# 1912 BARRELL

## Texas Company Tops List With Sister Of St. Joseph 1,912 Barrell Producer On Section 13

### This n' That



With the Railroad announcement that the Texas Company Sister of St. Joseph oil well on Section 13, was rated 1,912 barrels daily, Hansford county came in for not only the No. 1 Oil producer of the Anadarko Basin, but the records show that the county is the site of all four of the largest wells in the basin.

Printed below is the facts concerning the latest No. 1 producer.

The biggest well completed in the Anadarko Basin has been given railroad commission potential of 1,912 barrels a day with no water. The big well is The Texas Company No. 1 Sister of St. Joseph in section 13, b' WCRS survey in Hansford County. The test is eight miles east of Spearman and is a setback to the same company's No. 1 Carmody discovery well completed recently for 1,783 barrels of oil.

The new well with flow from the Atoka Sand with perforations at 7,080 to 7,109 feet. Gravity of the oil is 37.5 degrees with gas-oil ratio 736 to 1.

The Texas Company holds most of the acreage in the area.

That particular area of Hansford County was opened in October of 1954 when R. H. Fulton of Lubbock brought in his No. 1 Lasater for 498 barrels of oil. That well was 3 miles northwest of the Texas Company's big producer.

But it was Fulton's second well on the Lasater that brought on the heavy drilling campaign in the county during 1955. Fulton's No. 2 Lasater, a diagonal well, flowed at the rate of 1,296 barrels of oil a day.

That well was the largest in the Anadarko Basin until a month ago when The Texas Company brought in the Texas Co. Carmody for 1783 barrels on section 69, just one section North of the present No. 1 Anadarko producer.

