Summer Mgrm. Of Fish Ponds Important

College Station, August—Fish certainly aren't human beings, but they are like people in one important respect—they can't live without oxygen.

Weed control and fertilization of farm ponds are important. However, Ed Cooper, wildlife conservation specialist, says that certain precautions should be taken to prevent oxygen depletion.

If mosses and other plants are sprayed with chemicals during the hot days of August and early September, the masses of decay-

ing vegetation will cause a loss of oxygen in the water. Without this oxygen, fish will die very suddenly, warns Cooper.

The application of fertilizers to farm ponds will also bring about an oxygen depletion. There should be no more fertilizing until cooler weather this fall or next spring, advises the specialist.

If the pond owner will fertilize properly in early spring of 1958, the fish will be aided by increased food supply brought about by fertilization. Too, the resulting change in water color will not allow the mosses to get a start.

If oxygen is deficient in a fish pond, Cooper advises taking a motor boat ride across it to stir

up the water. This helps aerate it and provides more oxygen for the fish.

Pond owners interested in proper pond management practices should obtain a copy of B-213, "Farm Fish Ponds", from the local county agent or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

External Parasite Will Take Bite From Turkey Profits

College Station, August—Protecting the turkey flock from external parasites is a must and this includes the range, roosting area

and housing, points out Wormeli, more feed for finishing and are sure to be discounted at market time, he warns.

Major trouble is now coming from lice, chiggers and bluebugs, says the specialist. Early detection makes control more effective and greatly reduces the damage caused by these pests. Clean premises are a must and this includes the range, roosting area

and housing, points out Wormeli, Lice spend their entire life cycle on the bird and multiply rapidly if not controlled. Root sprays or paints applied shortly before the turkeys go to roost are effective. Lindane, malathion or nicotine sulphate can be used.

A malathion dust (4 percent) is recommended for treating litter. Malathion used as a five-tenths

percent spray, DDT as a five percent dust or sodium fluoride may be applied to the birds. Make sure, says Wormeli, that the compound reaches the bird's skin.

Chiggers are among the most annoying pests due to the position they secrete on the skin. When treating the range with a spray for chigger control, Wormeli

advises doubling the amount of water used in the mixture for more uniform coverage. Chlor-dane, toxaphene and lindane will give good results.

Bluebugs, suck blood from the turkeys and cause unthriftiness and a loss of weight. They are more difficult to control and mature bugs can live as long as two years without feeding. Lindane

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish a retirement fund for officers and employees of the State. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62 (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, as if it were a corporation, and to make such reasonable regulations, not inconsistent with the Constitution, as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been employed in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of the State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 42 of Article XVI of the Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a, of the Constitution of Texas, to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children, and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children, and to amend and appropriate additional sums, supplementing current appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid for any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-two Dollars (\$22) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are made out by the Legislature.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-two (22) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid for any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year, or who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporations of the State of Texas, including river authority, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized under Article XVI, Section 52 of Article III, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservancy and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storage and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of payment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, a sum which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Fund, in the purchase of such investment securities as may be provided by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Texas Water Development Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to be due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1955 moneys received in excess of the foregoing requirements, then such excess shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and conditions provided in this Section as may be provided by law.

"The Legislature may provide for the sale of state bonds to be deposited to a fund hereinafter designated in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as provided by law.

"Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporations of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State, providing for the payment of such bonds creating an agency administrator said Fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law, limiting the total amount which financial assistance may be appropriated, and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

"Section 42c. There is hereby created in the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, composition and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for the issuance of bonds in an amount not to exceed that of the Texas Water Bonds Act (1909, 1950, 1951). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be known as Texas Water Development bonds and shall be issued in such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the rate shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum. They may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"The moneys received from the sale of state bonds shall be deposited to a fund hereinafter designated in the State Treasury to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as provided by law.

"Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

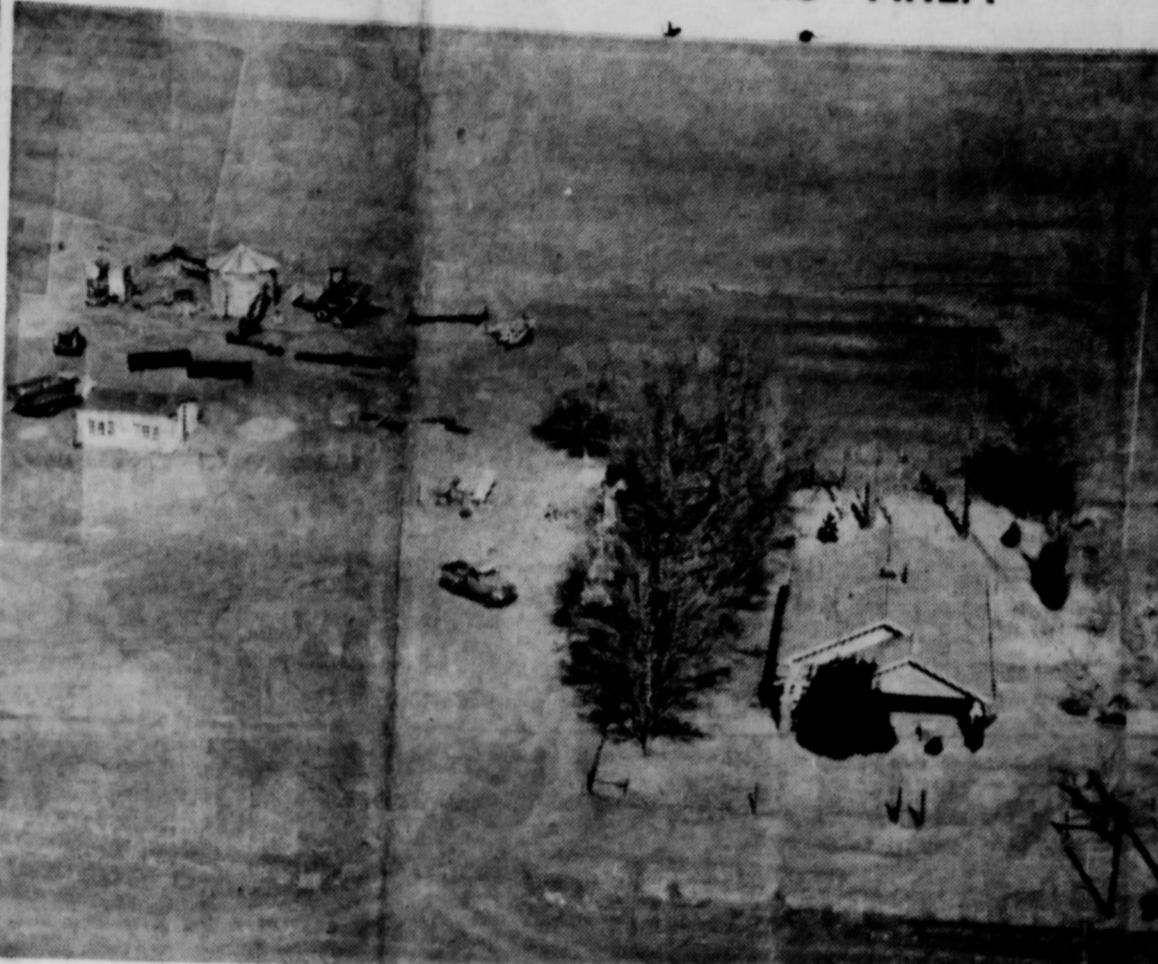
Football Practice Begins Monday

Summer Mgmt. Of Fish Ponds Important

College Station, August—Fish certainly aren't human beings, but they are like people in one important respect—they can't live without oxygen.

Weed control and fertilization of farm ponds are important. However, Ed Cooper, wildlife conservation specialist, says that certain precautions should be taken to prevent oxygen depletion.

If mosses and other plants are sprayed with chemicals during the hot days of August and early September, the masses of decay-

ing vegetation will cause a loss of oxygen in the water. Without this oxygen, fish will die very suddenly, warns Cooper.

The application of fertilizers to farm ponds will also bring about an oxygen depletion. There should be no more fertilizing until cooler weather this fall or next spring, advises the specialist.

If the pond owner will fertilize properly in early spring of 1958, the fish will be aided by increased food supply brought about by fertilization. Too, the resulting change in water color will not allow the mosses to get a start.

If oxygen is deficient in a fish pond, Cooper advises taking a motor boat ride across it to stir

up the water. This helps aerate it and provides more oxygen for the fish.

Pond owners interested in proper pond management practices should obtain a copy of B-213, "Farm Fish Ponds", from the local county agent or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

External Parasite Will Take Bite From Turkey Profits

College Station, August—Protecting the turkey flock from extremely important, say Ben Wormell, extension poultry husbandman. Infested birds will require

more feed for finishing and are sure to be discounted at market time, he warns.

