The old cowboy knows many simple remedies on how to cure distemper on horses that was handed down to them by their grandfathers. One of the best cattle men and horse raisers in the west, had an epidemic going through his quarter horses with Veterinarians vaccinating them, some died and others were ruined as their wind was gone, and they could not stand any more hard riding. This cowboy said if you will get some goats and turn in the lot with the horses they will get well. He told him his grandfathers always kept goats with his race horses, and they never had the distemper. And they would quiet them down, and they would not be nervous when they were with the goats. In a few days he saw a short truck back up to the shoot in the lot, and the goats begin to file out. In a short time the distemper had gone from the horses that had it, and no more.

for lawns. The lawn area should be graded for proper drainage and smoothness. Sand may be added to clay soils or clay to sandy soils in order to make them suitable for lawns, says Trew. A soil test is recommended in order to know just what kinds and amounts of plant food should be added to the soil. The fertilizer should be worked into the soil by plowing or spading. The addition of organic matter will improve the tilth and water holding capacity of the soil but in new lawns, Trew recommends the use of a nitrogen fertilizer along with the organic matter to take care of the decomposition process.

Sidedress For Better Small Grain Yields

College Station, Jan.—Generally, the value of using a nitrogen fertilizer for increasing the yields of cotton and corn is well known, but according to M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist, small grain producers who fail to give their crop an application of this same plant food are passing up an opportunity to increase yields.

From now until mid-February, farmers in the area south of Waco should apply the nitrogen sidedressing. Those to the north of the area should make the application by March 1 or not later than March 15.

The specialist emphasizes that demonstrations conducted for the past several years have shown that small grain yields can be increased from 25 to 30 percent through the use of nitrogen fertilizers.

Generally, Thornton says, an application of 150 to 200 pounds of ammonium sulphate or 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate an acre is sufficient if applied within the suggested dates. The increased yields will more than pay for the plant food and labor required to put it on the crop. Too, he adds, increased yields are needed now to replenish the short stocks of farm held small grain in Texas. Of course, he says, cooperation from "mother nature" in the form of badly needed moisture will materially aid the cause of production.

Hints Offered On Establishing And Managing The Lawn

College Station, Jan.— Good lawns don't just happen. They are the product of considerable time and effort, says E. M. Trew, extension agronomist. A fertile soil, adapted grasses, and drainage along with proper watering, fertilization and mowing are essential for establishing an attractive lawn.

Seek More Teachers For Texas Schools

Superintendent H. R. Hartman, of the Spearman School District, today urged college graduates in this area to give serious consideration to opportunities available to them in the teaching profession.

Superintendent Hartman explained that the need for teachers is especially critical in some areas of the State and that more than 2,000 persons have had to be assigned to teaching positions this year on the basis of emergency teaching permits.

The Spearman Lynx met the Booker team in the Lynx gym Tuesday night for a big upset. There was a good crowd out to see the Lynx win these.

The Lynxettes had an easy time of winning their game, and it showed good sportsmanship between the two teams. Booker was far behind all the way. The score by quarters: 28-12; 44-20; 70-28; and final score 80-38. The girls broke their season record of 74 which they set by winning over Kelton in the Perryton tournament. Mary Pearson had 38 points for the Lynx as high point, and Trosper had 14 for Booker. The percentage on free throws wasn't very different: Lynxettes had 46.2 percent against the 40 percent of the Booker girls. That was the last game for the Lynxettes before district playoffs.

Extension Range Manage Program Progresses Despite Continued Drouth

College Station, Jan.—Range management demonstrations conducted last year under the supervision of local county agents involved 3,468,105 acres of Texas rangelands, reports Extension Range Specialists A. H. Walker and G. O. Hoffman.

The specialists, in their year end report, further stated that 7,751 range operators conducted demonstrations which stressed the efficiency and economy of production under drouth conditions. These demonstrations, because of the improved practices used, increased the returns or savings to the ranchman by approximately four and a quarter million dollars. Educational benefits from training meetings and field demonstrations in the form of new knowledge on accepted range practices were estimated by the specialist to have been worth another \$7000,000 to the state's ranch operators.
A total of 10,734 ranch operators in 225 Texas counties received assistance during the past year on range management problems while some 985 meetings were attended by 28,500 interested livestock producers. Field days held in the counties numbered 139,000. Flexible stocking demonstrations were conducted by 2,000 operators; 11,977 new watering facilities were constructed while more than 1,400 ranchmen used a salt distribution practice to get more uniform utilization of their range vegetation.

