### Russell Beckworth of Berger Says Has Organization Ready When Lease For Townsite Signed

#### Sinclair Oil & Gas In Operation

Fort Worth, Texas, August — Sinclair Oil & Gas Company has placed in operation a gas gathering system and booster station five miles south of the town of Farnsworth in Ochiltree county, Texas, Panhandle, to compress oil-well gas for sale to Northern Natural Gas Company.

Russell Beckworth of Berger, who owns 19 lots within the city limits of Spearman, and who has built and sold several GI homes in this city, stated Monday of this week that he had a big organization ready to drill gas and oil wells within the city limits of Spearman if the lot owners would donate their leases and thus they will be able to share in the profits from royalty from as many as 19 to 29 wells to be drilled within the city limits of Spearman.

Mr. Beckworth stated that the same plan used in Oklahoma City and other cities would be followed, namely, leave blank leases for lots at the Chamber of Commerce, newspaper, bank or central point on Main street, and encourage all lot owners to sign the lease. The lease is to carry a positive guarantee that drilling would begin the minute the 320 acres in the original townsite is signed up.

Beckworth stated that from past experience it has been found that 60 per cent of lot owners cooperate rapidly. This leaves a lot of clean-up work to be done after the program is inaugurated. He stated his organization would undertake the expense of cleaning-up and paying for all legal and recording of leases.