Major trouble is now coming from lice, chiggers and bluebugs, says the specialist. Early detection makes control more effective and greatly reduces the damage caused by these pests. Clean premises are a must and this includes the range, roosting area

and housing, points out Wormell. Lice spend their entire life cycle on the bird and multiply rapidly if not controlled. Roost sprays or paints applied shortly before the turkeys go to roost are effective. Lindane, malathion or nicotine sulphate can be used. A malathion dust (4 percent) is recommended for treating litter. Malathion used as a five-tenths

percent spray; DDT as a five percent dust or sodium flouride may be applied to the birds. Make sure, says Wormell, that the compound reaches the bird's skin.

Chiggers are among the most annoying pests due to the poison they secrete on the skin. When treating the range with a spray for chigger control, Worm-

ell advises doubling the amount of water used in the mixture for more uniform coverage. Chlordane, toxaphene and lindane will give good results.

Bluebugs, suck blood from the turkeys and cause unthriftiness and a loss of weight. They are more difficult to control and mature bugs can live as long as two years without feeding. Lindane

Betty; and upon the contingencies that the said Renetta Betty either predeceases John F. Betty or be living separate and apart from him by reason of divorce, then and in that event said lands shall pass to the children of John F. Betty, share and share alike Renetta Betty is living with her husband, John F. Betty, and as his wife. The three minor plaintiffs, namely, Deanne Marie Betty, Teresa Sue Betty and Cheri Kay Betty, are the only children thus far born to John F. Betty, and he has not adopted any child. Gerald C. Betty is contingently named as guardian of the estates of the minor children of John F. Betty at his death. The provision of the will of the said Edna R. Betty creating said estate as above set out is as follows:

"All of the real property of which I may die seized, irrespective of where the same may be situated, I give, devise and bequeath unto my son, John F. Betty, for his natural lifetime only, he during such time to have the right of use, occupancy and possession thereof, and be entitled to all rents, issues and income therefrom. At his death it is my desire and I do hereby direct that all of such property hereinafter devised shall go one-third (1/3) to his widow, Renetta Betty, and two-thirds (2/3) to his children who survive him. Conditioned, however, that in the event Renetta Betty predeceases John F. Betty, or they be living separate and apart by reason of divorce, then it is my desire that all of the property herein devised for life to John F. Betty shall descend to his children in equal shares, and that all of such property shall remain intact until the youngest of said children shall have attained the age of twenty-five (25) years.

"It is my further desire that in the event of the death of my son, John F. Betty, while any of his children are yet minors, that my nephew, Gerald C. Betty, shall be named testamentary guardian of the estates of such minor children under such bond and other limitations as the Court having jurisdiction may require."

This action is brought by the plaintiffs named herein not only as individuals in their individual capacities but also as representatives of all of the contingent remaindermen or possible future interest holders, born or unborn, under, through or by virtue of the will of Edna R. Betty, deceased, hereinabove referred to: the said contingent remaindermen or possible future interest holders being such by virtue of being either the child or children of John F. Betty or the descendants or heirs of any child or children of John F. Betty who should predecease him.

It is necessary for the conservation, preservation and protection of said property and of all the present and contingent or future interests therein that said land be leased for the production of oil, gas and other minerals. It is to the best interest of the plaintiffs and all of the defendants, including any persons who might hereafter come into being and who would in such event have a contingent interest in said lands under, through or by virtue of the will of Edna R. Betty, deceased, that said land be leased for oil, gas and other mineral development; and the leasing of said land for said oil, gas and other mineral development and the safe and proper investment of the proceeds will inure to the benefit and advantage of the persons entitled thereto.

The nature of the proceeding is fully shown by plaintiffs' original petition on file in this cause and a true copy of the same will be furnished to any defendant by James P. Linn, attorney for plaintiffs, Spearman, Texas, immediately upon request.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs. If this citation is not served within ninety days after date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

