## T. H. TAYLOR DIES AT DENTON

Jack Taylor received word on Monday that his father T. H. Taylor had passed away at 5:10 p. m. in a Denton hospital, where he had been a patient about two weeks.

Mr. Taylor was 93 at the time of his death and had been in failing health since his retirement from farming in 1944.

He and Mrs. Taylor had been visiting in the home of their daughter this summer. The Taylors came to Spearman in 1920 from Pampa. They purchased a farm five miles southwest of town and put a two-story rooming house on Main Street. They headed down the boom transient population and continued in business until 1930 when they sold it and moved to their farm.

Mr. Taylor operated the wheat and stock farm until he retired in 1944.

He and Mrs. Taylor moved in Jack's home in town and Jack and his family moved to the farm.

Mr. Taylor, a native of Tennessee, married Miss Kate Robins of Belton and they pioneered in the Indian Territory. Later they moved to Elk City and from there to Texas.

Among the survivors are the wife, Kate, a son, Jack of Spearman, a daughter, Mrs. Jack Hodges of Denton and two grandchildren, Tommy Taylor of New York and Mrs. Lovell Lee of Lubbock.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday in the First Presbyterian Church in Denton, at 4:00 p. m. Burial was at the Denton Cemetery.

## Hansford County S. C. D. News

### Stubble Mulch Vs. Insects

During the past few years farmers in the Hansford HSD have been experiencing some drought years in which very few crops have been made. Wind and water erosion has made itself known due to the lack of crop residues necessary for control of wind and water erosion. A number of farmers have made the remark that their fields did not have any gullies in them as long as they could grow good wheat but with the dry years and poor stubble gullies have begun to show up. With the spring rains many bare fields were severely eroded.

Due to the spring rains a heavy crop of residue has been made with wheat, oats and barley. Harvesting of these crops is being over now and the task of plowing the stubble has begun. Now is the time to save that stubble and to save the soil and to save any moisture that falls by practicing stubble mulch tillage.

Stubble mulching provides a cover to the land for protection against wind and water erosion, and to conserve moisture, to intercept and reduce the impact of raindrops and break up the surface water film, permitting greater penetration, reducing pulverized condition of the soil, permit surface decay of organic matter and reduce runoff. Also there is an increase in production.

The power is being increased from 33,000 volts to 69,000 volts. Because of large private and industrial use in the city, this large voltage will insure sufficient power for a good many years.

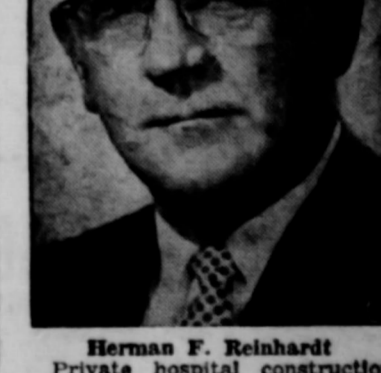

## RECORD YEAR FOR NEW HOSPITALS

Private hospital construction may reach a record in 1957. Such construction in the first half of 1957, was running 40 percent over the same months last year. On this basis it is estimated expenditures for new hospital construction in 1957 may reach \$423 million, according to Herman F. Reinhardt, recently-elected President of the American Association of Fund-Raising. More than \$225 million of this sum is expected to come in contributions from individuals, foundations and corporations.

Possibly \$4 billion will be needed in the next decade to meet only those needs for additional hospital beds which come from population growth and increased use of hospital facilities, according to the American Association of Fund-Raising Council. Of this sum at least \$2 billion must come from private individuals, corporate and foundation gifts.

Of the \$6.5 billion given to philanthropy in the United States in 1956, \$5.6 billion came in gifts from individuals and corporations. The twenty-two firms which are members of the American Association of Fund-Raising Council donated in raising about \$750,000,000 in 1956 for hospitals, colleges and universities, churches and other gift-supported institutions.

### Drouth Back In County

### Hansford County S. C. D. News

#### Stubble Mulch Vs. Insects

During the past few years farmers in the Hansford HSD have been experiencing some drought years in which very few crops have been made. Wind and water erosion has made itself known due to the lack of crop residues necessary for control of wind and water erosion. A number of farmers have made the remark that their fields did not have any gullies in them as long as they could grow good wheat but with the dry years and poor crops gullies have begun to show up. With the spring rains many have fields were severely eroded.

Due to the spring rains a heavy crop of residue has been made with wheat, oats and barley. Harvesting of these crops is about over now and the task of plowing the stubble has begun. Now is the time to save that stubble and to save the soil and to save any moisture that falls by practicing stubble mulch tillage.

Stubble mulching provides a cover to the land for protection against wind and water erosion, and to conserve moisture, to intercept and reduce the impact of raindrops and break up the surface water film, permitting greater penetration, reducing pulverized condition of the soil, permit surface decay of organic matter and reduce runoff. Also there is an increase in production.

