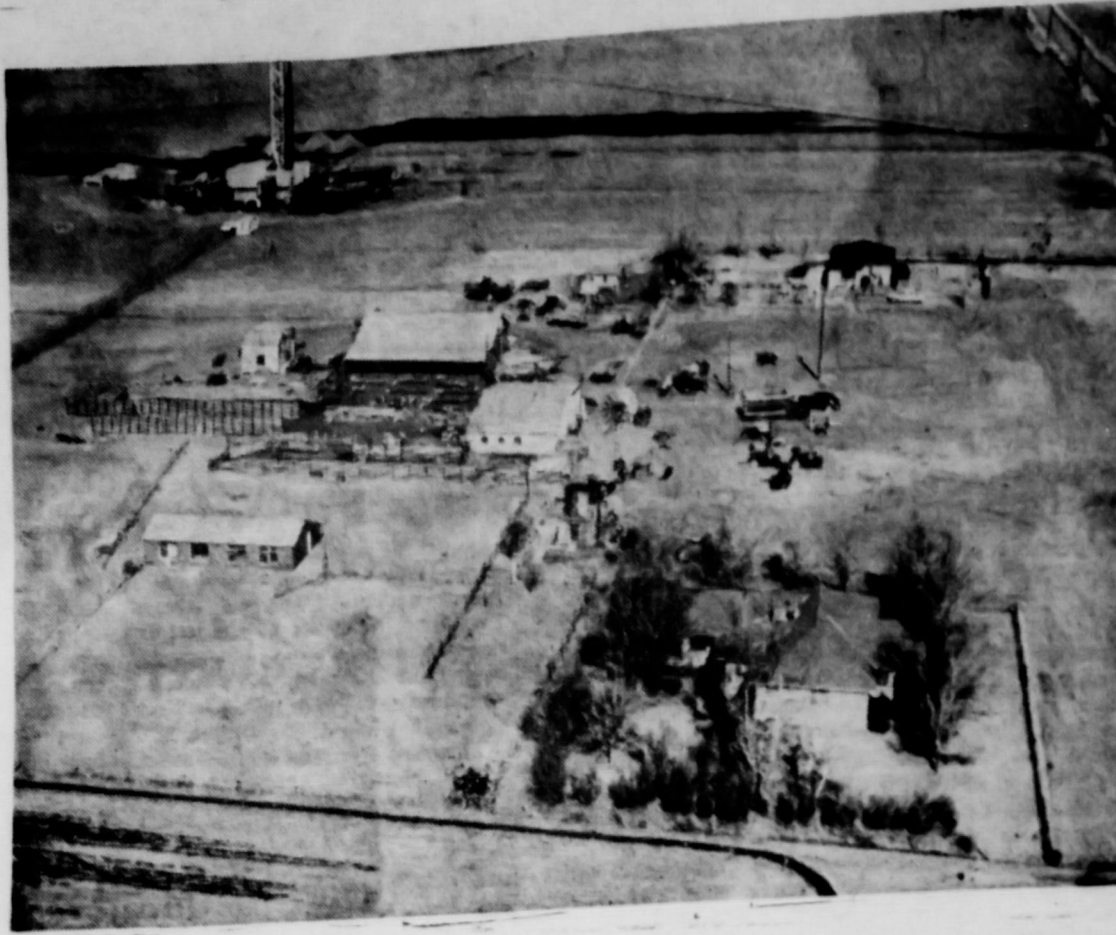

The farm homes pictured above, are those of G. A. and David Burger, near Waka, Texas. Mr. Burger has been on this farm since 1926, and he and Mrs. Burger raised four children. They are David, who lives in the smaller farm home pictured above, Lois, who is Mrs. Arlan Heusinkveld, of Wichita, Kansas. Laverne, who is a hospital technician, in Puerto Rico, and Fay Jean, who is married to Eldo Gurley, and they live North of Waka.

David is a graduate of Perryton high school and attended McPherson College in Kansas, and was majoring in chemistry, when he joined the service during World War 2. David has four children; they are, Ann 12, Richard 10, Sharon 8, and Jerry 3. All of the children go to the Waka Independent school.

I have been afraid to ask anyone about the maize harvest. So far as I know we will lose a lot of maize because the weather is taking a big toll. Looks like we can't get everything just right for a chance to pick up some of the losses we have sustained during the drought years.