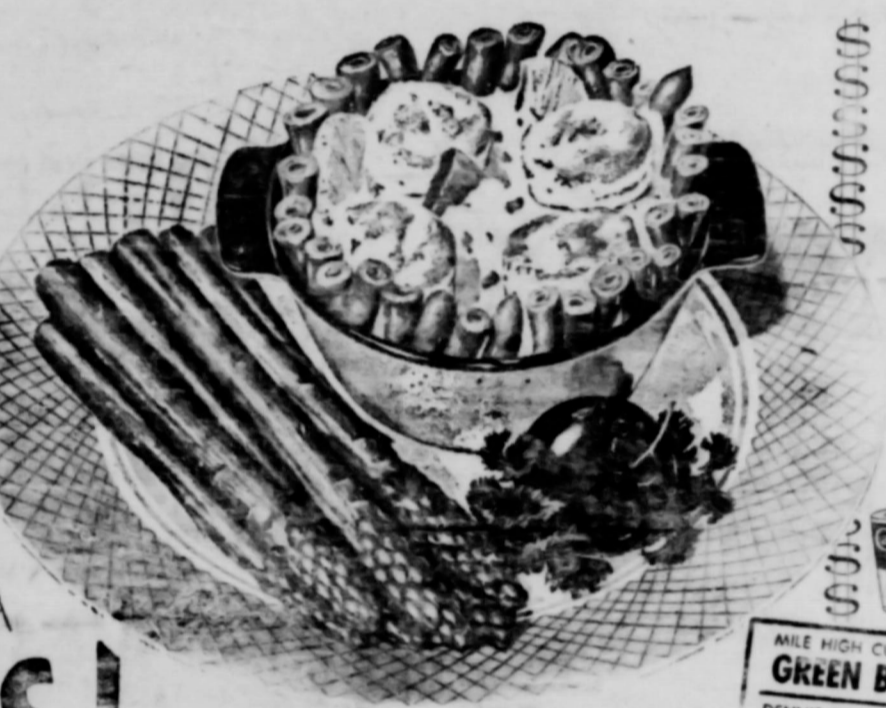

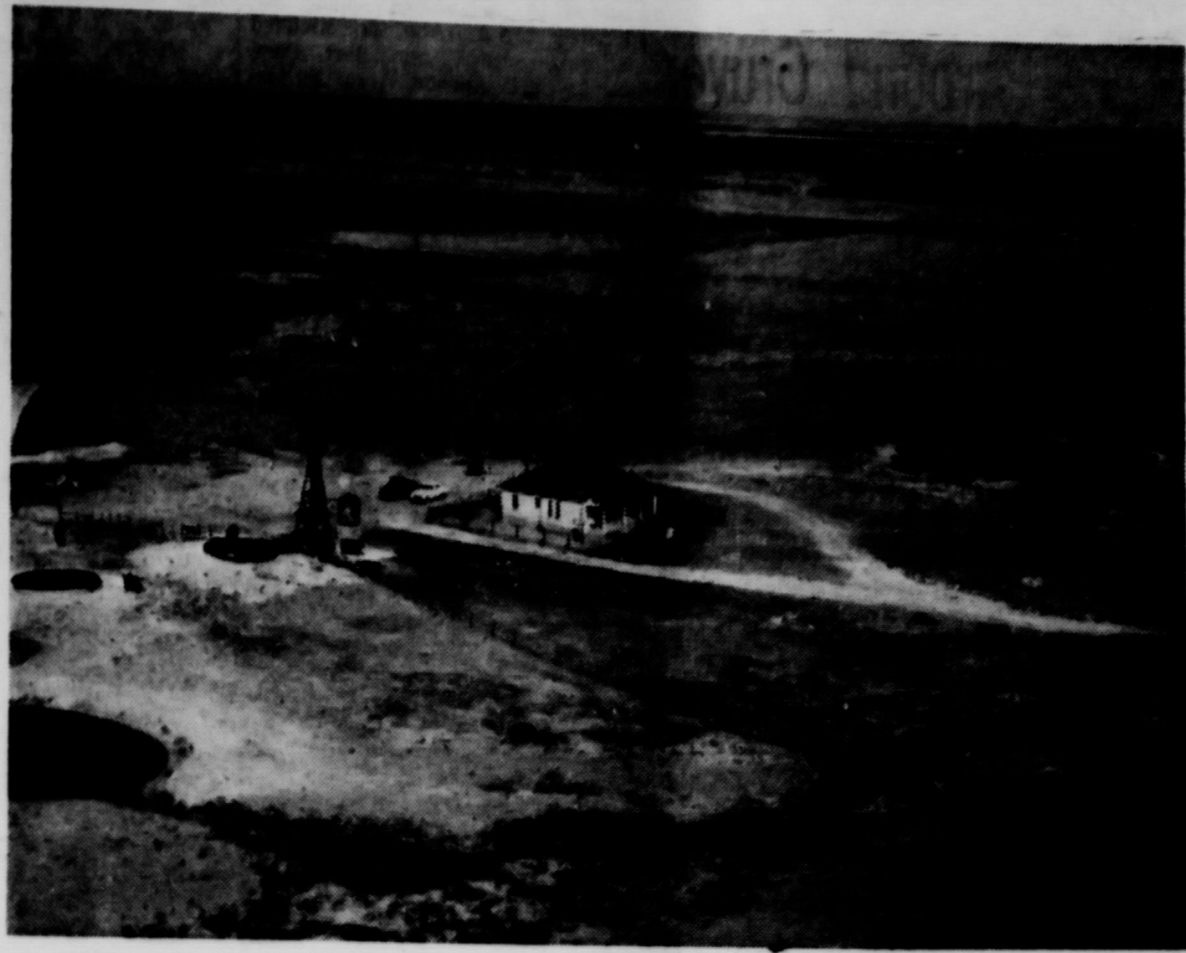

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1937.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION (A) OF SECTION 62, ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION FUND FOR OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE.