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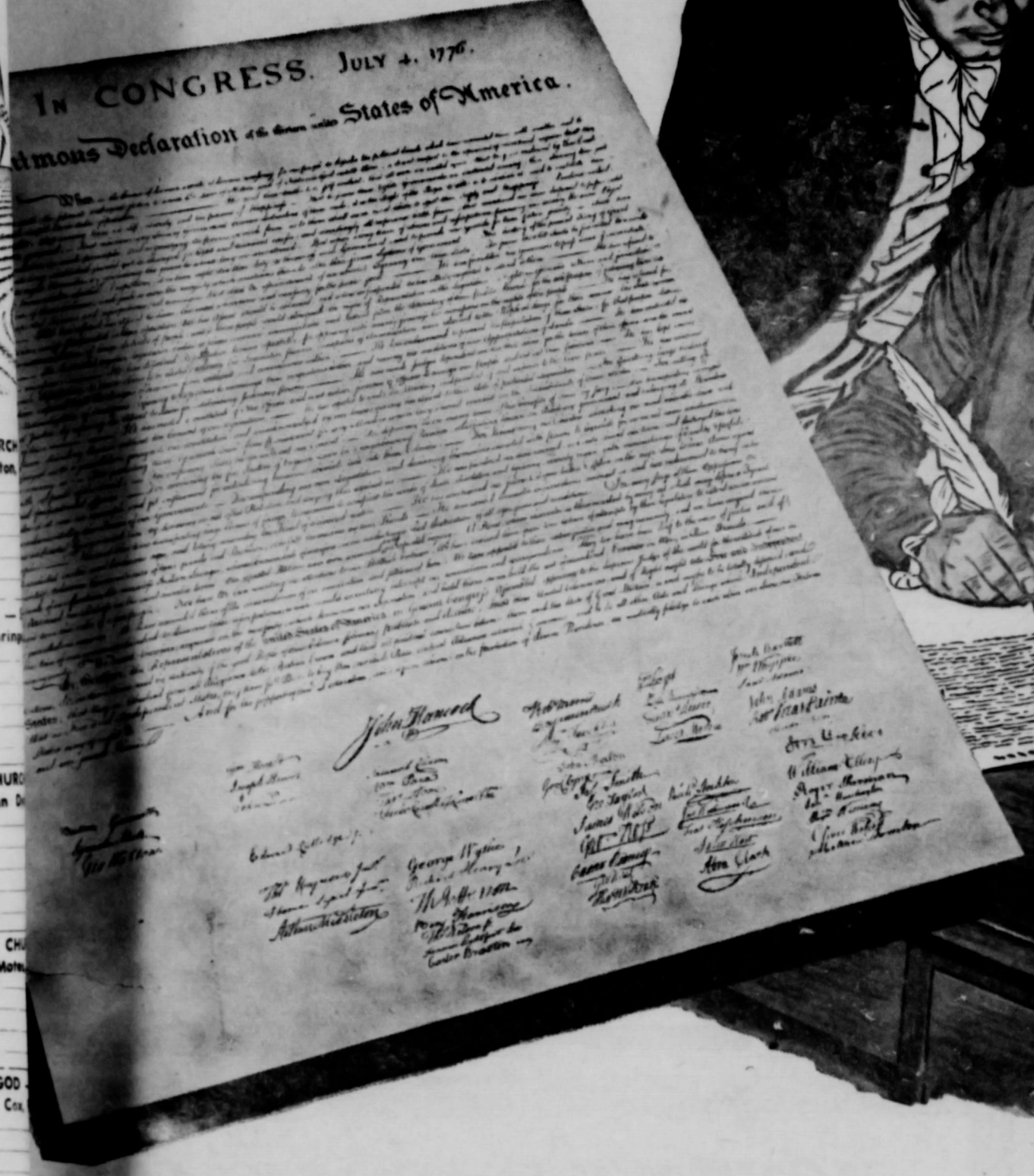
