#### Grand Jury Returns Two Indictments

#### Spearman Merchants Are Chain Store Operators ... And Like It

Two men from the State Comptrollers department at Austin swooped down on Spearman merchants Tuesday noon and local merchants became aware of the fact that they were chain store operators, and must pay a tax which averaged a little better than \$5.00 per merchant covering 1936-1937-1938. The chain store legislation has been in court since its original passage, and only recently was validated by the Supreme Court. State officials declare the revenue from this tax will amount to a million dollars a year and will eliminate the necessity of levying a sales tax. One large chain operator in Texas paid a tax above a half million dollars.

New rulings received this week by county agent Joe Hatton clarify some of the question marks regarding the new wheat program for 1938. The program as a whole is very elastic, since the acres diverted from soil depleting crops can be used for a varied assortment of uses that can and will prove beneficial and profitable. The diverted acres can be planted to sudan, cane or millet, and the crop harvested for hay, or grazed. However this diverted acre crop cannot be harvested for seed or for silage storage. The diverted acreage can be summer fallowed, in fact that acreage can be used for most any purpose except to plant and harvest a soil depleting crop.

One important ruling received is to the effect that land worked in such a way as to become a winderosion hazard will be counted as soil depleting. This will tend to discourage the one-way plowing, and cultivation not on the contour.

In order for individual producers to earn all the money in the government program, each individual must earn his own soil building goal. The soil building goal will be set for each farm by the proper officials, and a varied program of sound farming practices will enable him to earn the soil building goal. Each practice will be credited by the unit towards the goal. The goal will be determined based on the number of acres cultivated and the number of acres in grass land. While the list below is not complete, we quote you a number of methods that will be used to qualify in earning the farm soil building goal. Contouring wheat land after harvest, planting row crop on contour, contour summer fallow, summer fallow with dammer lister, terracing, leaving wheat stubble on land during winter of 1938, contour furrowing or ridging grass land, building dams having seeded wheat on contour in 1937, cover crop, strip cropping, planting legumes or native grass.

For complete details of the new crop plan we advise that each wheat producer consult the county agent.

#### GLEANED FROM THE HEADLINES

**BUSINESS**—despite the sharp decline in stock and commodity markets last week there is a growing feeling among impartial observers that business generally will show marked improvement by late summer or early fall. Reports from Detroit indicate that sales of new cars, which began to pick up ten days ago, were exceeding earlier expectations. Rayon manufacturers believe that operations of that industry will improve later in the year as sales of medium priced dresses and underwear are increasing. Steel operations were up to 35.7 per cent of capacity last week, largely because of purchases of steel by manufacturers of stoves, refrigerators, air conditioning equipment and farm implements.

**WASHINGTON**—when large corporations need money for modernization and expansion purposes, they issue stocks or bonds which are sold to investment bankers who in turn sell the securities in small lots to the investing public. But this method seldom is open to small companies because security dealers usually cannot handle small issues of stocks or bonds profitably. Consequently, small businesses have to rely pretty much on their local banks for funds. This has worked a hardship in many deserving cases. The Senate, therefore, last week took up a bill introduced by Senator Carter Glass of Virginia designed to broaden the leading powers of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to include small business as well as banks, railroads and other special industries. The RFC announced it had one billion five hundred million dollars available to lend upon the passage of the Glass bill. Small business firms having good collateral will benefit if this bill becomes law.

**WATCH**—for an awning that is automatically raised or lowered by means of a photo electric cell sensitive to rain and sun—A miniature oil can that looks like a fountain pen and is designed for oiling small machines, electrical equipment, typewriters, etc.—More summer excursion trains equipped with motion picture projectors and radios—Larger sales of airplanes to individuals this summer—Bicycles with shock-absorbing handle bars—A new device which returns the golf ball to the player after it enters the cup—A new water proof and self lubricating bullet which won't jam in the hunter's gun—Bathroom tiles made from shrimp hulls.

**SLUM**—clearance which will employ thousands of local workers will soon be under way in Austin, Texas; Charleston, S. C.; New Orleans; Syracuse and Youngstown Ohio. The government plans to build 3,077 new homes for 12,000 slum dwellers at a cost of \$16,836,000. Rentals will average \$4.25 a month in the two northern cities, \$4 in Charleston, \$3.90 in New Orleans and from \$2.75 to \$3.00 in Austin. Many other cities and towns are expected to have allocations in the near future.

#### SURPLUS PRODUCTS OF TEXAS FARMS BOUGHT BY FSSC

More than 98 million pounds of food products were purchased in Texas and removed from overburdened agricultural markets during 1937, by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation in cooperation with the triple A. Surplus agricultural commodities bought in Texas last year included 81,837,440 pounds of fruit, 9,129,000 pounds of onions, 6,150,000 pounds of rice, 267,000 dozen eggs and 534,000 pounds of cottonseed oil which was converted into shortening. The corporation also purchased 679,064 cases of grapefruit juice during the year in a supplemental program to stabilize the market for citrus growers. The primary object of the purchase operations was to remove surpluses, stabilize markets, and protect growers. The food bought was distributed by relief and welfare agencies in various states.

