Truck driver Massey said that he believed that a spring broke and rubbed against one of the tires causing friction that got hot enough to catch the van on fire. Massey said that he was mid way between Amarillo and Fritch on State highway 136 at about 2:30 a. m. 2-29 a. m. when he smelled the smoke. He discovered the semi-trailer was on fire. He hauled some of the mail to safety but the bulk of it was ruined. The mail is hauled north of Amarillo by the Amarillo Daily News circulation van. All of the papers in the van were burned but part of the mail for Borger was saved and 2 one-half bags were rushed there about 8:00 a. m. All of the Sanford, Fritch, Waka and Farnsworth sacks were rescued. Mail for Phillips, Perryton, Stinnett and Morse and Spearman was almost completely destroyed. Amarillo Daily News pressmen went back to work and printed all the papers over again and these were sent out north on another truck by the same driver, Massey.

Fire trucks from Amarillo arrived at the scene soon after Massey reported the blaze and they dragged more of the burning mail sacks from the truck with hooks but most of it was already destroyed. Amarillo Postmaster Gordon Jordan said the fire was still being investigated and he stated that as soon as the damaged mail was reworked that it would be sent out.

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## Mail Sacks Burned Tues. November 26

The Spearman mail sack from Amarillo burned Tuesday November 26 at a location ten miles south of Fritch. The truck driver, Fred S. Massey, managed to drag some of the sacks out before they were destroyed but a large percent of the Spearman mail was lost.

Postmaster Donald Smith said that Spearman receives an average of 35 sacks of mail daily from Amarillo. On Wednesday the Spearman Post Office received its portion of the damaged mail which consisted of mail, and some circulars, no first class or air mail was received.

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## Postmaster Urges Early Christmas Mailing

The local post office hopes to keep its good record on handling Christmas mails by getting everything processed and delivered well before Christmas Eve. Postmaster Donald Smith said this week.

He added that how well the mail moves will depend a great deal on the cooperation local people give in getting their packages and Christmas cards mailed during the next ten days.

"It's important in the small town as well as in the city to mail early during the Christmas season," the Postmaster said. "Most people appreciate the early arrival of a gift or card, and where there is a heavy concentration of mail early mailing could mean the difference in on-time and late delivery."

"And be sure to use the correct address," Mr. Smith added. "Wrap and address packages carefully. Take a little extra time and place the address inside the package just in case it should come unwrapped."

The address on all mail destined for the larger cities should include zone numbers to insure faster delivery.

The Postmaster also advocated the use of first class postage on Christmas cards. First class postage—a three-cent stamp—allows a written message to be included inside. There are other advantages, too. The Post Office considers first class mail as preferential mail which is entitled to the fastest handling. Also, a Christmas card with first class postage may be forwarded or returned to the sender.

"Incidentally," the Postmaster concluded, "it is socially correct to place your return address on the envelope bearing a Christmas card."

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## Large Crowd Hear Commissioner Of Agriculture John C. White In Talk At School Cafeteria

More than a hundred and fifty Hansford citizens were present at the school cafeteria Tuesday November 26th to hear Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White make an informative and inspirational talk on agriculture. The occasion was the annual Agricultural-Chamber of Commerce banquet. The P. T. A. of Spearman was responsible for the preparation and serving of the very appetizing meal.

Ralph Maglaughlin, former Soil Conservation Manager and now head of the agricultural department of Spearman schools, was Master of Ceremonies for the evening.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Don Floyd introduced some of the out of town guests from Dumas, Gruver and Panhandle, Texas.

Joe Smith, Chamber of Commerce chairman of the agricultural committee made a short talk. Cotton John (Carland) Smith of the Amarillo KGNK Radio and TV introduced the distinguished guest speaker, John C. White, Commissioner White gave us a picture of the dangers of economic ruin unless soil erosion could be stopped. He stated that one inch of rich top soil the size of the state of Missouri was lost each year as result of erosion. He emphasized the importance of the government program of soil conservation, and deplored the fact that some of the funds allocated for future soil conservation programs would be used for the defense program under the Republican administration recent plans.

