Northern Natural Gas Co. Plan Expansion.

Construction is now underway on a tremendous new dehydration plant, 16 miles South East of Spearman. The new plant is located on Buzzard land, owned by Mrs. J. M. Buzzard of Spearman. This could be the biggest oil field development in the history of the area.

The plant just one mile west of Spearman may be turned into one of the biggest pipe receiving stations in this area. Rumors have it that in the very near future a pipeline will be put at the plant west of Spearman; there is a remote possibility that a big housing unit will be erected for Northern Natural personnel at the plant 1 mile out from Spearman.

All ready Northern Natural planning on a big gasoline plant at the new location south of Spearman. The reason for locating here is that all of their gathering lines, including the big 16 inch line, are located at this new location. The plant will be in operation in the near future, handling fifty million cubic feet of gas daily.

Northern Natural has a new office in Spearman, now located just behind Chambers Dry Goods, and of course there is a host of information and maps in this office, available to land owners and others interested. After checking the pipeline maps at the office, it was learned that a very extensive pipeline project is now underway by Northern Natural, with more pipeline work in the future.

Of course the new plant and its personnel will be closer to Spearman than any other town, and will be located in the Spearman school district. We presume Spearman will be headquarters for all of the Northern Natural personnel, as it has been in the past, and this city is mighty glad to have such fine new citizens for our area.

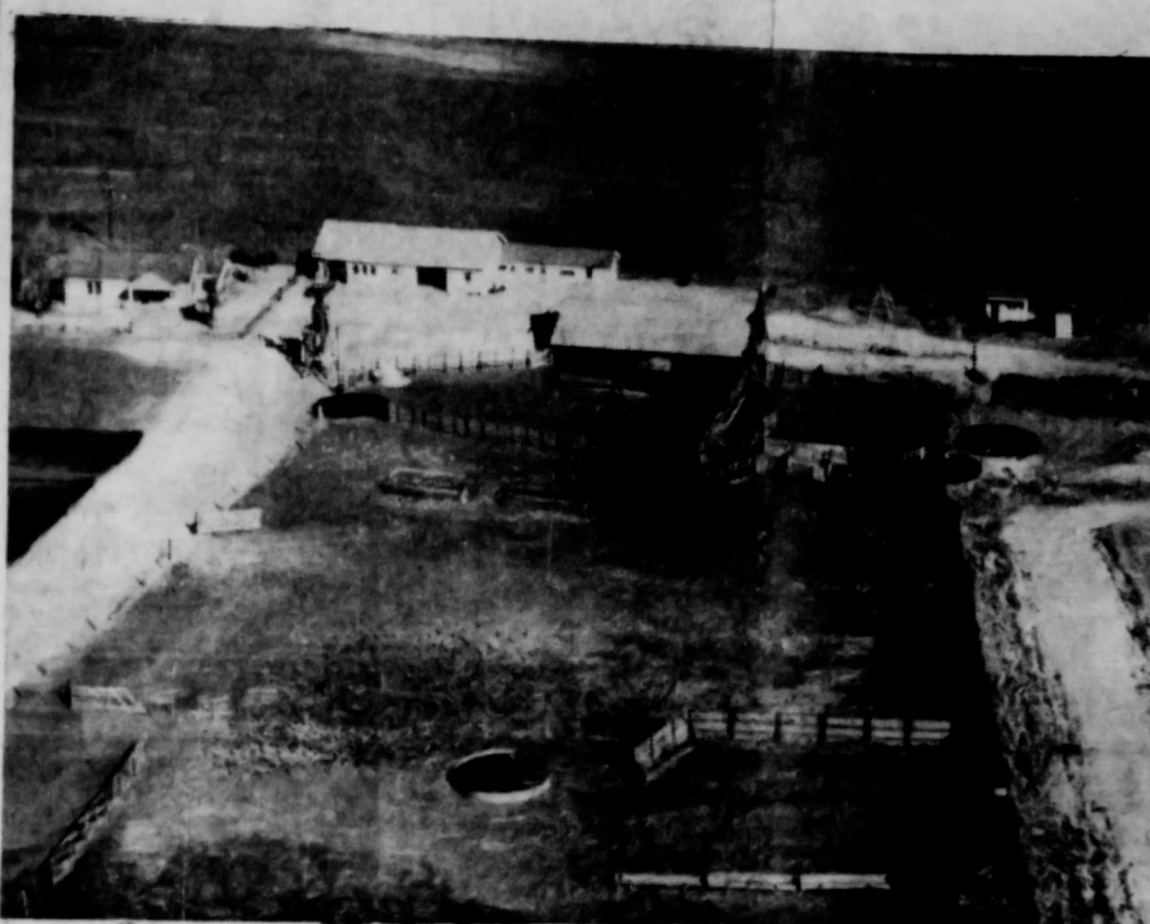

Hansford County S. C. D. News

Stubble Mulch vs. Insects!
During the past few months there has been some discussion concerning the possible increase in grasshopper infestation brought about through the use of stubble mulch tillage.

Stubble mulch tillage does not increase grasshoppers. Stubble mulching is one of the most important conservation practices for use in combating both wind and water erosion.

Mr. Norris E. Daniels, Asst. Entomologist, Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, Bushland, Texas, advises that "there is little danger of causing infestation" through the use of stubble mulch tillage.

Since 1951 studies on insects at the Bushland Station indicate that for greenbugs there is no apparent difference between mulched and clean land and so far as is known, residue does not cause greenbug infestations. Likewise, there are no apparent differences for cutworms. In regards to grasshoppers, "some species lay eggs in trashy places but most species deposit their eggs in solid surfaces such as fence rows or even the hard road."