This writer has been holding up on releasing some news that is now history, although we do not have any authorized statement to back it up. Namely, the fact that the Pipe Line division of The Northern Natural Gas organization will be moved to this city in the not to distant future. When and if this happens—and it will—we anticipate that at least a dozen new houses will be constructed and perhaps as many as 30 families will move in to Spearman to man the installation. If any one denies this rumor the country editor is just a big story teller—but we believe every word of the rumor.

We will be in position to announce the construction of a Federal Housing project in Spearman, that will house 30 families in a few days. This will be a low rental housing project and it will really relieve some of the lack of housing that we now have in Spearman. Work will begin on this project, we expect late in the Spring of 1958.

Do you know which members of your family would be eligible for social security benefits if anything should happen to you? John R. Sanderson, district manager of the Amarillo social security office said that many questions received in the district office indicate that workers and their families do not understand the survivors benefits provided in the social security law. Consequently, families may lose benefits in the event of the death of the worker.

The law now permits widows to draw monthly benefits at age 62. Widows who are younger may draw monthly benefits if they have in their care a child of the deceased worker who is entitled to benefits. Sanderson said most people know that a child of a deceased worker is entitled to benefits until age 18. Many people, however, are not aware that a disabled son or daughter over 18 may now qualify for a child's benefit if the disability began before age 18.

Under certain circumstances a widower who was dependent on his wife may qualify for monthly benefits. Dependent parents may qualify if the worker was not survived by a spouse or a child entitled to monthly benefits.

Mr. Sanderson pointed out that in almost every case a lump-sum death benefit can be paid to survivors. This payment is in addition to any monthly benefits the family may get. He emphasized that benefits are not paid automatically; families must make application for them.

The social security office recommends that every worker find out what payments may be due his family in the event of his death. Workers need this information to plan effectively for the financial security of their families. Your social security office has a booklet entitled "Your Social Security" which provides this information. You may write or telephone your social security office for a copy.

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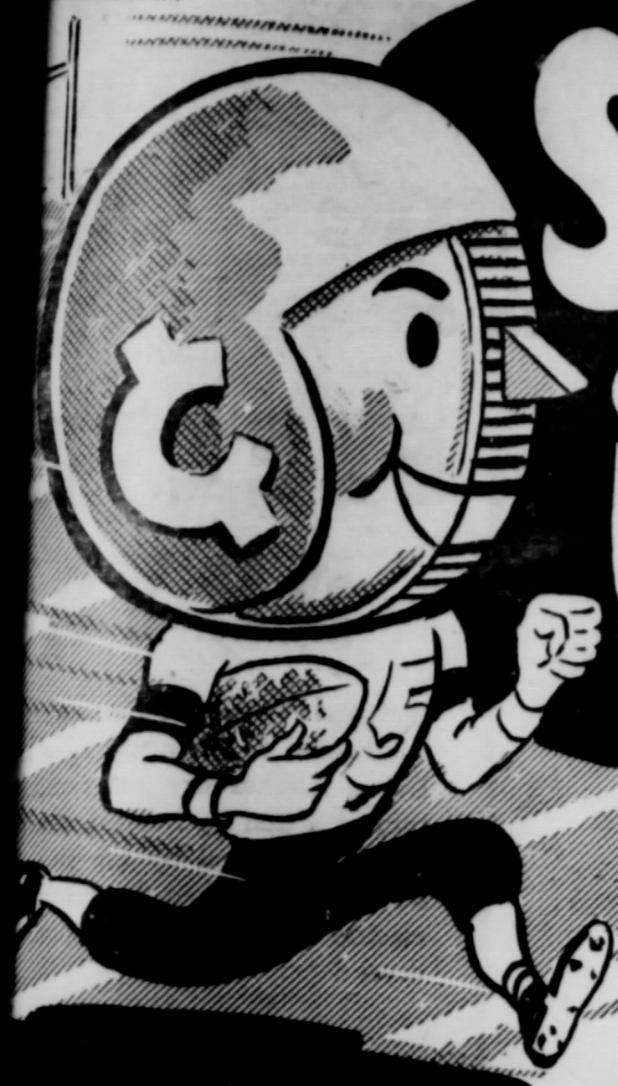

