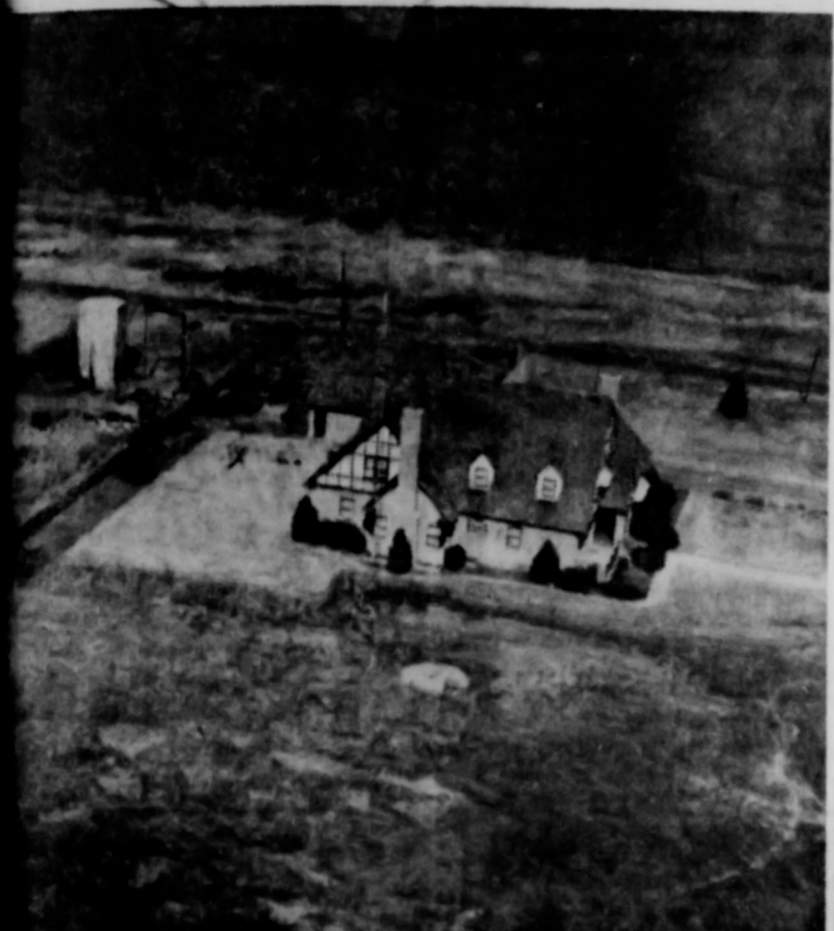

Chamber Of Commerce Banquet Well Attended Friday Night

The Spearman Chamber of Commerce held a business banquet Friday night, and it was a real whopper! The chairman of the various chamber committees brought newly compiled reports on what is happening in Spearman, and the facts were amazing.

R. V. Converse, chairman of the Government Affairs committee opened the discussion on the possibility of a new lake for Spearman, and Hansford County. He went so far as to describe the only approved dam site, and this wonderful location, would back water up 12 miles on the Palo Duro, making a complete water re-charging system for all of the irrigation wells in the county, plus an unexcelled fishing and recreation lake.

Jesse Davis, chairman of the housing committee discussed the need for more housing. He said 42 new families have moved to Spearman since the first of January. The housing committee and all interested towns people met with Mayor Gibner last night (Wednesday) to discuss some low Cost Federal housing for Spearman.

Texas Company Brings In 1,768 Barrel Producer

The Texas Company has added a big producer to the East Spearman-Atoka Field in Hansford County with its No. 1 Richardson in section 21, block 2, WCRB survey, given a potential of 1,768 barrels of 38 gravity oil. The well is eight miles northeast of Spearman. The producer, a south field extension, is two locations south of the Fulton No. 1 O'Loughlin completed for 1,500 barrels after being abandoned and later re-entered for a test of the Atoka.

Production in the new well is through perforations at 7,000-7,122 feet.

The well was one of five completed the past week, adding 2,013 barrels of oil to the daily potential of the Panhandle Field.

