Federal Aid Highway Bill

The Conference Report on the Federal Aid Highway Bill of 1958 was adopted last week and included provisions against certain types of outdoor advertising along interstate highways visible from the main portion of the highway and within a distance of 660 feet. Such regulation would be consistent with standards to be prepared by the Secretary of Commerce, and only four types of signs would be permitted: (1) Directional or other official signs and notices required or authorized by law; (2) Signs permitted by State law advertising activities within 12 miles of the point at which the signs are located, which signs are consistent with the national policy and standards; (3) Signs advertising the sale or lease of property upon which they are located; and (4) Signs designed to give information in the specific interest of the traveling public which are erected pursuant to State law and which are consistent with the national policy and standards.

I voted against these measures, because it is my opinion that the use of a man's land should be regulated only in accordance with the police powers of the state and by the state—not by the federal government.

TIME TO FIGHT CANCER

This is Cancer Control Month, the annual occasion for the American Cancer Society's Cancer Crusade. That great public service organization is the only national voluntary health agency fighting cancer in three fronts — through research designed to find new methods of cure for this disease and eventually to conquer it, professional and public education, and service to cancer patients.

Momentous strides are being made in the attack on man's cruellest enemy. In the last twenty years more progress has been made in understanding cancer than all the previous history of mankind. This is largely due to the fine assistance volunteers in the April Crusade, both men and women, have given to the ACS. There are nearly two million Cancer Crusaders.

More people die of cancer each year, but more are being saved from it. Until the spring of 1956, statisticians estimated that one in four Americans who had cancer was being cured. At the Third National Cancer Conference in Detroit in June, 1956, it was disclosed that one in three was being saved. From one-in-four to one-in-three means that some 38,000 lives are being saved annually which would have been lost to cancer a decade ago. In all, about 150,000 are saved in this country each year. That is heartening, but physicians agree that one in two—half of those who develop cancer, or 225,000—could be saved today by earlier diagnosis and prompt treatment.

The Society has led the way to the greatest research attack ever launched against a single disease, and has devoted nearly \$60,000,000 to research since World War II. Its spokesmen have been leaders in persuading Congress to appropriate large sums for this work.

The American Cancer Society is not a permanent organization. It is working hard to put itself out of business. It will last only until cancer is conquered. Public contributions to enable the Society to carry on its attack have mounted from less than a million dollars in 1944 to more than \$29,000,000 in 1957. To continue this accelerating attack, the Society relies on its independent fund-raising and The 1958 goal: \$30,000,000.

Certainly the ACS, in seeking that goal deserves all possible support from the public.

Mrs. Billy Miller is Chairman for the Hansford County Crusade for Cancer Funds. Hansford County's goal is \$1,600.00. Mrs. Miller stated she had not organized the usual door-to-door solicitation but is banking on the people to help put this quota over by sending in their donations to CANCER, care of your local post office, or Freeman Barkley, at the First State Bank. Mr. Barkley is the Treasurer of the local unit.

The business firms will be called on however. They expect to give, and do so generously each year.

In Morse, Texas the Cancer Chairman is Mrs. Elva Jean Thuit in the Oslo Community the Chairman is Mrs. Emil Knutson. In Gruver, Texas the Chairman is Rev. Herbert Hughes. He has an assistant, and they are planning a Crusade in Gruver. Each of these Cancer Volunteers will appreciate your cooperation in Giving Generously.

Church services will be held next Sunday at 9:30 and Sunday school and children's choir practice will follow.

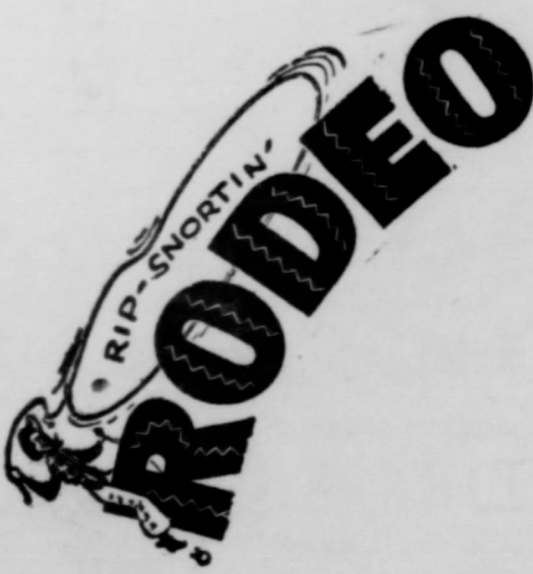

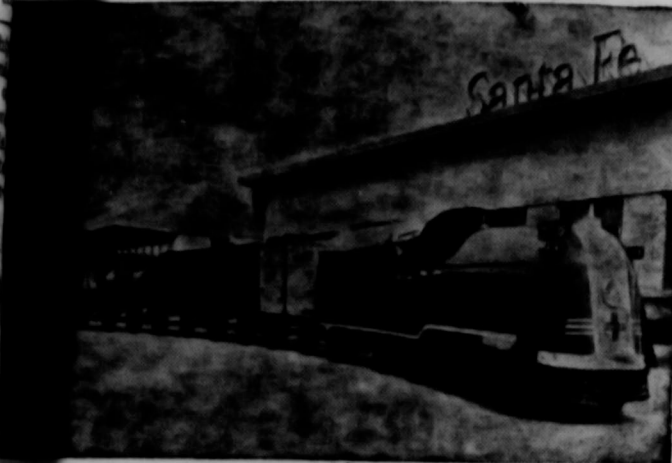

The Santa Fe Railway's miniature freight train has been a favorite at parades or civic celebrations in on-line communities for years. Modernized a number of times during that period, the one-car freight train is 92 feet long, weighs nearly 14,000 pounds and stands six feet and seven inches high. It is headquartered at Topeka, Kans.