White touched on the marketing problems of agriculture, and assured citizens that in basic crops such as cotton, the United States could not compete in a world market. He outlined the cheap labor such as 12 cents per day in Egypt and Old Mexico and suggested that planting and harvesting of cotton be limited to the domestic needs of our nation. His suggestion for increased sales of a profit was a thorough study of new fields of use for cotton. He gave a few examples for processing cotton into fabrics and food products.

The speaker outlined the fact that the present cultivated acreage for food and fabrics for our nation at this time was a little in excess of five acres per individual. He quoted estimates that this would be cut to less than 3 acres per individual by the year 2000 because of the estimated increase in population.

The talk was recorded by Cotton John of KGNK Radio and rebroadcast Wednesday of this week.

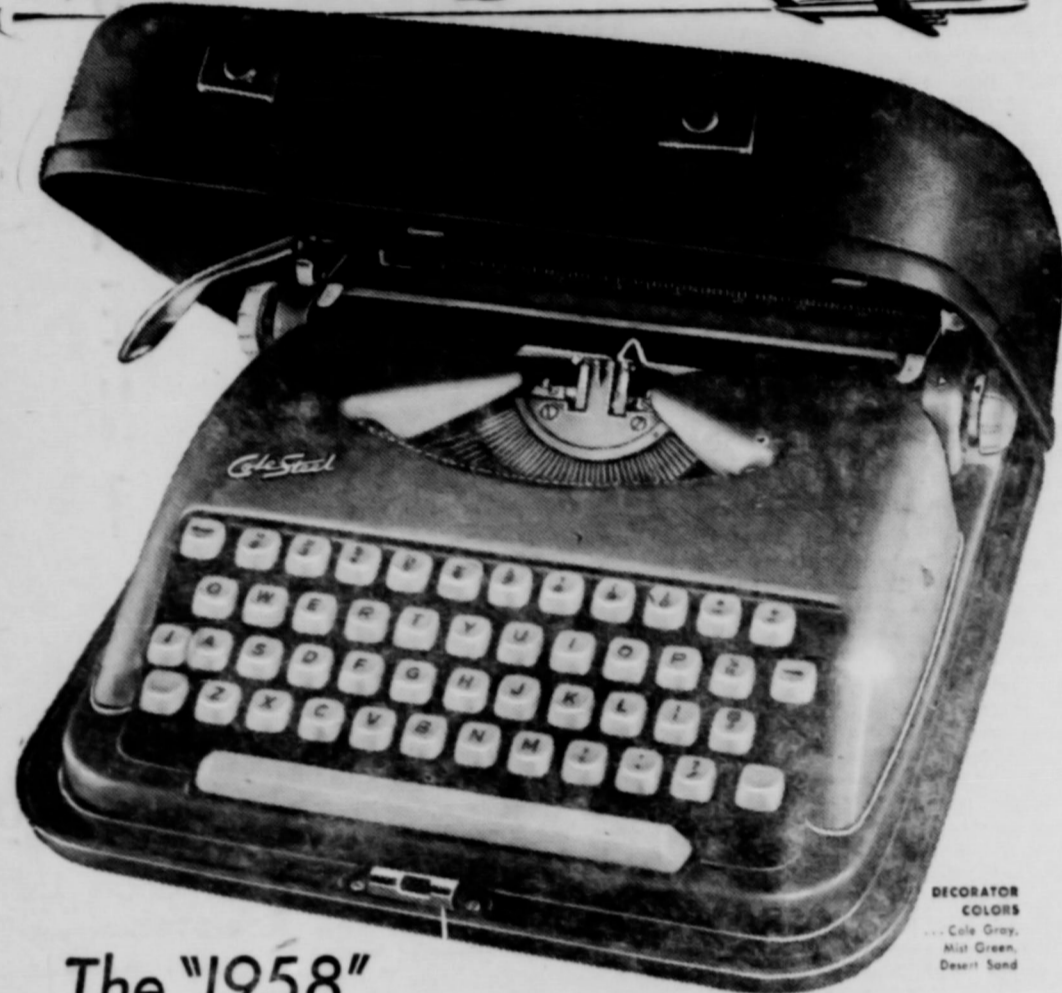

**TEXAS A&M COLLEGE SYSTEM EXTENSION SERVICE NUMBER OF LAYING CHICKENS EXPECTED TO BE DOWN IN 1958**

Many farmers who raised laying chickens last year are not doing it in 1957, according to the Crop Reporting Board of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The decrease is greatest in small flocks many of which have evidently been liquidated. In February of this year farmers reported that they intended to buy 9 per cent less chicks than they bought last year. Griffin points out that they bought 19 percent fewer flock replacements during the first six months of this year. Texas figures are even higher, showing a 25 percent decrease. Every region of the country has shown a sharp decrease in chicks raised. These figures do not apply to broiler chickens.

## Washington News Letter From Your Congressman, Walter Rogers

To The People Of The 18th District

### THE PRESIDENT'S ILLNESS

The shock and concern that engulfed the capital city at news of the President's illness could be felt even before the cause was known. It was very evident that something was wrong and many people, when they got the news, were heard to remark that they felt something had gone wrong but did not know exactly what it was. It was generally suspected throughout the nation's capital that the whole story was not being told when it was reported the President had suffered a chill. It is pretty hard to fool the American people, and subsequent developments proved they had been misled by the original soft peddling as to the condition of the President.

At the time this report is being written the President seems in good condition; however, defects in the circulatory system can get better or worse momentarily. By the time this letter reaches you, anything might have happened. Let us all hope and pray it is for the better and our President is in excellent health by that time.