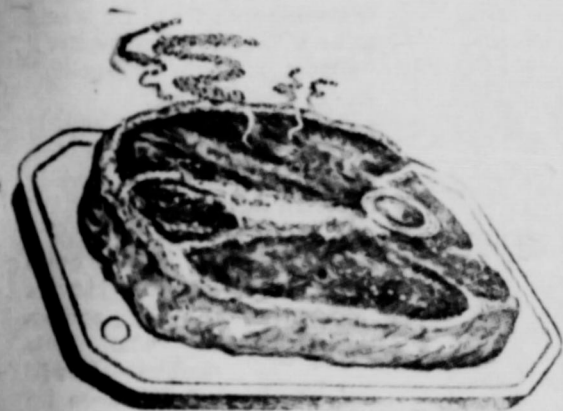

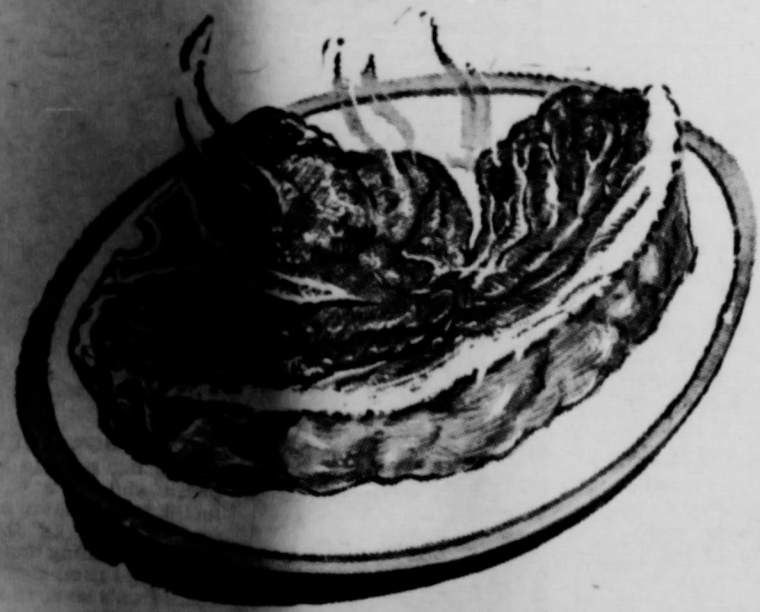

Morre Milk At Reduced Prices For Children Attending Summer School

Panhandle Outdoor Life Fish Population And Food Supply

S. V. Whitehorn

Two of the most important things in fish pond management are the control of fish population (kinds and numbers) and the production of food for the fish. The most practical way to provide food for the fish is to grow it in the pond where the fish live. This will consist of plant and animal life found in the water. The production of microscopic plant and animal life often referred to as plankton or "bloom" is the first and most important step in the whole food chain. An abundant supply of plankton can be produced in waters containing lots of plant food such as all fertilizers contain. This plant food normally finds its way into the pond from being dissolved from the soil as the water flows in from over the watershed. The plant food in the water is largely determined by the fertility of the watershed over which the water flows. Poor land means poor water and poor water means little food for the fish. To increase the production of food in the water, we now think in terms of fertilizing these acres of water as we fertilize land for crops. The principle is the same, and the same kind of fertilizers may be used—says the Farm Fish Pond Bulletin No. B-213 of Texas A & M College.

Frank Addington of Addington's Western Store, Pampa, recently related about a fellow that was seeking a job as a laborer. When the man was hired the boss told him to go to a certain vacant lot that contained lumber, etc. and build a five-room house. The new employee related that he knew absolutely nothing about how to construct a modern house. The contractor stated that knowledge wasn't necessary since the bystanders would tell him how it should be built. Lake managers can take the "bystanders' ideas and try them if they wish (which would probably be better than trying or doing nothing) but there is a vast amount of "tried and proven" ways of producing more fish put out by aquatic biologists and men who have spent years in scientific study in this field.

The late Gene Howe had a theory that what was needed in this part of the state was "growing ponds" to raise the fingerlings from bass bait to tench stockers. This can be done by many fish pond managers if they wish. Anyone will have to try and make an effort before anything worthwhile can be accomplished. Jim Nix of the Nix Trout Farm has proven that rainbow trout can be propagated in the Panhandle but it wasn't without a great amount of effort that Mr. Nix proved this fact.

