

Needy blind persons who are aged, needy blind, and needy children sona fide citizens of Texas and from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42, from Forty-

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislature and one fide citizens of Texas at least five (6) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.