### SCIENCE

The outstanding scientists have had several days before the Senate Preparedness sub committee headed by our Senior Senator, Lyndon Johnson. They have undertaken to explain the position of this country on matters scientific. Other individuals, businessmen and otherwise, have appeared before the committee and offered their bit. Many excuses have been offered in explanation of why Russians led us in placing a satellite in orbit. Some blame it on the lack of sufficient funds, which is not an unusual American excuse. Others say we just did not develop the know how because we did not realize Russia was so far advanced. Others claim it was the result of simple miscalculation as to when great efforts should be expended on the missile program.

Other reasons were advanced, but these three seem to be the most important. As to the first one, it can be said there was never a country in the history of the world which provided as much money for defense purposes as has the Congress of the United States for the defense of this country. If these funds were wrongfully spent, that is another question, but to say funds were not ample and sufficient is just not true.

As to the second reason, there is some merit. It appears this country has been spending too much time in recent years talking about the things the Russians have not accomplished and too little time finding out what they have accomplished. In other words, we have been trying to rest on our past laurels and refusing to recognize the fact that other people have capabilities the same as us.

As to the third reason, there is little question that a lag in the missile program was permitted pending the development of an atomic warhead small enough in size to be transported by a missile. As the matter now develops, both programs should have been worked on at the same time. It is very good the sputnik has awakened us to some of the failures as they may be corrected without undue delay.

There is one question in this entire controversy which seems to have been completely overlooked. That is, "What was our intelligence doing while the Russians were developing their missiles and their sputnik?" I have yet to see an explanation in answer to this question.

To me, it is most important, because only a few years ago we had the atom bomb and it was our secret. Yet the Russians through their intelligence and espionage system, were able to steal that secret from us. What happened to the Agency headed by Allan Dulles, the brother of our Secretary of State? I speak of the Central Intelligence Agency which is so super-secret. This agency spends a tremendous amount of money each year on programs and projects so secret the people who furnish the money are not even allowed to know the general purpose for which it is used. No doubt this is another agency which will be looked into come 1958.