A worn out field of white sand and new unproductive type you can imagine, will produce a handful of crops but the same field will produce tons of vitamin rich grains and feeds if its properly fertilized.

The average fisherman doesn't think in comparable terms when he drives by a wheat field that will produce fifty or more bushels of grain and then when he drives by a field (in some other part of the state) that will not make one bushel of grain under the same conditions. The same applies to ponds but the fish pond manager evidently hasn't thought why there aren't hundreds of pounds of fish in the lake or tank.

Many of the fish ponds in this area are "spring fed" and the pond is located in the lower part of the terrain and along or near the Canadian River. In the breaks and after you leave from "on top" the soil ranges from very fertile to poor. In the top areas of this part of the state the land is very fertile but along the river it consists of sand. Wonder why a pond near the river, spring fed, doesn't produce excellent fishing? This answer is simple enough for an aquatic biologist. Spring fed streams contain practically no fertility at all and probably the lake is made in or on sand. Usually sand contains very little fertility.

Lake Fryer, southeast of Perroyon, was noted for one of the best channel cat and bass lakes in the Panhandle before it washed out. The water of this lake drained over upland prairie land before it reached the lake.

After a pond is in proper balance the solution is crystal clear when it comes to producing fish. The answer is simply to fertilize the waters to the maximum degree. One quarter of a bale to the acre or three bales, any farmer who is irrigating on the joint plains knows what it takes to make the difference. Simply add the fertilizer. Dollars and cents is what it all boils down to. Anyone who has a pond can have good fishing with a little time, energy plus a few dollars spent. One of the prescriptions for fertilizing a pond runs something like this—400 lbs. cottonseed meal plus 200 lbs. of 20% superphosphate. Another runs 300-500 lbs. high grade commercial fertilizer. Both of these prescriptions pertain to the surface area of water.

Of course, keeping a pond in proper balance (game fish and large fish) is a necessity to good fishing in the Panhandle

Can West Texas Farmers Switch To Tomatoes?

College Station May — West Texas farmers "backed to the wall" by acreage controls and low grain sorghum prices are scanning the list of vegetable crops in a search for some profitable use of diverted acreage. Tomatoes can economically produce the necessary quality for moving into central states' markets.

A 1936 study conducted by Texas A & M's Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology revealed that farmers in Bailey, Parmer, Deaf Smith, Castro, Lamb, Hale, Lubbock and Floyd counties produced 348 bushels of tomatoes an acre. Production and marketing costs averaged \$188.00 an acre.

Chief competitor for West Texas tomatoes in the central states area will be California, long-time producer of high-quality vegetables. West Texas growers must realize the importance of management practices such as padding and covering for transporting tomatoes in containers, and the advantage of a good grading system if they expect to enter serious competition for any major market.

Unlike most West Texas crops, tomato prices fluctuate widely. Agricultural Economists cannot give a complete set of reasons for the annual price variations, but can partially explain them. Variations in Texas and competing area production of tomatoes as well as variations in the national disposable income are cited as important influences concerning these price differences.

Recipe for Rose Jar

The following is a re-print of a very old recipe for making a Rose jar. Please clip out immediately as it cannot be printed a gain soon.

Gather rose petals early in morning and toss lightly on a table in a cool, airy place until dew has dried. Then put them in half inch layers in a stone jar, sprinkle a little salt between layers. Add to these from morning to morning until you have enough for the purpose. Then let stand for ten days, stirring the whole each morning. Prepare an ounce of coarsely ground cloves and allspice and an ounce of shredded stick cinnamon, mixins well. Transfer the rose petals to another jar, scattering the spices between the layers. Cover this jar tightly and let stand in a dark place for three weeks when stock will be ready for permanent jar, which should be provided with a double cover.

Mix a quarter of an ounce of coarsely ground mace, allspice and cloves, half a grated nutmeg, half an ounce of finely shredded cinnamon, an ounce of powdered orris root and a quarter of a pound of dried lavender flowers. Then fill the permanent jar with alternate layers of the stock and this mixture. Add a few drops of several essential oils such as rose, geranium, neroli and bitter almond to each layer. Over the whole pour an ounce of fine cognac or rose-extract. These proportions
