## Dry Weather Stops Planting Of Wheat In County

In fact, we haven't had a good rain in almost 3 weeks now, and we have had extreme hot temperatures the past 3 weeks. Some of the grass is beginning to turn brown, and cow men also are needing a good rain.

**Turkey Growers Warner Of Chiggers**

Practically all Texas turkey producers face the possibility of loss due to chigger damage during the summer and fall months, warns

Joe Wakefield, Department of Poultry Science, Texas A&M College.

Unfortunately, most flockowners do not realize their birds are infested with chiggers until an attempt is made to sell them at

market time, says Wakefield. Chiggers attach themselves to the skin in clusters on the breast, thigh and legs and secrete an enzyme which liquefies the skin and causes hard, red bumps and pox-like scabs. These abscessed and inflamed areas may make the birds worthless or cause them to sell at a greatly reduced price.

Only the larval stage of the chigger is parasitic to animals, points out Wakefield. It is during this time that the chigger must have a blood meal for further development. The adult chigger hatches out in weedy or grassy areas and attaches himself to the bird. It remains on the bird for a period of three to eight days, then drops off to continue its life cycle on the ground. Because it takes two to five weeks for the scabs to heal, he advises checking the flock periodically as long as they remain on the range.

Since poultry is susceptible to insecticide poisoning, the best place to control chiggers is on the ground, points out Wakefield. If there is no practical way to keep birds out of weedy or grassy areas, he says the range should be sprayed or dusted with one and one-half to two pounds actual toxaphene or chlordane or 0.25

**SUMMIT TALKS**  
The Russian Bear has his propaganda machine going at full speed producing advertising designed to convince other countries that Russia is leading the march for world peace. Most Washingtonians in public life recognize that this propaganda barrage has been effective, even though some will not admit it. Our efforts to counteract it by exposing it for what it really is, have not been too successful, because the State Department seems to lack the necessary imagination to offset it. Our knowledge of the purpose which Russia is pursuing should enable anticipatory moves on the part of this country to neutralize 90 percent of the propaganda, insofar as other countries are concerned.

Many here feel that it is time for this country to take the initiative and to formulate a policy and an agenda for a summit meeting that will insure participation by those countries who are acting in good faith and expose who are acting in bad faith for what they are.

**The National Debt**  
By the time this letter reaches you, the Administration will probably have asked for authority to increase the national debt to 288 billion dollars. The permanent debt ceiling is \$275 billion. The Administration heretofore asked this session of Congress for approval to raise the debt ceiling to \$280 billion on a temporary basis. This was done. It presently appears that the new request of the Administration will be that the permanent ceiling be raised from \$275 billion to \$285 billion and the temporary ceiling be lifted from \$280 billion to \$288 billion. The temporary ceiling of \$280 billion would probably run until June 30, 1959.

