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**NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF HANSFORD**

To The Resident Qualified Electors of Hansford County, Texas, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

**TAKE NOTICE** that an election will be held on the 31st day of November 1957, within Hansford County Texas, to determine if said County shall issue Courthouse and Jail Bonds, and if a tax shall be levied on all taxable property within said county, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity pursuant to an order for **COURTHOUSE AND JAIL BOND ELECTION** made and entered by the Commissioners' Court of Hansford County Texas, on the 14th day of October 1957, and which order is in words and figures as follows:

**ORDER FOR COURTHOUSE AND JAIL BOND ELECTION STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF HANSFORD**  
ON THIS 14th day of October, 1957, the Commissioners' Court of Hansford County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Spearman, Texas, there being present and in attendance the following members to-wit:

and among other proceedings had were the following:

The County Judge introduced the following election order: "WHEREAS the Commissioners' Court of Hansford County, Texas, deems it advisable to submit to the resident qualified taxing voters of said county, who own taxable property in said county, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, a proposition for the issuance of bonds of said County, for the purpose hereinafter stated, therefore

**BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF HANSFORD COUNTY, TEXAS:**

That an election be held in said County on the 31st day of November, 1957, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which

THE MANNER of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of the State of Texas, as regulating general elections. A COPY of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and certified to by the County Clerk shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of said election.

**NOTICE OF SAID ELECTION** shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS". Said notice shall be posted in each of the election precincts of said county, and at the County Courthouse, not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks, in a newspaper of general circulation, published in Hansford County, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

The above order having been read in full, it was moved by Commissioner Renner and seconded by Commissioner Vernon that it be passed. Thereupon the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted

the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified taxing electors who own taxable property in said County, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation for their action thereupon: "SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Hansford County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the total principal sum of ONE HUNDRED SEVENTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$175,000), to mature serially at such time as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court, but not later than twenty (20) years from the date thereof, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5 per cent) per annum, and to levy ad valorem taxes sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, for permanent improvement purposes, to-wit: the construction of improvements, additions and repairs to the present County Courthouse, including the construction and erection of the County Jail, said building thereafter to constitute the County Courthouse and Jail Building, in the City of Spearman, the County Seat of Hansford County, Texas, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas?"

**ALL VOTERS** who are legally qualified voters of said Hansford County, Texas, and who are resident property taxpayers of said County, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election; and said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1 and 2, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

**IT IS FURTHER ORDERED** that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 8, V.A.T.S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

EACH VOTER shall mark out with black ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

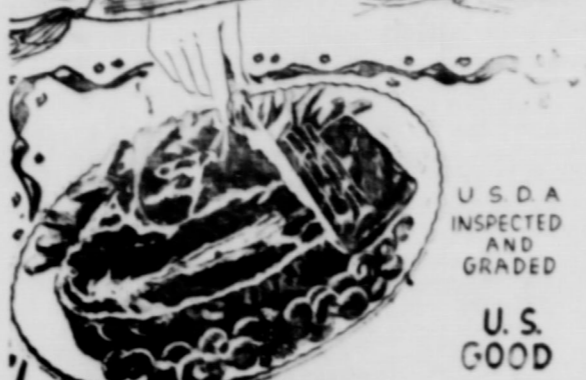

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**Application of Lawn Aid**

A beautiful lawn is the main practice in the fall care of a home and is a properly established lawn that will provide a beautiful and wash-off earlier next year.

E. M. Trew, extension soil and water conservation specialist, said the list of winners was released by Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, sponsor of the program.

**Tex. Winners In Soil Conservation Award Program Announced**

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**1957 Turkey Production On Way To New Record**

College Station. — It appears that total turkey production in 1957 will be larger than in 1956 and that it will be a new record. Storage stocks are also much larger than last year. However, more turkeys are being marketed earlier this year and should help reduce the number available for the fall market. This should result in a higher price than was expected earlier this year, but it will still be below last years prices.

Because of information made available to producers from various sources, producers have cut down on their production, according to John G. McHaney, extension economist. The reduction of the turkey hatch during the closing months of the present hatching season has helped to reduce the apparent extremely large increase that was indicated earlier in the year. Nevertheless, turkey producers in the United States are raising about 5 percent more turkeys this year than

**TRAFFIC SAFETY**

Much information is being gathered together at the present time by a Congressional Committee in the hope that some solution may be found to the traffic problem that confronts this nation. This problem is one that takes approximately 43 thousand lives each year and leaves between a million and a million and a half citizens of this country maimed or injured. Research has commenced on several fronts. The automobile manufacturers are doing much of it themselves in an effort to provide a safer package within which the occupant is conveyed from one point to another. This includes the new safety steering wheel, sometimes called the deep dish wheel. This is intended to provide a cushion effect on the chest in the event of collision so that the body may be stopped before

it is punctured by the steering post. Another safety feature is new type door latches which will prevent the door from opening on impact. This feature was installed because statistics reveal that your chances for survival, if you remain in the car, were more than 5 to 1 and your chance of escaping a moderate fatal grade injury were more than 2 to 1. Another safety feature is the padded dash board or instrument panel and padded sun visors. It is estimated that about 38 percent of passenger injuries in the right or center front seat position result from striking the sun visor or instrument panel. About 4 percent result from striking the rear view mirror.