Mr. Daniels states that "false wireworms" might deposit more eggs in a trashy field but the moisture conserved by the mulch would compensate for this as these larvae like dry soil and would not do as much damage or stay long in moist soil." He further advises that although brown wheat mites are usually more numerous on wheat that is planted in trashy ground, "fallowing would tend to keep their population low because of the overwintering eggs of the young die if there is no wheat or green plants for them to live on. Brown mites do little damage if there is available moisture. They are, as a rule, found heavier in continuous wheat. I would not worry too much about mites."

In general, Mr. Daniels states "All in all, I would say stubble mulch is best as it would compensate in moisture for what little infestation it might cause. The stubble mulch plots have been going on at the Station since 1941 and I do not believe anyone has noticed more pests on one plot than another."

It is felt that stubble mulch tillage should be practiced by all farmers and ranchers in this area. Any possible undesirable effects will be greatly overcome by the numerous advantages to the soil through the use of this practice. Remember, cover, in any form, helps to prevent erosion and conserve moisture.

The 1957 wheat production in the Spearman area of Hansford county is evidently turning out a bit better than anticipated three days ago. A check of three of the five elevators in Spearman revealed that more than a million bushels of grain has been harvested and is now either on storage at the three elevators or has been shipped to terminals. We were unable to get reports from two of the elevators but the figures show that 380,000 bushels of the 1957 crop have been shipped to terminals from the three elevators in Spearman. The same three elevators have stored 640,000 bushels of the 1957 wheat production of this area.

From this partial report and the fact that there are several other shipping points in Hansford county we make the uneducated guess that the production in the county will exceed two million bushels.

Hansford County S. C. D. News

Stubble Mulch vs. Insects!

During the past few months there has been some discussion concerning the possible increase in grasshopper infestation brought about through the use of stubble mulch tillage.

Stubble mulch tillage does not increase grasshoppers. Stubble mulching is one of the most important conservation practices for use in combating both wind and water erosion.

Mr. Norris E. Daniels, Asst. Entomologist, Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, Bushland, Texas, advises that "there is little danger of causing infestation" through the use of stubble mulch tillage.

Since 1951 studies on insects at the Bushland Station indicate that for greenbugs there is no apparent difference between mulched and clean land and so far as is known, residue does not cause greenbug infestations. Likewise, there are no apparent differences for cutworms in regards to grasshoppers. "Some species lay eggs in trashy places but most species deposit their eggs in solid surfaces such as fence rows or even the hard road Mr. Daniels states that "false wireworms might deposit more eggs in a trashy field but the moisture conserved by the mulch would compensate for this as these larvae like dry soil and would not do as much damage or stay long in moist soil." He further advises that although brown wheat mites are usually more numerous on wheat that is planted in trashy ground, "fallowing would tend to keep their population low because their overwintering eggs hatch from the wheat straw and the young die if there is no wheat or green plants for them to live on. Brown mites do little damage if there is available moisture. They are, as a rule, found heavier in continuous wheat. I would not worry too much about mites."

In general, Mr. Daniels states "All in all, I would say stubble mulch is best as it would compensate in moisture for what little infestation it might cause. The stubble mulch plots have been on since the Station since 1941 and I do not believe anyone has noticed more."

It is felt that stubble mulch tillage should be practiced by all farmers and ranchers in this area. Any possible undesirable effects will be greatly overcome by the numerous advantages to the soil through the use of this practice. Remember, cover, in any form, helps to prevent erosion and conserve moisture.

The 1957 wheat production in the Spearman area of Hansford county is evidently turning out a bit better than anticipated ten days ago. A check of three of the five elevators in Spearman revealed that more than a million bushels of grain has been harvested and is now either on storage at the three elevators or has been shipped to terminals. We were unable to get reports from two of the elevators but the figures show that 380,000 bushels of the 1957 crop have been shipped to terminals from the three elevators in Spearman. The same three elevators have stored 640,000 bushels of the 1957 wheat production of this area.

From this partial report and the fact that there are several other shipping points in Hansford county we make the uneducated guess that the production in the county will exceed two million bushels.

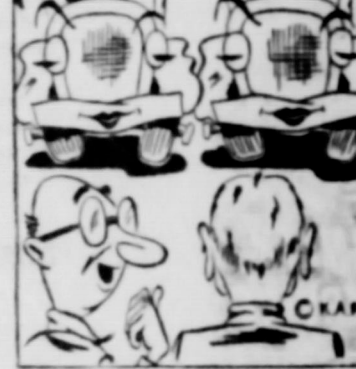

The Rains And Social Security

Probably few farmers have seen any connection between the recent rains and their social security payments. According to a statement from John R. Sanderson, Manager of the district social security office in Amarillo, there is such a connection.
 Over 1200 farmers have filed claims for monthly social security payments in the Amarillo office this year. Except for farmers who became age 72 before 1957, payments cannot be made for all months of the year to a farmer who has a net profit of over \$1200.00 in 1957. Because of recent rains, many farmers who did not expect net profits of over \$1200.00 when they filed their claims now expect more than that amount in 1957.
 Sanderson urges any farmer under 72 years of age and receiving social security payments to be sure he is that his net profits will be over \$1200 in 1957. If he fails to stop the payments and does not have a net profit over \$1200, he will have been over paid and will have to refund some or possibly even all of his 1957 payments. At the end of the year when the exact amount of 1957 profits are known, an adjustment will be made to pay the farmer for any additional months due him or to collect from him the amount of any overpayment already made to him.
 Since both 1955 and 1956 were so wincome years for most farmers, it is quite possible that a good crop in 1957 could cause an increase in the amount of a farmer's social security payments. Applications to have payments refigured to include 1957 profits cannot be filed before July 1, 1958.