#### Important Notice To Electric Customers

Bill Berton, manager of Community Public Service Company takes this means of notifying all people of Spearman, that the power supply will be cut off in Spearman from 1:00 a. m. Sunday July 28 until 3:00 a. m. the same date. The power will be off for two hours, while most of us are asleep. This represents a big advancement for this area. The power is being increased from 33,000 volts to 69,000 volts. Because of large private and industrial use in the city, this large voltage will insure sufficient power for a good many years.

#### RECORD YEAR FOR NEW HOSPITALS

Private hospital construction may reach a record in 1957. Such construction in the first half of 1957, was running 40 percent over the same months last year.

On this basis it is estimated expenditures for new hospital construction in 1957 may reach \$423 million, according to Herman F. Reinhardt, recently elected President of the American Association of Fund-Raising. More than \$225 million of this sum is expected to come in contributions from individuals, foundations and corporations.

Possibly \$4 billion will be needed in the next decade to meet only those needs for additional hospital beds which come from population growth and increased use of hospital facilities, according to the American Association of Fund-Raising Council. Of this sum at least \$2.2 billion must come from private individuals, corporate and foundation gifts.

Of the \$6.5 billion given to philanthropy in the United States in 1956, \$5.6 billion came in gifts from individuals and corporations. The twenty-two firms which are members of the American Association of Fund-Raising Council assisted in raising about \$75,000,000 in 1956 for hospitals, colleges and universities, churches and other 501-c3 organizations.

## PANHANDLE OUTDOOR LIFE

S. V. Whitehorn  
The Texas Game and Fish Commission adopted a formal resolution asking the Fifty-fifth Legislature to increase the cost of fishing license from \$1.65 to \$2.15. The Commission also proposed that salt water anglers be included among those required to have a fishing license. It was further proposed that all persons under 17 years of age and all persons over 65 years of age be allowed to fish free. Another proposal by the Game and Fish Commission was the creation of a "Big Game" license to cost \$6. This license to be required of only those who hunted deer, turkey and antelope. This proposal was not accepted but a substitute bill was passed and raised the hunting license from \$2.15 to \$3.15.

The legislature readily agreed to the recommendation to increase the price of hunting and fishing licenses. There had been but a fifteen cent increase in resident hunting license in more than 20 years, and only a fifty cent increase in the cost of a fishing license in more than ten years. Never before in history has the salt water angler paid anything. Individual sportsmen and organized sportsmen gave overwhelming support in favor of paying more into the Special Game and Fish Fund for their wildlife management program.

The number of people who hunt and fish in Texas is less than one fourth of the total population. Only those who hunt fish, or who directly participate in the advantages of the game and fish harvest are required to pay for the wildlife conservation bill.

Long range plans for improving living conditions for wildlife were worked out more than a year ago. These plans anticipated both a work program based on old revenue standards and work to be added if more funds were available. Now that more revenue is anticipated, it is expected that there will be enough money to increase the work program by about 25 per cent.

Eight counties are now included in the law giving the game and fish commission the responsibility of fixing open seasons, bag limits and means of taking game and fish. These regulations must be decided on the

basis of scientific studies made by men who have continually lived with the problems. An expansion of this study program is necessary to meet the additional needs and will cost additional dollars. More trained men must be found to work on this program.

Texas is badly in need of lands to be used as refuges for water fowl, ducks and geese by the thousands come south each fall. If we expect them to spend the winter with us and furnish sport for our hunters, we must provide attractive quarters for them, and also insure enough brood stock will return to northern nesting grounds to raise a new crop of birds for the following year. Each species of game, large and small, needs more help as the pressure of man bears down upon it. Work programs for each are expected to be expanded under a program made stronger by the help of improved financing.

Fishing pressure has expanded with the ever increasing army of anglers, while at the same time, Texas has acquired many new fishing holes in the form of lakes of many depths and sizes that were built as water conservation or multiple-use important water projects. To keep fishing good the undesirable fish must be removed by one means or another. Desirable fish must be planted in the waters and each other work must be done to keep the water clean and free from the water clean must also be kept in the water. The work of the Division of Inland Fisheries.

The information situation division is maintained by the commission to forward all in all phases of wildlife management to individual groups. The adult out department of Texas have consistently supported the idea that the teaching wildlife facts to the school-age children is an important wildlife conservation function. Part of the commission's work in the past has been the preparation and distribution of literature for use by teachers and pupils in our schools. The program should be renewed and expanded. Since the landowner is a key person in the game production business in Texas, he too should be informed. No better work can be done in game management than providing the practical information to help him with his game production and harvest problems. An expansion of information-education-landowner valuable material division will help to bring the more game for a greater profit and pleasure.