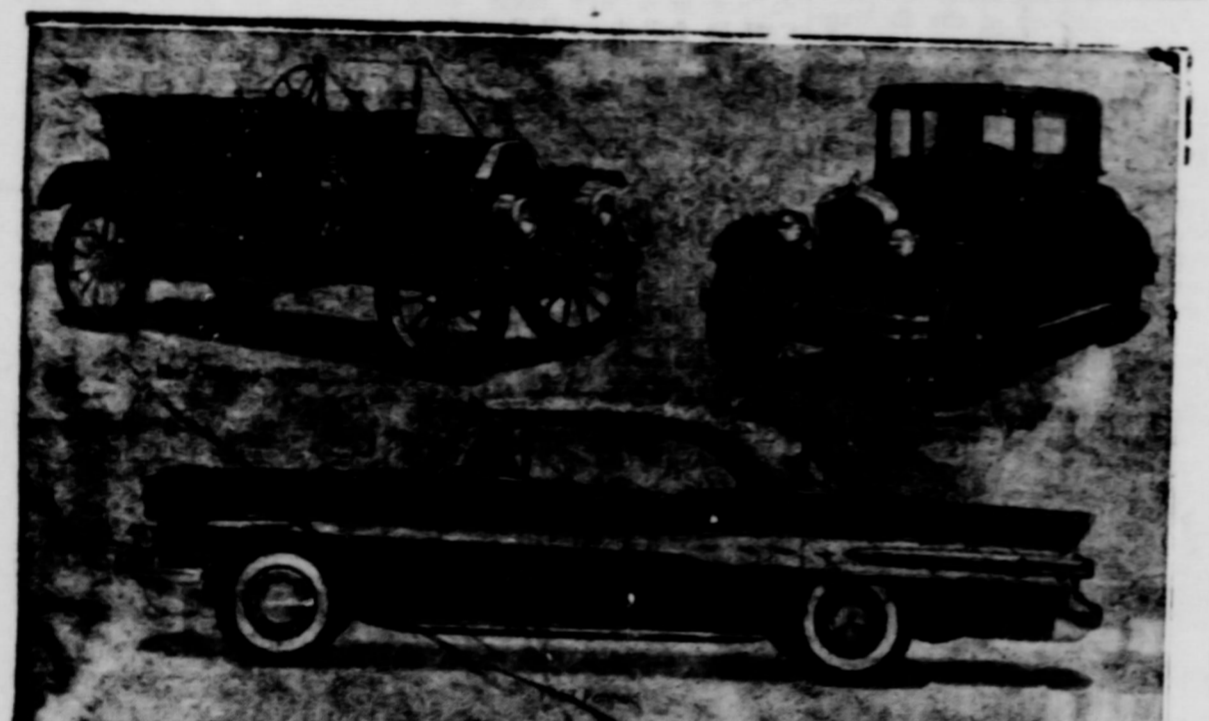

Use certified seed and inoculate them before planting. Cotton root rot is one of the worst alfalfa diseases, cautions Trew. Don't plant on land severely infested with this disease. Rust also does some damage. When plants are severely infested with rust, they should be harvested, regardless of the stage of growth.

NEW FISHING LAW TO BENEFIT TEXAS FISHERMEN A new Sports Fishing License law which increases fishing license fees becomes effective September 1st, 1957. The additional revenue will enable the Game and Fish Commission to increase its work program by about 25 per cent and will generally benefit Texans interested in better fishing.

AG ECONOMIST REVIEW PRICE SITUATION Most phases of agriculture seem to be holding their own as far as prices are concerned and probably will continue to do so—with the usual seasonal declines—for the remainder of 1957. Marketings of meat animals and grass cattle will be a little below the levels of last summer, according to John McHaney, extension economist. Hog slaughter will likely continue below the 1956 rate until later on in the year. No price drop in sight except for the usual seasonal declines, and meat animal prices should maintain a modest margin over last year.

Prices of lower grades of cattle will decline seasonally. However, says the economist, they will be supported by a strong demand for feed lot replacements and prices should remain at a higher level than last year. Hog prices will probably continue above a year ago during the rest of the summer and early fall. However, there is a slight possibility that prices at the end of the year may be a little below the prices of last year.

DON'T OVERLOOK ALFALFA Alfalfa is one of the most versatile of farm crops. It is important to Texas as a source of hay, seed, pasture and also as a soil improving crop.

Alfalfa does best on fertile, well drained, neutral to alkaline soils of medium texture, according to E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist. However, it is being grown on some acid sandy loam soils of East Texas with the addition of lime and plenty of fertilizer. Alfalfa needs plenty of phosphorus and potassium as well as adequate calcium. A soil test is best for determining its needs.

The most widely grown and best adapted varieties for all of Texas are the "Common" variety—Southwestern and Barstow. Ranger and Buffalo are grown in the rolling and high plains areas for seed, but have no advantage over the "common" varieties in forage production.

A new variety, Lahontan, is expected to become important because it is about 75 per cent resistant to the spotted alfalfa aphid. Some seed will be available this fall. Fall seeding is best for alfalfa. The weed problem is greater with spring seeding. The seedbed should be firm, clean and moist. Drill 15 to 20 pounds per acre.

In Hansford County 160 farms are irrigated, total acres irrigated are 70,000, irrigated by gravity (water ditched to crop) are 69,800 acres, there are 34 underground piping systems in the county irrigating 10,200 acres, there are only 2 sprinkler systems, irrigating 135 acres. There are 225 irrigation wells, with only 8 of these wells having a lift under 125 feet. There are 217 wells that lift the water more than 125 feet. Of all the wells in the county only 32 have a capacity under 700 gallons per minute. One hundred ninety four lift the water more than 125 feet. There are 85 wells in the county that enjoy Natural Gas as a fuel, while 127 use Butane, 5 use gasoline, 2 use diesel, 6 use electricity as fuel. The irrigated acres are planted to various crops as follows: cotton 625 acres, grain sorghum 28,375, alfalfa 600 acres, pasture 1,200 acres, Sudan 3,000 acres Oats 2,000 acres, corn, 1,200 acres, wheat 31,000 acres. There

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Lamb prices this fall may average as high or possibly a little higher than last year, points out McHaney. Egg prices should also begin to increase. By late summer prices are likely to be above a year earlier.