Section 1. That Section 62 (a) of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows: "Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature shall also include officers and employees of judicial districts of this State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 4-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a state or county who is or was at any time entitled to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of such Fund, and such amount shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to such person by the State.

"All funds provided for the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the State of Texas, or in the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds, or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent State Fund of this State under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1937, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AMENDING SECTION (A) OF SECTION 62, ARTICLE XVI OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION, RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION FUND FOR OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1937.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III, SECTION 51-a OF THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, SO AS TO INCREASE THE LIMIT ON THE MAXIMUM MONTHLY PAYMENT TO NEEDY AGED PERSONS FROM STATE FUNDS AND OUT OF STATE FUNDS FOR ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY AGED, NEEDY BLIND, AND NEEDY CHILDREN, AND ALLOCATING AND APPROPRIATING ADDITIONAL SUMS, SUPPLEMENTING CURRENT LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS, FOR PAYMENT OF ASSISTANCE GRANTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Law, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, for the payment of assistance to: "(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual and unless such additional amounts are made by the Federal Government.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth, provided however, that the amount of such assistance shall not exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds, and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of all benefits available for inspection.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance grants authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Commission Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning December 1, 1937, and ending August 31, 1939: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November 1937, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clauses: "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT INCREASING THE LIMIT ON THE MAXIMUM MONTHLY PAYMENT TO NEEDY AGED PERSONS FROM STATE FUNDS FROM TWENTY DOLLARS (\$20) PER MONTH TO TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS (\$25) PER MONTH SUBJECT TO CERTAIN CONDITIONS FOR PAYMENT IN EXCESS OF TWENTY-ONE DOLLARS (\$21) PER MONTH AND ON THE TOTAL YEARLY EXPENDITURE OUT OF STATE FUNDS FOR ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY AGED, NEEDY BLIND, AND NEEDY CHILDREN FROM FORTY-SEVEN MILLION DOLLARS (\$47,000,000) PER YEAR TO FORTY-SEVEN MILLION DOLLARS (\$47,000,000) PER YEAR, AND ALLOCATING AND APPROPRIATING ADDITIONAL SUMS, SUPPLEMENTING CURRENT LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS, FOR PAYMENT OF ASSISTANCE GRANTS."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1937.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS ADDING A SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 48-c OF ARTICLE III, PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF BONDS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS TO CREATE THE TEXAS WATER DEVELOPMENT FUND TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO CERTAIN POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OR BODIES POLITICAL AND CORPORATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS IN THE CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE WATER RESOURCES OF THE STATE, PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF SUCH BONDS; CREATING AN AGENCY TO ADMINISTER SAID FUND AND TO PERFORM THE DUTIES PRESCRIBED BY LAW; LIMITING THE POINTS FROM WHICH FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE MAY BE GRANTED; AND PROVIDING FOR THE HOLDING OF AN ELECTION AND THE PUBLICATION AND ISSUANCE OF THE PROCLAMATION THEREOF.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 48-c, as follows: "Section 48-c. There is hereby created an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under the provisions hereinafter with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for the issue and sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds' and shall be executed in the name, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum. They may be issued in such installments as the Board finds to be feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereinafter provided in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in the manner as prescribed by law.

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies political and corporate of the State of Texas including river authority, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVII, Section 69 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or purposes."

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or when any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Board, from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for the administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as provided herein, the principal and interest on such bonds, or any interest thereon, shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund established by the Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section if any year prior to December 31, 1937, moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water Development Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and under the same terms and conditions prescribed by the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under this section after December 31, 1937, and all moneys therefor received as repayment of principal for financial assistance as interest thereon shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund for the purpose of making such investments as the Board may be authorized to make.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall be registered by the Attorney General, and delivery to the purchasers shall be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas subject to the terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature.

"Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1937, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1937, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words: "FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF TWO HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS (\$200,000,000) IN BONDS BY THE STATE OF TEXAS TO CREATE THE TEXAS WATER DEVELOPMENT FUND TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO CERTAIN POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OR BODIES POLITICAL AND CORPORATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS IN THE CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE WATER RESOURCES OF THE STATE."