### CONGRESSMAN ROGERS SAYS

Along about this time of the year most members of the House of Representatives and the Senate begin to make guesses as to the day on which Congress will adjourn. It had been the opinion of most of the members that adjournment would come some time between the tenth and 20th of August. This continues to be the opinion of those with whom I have talked and also my own. However, a matter has arisen which necessitates a qualification of that estimate. I refer to the action of the U. S. Senate with relation to the Civil Rights bill. When the bill that had passed the House reached the Senate it was, generally understood, it would be referred to the Committee on Judiciary for further study and hearings. However, a coalition in the Senate, made up of Modern Republicans and northern Democrats, circumvented the ordinary procedure in the Senate and bypassed the Judiciary committee. They placed the bill on the Senate calendar to be debated and voted upon by the full Senate, without the benefit of committee hearings. This caused properly utilize the potentialities of the bill. It is not sufficient to argue that the three quite a furor among those who have always adhered strictly to the rules of parliamentary procedure. ## Civil Rights

Many Members of Congress were deeply disturbed by the news stories which came out of the conference between President Eisenhower and Senator Dick Russell of Georgia regarding the so-called Civil Rights Bill. It had been the feeling of several that the President did not realize the bill could be used as a weapon with which to punish the South. This feeling was brought about

by the statement of the President in his press conference to the effect there were some things in the bill he did not clearly understand. However, it is now generally conceded everyone understands that, if this bill becomes law, it can be used as a whip or weapon to punish the Southern states. The discussion between the President and Senator Russell did not indicate any doubt on the part of the President that the law could be used for such purposes. The conference merely brought out that the President did not intend to use the law.

The test of a good law should not be whether or not the head of the government would use the same to abuse people, but whether or not he could so use it.

## THE SUPREME COURT SPEAKS

There is a book titled, *The Supreme Court Speaks*. It is a book I wish everyone could read and thoroughly digest. Many questions in the minds of our people regarding the extent of power vested in the Supreme Court would be answered. This is especially important and timely in view of the many recent decisions of the Court which have been subjected to criticism in the press, on the floor of Congress, and on main street. The reader would fully realize the indispensable necessity of placing only well-balanced individuals on the Court, who are devotedly dedicated to the American way of life. To stray from such policy would be to endanger sorely the very existence of our form of government. This is so because ours is a government by law, and the Supreme Court has the final decisive say

as to what is or is not the law. I received many letters asking why Congress does not pass laws overruling certain decisions rendered by the Supreme Court. In the first place, it is most difficult to pass such a law. We, in Texas, fully appreciate this, because that is exactly what we did in the famous Tidelands case. Those of us who were here dur-

ing that battle will never forget the uphill fight which had to be waged to accomplish it. However, in the second place, I hasten to point out that, even though Congress should pass a law invalidating a decision of the Supreme Court, **WALTER ROGERS, Member of Congress 18th District of Texas**

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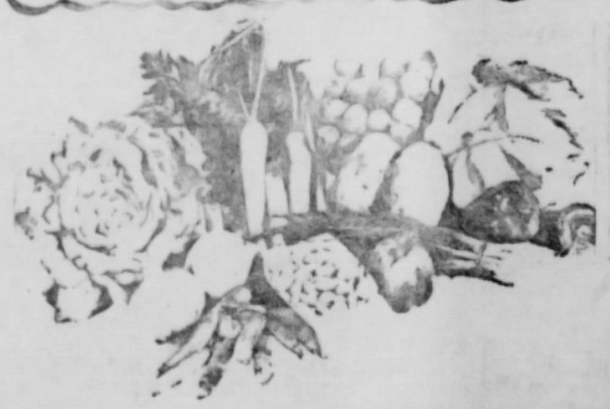

