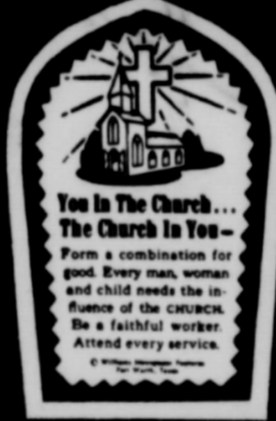

Patsy, 18-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Cator is a Senior at Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Pete Jr., 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Cator is a student at Roswell, New Mexico, Military Institute.

How Pete Cator finds time to supervise all his property and father his well behaved children is a tribute to his stubborn determination to be successful as a parent, husband and cattleman. This writer just missed Pete Saturday of last week. We drove over to Morse and learned that he had been in Morse only an hour before and was enroute back to his Now Mxico property and his family. Daily News Sports Writer The only unbeaten, united football team in the Texas Panhandle, Kress' amazing Kangaroos, retained their leadership in the Daily News' Class B rankings in this, the final week of the poll. The Roos have been the front runners for the past eight weeks.

Kress authored one of the most surprising comeback yarns of recent years. Forced to go for at least three years without a win, the Roos amazed almost every Panhandle football fan by winning their first game of the year, a 19-0 success at Quitaque. However, it appeared the Roos had gone victory starved for so long that when they did taste success they didn't know when to stop—and they didn't.

Kress compiled a perfect 10-0 record this year and scored 27-0 points to the opponents 86. The Roos, coached by successful Austin Bowes, will meet the Wilson Mustangs, of District 4-B, in a bi-district battle at Plainview, Thursday at 3 p. m.

The game resulted in a tie score, but Wilson won on penetrations.

Kress hurdled the last obstacle in its path to an unbeaten campaign Friday afternoon with a 26-7 victory over a good Farwell outfit.

The other teams this week, in order, include Gruver Matador, Wheeler, Claude, Estelline, Farwell, Groom, Stratford and Darrouzett.

Gruver, which closed out the regular season a week ahead of Kress, retained the No. 2 position this week. The Greyhounds compiled an impressive 9-1 mark over the regular route and won the District 1-B title in the process.

The Greyhounds will face the Matador Matadors, the No 3 team, in a bidistrict contest at Canyon, Dec. 2, at 7:30 p. m.

Matador (composed of many players from last year's fine team which won the District 2-B title, the bi-district banner and the regional championship looks as if it is up to its old tricks again. The Matador clinched the district title last Friday night with a 27-18 success of the potent Wheeler Mustangs.

The Matadors rolled up the same record as Gruver, its enemy in the bi-district tussle, 9-1.

Wheeler, with its 7-3 mark tumbled from the No. 3 post down to the No. 4 slot this week. Coach J. D. Atwell's team was one of the big surprise outfits in District 2-B this year. The Mustangs won only one game last year.

Another big surprise team, Claude, nailed down the No. 5 post. The Mustangs compiled a 7-3 mark this year.

Estelline's Bear Cubs shot down the Boys Ranch Ranchers, 12-7. Coach Pete Wood's club finished the year with a 6-3 mark.

The Groom Tigers, upset by Claude two weeks ago, roared back to polish off Vega 52-19, and claim the No. 7 slot this week. The Tigers finished the season with a 6-4 record.

Farwell, stopped by Kress, tumbled down to the No. 8 peg this week. The Steers, always a threat on the gridiron, closed out with a 6-4 mark.

Stratford, the No. 9 team, and Darrouzett the No. 10 club, finished their season two weeks ago. Stratford had a 6-4 season while Darrouzett won five, lost three and tied one.

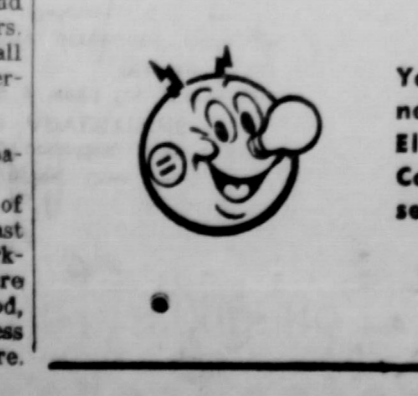
