

Farm Fire Hazards, Can Be Reduced



Every 24 hours, fire strikes 100 farm families, leaving nine persons dead and destroying more than \$300,000 worth of property.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters and other agencies annually publish a list of suggestions during Fire Prevention Week (this year, October 9 to October 15) designed to help eliminate fire

One of the foremost of these is a warning to keep the problem of fire safety in mind when new construction is being planned.

To reduce the menace of property loss by fire, many farmers are turning to steel buildings, such as the five Quonsets shown in the above photograph. The Quonsets recently replaced those on the farm of O. W. Bridgeman of Plain City, O., whose 340 acre farm had been razed by fire, destroying all buildings except the house and a shed. Property loss figures reflect only a portion of the total cost of farm fires however, as Bridgeman would readily testify. Thousands of tons of vitally needed food and meat are wasted, irreplaceable natural

resources are destroyed and often people perish. Bridgeman was pleased with the speed with which his farm was back in operation. Four days after the fire, he told the area Quonset dealer, Paul V. Reed, to build five Quonsets on his farm. Only 45 days after concrete was poured for the floor, the Quonsets were up and Bridgeman was back in business.

Bridgeman is happy with the buildings. He says, "My Quonset farmstead gives me much greater fire safety, and that's mighty important to me after losing so much in one fire."





## **Fumigate** Gardens Now

Harlen E. Smith, Extension Plant Pathologist Now is the time to fumigate garden soil in order to control root knot disease. Before fumigating, old plant trash and infected roots should be removed, and good seed bed prepared as if for planting. Soil moisture should be adequate to germinate seed.

Garden dowfume, D-D, Soilfume 60-40, Iscobrome 40, and Bromofume 40, are effective as garden soil fumigasts. 10 days or more before planting later this winter or in the spring providing the same precautions are used as with fall fumigation. A cover crop planted in the fall, ten days or more after fumigating, will not reduce the beneficial results of the treatment.

Soil fumigant may be applied in the furrow ahead of a flatbreaking operation; however, results will probably not be as satisfactiory as when the fumigant is applied in a well-prepared seed bed. Care should be taken in order that unfumigated soil will not be mixed with the fumigated soil. Be sure to use disease-free transplants.

This weeks Mystery Farm and its outstanding improvements is the results of the persistant, hard headed, hard working efforts of an OAKIE, who showed outstanding intellengence back in his younger days. His first stroke of excellent judgment, came when he persuaded Miss Mary Danford to marry him at Billings, Oklahoma in 1920. We refer to that one and only, congenial gentleman, and intellegent, hard working farmer, Ray Skinner. It was exactly ten years before the Oakie showed what could be termed as "Inspirational Intelligence" and that was when he and his very talented wife pulled up stake in Oklahoma and moved to Hansford county, in 1930. Ray might have thought he made a mistake, because he hit Hansford county when we suffered drouth conditions and damaging farm prices. However, he never looked back or used a crying towel. He wanted land and he went in debt to buy his first half section in Hansford county, the land that is about one and one-half miles west of Spearman. Ray and Mrs. Skinner know the difficulties of paying for land and farming equipment during

drouth and disasterous price changes. This writer has heard him say that he

worked his farm to the best of his ability, and then hired out for day labor to keep his plan of life underway. Of course, he was fortunate in having such a wonderful wife. Mrs. Skinner taught school at Black School for 6 years and then taught in the Spearman school system for 9 years. They managed to purchase the original half section, then they bought the Mystery farm from Dolph Daniels. Dolph had made a very comfortable home out of the Mystery farm residence, a four bedroom modern home. However, it was up to Mr. and Mrs. Ray Skinner to add the large grainery, machine shop, chicken houses, hog house and a rent home to the improvements at the Mystery Farm.


Then came the Pioneer program of irrigation for the Hansford Area. Ray was one of the first farmers of this area to install an irrigation well, and he proved successful in that he harvested 87 bushels of maize per acre on a large portion of a half section of land the first year. This young couple (Mrs. Kumfelman is the forme daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Jackson) have three children. old son, Jim a 4 year old son and Karen a 2 year old daughter. enjoy their work, and have many privileges at the Skinner farm them in their economical pattern in the future.

This writer has regarded Ray and Bib Skinner as two of farmer - ranchers of this area. Both Ray and Bob live in Sp a beautful 3 bedroom modern brick home, and Bob and Mrs. lovely new home built only a few years ago. They (Bob and Mrs two children, Mike and Bill, truly two fine youngsters. Inciden Skinner is a Registered Nurse, and has been very beneficial in Hospital and Health programs of this county.



There is one experience that I want to tell about that took place outside Russia. It was when we left the Greater London Airport, New York. 