The truth about our scientific failure, if it could be so called, goes a lot deeper than many of the reasons which were given to the Senate Preparedness Subcommittee or to any other committee investigating the matter on Capitol Hill. The simple truth is, there has been a failure by our entire country to fully realize and appreciate the need in the fields of science. In many of the schools there is no scientific course. This may be due to lack of funds for equipment, but usually it is due to the lack of funds with which to pay properly equipped school teachers. In some instances the money is available but there are no teachers. This is not a mistake or failure that has occurred within the last few years. It has been going on for a long long time. It cannot be solved by some fly-by-night cure all legislation permitting the government to finance some child who has been chosen as having a mind with a scientific turn. The solution of this problem lies at the grass

roots of this nation. Proper facilities and teachers must be made available to every school in the nation. The facilities can be readily acquired—the teachers cannot—unless we are willing to recognize them for their true worth and to pay them in accordance with the contribution they are making to this nation and its future.

## Farm Bureau Meet At Dallas

Delegates to the Texas Farm Bureau convention Nov. 17-20 in Dallas approved a resolution calling for the gradual elimination of government regulation of individual farming operations.

New officers elected included J. H. (Harrell) West, Bishop, president, replacing J. Walter Hammond of Tye. C. H. DeVaney, Coahoma, was named to the vice-presidency vacated by West. Edwin Sanderson, Paris, was elected secretary-treasurer, replacing Loys D. Barbour of Iowa Park. New directors voted in by delegates included D. M. Womble, Morse; Glenn Mettauer, Chireno; and R. C. Macheuhl, Bellville.

In their business session Nov. 20, the 609 voting delegates from 140 counties approved a recommendation to the national convention on cotton which would give growers a choice in the annual referendum of the following: (1) 75 per cent of parity supports and 20 per cent more acreage, (2) present acreage and 90 per cent of parity, and (3) no acreage restrictions, no price supports.

The delegates, by their actions, said the principles of the Soil Bank are sound, but that the present Soil Bank program does not accomplish its full intent. They called for a total acreage retirement program under which the percentage of cropland retired would be determined by the percentage of overall overproduction of all farm commodities.

In the field of research, the voting delegates called for research to be directed toward (1) industrial uses of agricultural commodities, (2) expansion of markets by promoting better nutrition, (3) lowering production and marketing costs, (4) improving quality of agricultural products.

In adopting state policies to guide the state farm organization next year, the delegate body said that no changes should be made in the present system of allocating funds for building farm-to-market roads. They stated that this is important "when it is considered that there are still approximately 100,000 miles of unimproved roads in Texas." They called for all weather roads to be built under local administration with priorities given to (1) school bus routes, (2) mail routes, and (3) population per mile.

In another action, the convention delegates stated that rural electric cooperatives should have equal rights with any electric power suppliers in rural areas.

They favored the development of a state-wide water development plan and supported the theory that diffused water belongs to the land on which it falls. The delegates said they favor the purchasing of storage space in a federal reservoir by the state if all prior beneficial users are protected by law and all irrigators are given priority over new industries and new municipal developments.

Speakers at the convention included Gov. Price Daniels, former TFB President J. Walter Hammond, and Jack Lynn, legislative director for the American Farm Bureau Federation.