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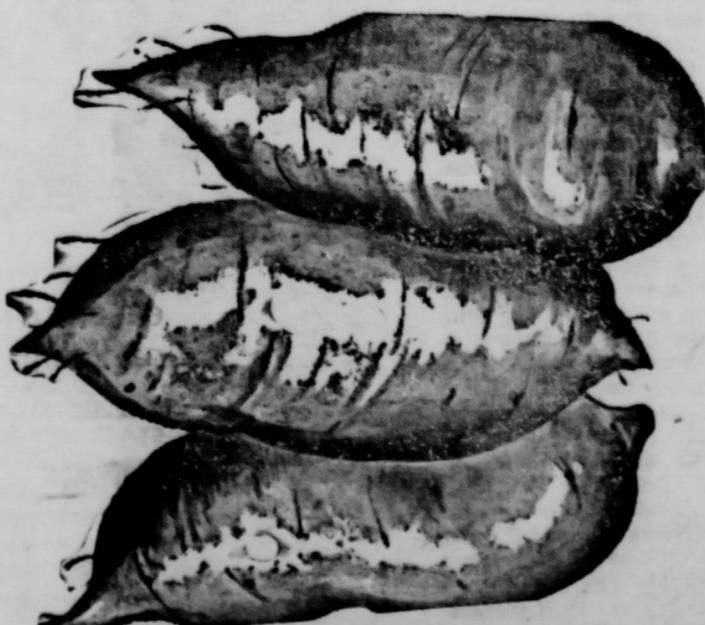

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Washington News Letter From Your Congressman Walter Rogers

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT: WHAT PRICE BICKERING

It is the opinion of quite a few here in Washington that Russia's successful launching of two satellites in advance of such an accomplishment in this country, is the price which has been paid by our people for inter-service rivalry, and bickering between the air force, navy, army. Whether or not our failure to equal Russia in this particular achievement is the result of bickering may be a debatable question. That there has been such bickering within the defense dept. is not debatable. The only question in this regard is whether or not the full extent of that bickering has been publicized. Frankly I do not believe Congress is fully aware of what has been going on in this regard. It is true there were Congressional investigations on the subject. But it must be remembered that the vast expense of the defense department of this country could provide many hiding places for matters which could not be dug out by a surface investigation. The three services involved are intergal parts of the defense department which is headed by a man of Cabinet rank. The purpose of the laws creating the defense department was to unify all the services so there could be a full coordination of effort. The evidence at hand would make it appear that such has not been realized. Under the circumstances, it would seem to me that the early days of the coming session of Congress should produce a full, complete and thorough investigation, to the end that the results sought in the unification act might be a reality rather than a figure of speech. Jealousy of jurisdiction or pride of authorship in an individual or a small group of individuals, can be a very dangerous thing when the security of the country is involved. If the President, or his appointed Cabinet officer cannot control such activities, then Congress must act without delay. This country cannot afford the price.

THE PRESIDENT'S SPEECH

I was glad to see the President get more specific in his "Science and National Security" speech than he has in many of his press conferences and other recent talks. He has been the subject of some caustic criticism for indulging in too many generalities and platitudes. The American people have always enjoyed patriotic speeches in eloquent words, well termed phrases and beautiful quotes. They enjoy these just as forms of entertainment; however, when the time comes that they want facts, they want the facts in cold unvarnished truth. They don't want to be misled or lulled into a false sense of security. They want to know, in the briefest, clearest and most concise terms, what the challenge is and what will be required by way of sacrifice, or otherwise, to meet and overcome it. So long as that spirit prevails and the leaders of this nation have the courage to present facts in plain, simple and understandable terms, there will always be a strong United States of America.

It is difficult to understand how Russia was able to forge ahead in launching the earth satellites. Tremendous sums of money have been provided for scientific exploration in this country behind the tightly locked doors of "classified-security reasons". I have always been led to believe that such precautions were necessary and that our scientific advances were keeping up with all other countries in the world. The President's speech is a reaffirmation which has been made to the Congress—that is, our scientific programs are on schedule and we are ahead of a number of other countries including Russia, in several departments. These reassurances are fine up to a certain point, but we are fast approaching a situation where concrete evidence will be demanded. When that time comes, the defense department certainly should be in a position to provide it.