From Chicago to Los Angeles, Denver to Galveston the popular engineer on the line children and adults alike is A. Benson, chief engineer, mechanic and nurse- in-charge of the Santa Fe's best exhibit, the miniature freight train.

Now old in service, but newly grown up, "the baby" happily had the run of the line since 1925. Originally designed and built by Topeka Shop for their annual crafts picnic parade, the prize-winning wagon forsook its birthplace for the Rutledge of Benson in its travels. Since it first in Topeka it has proudly carried the AT&SF insignia into 176 communities.

Despite the mishaps and hurries of a railroader, it has missed a parade, rodeo, jubilee or fair under guidance of Benson. "In fact," says "that train sometimes goes where we are going better than I do. Take last summer for instance. I was bound home for Lubbock after a parade in Lubbock. The agent at Lubbock told me the train had taken off for Amarillo. Figuring I was on a goose chase I lit out after it. Amarillo and La Hanta, I slept and no food I finally caught up with it in Garden City at 9:30 in the morning of the parade. We didn't have time to spit and polish, but we made the parade at 10 o'clock."

With 194 5th little freight train as a companion in the miniature freight train built by Topeka shopmen for their 1926 picnic parade as a follow-up to the successful appearance of the

year old tyke, son of an employe who came down for the parade all dressed like a porter. He even had his face blacked. We put him on the observation platform and did the parade in style that day.

The miniature train is frequently in a parade where floats compete for prizes, but the little train is never run as an entry. "We're just there to tell people about the Santa Fe, and hope they will like us", Benson explained.

Now that the summer parades are lining up, BMenson is once again getting the train in shape again, and so far as we know the appearance here on April 25-26th will open another season for Mr. Benson.

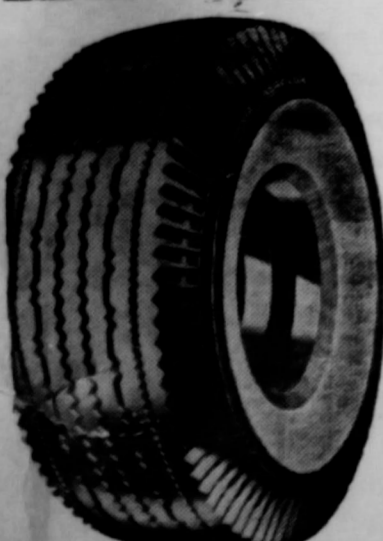

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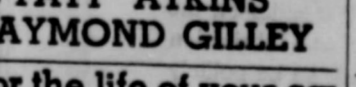

Storing Winter Woollens
Before storing those winter woollens, be sure they are clean... Extension clothing specialist reminded us that perspiration weakens wool, grit cuts it and spots attract

moths. First examine garments carefully and clean or wash as directed on the label. Before washing, give special treatment to spots and stains. Also measure your knitted garments so they can be pulled back into shape after washing. Guard against damage from clothes moths. Dry cleaning kills all forms at the time of treatment, but does not insure permanent protection. Garments placed in sealed paper bags immediately after cleaning will be protected indefinitely. Moth-proof washable woollens when you launder them. Directions for doing this are given in the Extension Leaflet 156, "Clothes Moths". The new building is 38' x 60'. The owner of the building is Kenneth G. Kohler of Amarillo, Texas. The general contractor is W. C. Humphrey, Amarillo.

The building will contain 816 new lock boxes and all other equipment is being installed new. It will feature the new modern bank type finance counters.

The old building was occupied for a period of ten years and 9 months. It originally had 581 lock boxes. In February 1956, 135 additional boxes were added and they were rented within a period of 3 months.

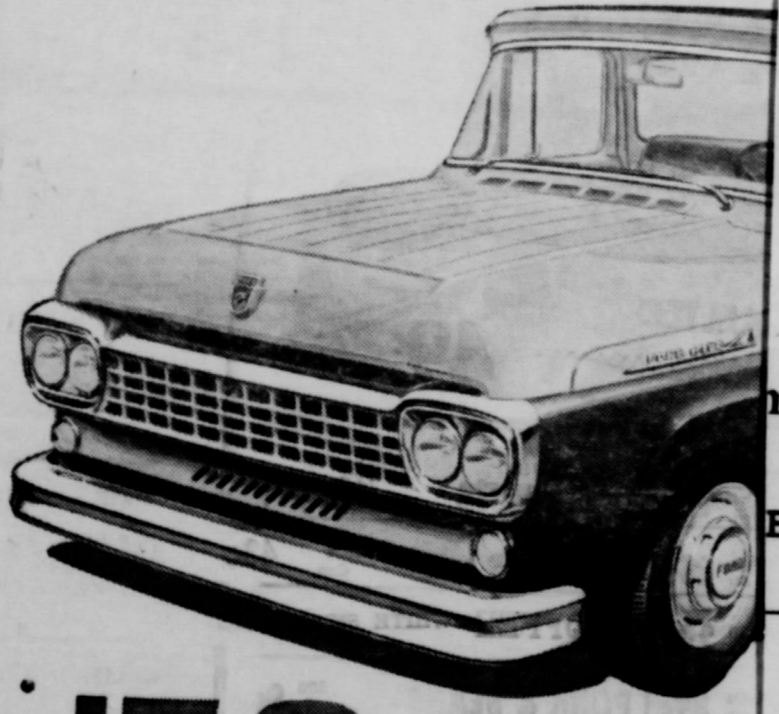