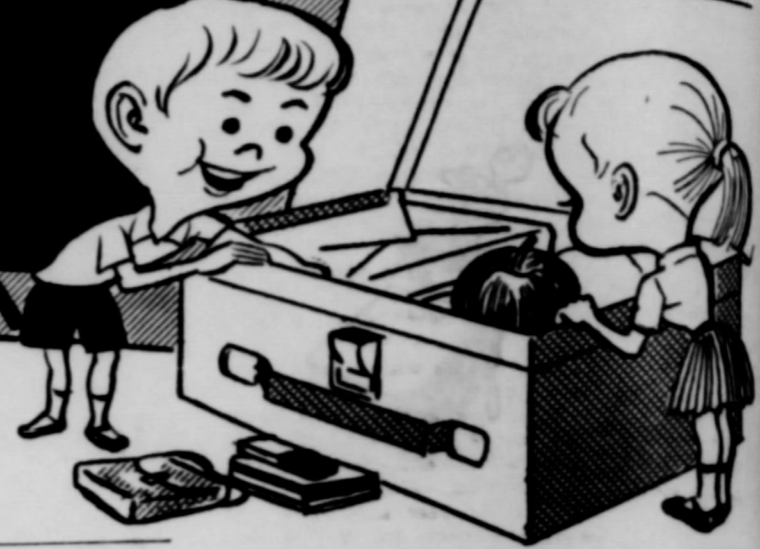

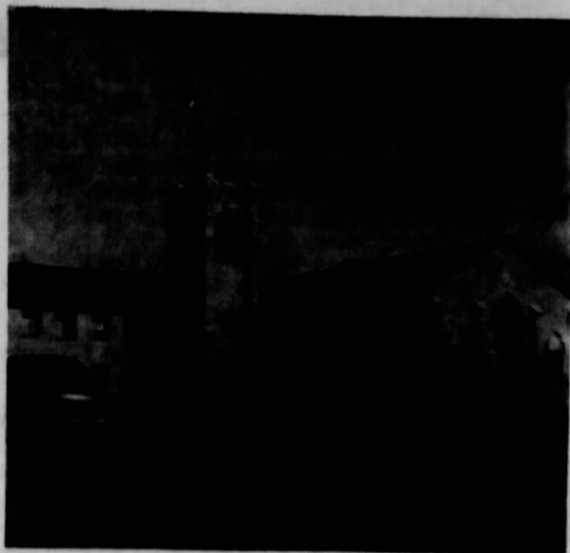

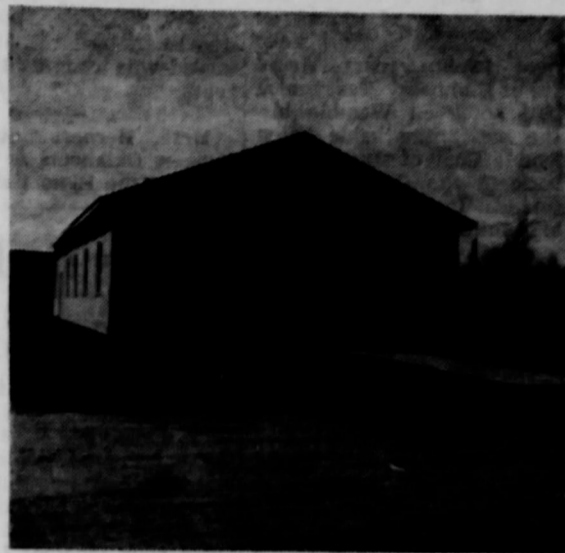

**BAPTIST BUILDING PROGRAM**

Due to the rapid increase in population in Spearman, Baptists of Spearman have faced the embarrassing situation of presenting their well planned educational program without comfortable facilities. This problem has been acute for the last few months. With an enrollment of 540 and a regular attendance in Sunday school of near 300, Sunday school officials have faced the necessity of converting hall ways and dining rooms into temporary class rooms. For almost six months plans have been made and revised upward to build an Educational Building. Now the final plans are being executed and the two story \$140,000.00 Educational Building is under construction.

The Baptist Sunday School organization has a total of 34 classes that range in attendance from the 38 members of Mrs. Jarvis Beginner Class to 6 in one of the three nursery class. Obviously, many of the present classes should be divided into smaller units for efficiency and comfort.

With the completion of the new Educational Building, Sunday School officials will have departmental assembly rooms and individual class rooms for servicing the present enrollment, and room to comfortably process additional students up to an approximate enrollment of 750 pupils.

The new building will add facilities for four new nurseries; Two new Beginners department class rooms; three primary department class rooms; Junior department assembly room with 6 departmental class rooms; two Intermediate departments and six class rooms each. The young married folk department will include four additional class rooms.

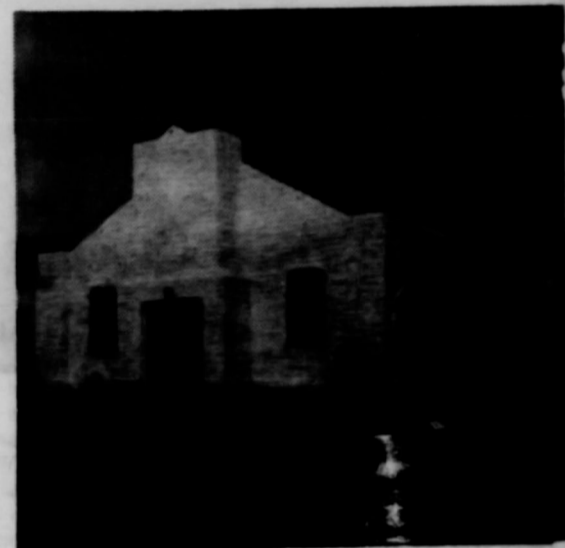
This will leave the Adult department to move into the basement of the church and take over some of the class rooms vacated by the Junior and Intermediate departments.

The Building Committee have revised their estimates upward, so that it now appears that the construction and furnishing cost of the Educational Department will be approximately \$140,000.00. Arrangements have been completed to borrow funds that will be needed to complete the program. However, the Building Committee plan to sponsor a campaign of sacrificial contributions during the building period in hopes of collecting approximately \$50,000.00. This would make the loan a modest loan, and would not place a burden on the future budgets of the church.
