Crooks was selected by members of the Board of Supervisors of the Hansford Soil Conservation District. In choosing the outstanding farmer, the board tried to select someone who has done an outstanding job of conserving soil and water on his land.

Crooks has built level borders on his steeper irrigated land to prevent soil washing and to conserve moisture. To prevent loss of "tail water", irrigation water which runs on down the furrow after the well is shut off) Vernon has installed receptive borders so this water may be held and used. Vernon is using fertilized crop residues (stubble) to maintain his soil productivity.

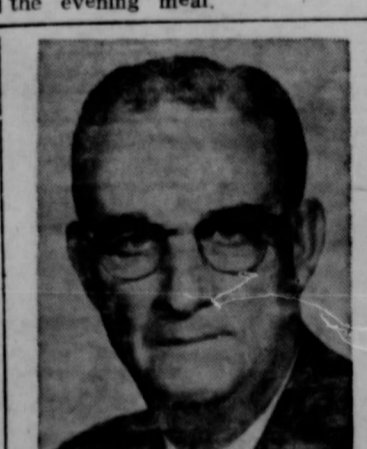

IT'S BERRY TIME

Whether you eat them in preserves, on ice cream, in pie, a shortcake, or fresh with cream and sugar, it's berry time. Why not freeze some strawberries while they are in season to enjoy later during the non-productive months? Firm fully ripe red berries are best for freezing. They may be packed in syrup, in dry sugar or packed without sweetening. However, they have a better texture and flavor if sweetened.

Ask your county home demonstration agent for a copy of B-175, **FROZEN FOODS**, for specific instructions on freezing berries and other foods. This is a new bulletin, this year, so ask for a copy.
DRINKING ENOUGH MILK?
It is difficult to have a balanced diet without including a good deal of milk every day, according to foods and nutrition specialists.

Recent studies show that women especially are not drinking the milk they need each day — neither are their teenage daughters. This may be partly due to the fact that many people think milk is fattening. It isn't. A glass of whole milk has fewer calories than a serving of many other foods.
Drink skim milk, if you're trying to lose a few pounds. It has approximately half the calories of whole milk, but you still get the important minerals, vitamins and protein.
When energy lags — in mid-morning or afternoon — try a cold glass of milk for a "lift that lasts". Make sure all family members get enough milk every day.

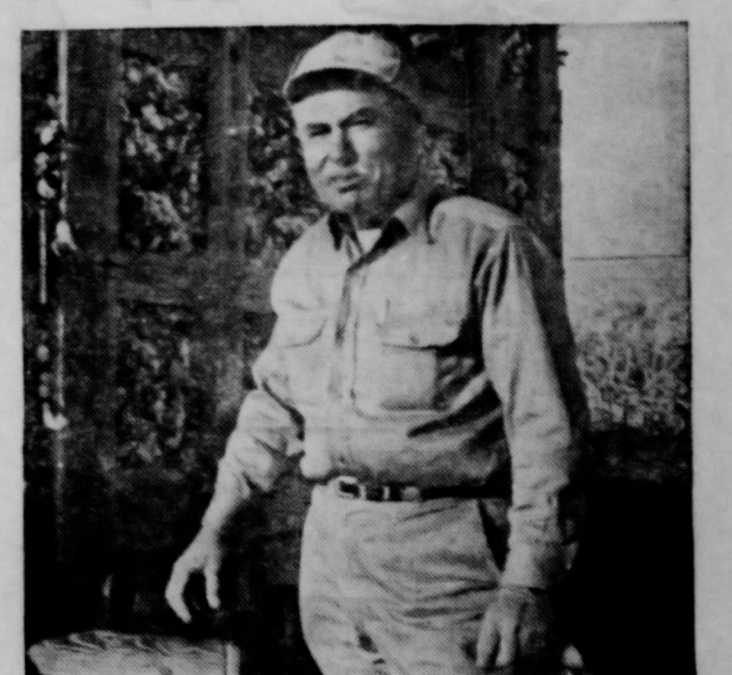

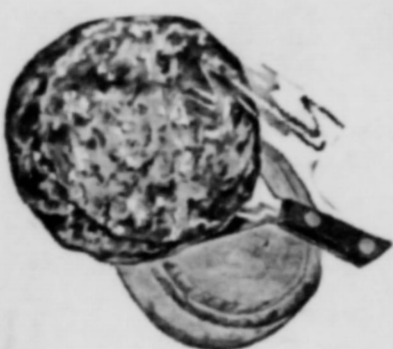

Important Wheat Referendum Set

COLLEGE STATION

Texas wheat farmers will help make an important decision when they vote June 20 in the national wheat marketing quota referendum.

Chairman M. Ferguson, chairman, State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said today.

If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve quotas for the 1959 crop, Ferguson explained, the 1959 wheat program will include acreage allotments, marketing quotas (with penalties on "excess" wheat) and price supports at a minimum national average of \$1.81 per bushel, or 75 per cent of parity.

If the quotas are not approved by at least two-thirds of those voting, there will be no marketing quotas or penalties, but allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support.

The price support rate would be about \$1.20 per bushel, or 50 percent of parity, as provided by law.

Chairman Ferguson pointed out that wheat marketing quotas and acreage allotments operate only in commercial wheat states - those with allotments of more than 25,000 acres. Texas has an allotment of 4,099,094 acres for the 1959 wheat crop.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum are those who will be affected by the wheat quotas if they become effective. This, farmers who will have 15 acres or less of wheat for harvest as grain in 1959 and those who are taking part in the 1958 feed wheat program are not eligible to cast ballots in the 1959 wheat quota referendum on June 20.