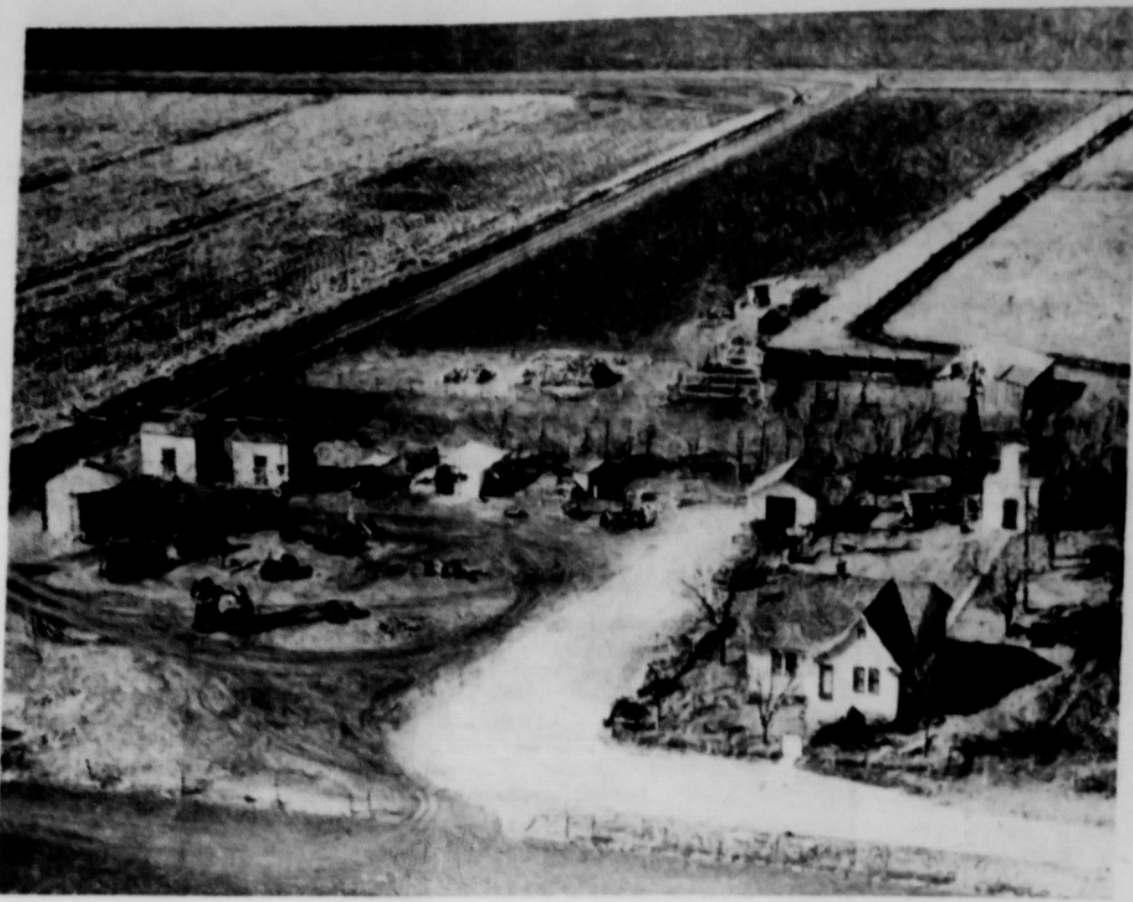

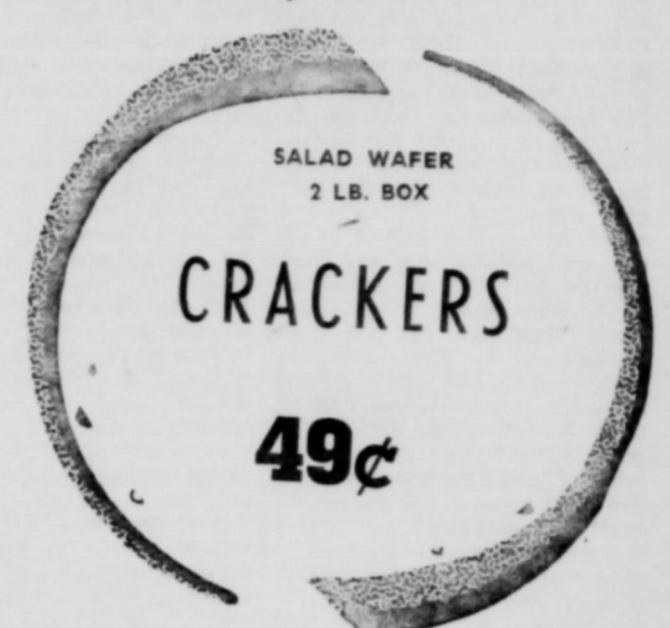

When a hunter does make a mistake similar to the above and wholeheartedly acknowledges it to the extent that he looks up the game official for the area and states that he wishes to pay a fine for an innocent infraction of the rules it is more than usual. During the past few years you can number such cases on the fingers of one hand and still have a finger or two left. A few years back one of the supervised Panhandle Antelope hunts, about sump I greeted an old friend of mine from Canadian. It was on the Wilmeth ranch and shortly after day light. We had a short visit and he took to the ranch in search for buck. It was less than two hours when my old esteemed friend checked in with me and solemnly stated "I have a present for you." Two seconds later he had walked