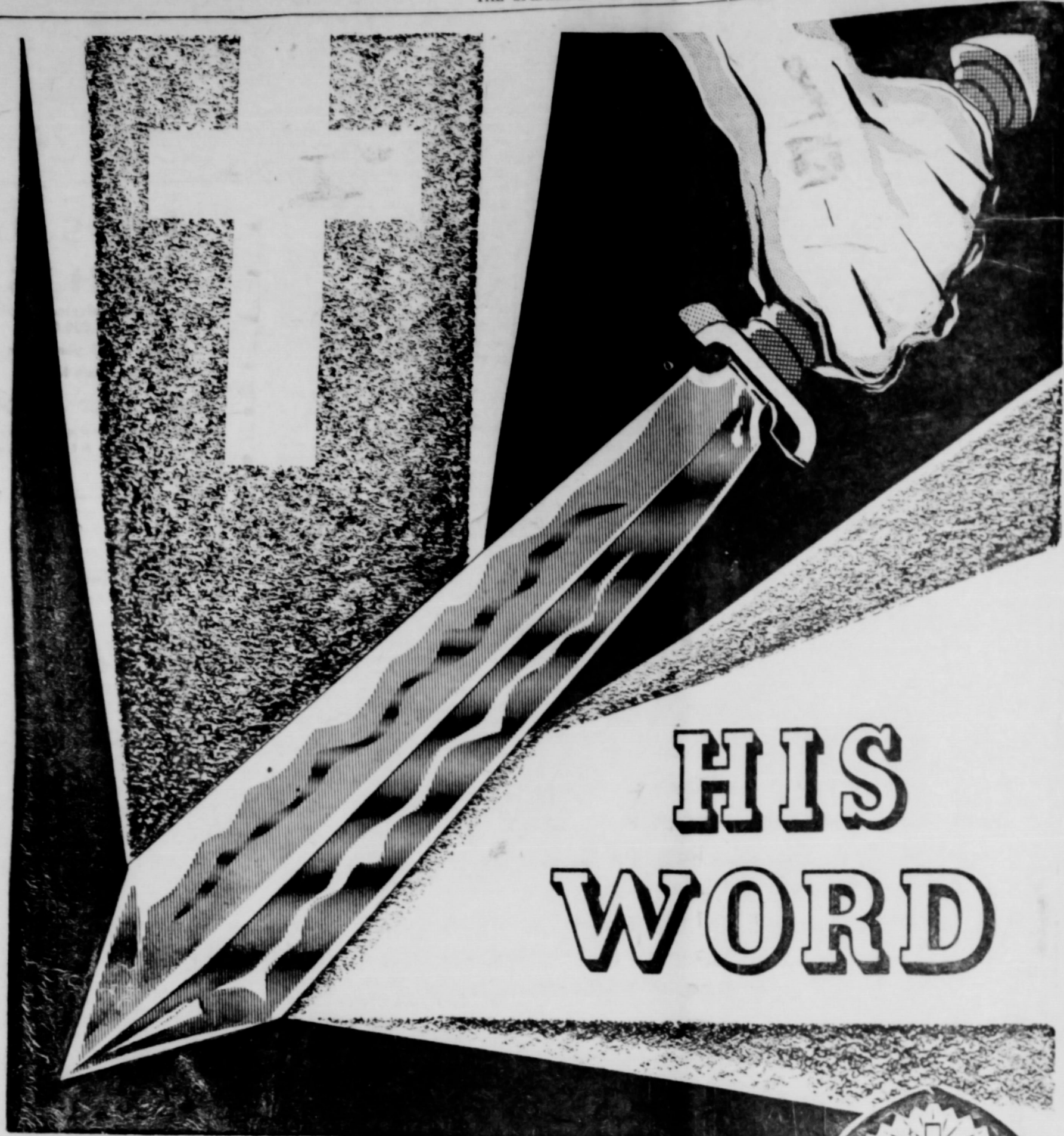

### Hansford County S. C. D. News

#### Stubble Mulch Vs. Insects

During the past few years farmers in the Hansford HSD have been experiencing some drought years in which very few crops have been made. Wind and water erosion has made itself known due to the lack of crop residues necessary for control of wind and water erosion. A number of farmers have made the remark that their fields did not have any gullies in them as long as they could grow good wheat but with the dry years and poor crops gullies have begun to show up. With the spring rains many bare fields were severely eroded.

Due to the spring rains a heavy crop of residue has been made with wheat and barley. Harvesting of these crops is about over now and the task of mowing the stubble has begun. Now is the time to save that stubble and to save the soil and to save any moisture that falls by practicing stubble mulch tillage.

Stubble mulching provides a cover to the land for protection against wind and water erosion, and to conserve moisture, to intercept and reduce the impact of raindrops and break up the surface water film, permitting greater penetration, reducing pulverized condition of the soil, permit surface decay of organic matter and reduce runoff. Also there is an increase in production.

Possibly the outstanding player of the evening was Johnnie Crawford, he allowed only one walk with his accurate pitching for the entire evening.

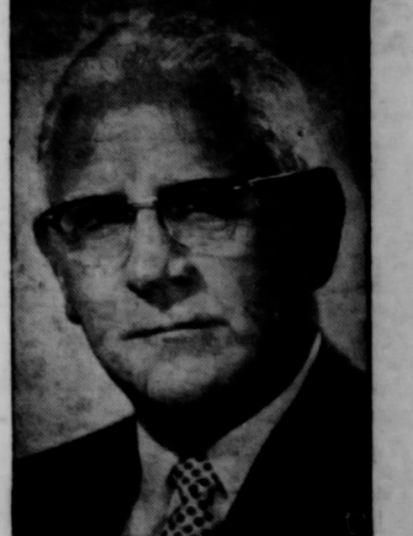

### RECORD YEAR FOR NEW HOSPITALS



Herman F. Reinhardt Private hospital construction may reach a record in 1957. Such construction in the first half of 1957, was running 40 percent over the same months last year.

On this basis it is estimated expenditures for new hospital construction in 1957 may reach \$423 million, according to Herman F. Reinhardt, recently-elected President of the American Association of Fund-Raising. More than \$225 million of this sum is expected to come in contributions from individuals, foundations and corporations.