Indications point to a wheat crop of about 971 million bushels in 1957—only 3 per cent below last year. Stocks of cotton owned by the Commodity Credit Corporation or held as collateral are the smallest since October of 1953.

The national average support price for 1957 is 60c per bushel for oats, 94 cents per bushel for barley and \$1.83 per 100 pounds for sorghum grain. If feed crop prospects continue favorable, feed grain prices will probably average somewhat lower the rest of 1957 than for the same period in 1956.

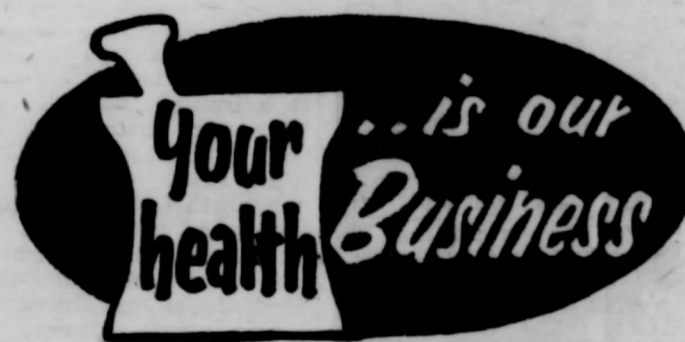

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Section 42 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 42, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows: "Section 42. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to lay out to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part by the State. The Legislature may also make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 45-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 47 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article VII, Section 2, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of such person, and shall exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the terms of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States or to such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such restrictions as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of the anticipatory character." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday day after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 42, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 42, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and this Amendment shall be published and the election held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to newly aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to newly aged, newly blind, and newly children, and allocating and appropriating additional appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions hereon contained, such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to, (1) Newly aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds for not more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual unit and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

"(2) Newly blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Newly children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application. "The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the newly aged, newly blind, and newly children as such Government may offer

but inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth, provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to such person shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds, and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the newly aged, newly blind, and newly children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder, available for inspection." "Supplementing legislative appropriations for the payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Taxation Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning August 31, 1957: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Aid to the Blind, and \$25,000,000 for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations available for such purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall be printed on such ballot the following clauses:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to newly aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month to Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to newly aged, newly blind, and newly children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to newly aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month to Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to newly aged, newly blind, and newly children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows:

"Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, composition, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law. "The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds' and shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein. "All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be considered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law. "Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authority, conservation and reclamation districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 58 or Article III, Section 49, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State and the preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods. "Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law. "While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. "The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board. "From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board, repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. "The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board. "From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board, repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. "The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board. "From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board, repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. "The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

### Water Is Cheap Yet Important To Poultry

College Station, August—Water is the least expensive yet one of the most important supplies in poultry production. It cannot be over-emphasized in a chicken's diet.

Water constitutes about 66 percent of an egg and a bird's body contains approximately 55 percent water, says Bob Griffin, extension poultry husbandman. It is pretty obvious that a shortage of water could have an adverse effect on egg production and broiler gains.

The water should be made convenient for the birds, advises Griffin. Have waterers level with the birds' backs and arranged so that they will not have to travel more than ten feet to the water supply.

And finally, says the husbandman, keep all waterers clean and free of litter. Check them several times each day if necessary.

