



College Station, Nov Generally, range conditions in Texas are much better than a year ago. But with winter coming on, it is time to consider management practices which will keep forage production and livestock numbers in balance, says A. H. Walker, extension range specialist. He suggests that all horses and

mules not needed in operating

the ranch be sold. Also that unthrifty and aged animals be marketed along with steers or wethers. He points out that the price is fairly good and it's better to sell now than be forced to do so later in the winter when there will be weight losses or heavy investments for feed. 'In most cases buying roughage to get livestock through the winter is a risky business," says Walker. The specialist says deferred pastures should not be grazed until after frost and as large a supply of bundles, hay and silage as possible should be saved. A protein supplement-one or two pounds for cattle and an eighth to a fourth pound for ewes should be fed daily to livestock on dry grass. The calf and lamb crops are needed to pay operating costs and they'll be better of their mothers get proper attention. If feed supplies are needed, Walker suggests that purchases be made immediately. It's just good business to sup-

plement range forage with planted grazing crops and crops for winter and spring grazing should be planted immediately. Walker also suggests that better livestock distribution and more uniform utilization of range forage can be obtained by shifting salting and supplemental feeding areas on the range.

Finally, he says, controlling brush will increase grass production. Trees can be successfully treated with chemicals during the winter season when labor may be more readily available. He suggests that a copy of B-800, More Grass from Controlling Trees and Brush, be obtained from the local county agent along with C-320, Range Management Versus Drouth. They're free for the asking.

MYSTERY HOME FOR WEEK IS HOME OF KARL NEILSON OF GRUVER

The Mystery home, published in last weeks Reporter, represents the final plans and ambitions of an imigrant lad from Odense, Denmark.

Karl Neilson came to America from Denmark on February 13, 1901. He has spent much of his life in the happy pursuit of being a first class citizen of his adopted ontry.

Karl comes to Hansford county via Iowa, Nebraska, Oklahoma and State Line, Texas. He has always wanted to be a farmer-rancher, and has given many hard working hors to his program, which makes him one of the very finest of Hansford citizens.

The Mystery home, a 3 bed room modern farm and ranch residence, represents mostly the hard work of its owner. Karl bought his section of land, as he says "When the price was mighty high" back in 1930. In 1931 he raised a bumper crop of 7000 bushels wheat



on the land, but the price was so low at that time, that he barely showed a profit on his venture. Nothing daunted; Karl started the construction of his home in the Spring of 1931. He of course had some unskilled labor to help him in his building program, and again in 1949 when he completely remodeled the home, he had the assistance of Mr. Heath in the program of remodeling. In addition to the residence, Karl has a large barn, a double chicken house, garage, and a renters home on his property.

Karl has followed the pattern of this area in raising small grain, making his major crop wheat, and planting maize and other small grain crops for forage for his cattle. Normally Karl has a herd of some 30 cattle and always 1 to 3 milch cows. At this time he has reduced his cattle to one milch cow.

Back in 1929 Karl was able to make a trip back to his native country at Odense, Denmark. When he

#### Double Duty For Your Holloware



The best care you can give your silver holloware is to USE it. If you wash it often and rinse well you'll find it tarnishes less, needs polishing only occasionally. Here's how a famous hotel chain fills an Escoffier dish with flowers (above) when it's not in use for food (right).



Festive flower centerpieces are easy to arrange in your favorite silver holloware. Just as a special company dinner seems actually to TASTE better when it's attractively presented in a pretty serving dish, any flowers are set off to advantage by a suitable container. This particular silver piece—the same one in both pictures—is a Statler Hotel "Escoffier" dish with a specially-designed cover that doubles as a tray. You've seen similar pieces for home use. Maybe you have a covered vegetable dish shaped like this. Chances are, it was made by the same manufacturer who makes most of the hotel silverware in this country. If you're letting your best silver bowl tarnish on the shelf between special occasions, why not take it down right now and try a flower arrangement. If you have no flowers at the moment, you can do some really striking arrangements with a few autumn leaves and a little imagination. The bright colors of the leaves will be enhanced by a soft, diffused reflection in your silver dish or tray.

Just one word of caution: if you use a "frog" to hold the flowers, place it on a square of cloth to avoid scratching the silver surface. Never use florist's putty or holders with plastic suction cups. Both contain chemicals that can damage the silver permanently. This winter, when flowers and leaves are scarce, you might want to arrange fruit in your silver holloware. The more you use it, the more you'll enjoy it.