Possibly \$4 billion will be needed in the next decade to meet only those needs for additional hospital beds which come from population growth and increased use of hospital facilities, according to the American Association of Fund-Raising Counsel. Of this sum at least \$2.2 billion must come from private individuals, corporate and foundation gifts.

Of the \$4.5 billion given to philanthropy in the United States in 1956, \$5.6 billion came in gifts from individuals and corporations. The twenty-two firms which are members of the American Association of Fund-Raising Counsel, including in raising about \$750,000,000 in 1956 for hospitals, colleges and universities, churches and other gifts.

**Shining Silver Without Effort**



With mountains of thank-you notes still outstanding, a sampling of this year's June brides indicates that silver continues to head the list of favorite wedding presents. One of the biggest thrills for any young bride is choosing the silver pattern that will decorate her table the rest of her life.

It's a safe bet, however, that before the last thank-you is penned, the time-consuming chore of polishing silver will have caused many new brides to store away their flatware for just special occasions.

The makers of a leading detergent, who now are offering a \$3.50 pair of decorative silver plated candy dishes as a dollar premium, have some proven suggestions for keeping silver bright with a minimum of effort.

Even though washed promptly after each use, silver in time builds up a coat of tarnish. Happily, the easiest cleaning technique is also the safest. Even the gentlest silver cleaning compounds contain mild abrasives that rub away some

of the silver itself while removing the tarnish. The electrolytic method removes just the tarnish from both sterling and plated silver.

Place a large piece of aluminum foil bright side up in the bottom of an enameled dishpan. Add enough boiling water to cover the silver with one tablespoon of Silver Dust detergent for each quart of water used. Cool slightly before adding the silver; make sure that each piece touches either the foil or is in contact with another piece that does.

Let stand a few minutes. Then remove, rinse and dry. Buff with a soft cloth for truly shining silver. The only caution is not to use the short-cut method on candlesticks which are usually soldered.

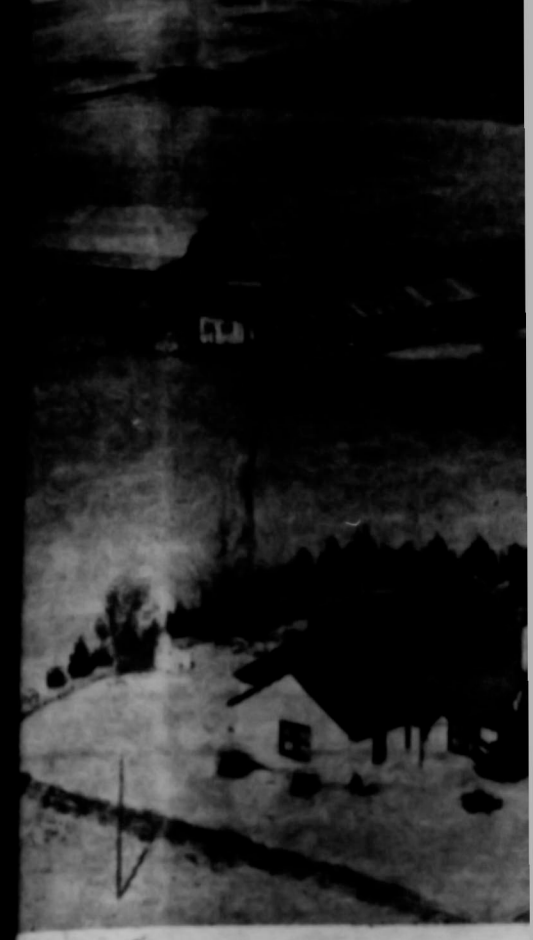

# Two Die In Collision Monday Fire Consumes Stationwagon!

## FUNERAL RITES HELD FOR MR. AND MRS. THOMAS BROWN JULY 31ST. AT 2:00 P. M.

The entire City of Spearman was in a state of shock Tuesday, as result of a terrible collision, South of Spearman, Monday night, that took the life of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown. The accident occurred about 5 miles South, near the Garnett Irrigation well, at an intersection of two dirt roads.

Injured are Brown's infant son, Douglas; Mrs. Billie Brown, 25, of Guyman; her two sons, Kelly, 4, and David, 2, and the driver of the pick-up, 80 year old Glen Bennett of Spearman.

Surviving without serious injuries is Mrs. Brown's husband, Raymond Brown. He was driver of the 1957 station wagon. Thomas Brown, and Raymond Brown, whose families were traveling together in the station wagon were cousins.

The Brown families were enroute to the Tommy Brown farm home located a mile South of the Jack Taylor farm home. Mr. Bennett was also enroute to his home after visiting the Clint Bennett West place.