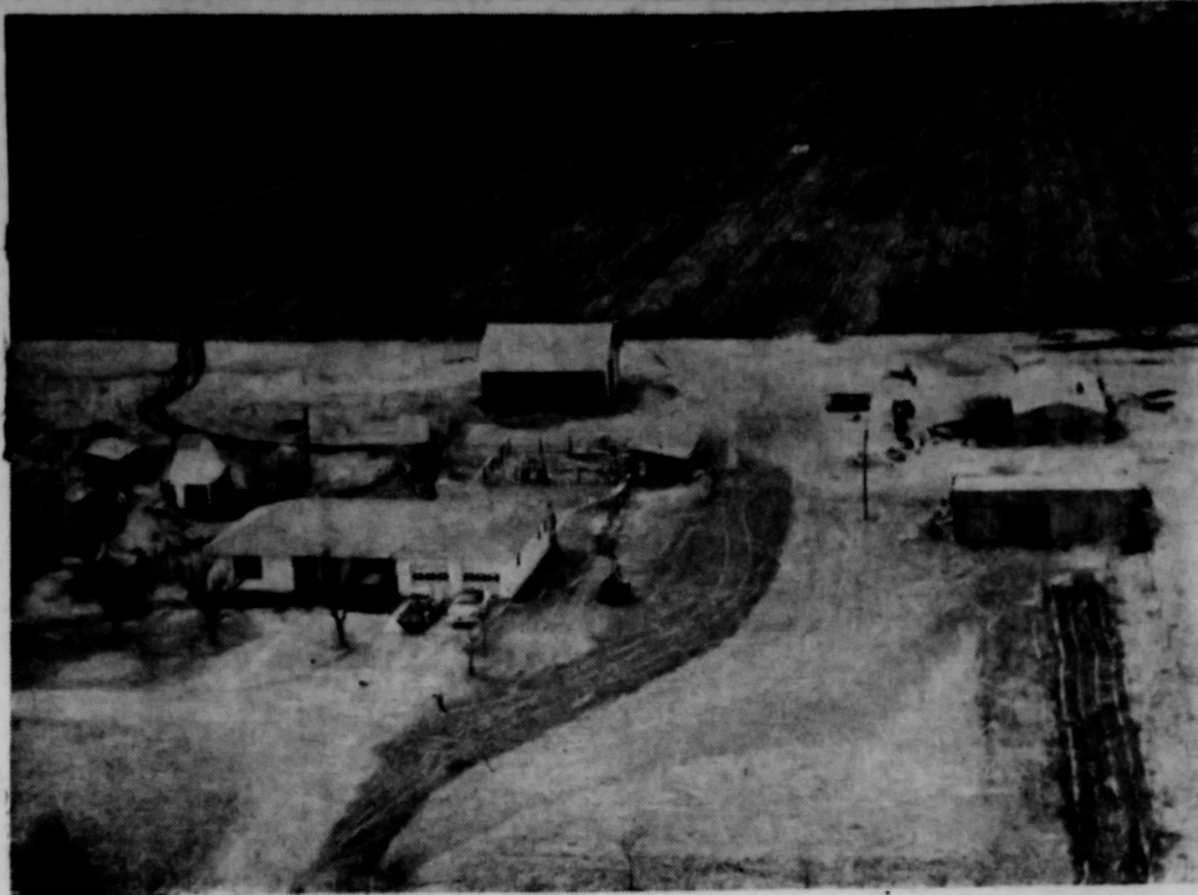

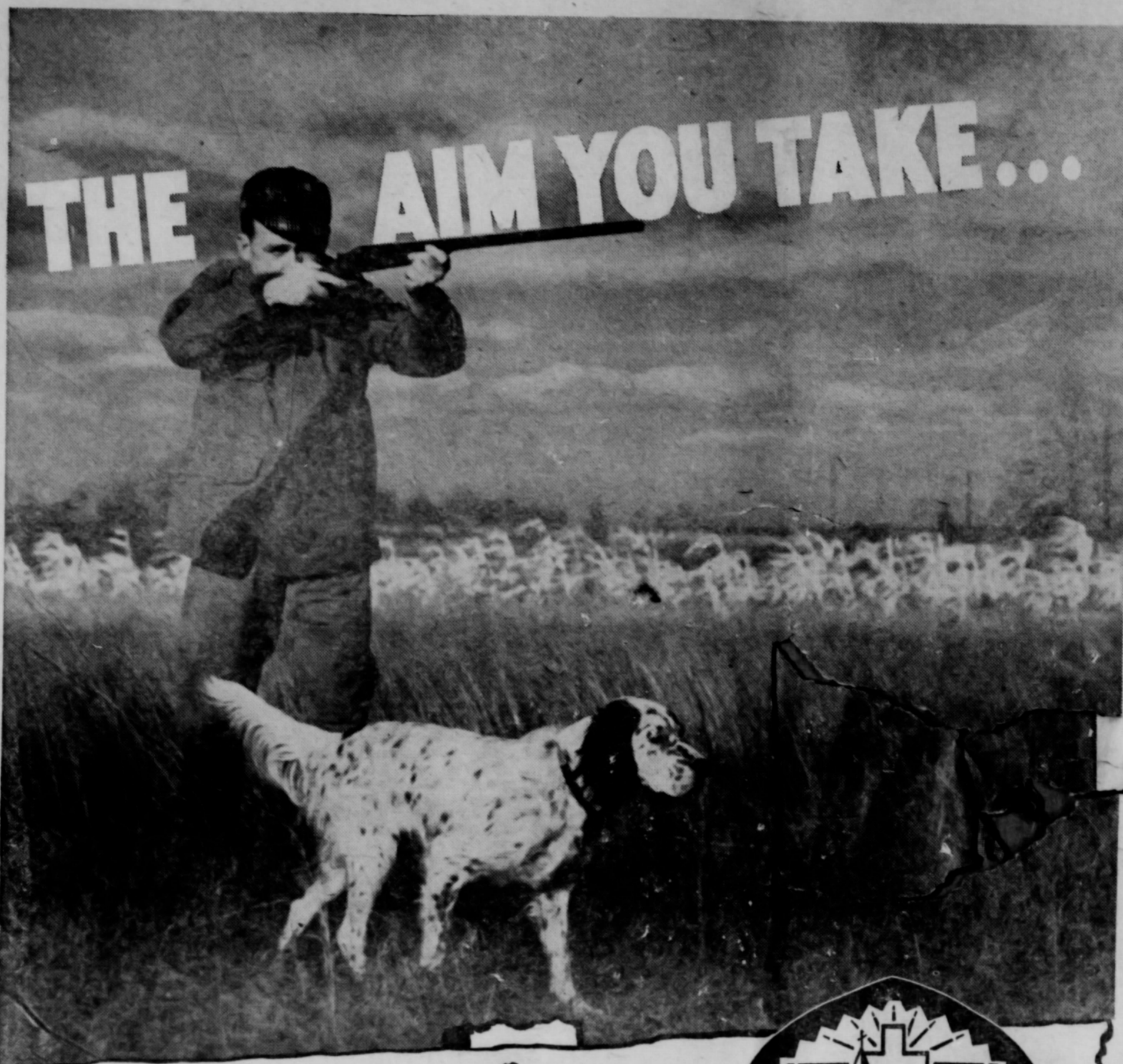

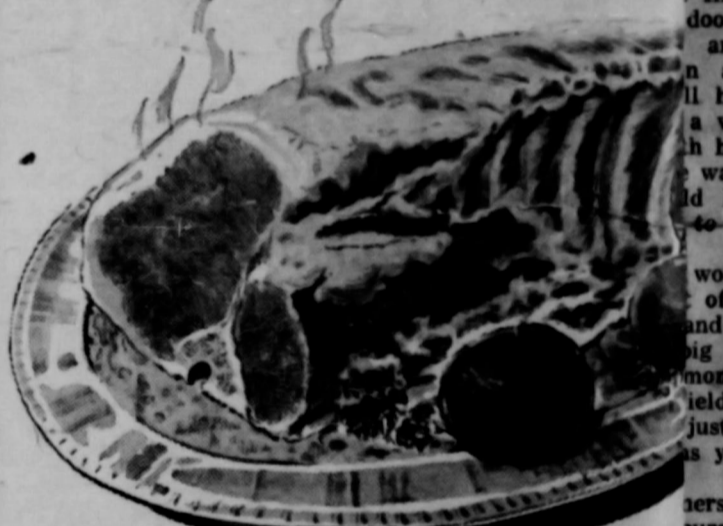

**Fishing And Hunting Big Business**
College Station. — Last year, 1955, about 25,000,000 American sportsmen fished and hunted and spent a healthy \$3 billion in connection with their activities. Ed Cooper, extension specialist in wildlife conservation, says these figures are proof of the importance of fish and wildlife to the general welfare of the country.
In Texas last year, he says, the Game and Fish Commission reported that 1,625,000 Texans either hunted or fished or did both. The state's sportsmen spent \$165,054,000 for equipment and all of the other things which go with hunting and fishing. Cooper said the average fisherman, includes all fishermen over 12-years of age, spent almost \$70 each while the average hunter spent slightly over \$59 in pursuit of their favorite game.
For the nation, fishermen spent about \$92 each. They devoted 19 days of their annual leisure time, at an average cost of about \$5 a day, to the sport of fishing.
Americans last year spent for fishing more than was expended on any of the following items: dental care, medical care and hospitalization insurance, personal legal service, higher education or even on funeral and burial expenses. But, comments Cooper, hunting and fishing are both mighty fine recreational activities. A few days spent in the woods or at the lake or beside a favorite stream or on the salt water can do things for sagging spirits or jangled nerves. He strongly recommends regular hunting and fishing outings.
In order to improve hunting and fishing in Texas, the specialist, suggests to landowners that they join with their neighbors in wildlife conservation associations so their land can be made more productive. Wildlife conservation must be carried out on an area basis for best results; hence, the need for cooperative action.

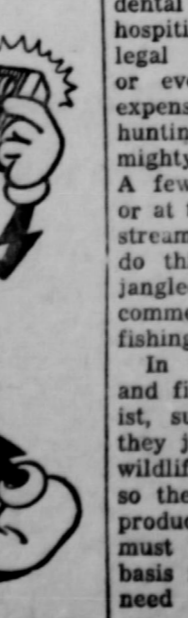

**Funds For Farmers Available July 1, '57**  
Temple, Texas, Jan. 3, 1957 — Smith of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service today announced plans to take quick action to put into effect the stepped up Great Plains program in this state.