around to the back of his car and pulled up the turtle hull and said "Here she is." He had killed a doe antelope. The carcass was well dressed out and prepared for the proper disposition, which would be a charitable organization. Mr. Cochran made an honest mistake and killed a doe instead of a buck. Even though regretful as he was, he properly prepared the carcass, looked up a warden, and asked to pay his fine. Mr. Cochran, later in the day killed a prize buck and went back to Canadian with the feeling of a day well spent. Possibly he could have drug the illegal antelope under a sage brush, gone ahead and killed a buck, checked out with the warden and gone back to Canadian with the \$75.00 that he had paid for illegal procedure and been that much better off. What is a sportsman? Shall we abide by the rules. Shall we cheat?—It's all left up to the American sportsman. Some are square shooters, some are not. The executor of the game and fish laws profits nothing from fines. Sometimes they are lauded and some times they are criticized. Nevertheless, our game must come first, else what shall our children and our children's children have to hunt in the future. Example number one of this Canadian sportsman is outstanding but its not shadowing the least an example of another Hemphill citizen. Last week during the just past deer and turkey hunt, this Canadian citizen took dead aim on a turkey gobbler in a weed patch. When walked up to pick up the gobbler, there was a turkey hen fluttering a short distance away. He had shot and killed the turkey he aimed at. The weeds were high and the cover tall and it so happened that there was a turkey hen in line of fire. The hunter had not noticed this turkey hen but, nevertheless, he had killed two with one shot from a shot gun. He could have left the turkey hen laying in the weeds or could have taken her to camp and possibly gotten by with the infraction of the rules. Mr. Graham had his young son with him who observed the whole procedure. Not once did it enter his mind to attempt to violate the game laws. He promptly picked up the two turkeys and headed towards the nearest game warden and demanded that he be taken into court and filed on. If my memory serves me right Mr. Graham stated that he was raising his son to be an outdoor sportsman and he wanted to set a proper example for his son. The way some see it our outdoor life here in Texas Panhandle must come first in all our considerations if we are to have hunting for the future generations here on the rolling plains. This is the poorest game range in the state. You could take thousands of words to elaborate on our Texas wildlife that we have on the high plains of Texas, therefore it must be continued into the next column, next week.

Mountain lions in the Panhandle? Black bear on the Canadian river? Mule deer in the Panhandle. These species have been reported numerous during the past few years. To me each report has been received with a bit of skepticism. Nevertheless, Don Bagot, prominent Texas rancher of the younger generation, bagged a five point black tail, or mule deer in Hutchinson county a few days ago. Down in Hemphill county, the son of Dale Nix, prominent Hemphill county rancher, also killed a mule deer on the Nix ranch. Mule deer, white tail deer, wild turkey, scaled and bob white quail, antelope, spanish red legged partridges, cee cee partridges, wild pheasants, plus other species of wild game are located in the Panhandle. By those who do not know the difference our Panhandle is a poor place to hunt. Nevertheless, the Texas Panhandle has its potentialities. It's all up to the sportsmen and game managers. We can have an almost unlimited amount of game in the future if we wish.

### Spearman PTA Will Meet December 9

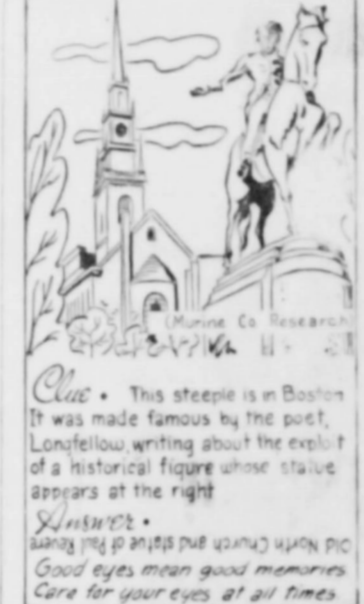