The Sheriff Department reported that the Brown vehicle was hit broadside at the intersection of the two dirt roads four miles South of Spearman at about 9:00 p. m. Monday night. All persons from both vehicles were apparently thrown from the wreckage as the station wagon and pick-up virtually exploded from concussion. It is a miracle that anyone survived the wreck.

The stationwagon was turned over twice and burned. The 1954 model pick-up truck remained upright. Mrs. Thomas Brown was pinned under the station wagon and was the only one burned.

Raymond Brown, who was apparently knocked-out only temporarily, reported that he moved the injured near the burning stationwagon and then walked to the farm home of Jack Taylor about a quarter of a mile away. Sheriff Cooke credits Raymond Brown with possibly saving the lives of those injured by his quick action immediately after the accident. However, Raymond was considerably discouraged as the Taylor home place was vacant at the time and Brown then walked more than a mile to Highway 15 where he summoned help from Francis Jones who was driving a station wagon.

Francis and Brown returned to the scene of the accident where the dead and injured were loaded into Jones vehicle and rushed to Hansford hospital here in Spearman.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown were pronounced dead on arrival. Mrs. Billie Brown was listed in critical condition with a severe back injury and was transferred to Amarillo to be under the care of a Specialist.

Survivors of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown include their three children, Wesley 5, Kathi 3, and Douglas, the nine month old baby, in the accident. Brown also is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Brown of Spearman, and his grandmother, Mrs. T. H. Coffin of Pampa. Mrs. Brown is survived by her mother, Mrs. Lillian Morris, and a sister, Judy Morris, both of Ponca City, Okla.; her father, Kenneth Bennett and a brother, Ben Bennett, both of Gladewater, Texas.

Memorial services were held at the First Baptist church in Spearman Wednesday afternoon, July 31st.

31st Rev. O. L. Bryant, pastor of the First Baptist Church and Rev. J. Waide Griffin, pastor of the First Methodist church officiated at the Memorial services.

**Shining Silver Without Effort**



With mountains of thank-you notes still outstanding, a sampling of this year's June brides indicates that silver continues to head the list of favorite wedding presents. One of the biggest thrills for any young bride is choosing the silver pattern that will decorate her table the rest of her life.

It's a safe bet, however, that before the last thank-you is penned, the time-consuming chore of polishing silver will have caused many new brides to store away their flatware for just special occasions. The makers of a leading detergent, who now are offering a \$3.50 pair of decorative silver plated candy dishes as a dollar premium, have some proven suggestions for keeping silver bright with a minimum of effort. Even though washed promptly after each use, silver in time builds up a coat of tarnish. Happily, the easiest cleaning technique is also the safest. Even the gentlest silver cleaning compounds contain mild abrasives that rub away some

of the silver itself while removing the tarnish. The electrolytic method removes just the tarnish from both sterling and plated silver. Place a large piece of aluminum foil bright side up in the bottom of an enameled dishpan. Add enough boiling water to cover the silver with one tablespoon of Silver Dust detergent for each quart of water used. Cool slightly before adding the silver; make sure that each piece touches either the foil or is in contact with another piece that does. Let stand a few minutes. Then remove, rinse and dry. Buff with a soft cloth for truly shining silver. The only caution is not to use the short-cut method on candlesticks which are usually soldered.

## Two Die In Collision Monday Fire Consumes Stationwagon!

### FUNERAL RITES HELD FOR MR. AND MRS. THOMAS BROWN JULY 31ST. AT 2:00 P. M.

The entire City of Spearman was in a state of Shock Tuesday, as result of a terrible collision, South of Spearman, Monday night, that took the life of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown. The accident occurred about 5 miles South, near the Garnett Irrigation well, at an intersection of two dirt roads.

Injured are Brown's infant son, Douglas; Mrs. Billie Brown, 25, of Guyton; her two sons, Kelly 4, and David 2, and the driver of the pick-up, 50 year old Glen Bennett of Spearman.

Surviving without serious injuries is Mrs. Brown's husband, Raymond Brown. He was driver of the 1957 station wagon, Thomas Brown, and Raymond Brown, whose families were traveling together in the station wagon were cousins.

The Brown families were enroute to the Tommy Brown farm home located a mile South of the Jack Taylor farm home. Mr. Bennett was also enroute to his home after visiting the Clint Bennett West place.

The Sheriff Department reported that the Brown vehicle was hit broadside at the intersection of the two dirt roads four miles South of Spearman at about 9:00 p. m. Monday night. All persons from both vehicles were apparently thrown from the wreckage as the station wagon and pick-up virtually exploded from concussion. It is a miracle that anyone survived the wreck.

The stationwagon was turned over twice and burned. The 1954 model pick-up truck remained upright. Mrs. Thomas Brown was pinned under the station wagon and was the only one burned.