The proposed safety device which has probably received more attention and research than any of the others is the seat belt. This device has been the subject of quite a bit of controversy. The extensive tests which have been conducted reveal that the chances of escaping injury in an accident are improved about 60 percent if you are wearing a seat belt. However, none of the automobile manufacturers have made seat belts standard equipment on their cars. During the hearing held in the vicinity of the automobile manufacturers plants I notice that not many of the cars, personal and otherwise, used in and around these plants were equipped with safety belts. Those who have engaged in the safety belt research felt that it is most important that all cars be so equipped. Whether or not this will be done I do not know, but I do know that the present estimate of the cost of installing seat belts in the front seat of automobiles at the factory is approximately \$13.00. This means that if 8 million cars are manufactured next year and seat belts are installed in the front seats, the total cost of these cars will be increased 78 million dollars. Whether or not these safety and others will solve the problem is conjectural but one thing is sure. According to past statistics some 43 thousand people will lose their lives on these highways of this nation in 1957. There will be over 1 1/2 million people injured, over 100 thousand of them permanently. There will be over 10 million motor accidents. And the monetary cost will approximate 5 billion dollars. Some years ago a wit made the statement that the most dangerous thing about an automobile was the "nut that held the steering wheel". Statistics will prove this remains as true today as when it was said. Reduction of speed and constant attention and alertness would do more to solve this traffic problem than all of the safety devices put together.

McHaney advises selling turkeys when they are well fleshed and finished. Remember that the cost of feed is great for putting an extra pound of weight on a bronze hen weighing 14 pounds or a tom weighing 25 pounds. Be sure that the turkey offered for sale are free of external parasite blemishes. These blemishes will lower the grade and in many cases cause a loss to the producer.

Other hints might include keeping up with consumer demands, keeping current on turkey prices, getting competitive bids or quotations from different buyers before selling and sell on U. S. grades when possible, especially if you have high quality birds.

## Washington News Letter From Your Congressman Walter Rogers

October 1957  
TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT  
EUROPEAN COMMON MARKET

Recent developments in European Countries who are joining in the Common Market Treaty with relation to labor, as well as goods, would indicate that a serious economic problem may be in store for this country in the future. There was skepticism on the part of many as to whether or not Germany would enter into these agreements. However, the action of the Chancellor of West Germany, Dr. Konrad Adenauer, and his Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano in leading the way in joining the Common Market and the subsequent re-election of Dr. Adenauer, would indicate that West Germany is most serious in its program to solve some of the economic ills of Europe and, two, in bending over backwards to show itself to be a good and hard working member of the European community. One writer felt that Germany would have been better off economically to have followed Britain and become a member of a Free Trade Zone, without assuming some of the responsibilities of the Common Market. However, Germany concluded otherwise and is probably right because of its substantial production of coal and steel. It could

suffer from an agricultural standpoint, but it was, no doubt, felt that this would be outweighed by other benefits. The ratification of the Treaty by France surprised many, including Frenchmen. Some looked upon it as a miracle and felt that France was on the move toward the solution of one of its most troublesome problems. Actually France had much more to gain in joining this group than to have stayed on the outside. Especially in the special provisions for French imports and the escape clause for French export subsidies. France also gained in the price it can ask from the Germans for French wheat. Some analysts feel that the concessions gained by France may cause trouble in carrying out the terms of the Treaty but all admit that it is a beginning to a cure for an economically sick Europe. They point out that Italy with its unemployment problem, Belgium with its low production costs and Holland with its agricultural surpluses will insist upon early exchanges of labor and goods in a free movement and seek the expanded market and increased prices for food. It was also pointed out that even those outside of the community but allied with its will want to speed up the operation of such a program to that British automobiles may go into Europe duty free, as well as

Danish bacon and butter. Whether the full 12 to 15 year trial period is required or whether the Common Market is in full force and effect in less time, there will be an economic impact on this country and it would be well for the matter to be thoroughly and completely debated in the early days of the coming session of Congress and before the time for extension of the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act.

### PASSENGER PENALTY

The commercial airlines have recently adopted a plan to penalize passengers who fail to show up for a flight on which they have a reservation. This plan is bound to run up against trouble. The fact is that the airlines have had trouble for some time with passengers who promiscuously make reservations and then fail to show up. This means that some other person who wanted to make the trip is not able to get a confirmed reservation and doesn't know whether he will be able to go until time for the plane to take off. There is no doubt that this has been a serious problem, but I feel that the airlines are going to be in for considerable criticism when they start collecting a money penalty from a passenger. This matter was discussed at length in the Congressional hearings when the Civil Aeronautics Board appeared before our Committee. At that time I asked the Chairman, Mr. Durfee, about this plan and why it was that nothing had been done in the nature of providing a penalty to be paid by the airline to the passenger when the airline

sold a ticket and then denied transportation to the passenger at the last minute because the plane had been oversold at some other point, or because of some other reason in which the passenger had no control. The Chairman was unable to answer the question and, in fact, indicated that no thought had been given to it by the Board. I pointed out to him that it was my understanding the CAB had been set up to protect the traveling public, as well as the airlines, and that if the passenger was going to be penalized for not showing, then by the same token, the airlines should be penalized for failing to provide the service it should provide.

