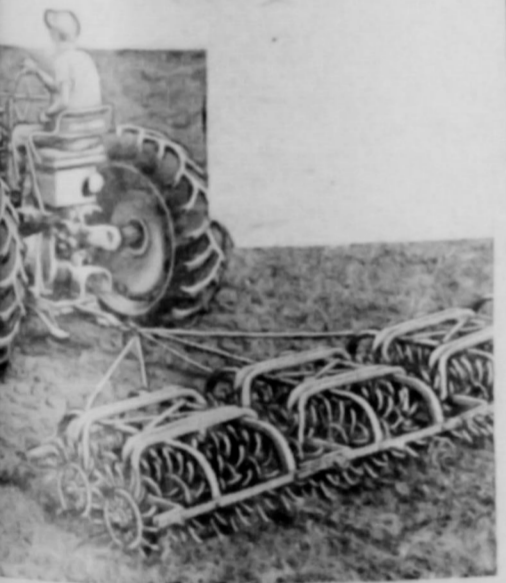

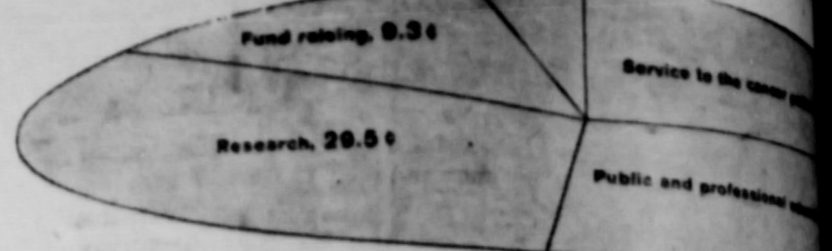