Raymond Brown, who was apparently knocked-out only temporarily, reported that he moved the injured from near the burning stationwagon and then walked to the farm home of Jack Taylor about a quarter of a mile away. Sheriff Cooke credits Raymond Brown with possibly saving the lives of those injured by his quick action immediately after the accident. However, Raymond was considerably discouraged as the Taylor home place was vacant at the time and Brown then walked more than a mile to Highway 15, where he summoned help from Francis Jones who was driving a station wagon.

Francis and Brown returned to the scene of the accident where the dead and injured were loaded into Jones vehicle and rushed to Hansford hospital here in Spearman.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown were pronounced dead on arrival. Mrs. Billie Brown was listed in critical condition with a severe back injury and was transferred to Amarillo to be under the care of a Specialist.

Survivors of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brown include their three children, Wesley 5, Kathi 3, and Douglas, the nine month old baby in the accident. Brown also is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Brown of Spearman and his grandmother, Mrs. T. H. Coffin of Pampa. Mrs. Brown is survived by her mother, Mrs. Lillian Morris, and a sister, Judy Morris both of Ponca City, Okla.; her father, Kenneth Bennett and a brother, Ben Bennett, both of Gladewater, Texas.

Memorial services were held at the First Baptist church in Spearman Wednesday afternoon, July 31st.

31st. Rev. O. L. Bryant, pastor of the First Baptist Church and Rev. J. Waide Griffin, pastor of the First Methodist church officiated at the Memorial services.

Interment was at the Pampa Cemetery under direction of Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home.