## John Venneman Is Director

Directors of the Grain Sorghum Producers Ass'n held their regular monthly board meeting this week in the Junior Ball Room of the Herring Hotel in Amarillo. Seventeen directors and committeemen were present from 12 of the 17 counties in Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico, with membership in the association.

Mr. R. G. Peeler, Hereford, President of the Ass'n and Mr. Frank Moore, Plainview, Legislative Representative, reported to the board on the recent Commodity Group Meeting in Washington which they attended. Peeler indicated that another conference of the Commodity Groups would be held in Omaha, Neb., in November and sought counsel from the county representatives of the Ass'n relative to plans for the Nebraska meeting.

The Ass'n is supporting a "Surplus Reduction Farm Plan" which in general calls for a uniform level of support for all commodities; government programs for all commodities to have a uniform expiration date; an percentage of cultivated acres to be retired from production.

In reporting on the Association's activities for the past month, Bill Nelson, the Executive Vice-President, indicated that farmer interest in a series of county organizational meetings had been very encouraging with 250 attending in one county with the average attendance being around 75. One-hundred-two local grain elevator operators are cooperating with the grain producers by deducting 2 pounds per thousand from farm deliveries and depositing it to the Grain Sorghum Producers Association in support of a program of Research, Legislation, and Market Development.

Nelson also announced that a Grain Sorghum Agricultural Industrial Utilization Steering Committee is being formed in cooperation with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and agricultural and industrial leaders in the

area. The initial session of this Executive Committee will be Oct. 22, in Plainview with both Research and Administrative officials in Agriculture and Industry participating.

## And Answers

Q—I sold my GI house because I had moved to another climate for reasons of health. My GI loan eligibility has been restored by VA. Do I have to use this restored entitlement to buy another house, or may I use it for a GI business loan instead?

A—You may use your restored GI loan entitlement for a business loan, if you wish. In fact, it may be used for any purpose authorized by law: a home loan, farm loan or business loan.

Q—I have been totally and permanently disabled for more than six months, and I've just applied for a waiver of premiums on my GI insurance policy. Will the waiver become effective retroactively, to the date I first became disabled?

A—No. The waiver is made effective from the premium due date following the date the six months of continuous total disability commenced.

Q—I am in school under the Korean GI Bill with an objective of engineer. I would like to drop one of my subjects, mathematics, and take physics instead. Would this be considered my one and only change of course allowed under the law?

A—No. You have the right to change subjects. It will not be considered a change of course, so long as your basic objective doesn't change.

Q—Are peacetime veterans entitled to compensation for service-connected disabilities? I know they are not entitled to pensions for non-service-connected disabilities.

A—Yes. Peacetime veterans may be entitled to compensation for service-connected disabilities. However, the rate of compensation for non-extrahazardous service disabilities is 80 percent of the rate paid to wartime veterans. (Continued on page 14)

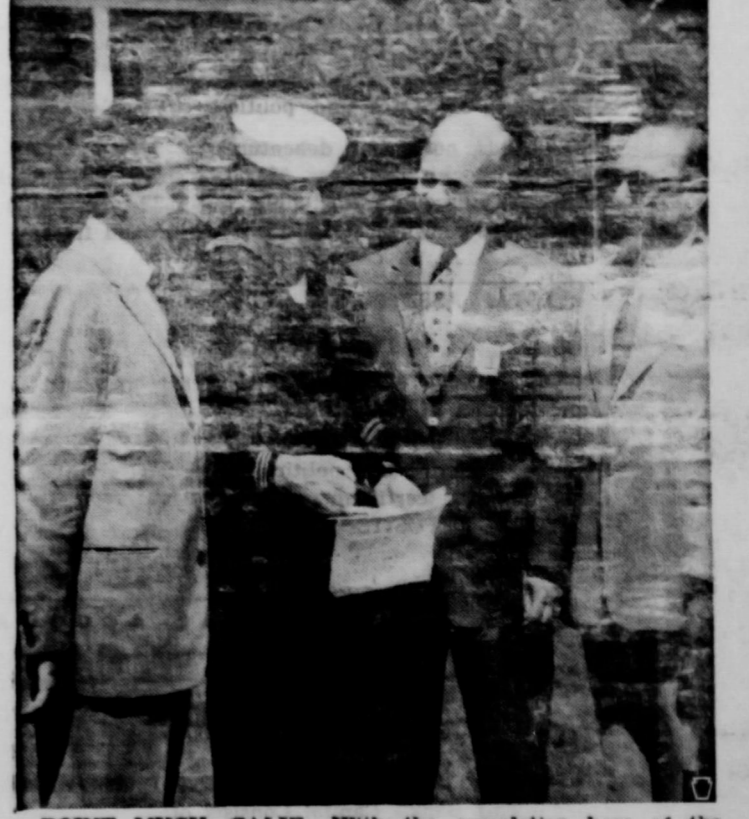