### NORRIS OIL WELL IS COMMERCIAL GASSER

Although operators plan to go on down to a total depth of 8,000 feet seeking oil production in the Norris well in Ochiltree county about 20 miles east of Spearman, they now have assurance of a commercial gas production if oil is not found in paying quantities. Judge H. E. Hoover, one of the big stockholders in the present development told a reporter in Spearman Tuesday that the well registered 24,000,000 cubic feet of gas from a core at a depth of a little more than 7,000 feet. He stated that the formations checked with the Oklahoma City field and that oil in paying quantities had resulted in the Oklahoma field below a strong gas pressure. This gives operators encouragement to go deeper in hopes of oil production. Several sands have been explored in drilling the Norris well to the present depth, any one of which might be developed into small production.

HAROLD LLOYD

A Fire, An Astrologer, And Some Horned Rimmed Glasses Made him The Richest Actor In The World

My first sight of Harold Lloyd was a distinct shock. I should never have known him off the screen, but he says, for that matter, no one does. For example, on one occasion, he was at a party with a friend who wears glasses (Lloyd himself never wears them off the screen). This friend didn't resemble him at all but everybody thought that the chap in the horn-rimmed glasses must be Harold Lloyd.

One day as he was drifting home from school in Omaha, Nebraska he came across an astrologer standing on a street corner surrounded by colored charts. This astrologer claimed he could read your fortune by the stars. Little Harold listened, pop-eyed with excitement. Suddenly a fire engine dashed by and the other boys ran after it. But he didn't. He kept listening to the astrologer. That was a strange thing for a boy to do and one of the men in the crowd noticed it.

The fellow that noticed it was John Lane Connor, leading man in the Burwood Stock Company of Omaha. He walked over to Lloyd, got acquainted with him and asked him if he knew some nice place where an actor could get board and room—Did he?

Harold leaped at the chance! Harold's mother was a dressmaker, and his father sold sewing machines. One day his father got smashed up in an automobile accident and hurt his back, and the insurance company paid him \$3,500. That was a fortune so he decided to pack up and leave the middle west and try his luck some where else.

Finally Harold's father said: "Let's flip a coin. If it's tails we'll go to New York and heads California."

But heads came up, so the family moved to San Diego and Harold did odd jobs about the theatre there. Day after day, he called at the casting offices; and day after day he was turned away. He was desperate. He must get by that doorman. He noticed that at noon all the actors came out of the Universal lot and went across the road to a lunch counter, and he also noticed the doorman didn't pay any attention to them when they came back with their grease paint on. So the next day, Harold hid be-

hind a billboard at noon, put on some make-up and slipped by the doorman in the crowd.

There was an actor by the name of Hal Roach who was playing small bits on this lot. He told Lloyd one day that his aunt had died and left him a little money so he was going to make pictures himself, comedies, and he wanted Harold to join him.

One day he picked up an idea that was worth a fortune to him—picked up quite by accident. He was tired so he drifted into a theatre and saw an actor with a straw hat and a pair of horn rimmed glasses playing the part of a preacher. Lloyd decided then and there to make horn-rimmed glasses his trade mark and to play the part that has since made him famous.

The funniest thing I know about Lloyd is that he himself didn't know he was funny until he was 20 years old. Before that he used to go around reciting Shakespeare. And when he first started making pictures the directors told him he wasn't a comedian and never could be a comedian and they advised him to get out of picture business and make his living at some thing else. But he kept right on—and now is the richest actor in all the world. In fact, he is the richest actor who ever lived.

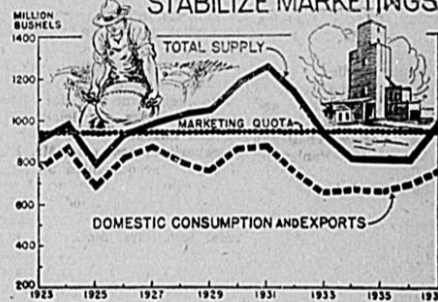

Wheat Marketing Quota Helps Stabilize Market

Wheat marketing quotas under the new farm act will be proclaimed only when the supplies for any years are estimated at more than 950 million bushels. The act states that there will be no wheat quota for 1938 unless parity payments are made available.

The quota plan for wheat will be used only when the total supply is so large that prices threaten to fall to very low levels, as they did from 1928 to 1934, and then only when 2-3 of the wheat farmers voting in a referendum approve of the plan. The secretary of agriculture is directed by the act to announce the necessity for quotas on May 15.

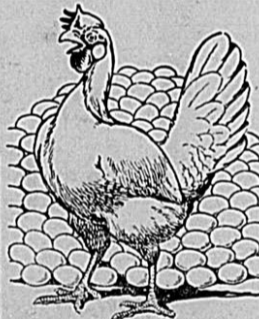