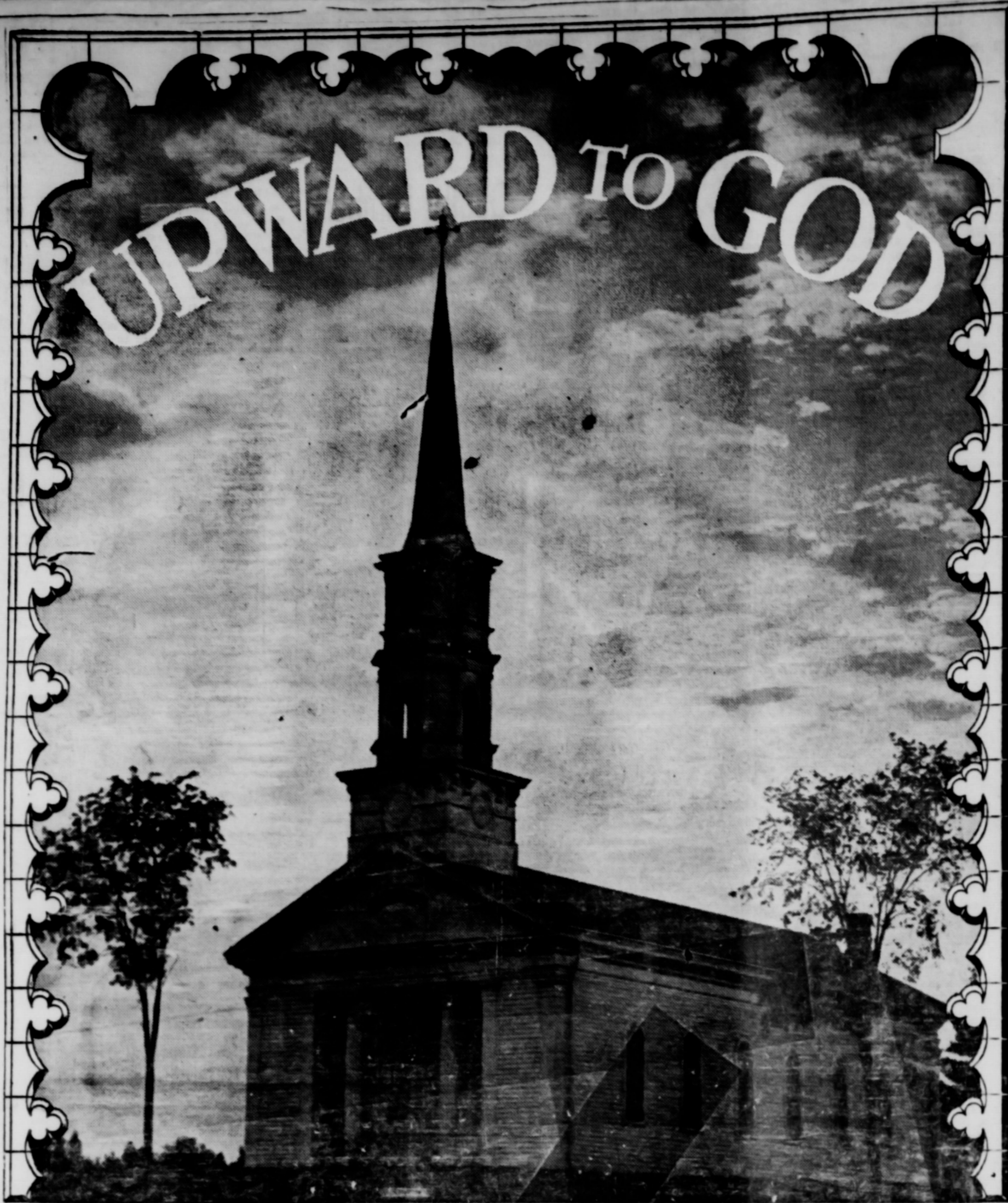

domestic and export channels. Representatives of crop improvement associations have strongly urged the action to help improve the quality of the nation's wheat crop.

The price-support regulations for 1958 will provide for producer certification regarding the undesirable varieties. Because these varieties are difficult to determine from threshed samples of wheat, it will be the producer's responsibility, based on his knowledge of varieties seeded and harvested, to identify the variety going under the price support program.

Hodges points out that some of the undesirable varieties might have protein content high enough for a premium but no protein premiums will apply in determining loan rates. The agronomist suggests a visit with the local county agent for information on the best variety for the area.

**A Soil Test Will Aid In Soil Building Crop Reporting**

College Station, August—Crops trying to grow in mineral deficient soils are like people on a strict diet—they get hungry.