GRAIN SORGHUM MOISTURE CONTENT

The eligibility requirements of grain sorghum for Commodity Credit Corporation loan, from a moisture content standpoint, poses a very serious problem in our district. The moisture content allowable did not create too much of a problem for some time, simply because we had a drought and it would have been difficult to have gotten 13 per cent moisture in the grain sorghum. However, this year the rains came and the moisture content jumped. I have had a long conference with one of the officials of the CCC on this subject matter and have advised him that it will be necessary for some changes to be made if the present crop is to be saved. I have also dispatched a letter to Mr. Benson and other officials of the Department of Agriculture on the same subject matter pointing up the problem. As the matter presently stands, wheat with a moisture content of 14 percent is eligible for loan. Grain sorghum is not eligible if it has in excess of 13 percent moisture. It is true that elevator operators can accept 14 percent moisture content mill for CCC loans, if the operator will certify that he will deliver to CCC grain sorghum having a moisture of

not in excess of 13 percent. This simply means the elevator operator must dry the 14 percent back to 13 percent or commingle the 14 percent with a sufficient amount of 12 or 11 percent to reduce the average moisture content to 13 percent. This will not suffice for our needs this year, and our every effort will be continued to bring about an increase in the moisture content allowed.

Gruver PTA Study Well Attended

Most of the duck and goose hunters in the top part of the Panhandle have been having poor luck in bagging their five ducks and six (6) geese per hunt. Many of last fall's lakes are now dry even though there was much rainfall during 1957 than there was in 56. Most of the spring and summer rain fell slow and didn't put out any "stock water."

There is thousands of acres of maize in the field with some of it on the ground, it has fallen over. This vast amount of feed would keep the migratory waterfowl here in the Panhandle all winter if there was sufficient water for the birds to seek protection from the hunters. My guess is that many of the ducks and geese will move on to the south plains for a stay instead of remaining in this area. There are many lakes, tanks etc below the Palo Duro all the way to south of Lubbock, so I have been told.

The daily bag limit for ducks is five with a possession limit of ten. Daily bag limit for geese is six (6) provided such limit shall not contain more than two (2) Canadian geese or its subspecies or one (1) whitefronted goose, or one each. Possession limit is one day legal kill or six.

What other species of geese is there in order to finish up the daily bag of six? The snow goose, the white one, with black wing tips would have to be included in the game bag.

The quail situation, in many parts of the Panhandle resembles the duck and goose, in that there is a vast amount of food on the ground that will not be consumed for lack of birds. Late report from A. S. Jackson, head wildlife Biologist for the Panhandle indicates that the quail population in Hemphill is not quite so large as I have predicted in the past. However, there will be a fair amount of bobwhites in that county plus a large crop of these birds further south.

Due to the huge weed crop on the Gene Howe Wildlife Refuge plus some other conflicting complications the Panhandle Birding Ass'n will not conduct the fall birding field trials this year near Canandian but will go all out towards having a wing ding at the spring trials which will be pulled off sometime in March. Jim Pell, Pres. of the club stated that the weeds are of such height on the trial grounds that it would be difficult for the handlers and the judges to observe a dog at work.

November 16th at one half hour before sunrise the deer and turkey season for the Panhandle will open. There will be but very few if any more turkey in the birds this summer but due to the cool damp spring the hatch was very poor.

A. S. Jackson related that there were several turkey nests found deserted on the game Howe refuge. Mr. Jackson stated that evidently the cold wet weather in the spring was the chief cause of this practice. Jackson also stated that some of these turkey hens re-nested and that there would be a late hatch in that part of the Panhandle.

The Texas Panhandle has been a very limited turkey haven for hundreds of majestic birds due to the fact that the range is so definitely limited. Along the creeks and draws leading to the Canadian river is where most of these birds are found. Hackberry, skunk brush berries plus grass seeds make up a large part of their winter diet. Some authorities say that in order to have an ideal range pecans and acorns are necessary. We have neither of these two species of bird food but somehow we do have more turkeys than many parts of the state that are considered ideal turkey range. Pecans will not grow much less thrive in this part of the state. The same is true with oak trees that is the type that produce acorns in abundance. There is an introduced specie of tree that really grows in abundance here and the tree produces more food per given amount of land than either the pecan or the oak. This tree is the Russian Olive. It is adapted to dry cold climates and it also produces a fruit that somewhat resembles a dried-up olive that the turkeys and quail really take to. These trees can be purchased thru the local county agent (I think) or thru the S. C. S.

If the Canadian river and its tributaries were decorated with this fruitful tree the carrying capacity of this area would more than triple in the way if increased game.