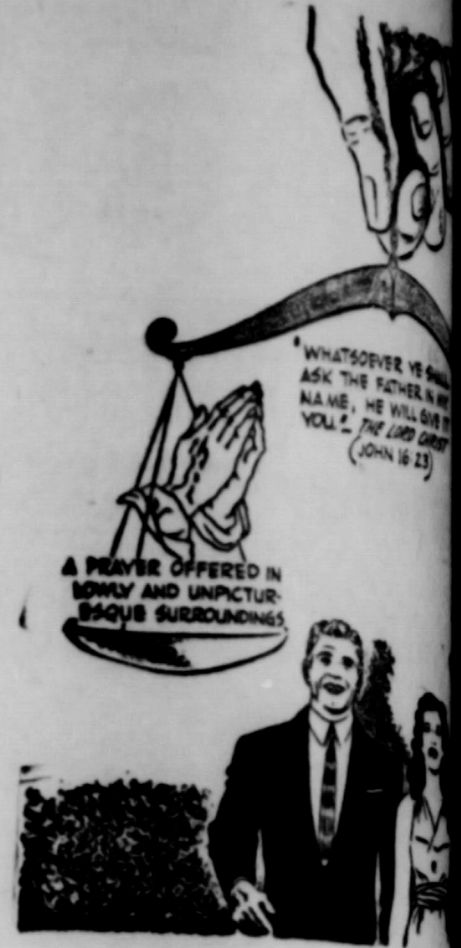

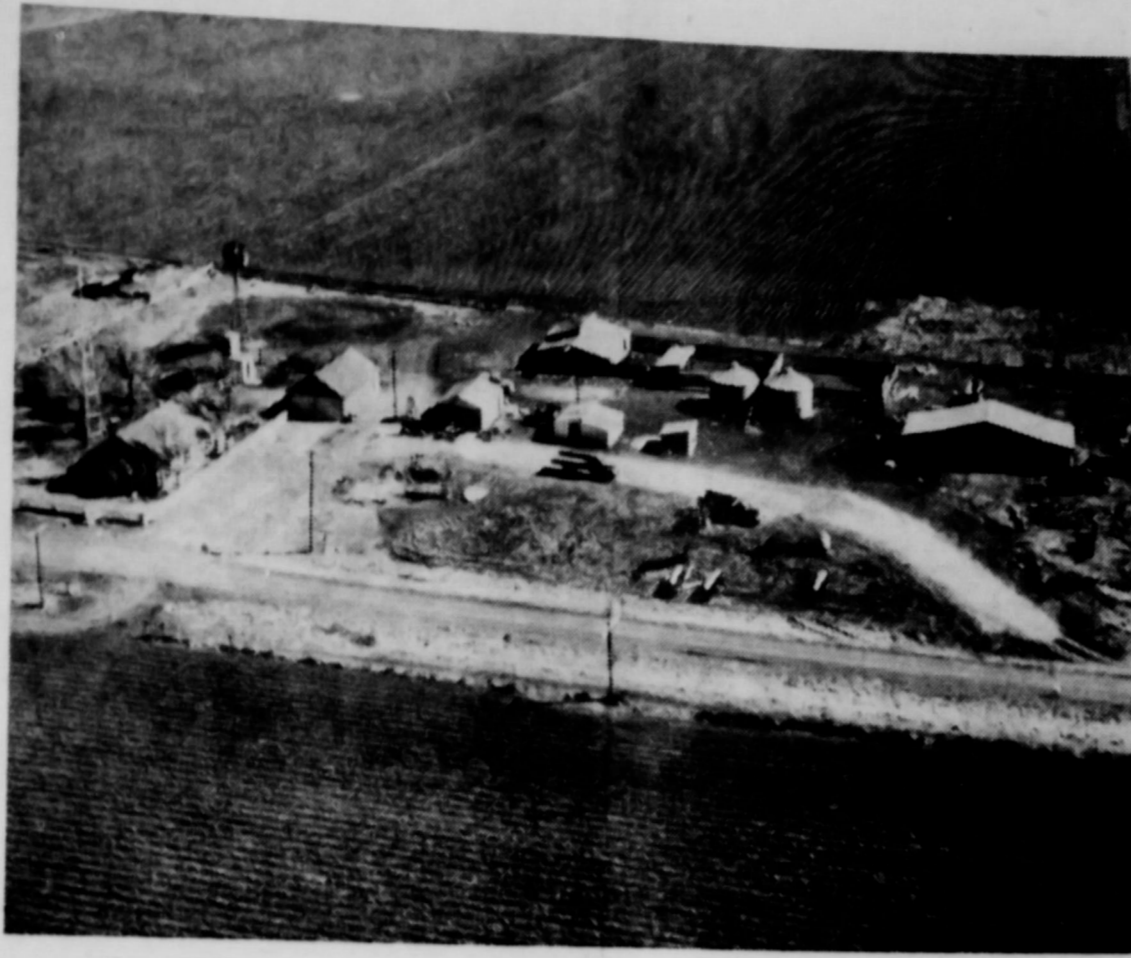

# Norma C. Berner Is Teacher Of The Year

The article printed below copied from the Duncan newspaper should prove of interest to many local citizens. Norma Berner is the daughter of Mrs. J. F. Berner and sister of Mrs. Mable Edwards, Mrs. Dot Jenkins, Mrs. Mattie Ruth Richardson, all of Spearman and Mrs. Leah Cross of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Norma Catherine Berner, 913 Pecan, who has taught students in Duncan for three decades, was recognized today as Stephen County's "Teacher of the Year."

Miss Berner was selected by a special Oklahoma Education Association committee. She began teaching in 1918 at World War I was being recent history 39 years ago.

For the past 30 years she has taught in Duncan, last year at the Junior High faculty as a mathematics instructor.

Her 39 years of continuous teaching service in the county is the longest, with the exception of three county teachers previously honored. Miss Berner will represent this county in September at Teachers Recognition day events at the Oklahoma City State fair.

A "Service to Oklahoma Youth" award will be given to one of the visiting teachers at the fair. Miss Berner attended Oklahoma College for Women, Chickasha; the University of Oklahoma, Norman, Oklahoma; and Central Teachers College, Elmore. She began teaching at Gotebo.

She taught at Edmonds in 1919 and 1920; Sealed, 1920-23; Comanche, 1923-26; and Healdton 1926-27, before coming here in 1927.

Since then, Miss Berner has taught in Irving, Emerson and the Junior High school.

**ON THE BALLOT**

All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in a bond of the United States, or in both issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of which is guaranteed by the United States or in such securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of these funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due on such bonds or securities, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such enabling laws shall not be invalid by reason of its retroactive character. The enabling laws shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the first general election to be held after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots cast shall be printed thereon the following:

Claims should be filed on form 249 on or after July 1, but no later than September 30, 1937. Last year a million and a quarter farmers filed claims for refunds to the Federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes, and refunds averaged \$20. It is estimated that the number of claims for refunds this year will be close to 2,500,000, and the total refund is expected to increase correspondingly. These expected increases are due to an increase in the Federal tax rate from two to three cents a gallon due to the fact that an entire year will be covered by these claims whereas only taxes paid on gas used during the first six months of 1936 were subject to the 1936 rate last year.

The farmer's tax refund outlines in plain language the procedure to be followed in filing a claim for refund of the gas tax. It also explains conditions under which the farmer may purchase diesel fuel and other special motor fuels to be used for farm purposes, without payment of the Federal tax thereon.

They will return home Saturday, August 3rd.

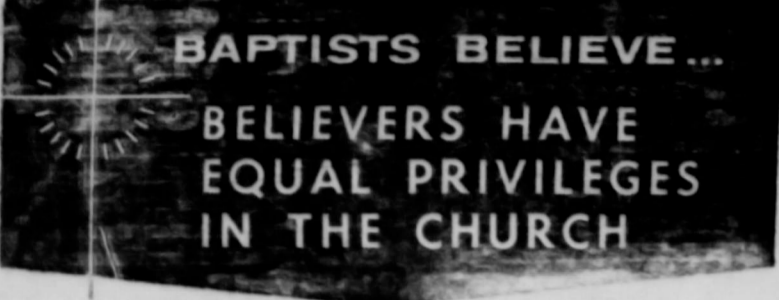
**Melba Cantrell Weds George Rook, Jr.**