Now, it may be practical for an overweight person to go on a diet to reduce, but no one wants to reduce his crop production. Yet, that is exactly what happens to crops that are grown on soil that is lacking in minerals, warns W. F. Bennett, extension agricultural chemist.

But the crops are not the only things that suffer from this condition, says the chemist. These sick crops cause mineral hunger in livestock. This produces poor livestock, giving poor grains and poor stock products it even tends to promote livestock disease.

Mineral hungry crops and livestock produce food that may cause a deficiency in our own body, says Bennett.

The average man has about three pounds of calcium (lime-stone) in his body. Children need lime for strong bones and good teeth. These strength-providing minerals are important to the human body.

So, the chemist advises fertilizing for more and better crops that will produce more and better livestock. Liming, in some areas, is especially needed now to offset the leaching that resulted from the hard rains of April and May. A soil test should be made to determine the extent needs.

Soil that is well supplied with minerals—especially calcium and phosphorus is essential for maximum productivity of top quality crops, concludes Bennett.

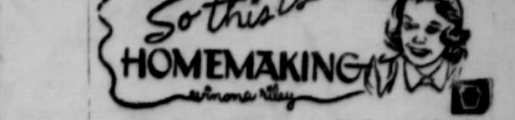

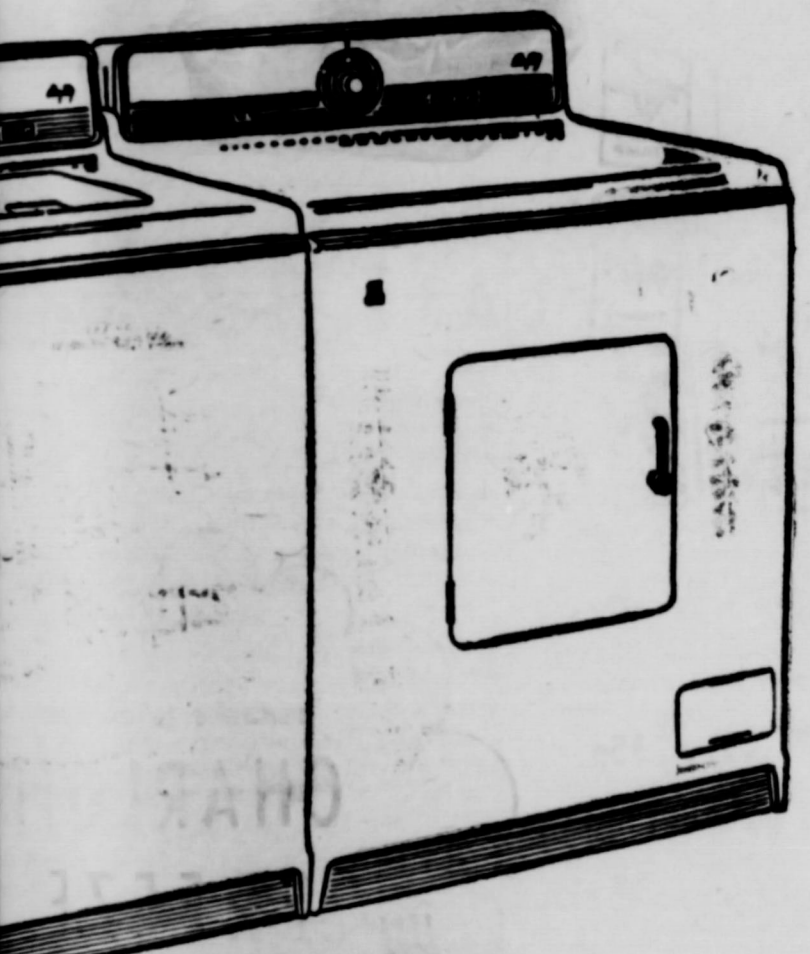