Smith said that he has called a conference of state leaders of agricultural programs and agencies in Texas for Jan. 11 at College Station to blueprint the plan of action on the farm and range lands of the 83 countries in that portion of the state.

Smith pointed out that Secretary Benson's order provided for the combining of the resources of the Department of Agriculture's various agencies in a step-by-step process for making long-time adjustments in land use, cropping systems, and in the treatment of cultivated lands and range, under the climatic hazards of the Great Plains.

The Great Plains program, brought into being by Public Law 1021 only last August, is designed to give farmers and ranchers in the Great Plains area of the 10 involved states, both immediate and long-range help in the use of the land within its capabilities, Smith pointed out.

Soil Conservation Notes  
The Conservation Reserve Act has created an overwhelming demand for grass seed. Raising grasses for seed production is a good cash crop under irrigation.

It is hard to get grass established. Grass requires a lot of work and attention the first year. After a good stand of grass is established you don't have to worry with reseeding in every year.

Grasses are very temperamental and are effected by change in climate. To get the best result in reseeding land, the seed source in this particular part of the State.

Raising grass for seed production is not only a good cash crop under irrigation, but has other benefits. After seed is harvested, you have excess forage that should be either mowed or harvested by grazing.

Experience has showed that the best results are obtained when you harvest one half of the remaining forage and leave the other half as a food source for the plant. Grass is an excellent plant for increasing the fertility of the soil.

The Soil Conservation Service assisting the Hansford Soil Conservation District will give you technical advice on selection of variety and management of grasses. This is a matter that should be investigated further by anyone interested in bettering themselves and the Soil Conservation District.
